To the Board of Docks:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my supervision for the quarter ending July 31, 1893:

#### WORK OF CONSTRUCTION UNDER NEW PLAN.

##### NORTH RIVER.

##### SECTIONS SOUTH OF WEST FOURTEENTH STREET.

##### CLEANING PAVEMENT.

The pavement on new made land between Pier "A" and West Tenth street, North river, has been cleaned and sprinkled from time to time, as required, under resolution of the Board, May 12, 1892.

##### Between Dey and Barclay Streets.

The new made land between Dey and Barclay streets is being paved under Contract No. 447. In progress.

##### West Washington Market Section—Resolution of the Board, July 9, 1891.

##### BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

Joints in granite were pointed; ten pieces of granite were set and, backing logs were placed and fastened.

##### EARTH FILLING.

75 loads of earth filling were received from Brown & Fleming, and same were placed in rear of wall, making a total of 24,949 loads, with tickets, and 657 loads received on scow, without tickets.

##### PIER, NEW 14, N. R.

The work of widening Pier, new 14, North river, under resolution of the Board, April 28, 1892, is in progress.

##### BUILDING CRIB.

Crib-logs and facing-timbers were placed and fastened; also vertical chocks; rip-rap and cobblestone were discharged into crib.

##### REMOVING ROCK.

The work of removing the rock on the north and south sides, at inner and outer ends, of Pier, new 14, North river, is in progress.

##### Chamber Street Section—Resolution of the Board, November 21, 1878.

##### BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

Backing logs were placed and fastened.



*Jay Street Section—Resolution of the Board, January 30, 1892.***BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.**

Joints in granite were pointed; six pieces of coping were set, and backing logs were placed and fastened.

**EARTH FILLING.**

3,955 loads of earth filling were received from Brown & Fleming, without tickets, and same were placed in rear of wall, making a total to date of 21,547 loads, without tickets.

**PIER, NEW 22, N. R.**

The work of building Pier, new 22, North river, under resolution of the Board, April 20, 1893, is in progress.

*Franklin Street Section—Resolution of the Board, November 13, 1890.***BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.**

One closure stone was set in wall, and backing logs were placed and fastened.

**EARTH FILLING.**

87 loads of earth filling were received from Brown & Fleming, and same were placed in rear of wall, making a total to date of 43,617 loads.

*Canal Street Section—Resolution of the Board, December 10, 1891.***BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.**

Cobble and rip-rap were discharged between caps in rear of wall; 2 cross-caps were placed and fastened; deck plank was laid and fastened; 95 pieces of granite were set on wall foundation, backed up with 311 batches of concrete.

**EARTH FILLING.**

5,942 loads of earth filling were received from Brown & Fleming, and same were placed in rear of wall.

**BUILDING SEWER.**

The work of building a new sewer at the foot of Canal street is in progress.

**TEMPORARY DUMP.**

The work of building a temporary dumping-board at Canal street is in progress.

**PIER, NEW 36, N. R.**

Pier, new 36, North river, is being extended under resolution of the Board, March 23, 1893. In progress.

**PIER, NEW 38, N. R.**

Pier, new 38, North river, is being extended under resolution of the Board, March 1, 1893. In progress.

**PIER, NEW 40, N. R.**

Pier, new 40, North river, is being extended under resolution of the Board, October 6, 1892.

**PIER 42, N. R.**

Pier 42, North river, is being torn up and removed, and a new pier is being built upon the site of same, under Contract No. 433.

**SECTIONS NORTH OF WEST FOURTEENTH STREET.***Pier at West Fifteenth Street.*

The work of building a new pier at the foot of West Fifteenth street under Contract No. 454, is in progress.

*West Twenty-third Street Section, South End—Resolution of the Board, November 5, 1880.***BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.**

Cobble and rip-rap were discharged on wall foundation; 173 vertical piles were driven, regulated and staylathed, and 36 bracing piles were driven and regulated.

**WEST TWENTY-THIRD STREET.**

Foundation and bracing piles were sawed off to grade; foundation piles were located; longitudinal and transverse caps were placed and fastened; 4 binding frames were built and sunk to place; 9 concrete blocks were set and chain-holes between blocks were filled with concrete in bags.

**WEST TWENTY-SIXTH STREET.**

Cobble and rip-rap were discharged on wall foundation; 34 vertical piles were driven, regulated and staylathed; 29 bracing piles were driven and regulated; foundation piles were located; 2 binding frames were built and sunk to place; 11 longitudinal, 1 transverse and 2 bench caps were placed and fastened; 5 concrete blocks were set and chain-holes were filled with concrete in bags.

**REMOVING OLD WORK.**

The old platform at West Twenty-fourth street and portion of the old wooden bulkhead between Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth streets were removed.

**BETWEEN WEST TWENTY-FOURTH AND WEST TWENTY-FIFTH STREETS.**

The work of paving between West Twenty-fourth and West Twenty-fifth streets, under Contract No. 451, is in progress.

**PIER AT WEST THIRTY-FOURTH STREET.**

The work of erecting an iron awning shed on the pier at West Thirty-fourth street, under Contract No. 437, is in progress.

*West Forty-third Street Section—Resolution of the Board, September 3, 1891.***BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.**

Rip-rap stone was discharged on wall foundation; 184 pieces of granite were set and backed up with 547½ batches of concrete; 21 pieces of coping were set and backing logs were placed and fastened.

**EARTH FILLING.**

3,061 loads of earth filling were received under Secretary's Order No. 12920, and same were placed in rear of wall.

**REMOVING OLD WORK.**

A portion of the old crib-bulkhead at West Forty-fourth street, was removed.

*West Fifty-second Street Section, North End—Resolution of the Board, February 6, 1889.***BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.****DREDGING.**

Mud and stone were excavated and removed from bulkhead wall area. Mud was pumped from wall foundation with section pump operated from 12-ton derrick. 499 batches of concrete were mixed and put in bags and set on rock foundation; 42 batches of concrete were mixed and spread on top of concrete in bags; 12 concrete blocks were set on wall foundation; 61 pieces of granite were set; 5 pieces of coping were set on top of granite, and chain holes in blocks were filled with concrete in bags.

**EARTH FILLING.**

446 loads of earth filling and 965 loads of ashes were received from the Department of Street Cleaning and placed in rear of wall. Total to date 9,147 loads under Secretary's Order No. 12300.

*West Fifty-seventh Street Section—Resolution of the Board, August 1, 1889.***EARTH FILLING.**

775 loads of earth filling and 100 loads of ashes were received from the Department of Street Cleaning and placed in rear of wall. Total to date 131,742 loads under Secretary's Order No. 10590.

**EAST RIVER.***Stanton Street Section—Resolution of the Board, March 1, 1893.***BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.**

Cobble and rip-rap were deposited on wall foundation; 552 vertical piles were driven, regulated and staylathed; 424 foundation piles were sawed off; foundation piles were located; 14 special blocks were set in wall and chain holes between blocks were filled with concrete in bags.

**PIER, OLD 62, E. R.**

Mud and crib-work were removed in the work of removing the outer portion of Pier, old 62, East river, under Contract No. 439.

*East Twenty-fourth Street Section—Resolution of the Board, April 25, 1889.***BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.**

1,060 loads of rip-rap and about 50 cubic yards of granite spalls were placed in rear of wall. 24 lineal feet of backing log was placed and secured to the coping.

**PIER AT EAST TWENTY-FOURTH STREET.**

The pier at the foot of East Twenty-fourth street is being extended under resolution of the Board, May 18, 1893.

*East Twenty-fifth Street Section—Resolution of the Board, October 27, 1892.***STONE FILLING.**

Cobble stone was deposited on wall foundation; 4 extra vertical piles were driven; foundation piles were located; 10 special blocks were set in wall; 59 pieces of granite were set and backed up with 91 batches of concrete.

**REMOVING OLD WORK.**

Old work in line of wall between East Twenty-fifth and East Twenty-sixth streets was removed.

**EARTH FILLING.**

617 loads of earth filling were received from Thomas Smith, and same were placed in rear of wall under Secretary's Order No. 12762.

**CONTINUATION OF WALL.**

The work of continuing the wall through East Twenty-sixth street until it meets the wall in front of Bellevue Hospital is in progress.

**PIER AT EAST TWENTY-FIFTH STREET.**

The work of building a new pier at the foot of East Twenty-fifth street, under resolution of the Board, September 22, 1892, is in progress.

*East Ninety-first Street Section—Resolution of the Board, May 25, 1893.***BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.**

Borings were taken over site of bulkhead-wall with borer "Woodcock" to ascertain the nature of the river bottom.

*East Ninety-fourth Street Section—Resolution of the Board, April 25, 1889.***EARTH FILLING.**

986 loads of earth filling were received and placed in rear of wall by Thomas Smith. Total received to date, 11,364 loads.

*East Ninety-sixth Street Section—Resolution of the Board, October 31, 1889.***BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.**

516 square feet of deck planking were placed on caps in rear of masonry; 110 pieces of granite were set and backed up with 318 batches of concrete and joints in granite were pointed.

**REMOVING OLD WORK.**

A portion of the old bulkhead in rear of the new bulkhead-wall was removed to make way for filling.

**BETWEEN EAST NINETY-SIXTH AND EAST NINETY-SEVENTH STREETS.**

2,929 loads of earth filling were received and placed in rear of new bulkhead-wall from McManus & Quinn, under Secretary's Order No. 12981.

*East Ninety-ninth Street Section—Resolution of the Board, September 1, 1892.***BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.**

221 vertical piles were driven, regulated and staylathed; 3 binding frames were made and sunk to place and 48 foundation piles were sawed off.

*East One Hundred and Second Street Section—Resolution of the Board, May 21, 1891.***BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.**

1,241 cubic yards of cobble stone and 1,832 cubic yards of rip-rap were deposited on wall foundation; 14 extra vertical piles were driven; 30 lineal feet of longitudinal capping and 35 transverse caps were placed; foundation piles were located; 30 lineal feet of backing-log was placed; 12 concrete foundation blocks were set; 94 pieces of granite were set and backed up with 190 batches of concrete.

**EARTH FILLING.**

4 loads of earth filling were received from Plunkitt & Smith, under Secretary's Order No. 11688, and same were placed in rear of wall; also received 458 loads of earth filling on tickets from Thomas Smith, and same were placed in rear of wall.

*East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Street Section—Resolution of the Board, 28th March, 1889.***GENERAL CHARGE.**

Mud, sand and gravel were pumped from rock bottom in slip at north end of section, to get required depth of water.

**DEPARTMENT YARDS.***West Fifty-seventh Street Yard.*

Blacksmith has done ironwork for the different sections of the work; for floating property and for general repairs.

Molds and cores were stripped and fifteen 12-foot standard blocks, containing 503.25 cubic yards; five 6-foot standard blocks, containing 190 cubic yards; four 5-foot special blocks, containing 86.66 cubic yards; two 7-foot special blocks, containing 51.33 cubic yards and five supplementary blocks, containing 16.50 cubic yards were made.

3,500 barrels of Portland cement were received and stored and samples tested and recorded. The yard has been maintained in good order.

*East Twenty-fourth Street Yard.*

Ironwork was made and repaired by the blacksmith for the work on the East river, and for the maintenance of the yard.

Molds and cores were stripped and taken down as required, and the following blocks were made: 2 standard and 29 special "B" blocks, containing about 1,145 cubic yards of concrete.

6,959 barrels of Portland cement were received and stored for Department use and samples were sent to West Fifty-seventh Street Yard to be tested.

The yard has been maintained in good order and condition.

**FLOATING PROPERTY.**

The Floating Property of the Department consists of the following:

100-ton derrick "City of New York," 12-ton derrick No. 1, 12-ton derrick No. 2, 12-ton derrick No. 3, 10-ton derrick.

Tug "Manhattan."

Tug "Pier."

14 pile-drivers, Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13 and 14.

15 deck scows, Nos. "B," "C," "D," "E," "F," "H," "I," "K," "L," "M," "N," "O," "P," "R" and "S."

4 divers' scows, Nos. "A," "G," "N" and "S."

Boring machine "Woodcock."

Steam launch "Inspector."

2 naphtha launches, one 25 feet and one 21 feet.

19 yawl boats, 2 skiffs, 2 bateaux, 1 rowboat and 5 sounding-boats.

2 sets of land ways, one 30 feet high and one 45 feet high.

1 set 58 feet inclined pile-driver ways.

Rock-drilling machine with ways, 19 feet high.

100-ton derrick has handled blocks for the various sections of the bulkhead-wall, as required, and various repairs have been made by the crew and the same has been kept in good order and condition.

12-ton Derrick No. 1—This derrick has been in commission during the quarter, and has been repaired and in use on the various sections of the work.

12-ton Derrick No. 2—This derrick has been in commission during the quarter, and has been repaired and used on the various sections of the work.

12-ton Derrick No. 3—This derrick has been in commission during the quarter, and has been repaired and used on the various sections of the work.

10-ton Derrick—This derrick has been in commission during the quarter, and has been used on the various sections of the work.

Tugs "Manhattan" and "Pier"—These tugs of the Department have been employed in the work of towing for the Department during the quarter.

Naphtha Launch (21 feet)—This launch is being used in connection with the various sections on the North, East and Harlem rivers in carrying parcels, etc., on the different sections of the work.

Naphtha Launch (25 feet)—This launch is being used in connection with the work of building crib-bulkheads at Riker's Island.

Steam-launch "Inspector"—Various repairs have been made from time to time, and she has been in use during the quarter.

Divers' scows "A," "G," "N," and "S"—Have been kept in good order.

The deck scows have been kept in almost constant use.

Small boats, skiffs, etc., have been kept in good order and condition.



*Materials and Supplies.*

Various materials and supplies for use of floating property have been received and expended in part, and the remainder has been stored for future use, as required.

*Miscellaneous.*

Various pieces of work have been done at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard for the use of floating property, and for other work, such as hanging fenders, straight edges, ladders, signs, pike poles, etc. The force of floating property has also been employed in filing saws, spinning oakum, pitch, pumping out scows and in general care of floating property.

## WORK OF CONSTRUCTION NOT UNDER NEW PLAN.

*Bulkhead One Hundred and Thirty-eighth to One Hundred and Fortieth street, H. R.*

12,325 loads of filling were received under Secretary's Order No. 11226 and same were placed behind bulkhead.

*Crib-bulkhead One Hundred and Twenty-ninth to One Hundred and Thirtieth street, N. R.*

The work of building crib-bulkhead at the above premises under Contract No. 427 was completed on May 19, 1893.

## SURVEYING PARTY.

In connection with the work of the bulkhead or river wall and the new piers at the different sections on the North, East and Harlem rivers, bench marks and base lines have frequently been verified, and from them lines, grades, etc., have been furnished from time to time, as required.

Lines, grades, etc., have also been furnished for the work of repairs under contract.

Surveys of the water-front on the North, East and Harlem rivers, and the structures thereon, have been made at various places, as required, and the same have been plotted and placed on file, and tracings therefrom have been prepared and plotted.

29,139 disc soundings to ascertain the depth of water in 235 slips, and 5,209 rod soundings to ascertain the depth of soft mud have been taken in 50 slips by the surveying and sounding parties, of which 14,648 disc soundings in 120 slips and 2,969 rod soundings in 30 slips were on

the East and Harlem rivers, and 14,491 disc soundings in 115 slips and 2,240 rod soundings in 20 slips were on the North river.

Of the above, 1,836 disc soundings in 32 slips and 4,588 rod soundings in 38 slips were for construction, and 27,303 rod soundings in 203 slips and 651 rod soundings in 12 slips were for general repairs and examinations—soundings taken before and after dredging.

Of the above soundings, 22,616 disc soundings in 220 slips were taken on the North, East and Harlem rivers.

Most of the soundings have been plotted and placed on file.

All of the dredging done by the Department of Docks during the quarter has been supervised.

Dredging done by lessees, claimants and others, under permit or order of the Board, has been supervised.

The measurements of all dredging by the Department of Docks has been made.

Reports, estimates, etc., of work done have been prepared and receipts given.

Work other than dredging by lessees, claimants and others, by order or permit of the Board has been attended to.

The automatic tide gauges have been attended to.

Seventh—The duties of the internes shall be such as usually pertain to the office of Senior Assistant in other hospitals, and they shall be at all times subject to the orders of the Resident Physician;

Eighth—The attending physicians and the internes shall serve without pay, excepting that the latter may reside within the hospitals, if the resources of the hospitals permit.

The 742 deaths represent a death-rate of 20.28 against 18.54 for the previous week, and 18.64 for the corresponding week of 1892.

The increase of 64 deaths was mainly due to an increase of 14 in the deaths from diphtheria, of 6 from cancer, of 11 from phthisis, of 24 from Bright's disease and of 13 from old age, partially offset by a decrease of 13 in the deaths from pneumonia, and of 7 from small-pox.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth Ward, and from typhoid fever in the Twenty-second Ward. The single death from measles was in the Twenty-fourth Ward.

## TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
