Report of Transactions, April 4 to April 9, 1910.

COMMUNICATIONS RECEIVED.

From Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Assistant Secretary transmits certified copy of a resolution adopted by the Board, which reads as follows:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of and concurs in the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted February 8, 1910, in relation to an issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), the proceeds whereof to be used by the Commissioner of Correction for the purpose of paying the salaries of two Matrons reinstated by the order of the Court, for whom no provision was made in the Budget for the year 1910, and that for the purpose of providing means therefor the Comptroller be and he hereby is authorized, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, to issue special revenue bonds of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding two thousand dollars (\$2,000), redeemable from the tax levy of the year succeeding the year of their issue.

From Committee on Salaries and Grades, Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Petition of Matrons, Orderlies, etc., Department of Correction, for increase of salary, will be considered on April 8, 1910, at about 3 o'clock p. m. The Commissioner or a representative of his Department asked to be present. On file.

From Commissioners of the Sinking Fund—Secretary transmits copy of a resolution, which reads as follows:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute a renewal of the lease to the City of premises No. 516 East Twentieth street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Correction, for a period of one year from April 1, 1910, at an annual rental of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200), payable quarterly, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease; lessor, John W. Brookman; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

From Municipal Civil Service Commission—Stating that Dr. Harlan E. Linehan had passed a non-competitive examination for Resident Physician, under provisions of Rule XII, paragraph 3. Appointed at Penitentiary, pending establishment of an eligible list.

From the Comptroller—Returning proposal of the Manhattan Supply Company for Supplies for Manufacturing Purposes, for substitution of sureties. Substitution approved.

From Board of Trustees, Bellevue Hospital—Sending copy of Senate Bill No. 657, which would permit certain City Departments to send to a private hospital such Physicians or Nurses as may have contracted a contagious disease while in performance of duty, etc. Assistant Corporation Counsel in charge of legislation also transmits copy of said bill. Notification sent to Assistant Corporation Counsel McGoldrick and to Secretary, Board of Trustees of Bellevue Hospital, that the Commissioner of Correction approves of the provisions of the aforesaid bill.

From United States Engineer Office, New York, District No. 1—Stating that a survey of the East River for entire length of Blackwells Island, East Channel, is to be made, with a view to the future improvement of the river. There will be two surveying parties of eight men each, with launch, etc. Colonel Black, Engineer in Charge, asks for passes to enable men to land on Blackwells Island when necessary in the performance of their work. Letter acknowledged, and sixteen passes sent. Wardens of Penitentiary and Workhouse notified.

From State Commission of Prisons—Secretary encloses copy of Assembly bill introduced by Mr. Tombs, one of the provisions of which requires the Department of Correction to vacate its occupancy of Blackwells Island on or before January 1, 1912. Secretary of State Commission states that it will be impossible to do this. A date might be fixed, but time should be allowed sufficient to build and equip new prisons. Letter acknowledged. The Department of Correction will ask to have time extended.

From Bureau of Combustibles, Fire Department—Inspector Burke, in answer to inquiry, states that, provided no gasoline is stored, except in fuel tank of automobile, and which is not to be opened on premises, the installation of six (6) fire buckets of sand and a drip-pan covering the entire area under the car, the storage of automobile in Department building, West Fifty-third street, near Eighth avenue, is allowed, and special permit for one year has been issued. Receipt of letter acknowledged. Copies given to Warden Mallon and to Department Chauffeur.

From Heads of Institutions—Reporting that meats, fish, bread, milk, etc., received during week ending April 2, 1910, agreed with specifications of contracts. On file.

From Heads of Institutions—Reports, census, labor, hospital cases, punishments, etc., for week ending April 2, 1910. On file.

From Steamboat Bureau—From Marine Architect Furstenau, asking permission to substitute Oregon pine for the white pine called for in specifications for steamboat "Correction," it being found "practically impossible to get clear white pine of over sixteen feet in length, whereas Oregon pine of forty to fifty feet in length is obtainable." The prices of these materials are about the same. Recommendation of Marine Architect approved and substitution ordered.

From Steamboat Bureau—Report of Captain F. W. Parkinson on inspections made by him of new boats under course of construction during week ending April 2, 1910. On file.

From Steamboat Bureau—Regular monthly report of Architect Furstenau—"work on all boats progressing satisfactorily," etc.

From Steamboat Bureau—Report of Department Inspector of ice made on Harts Island for use of institutions and transported by steamer "Minnahanonck" as follows: To Storehouse, Blackwells Island, 227½ tons; to Rikers Island, 33 tons. Transportation will be continued until both ice houses are filled.

In accordance with the rules, a fire drill was held at Bellevue and Fordham Hospitals on March 23; at Harlem Hospital on March 24, and at Gouverneur Hospital on March 25.

Arrangements have been made with the Finance Department whereby permission is given that we may send our payrolls down early in the month, in accordance with previous custom. This will prevent the long delay to which your attention was called recently.

A previous recommendation was made that Ambulance Drivers in this Department should purchase at their own expense caps, rubber coats, rubber boots and cap covers. Roosevelt Hospital pays Ambulance Drivers \$20 to \$25 per month and maintenance; caps only. Presbyterian Hospital pays Ambulance Drivers \$18 to \$25 per month; the head Driver, who also runs the electric ambulance, \$40 per month. Caps, suits and rubber boots are supplied. New York Hospital pays at the main hospital \$35 and \$45 per month; at the House of Relief, \$25 to \$35 per month; everything furnished.

In a report received from the Supervising Engineer, Mr. M. J. Harkins, it appears that under the present system of piping at Harlem Hospital if a fire occurred it would be necessary for the Engineer to leave the power house, go to the cellar of the main building, shut off the valve to the house supply line before the fire pumps could be put up to the full pressure, and that if the fire engines of the City Department were connected with the Siamese connection and a pressure put on, it would probably burst all pipes connecting with the house supply. He recommends, in order to avoid this trouble the installation of an independent 4-inch line from the power house to the main building with a shut-off valve in the pump room, so that the Engineer could shut it off immediately in case of fire, thereby leaving the pressure on fire line only. His recommendation seems to call for approval and prompt action along lines suggested.

A letter has been received from W. H. Stewart, Radiographer, Harlem and Gouverneur Hospitals, asking for an assistant, whose services will be gratuitous, and offering to take on Fordham Hospital work as a part of his service. It is recommended that this be approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the recommendation that Ambulance Drivers should purchase caps, rubber coats, rubber boots and cap covers, at their own expense, was approved.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the installation of an independent 4-inch pipe line from the power house to the main building at Harlem Hospital, with a shut-off valve in the pump room, was approved, and the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to have the work executed as soon as practicable.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, the appointment of a voluntary Radiographer at Harlem and Gouverneur Hospitals was approved, and the offer of Dr. Stewart to act as Radiographer at Fordham Hospital was referred to the General Medical Superintendent for further investigation.

The General Medical Superintendent presented lists of changes in help at Bellevue Hospital for the three weeks ending March 5, 12 and 19, and, on motion, duly seconded and carried, these were referred to the Committee on Officers and Employees.

Dr. Brannan reported that, in response to a request of the Deputy Comptroller, he had called at the Department of Finance and conferred with the Chief Engineer and the Deputy Comptroller in regard to the claim of the William Horne Company for an extension of time on their contract until the date of the completion of their work. It is admitted in the Department of Finance that there had been a delay in the signing of the contract and that the facts warranted the extension of time claimed. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was therefore

Resolved, To grant the William Horne Company an extension of time on their contract for the construction of the fence until the date of the completion of the work, viz.: September 1, 1909.

The President reported that the Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appointed to consider the corporate stock Budget had recommended that revenue bonds be requested for the purpose of extending the psychopathic wards, and, upon motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To request the Board of Aldermen to authorize the issue of \$20,000 revenue bonds for this purpose, this amount to include the cost of the covered passageway.

The President reported that on March 24 he attended a hearing on the corporate stock Budget.

The Committee on Officers and Employees recommended the adoption of a rule as follows:

No person who shall have been in the Department less than three months shall be entitled to leave of absence with pay on account of illness. A person in the employ of the Department more than three and less than six months shall be entitled during illness to a leave of absence of two weeks with pay, and a person employed over six months to one month's leave of absence with pay. This rule does not apply to Nurses, and exceptions may be made in other cases at the will of the Board.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, these recommendations were adopted.

Communications.

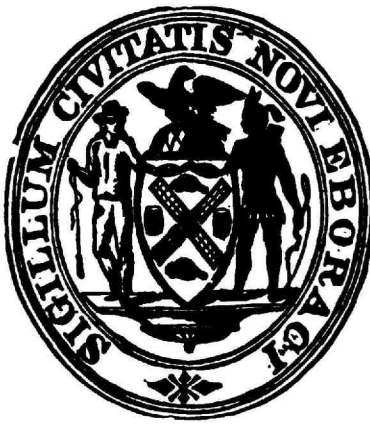
