REPORT FOR THE WEEK ENDING MARCH 21, 1914.

CHANGE IN DATING AND PAGING THE WEEKLY BULLETIN.

Attention is called to the fact that this number of the Weekly Bulletin, No. 11, is dated March 21, 1914. This, the date of publication, will hereafter appear on the title page. The vital statistics are those for the preceding week, in this case for the week ending March 14th.

In order to facilitate reference to items appearing in the Weekly Bulletin, the paging will hereafter be continuous, and inasmuch as ten numbers, each of eight pages, have already been issued, the present number will be found to commence with page 81. CO-OPERATION BETWEEN INSTITUTIONS AND THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

In its dealings with the various institutions with which its work brings the Department of Health into contact, unfavorable criticism often arises from a misunderstanding of the department's regulations or of the reasons which prompted them. Moreover, since none of us are infallible, it is possible that regulations may now and then be adopted, the strict enforcement of which work unnecessary hardship on officers of institutions sincerely anxious to co-operate with the public health authorities in every way. In order to promote mutually helpful relations between the Department of Health and the institutions in this City, the Commissioner invites criticisms and suggestions concerning the Department's attitude in any matter affecting the institutions and promises that all such communications will be given careful consideration.

NOTIFICATION OF VENEREAL DISEASES.

A resolution of the Board of Health, adopted February 20th, 1912, requires officers in charge of hospitals, dispensaries, clinics, homes, asylums and charitable institutions, to report the name of every patient under observation suffering from syphilis in every stage, chancroid, or gonorrhoeal infection of every kind.

When this order was originally promulgated, a report form was furnished by the Department, the preparation of which involved considerable clerical work. The performance of this additional clerical labor was found burdensome, and in order to simplify the work of the reporting institutions, a venereal disease journal was prepared and delivered to such institutions; this journal is to be kept in the office of the institution and inspectors of the Bureau of Infectious Diseases are instructed to call at regular intervals for the purpose of copying the journal entries.

Following these steps to facilitate the work of the several institutions, the Department now expects literal compliance with the resolution of February 20th. No institution which fails to comply can properly certify to its compliance with the rules and regulations of the Board of Health, as required annually by the State Board of Charities. The next visit of the inspector of the Bureau of Infectious Diseases will be made on or about April 1st. Subsequent visits will be made monthly and the venereal disease journal should be found in proper order when these visits are made.

The attention of dispensary officers and others who may be interested is called to the fact that the Department of Health provides facilities for the free bacteriological examination of discharges for the diagnosis of gonorrhoeal infections and provides, without charge, vaccines for the treatment of such infections. It also makes, without charge, the Wassermann test for the diagnosis of syphilis and examines specimens for treponema. These diagnostic and therapeutic facilities are extended only when the data required for the registration of the case are furnished by the physician or institution treating the patient.

ISOLATION FACILITIES IN HOSPITALS, HOMES, ASYLUMS, ETC.

A request was recently received by the Department for the transfer of a child suffering from a contagious disease from a large country institution outside of New York to the Willard Parker Hospital. In response to this request, a letter was written. the substance of which is reproduced here as indicating the present policy of the Department:

"My Dear Sir: "I regret that I am unable to comply with your request to have cases of contagious diseases removed from to the Willard Parker Hospital. I am informed that the Department has made such transfers in the past, but I cannot believe that the matter ever received very serious consideration. As an act of courtesy to your institution, compliance with your request is doubtless indicated; as a matter of justice to the children concerned. it is clearly contraindicated.

"The Sanitary Code prescribes that all hospitals and homes in this City shall have suitable facilities for the isolation of contagious cases. The principle is one which applies with equal force, whether in the City or country, and this Department will now use its power and influence to hinder rather than to facilitate the transfer of contagious cases, whenever and wherever such transfer involves a long journey with its attendant risks to the patient.

I feet quite sure that upon careful consideration you will assent to the proposition that all institutions which care for considerable numbers of children should have suitable facilities for isolation. Yours truly.

"S. S. GOLDWATER, Commissioner." ARE YOU BUYING CLEAN FOOD?

During the course of this campaign, almost twenty thousand inspections were made, and in approximately half of these conditions were unsatisfactory. As a result of the Department's activities most of the dirty places have been closed up, only a very small number having to be summoned to the Magistrates' Courts. It is believed

that the work will be practically completed by the middle of March.

The food clean-up campaign was inaugurated because of the many circumstantial complaints sent to the Commissioner of Health just prior to and during the Christmas holidays. The Commissioner instructed an Inspector, in whom he had great confidence, to make careful inspections in various parts of the City in order that these serious complaints might be confirmed or disproved and, much to his chagrin, found that the conditions were almost universally bad. In the majority of instances, the places complained of were merely dirty by reason of carelessness or lack of knowledge on the part of the proprietors. In other instances, structural defects also existed. Despite the small force of Food Inspectors available, the Commissioner formed a special "clean-up squad" by drafting Inspectors from the other bureaus and directed that a thorough tour of inspection of all places in the City where food was handled be at once undertaken. The City was divided into small districts and each Inspector required to make careful inspections of all places where food was handled.

Out of some twenty thousand places inspected, 6,134 were merely dirty; 2,021 had structural defects; in a little over 1,000 places, structural defects and filth existed side by side. It is gratifying to know 5,000 of the 6,000 dirty places have already been reinspected and of this number less than fifty had disregarded the instructions of the Department. These were summoned to the Magistrates' Courts where in every instance

fines were imposed in accordance with the gravity of the offense.

If the store you patronize is not kept clean, notify the Department of Health.

EXEMPT POSITIONS VACANT.

The attention of physicians is called to the fact that a vacancy in the position of Attending Physician to the Tuberculosis Clinic exists in Stapleton Clinic, Borough of Richmond. The position requires attendance at the Clinic on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday from two to four p. m., for the examination and treatment of tuberculosis patients, together with such visits to these patients in their homes as may be necessary. The Physicians attached to this service receive a compensation of \$600 per annum and are required to conform to all the rules and regulations of the Department of Health governing its employees.

Candidates for the position should make application to Dr. John S. Billings, Director, Bureau of Infectious Diseases, No. 149 Centre st., New York City, and should include in their applications a statement concerning their special qualifications for the

position.

ALMOST LOST A CORONET.

A few years ago a young lady socially prominent in this city became engaged to a foreign nobleman. In order that the marriage should be recognized as valid in his country, it was necessary for the bride to attach to the various required papers a transcript of the official record of her birth. As she was born in this city some thirty years previously, the family communicated with the Department of Health requesting the necessary transcript. To their dismay, they found that the attending physician had neglected to register the birth, and there was no record whatever at the Department of Health. After much difficulty, the physician who had officiated at the birth, and who was now over eighty years of age, was located and a certificate of birth obtained from him. A blank petition to allow this certificate to be filed was then forwarded to the parents, with instructions to fill out the same and make the necessary affidavits before the American Consul in their city. On the receipt of the petition, affidavits and certificate of birth, the matter was presented to the Board of Health, which thereupon consented to record the delayed certificate, thus enabling another of America's fair daughters to realize her fond dream of wearing a coronet. It is not hard to imagine what the young lady and her family thought of the physician's failure to file the certificate at the time of birth.

FILE YOUR BIRTH CERTIFICATE PROMPTLY.

It is estimated that fully ninety-eight per cent. of all births occurring within the city limits are filed with the Department of Health and that ninety-five per cent. of the returns are received within ten days after the dates of birth. This almost complete compliance with the law has been obtained within the past few years, and then only as a result of disciplinary action on the part of the Board of Health, fines being imposed ranging from ten to one hundred dollars, the amount depending upon the extent of the violations and the record of the individual in this regard.

The Department, by reason of this satisfactory condition, is now in a position to measure its infant mortality (that is, the mortality under one year of age)—on each one thousand births reported, enabling comparisons to be made between the rate of this City with that of the large foreign cities and with a few of the large domestic

ones.

The uses to which the birth records are put at the present time are many and important and may be divided into five classes:

1, Scholastic; 2, Commercial; 3, Legal; 4, Social, and 5, Statistical.

The child seeking admission to the public schools must present a record of its birth, certified by the Department of Health.
 The law governing the issuance of employment certificates to children between

as contained in the certificate on file with the Department of Health.

3. Furnishing proof of age is often required in securing legacies, pensions, etc. Very often in criminal cases the prosecution of persons charged with abduction or

fourteen and sixteen years of age, compels the applicant to furnish evidence of age,

rape depends upon the evidence on record as to the age of complainant.

4. In Continental Europe marriages may not be contracted unless certain

formalities are complied with and one of these is the filing of certified transcripts of official records of birth of the contracting parties.

5. The gauge of infant mortality is best expressed by the number of deaths per thousand births reported and is used entirely by English and Continental statisticians in their reports on vital statistics and will undoubtedly come into general use in the

country when births are recorded in their entirety.

A word may be said as to the advisability of physicians and midwives complying strictly with the provision of the law which compels the filing of a certificate of birth within ten days after its occurrence. It is our experience that the observance of the law is far more complete where medical attendants are held to a strict compliance with the ten-day provision than if laxity as to the date of filing prevailed. The Department of Health therefore urges physicians not to wait beyond the seventh or eighth day for parents to make up their minds as to the given name of the infant, but to send in the certificate without the given name, which latter may be added to the certificate at the future convenience of the parents. Another important procedure for the medical attendant to follow is to insist upon an acknowledgment by the Department of Health within three or four days of the receipt of certificates mailed to it.

MORTALITY FOR WEEK ENDING MARCH 14, 1914.

There were 1,705 deaths and a death rate of 15.93 per 1,000 of the population reported during the past week as against 1,848 deaths and a rate of 17.94 during the corresponding week in 1913, an absolute decrease of 143 deaths and a relative decrease of 215 deaths, equivalent to a lowering in the weekly death rate of 2.01 point.

The following causes showed material decreases: measles, scarlet fever, diphtheria and croup, whooping cough, typhoid fever cerebro-spinal meningitis, diarrhoeal diseases under five years of age, other digestive diseases, lobar pneumonia, broncho pneumonia, Bright's disease and nephritis; the causes showing an increased mortality were: organic heart diseases, influenza. The number of deaths reported from all forms of tuberculosis remained the same.

Viewed from the point of age grouping, the mortality of infants under one year of age showed a decrease of 24 deaths, between one and five years of age 67 deaths, between five and sixty-five years of age 25 deaths, and at sixty-five years and over 27 deaths. It is thus seen that the greatest saving was among the children under five years of age, due to the diminished prevalence of the infectious diseases and

The death rate for the first eleven weeks of 1914 was 15.45 per 1,000 of the population as against a rate of 15.79 for the corresponding period of 1913, a decrease of .34 of a point.

AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of The City of New York and the Counties of New York, Bronx, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and for other purposes, and to levy taxes on the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation in The City of New York, pursuant to law. in and for the year 1914.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. There shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, the sum of one hundred and forty-two million six hundred and nine thousand four hundred and thirty-five dollars and fifty-five cents (\$142,609,435.55), to pay the expenses included in the Budget for the year 1914, for conducting the public business of The City of New York in each Department and branch thereof, including principal and interest of the City debt, and an amount provided for deficiencies in taxes, pursuant to chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, amounting in the aggregate to one hundred and ninety-two million nine hundred and ninety-five thousand five hundred and fifty-one dollars and sixty-two cents (\$192,995,551.62), remaining after deducting therefrom the sum of six million six hundred and thirty thousand one hundred and sixty-five dollars and sixty-six cents (\$6,630,165.66), being the aggregate of the county charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Bronx, Kings, Queens and Richmond, included therein,

which sum is hereinafter levied and imposed upon said counties in the manner provided by the Greater New York Charter; and after also deducting the sum of five hundred and twenty thousand and fifteen dollars and six cents (\$520,015.06), being the aggregate amount of borough assessments or special tax, in the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, which sum is hereinafter levied and imposed upon the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 679 of the Laws of 1911 (section 247 of the Greater New York Charter); and after also deducting the sum of forty-three million two hundred and thirty-five thousand nine hundred and thirty-five dollars and thirty-five cents (\$43,235,935.35), supplied by the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, as stated by the Comptroller of The City of New York in a communication to this Board dated February 21, 1914, transmitting his certificates of the amount of the appropriations made for the year 1914, copies of which communication and certificates and of the said Budget are as follows:

BUDGET FOR 1914. Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this, the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, the total amount

appropriated being:

One hundred and ninety-two million nine hundred and ninety-five thousand five hundred and fifty-one dollars and sixty-two cents (\$192,995,551.62), divided as follows: First-The amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business, to meet the debt charges of said City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, and to meet a direct State tax levied upon the City for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen:

One hundred and eighty-three million three hundred and forty-five thousand three hundred and seventy dollars and ninety cents (\$183,345,370.90)

Second-The amount estimated to be the deficiency on January 1, 1913, in the product of taxes theretofore levied, deemed to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for, as required by chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, being section 248 of the Greater New York Charter:

Two million five hundred thousand dollars (\$2,500,000).

Third-The amounts estimated to be required to pay the assessments levied against the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen:

Five hundred and twenty thousand and fifteen dollars and six cents (\$520,015.06) Fourth—The amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Bronx, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen:

Six million six hundred and thirty thousand one hundred and sixty-five dollars

and sixty-six cents (\$6,630,165.66). Resolved, That this, the Budget of The City of New York, as hereby made in pursuance of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, shall be administered under the following terms and conditions:

(a) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries Regular Employees.

(b) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries Temporary Employees,"

(c) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of Wages Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Wages Regular Employees."

(d) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule that

"Wages Temporary Employees." (e) That no transfers shall be made from or to appropriations classified as "Hire of Horses and Vehicles with Drivers," "Hire of Horses and Vehicles without Drivers" or "Hire of Automobiles." except to or from an appro-

priation classified as "Hire of Horses and Vehicles with Drivers," "Hire of Horses and Vehicles without Drivers," or "Hire of Automobiles." (f) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Fees and Commissions" to any other appropriation or schedule than "Fees and

Commissions." (g) That no transfers shall be made from any of the appropriations made herein under any classification other than "Personal Service" to any appropriation classified as "Personal Service," except in cases where the title of appropriation specifically provides for transfers herein forbidden, or in cases where appropriations were made under the classification of "General Repairs," if, upon the written statement of the Department Head, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment finds that the repair work can be done more eco-

nomically by departmental labor. herein under any classification where the title of the appropriation prohibits such transfer or when the appropriation is made conditional upon the purchase of some stated article or articles or for the payment of insurance or taxes, although otherwise the transfer might be proper under the Budget ber of incumbents previously authorized.

resolutions in the Budget for 1914.

Second-That no change shall be made by any Board or head of an Office, Bureau or Department in the City or County governments in the schedules of "Salaries Regular Employees"; "Salaries Temporary Employees"; "Wages Regular Employees" "Wages Temporary Employees"; "Fees and Commissions," herein contained, except when authorized thereto by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that no requests for changes shall be considered except as follows:

(a) In the case of schedules or appropriations of "Salaries Regular Employees," where the proposed change will not increase the amounts expendable in any month to more than one-twelfth of the total amount herein appropriated for

"Salaries Regular Employees."

(b) In the case of schedules or appropriations of "Wages Regular Employees," where the proposed change will not increase the amounts expendable in any week to more than the pro rata of the number of working days in such week to the total number of working days provided for such schedule line for the whole year.

Third—That in case of modifications of schedules or transfers within appropriations classified as "Personal Service," where one of the appropriations is a Tax Levy part appropriation, the full amount of cash necessary to pay the total salaries or wages of the incumbents transferred for the balance of the year 1914 shall be transferred to the appropriation to which the incumbents are transferred.

Fourth-(a) That the heads of the several Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County governments shall prepare their several payrolls for audit by the Department of Finance in accordance with the items of the aforesaid schedules, entitled "Salaries Regular Employees"; "Salaries Temporary Employees"; "Wages Regular Employees"; "Wages Temporary Employees"; "Fees and Commissions," or in case these items have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in accordance with the items of the schedules as changed, and that no payroll shall be passed by the Department of Finance unless the incumbents and the rate of individual compensation agree with such schedule lines as originally adopted or as hereafter modified by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

(b) That each and every payroll shall be accompanied by a recapitulation showing the exact amount expended to and including said payroll for every item appearing on the schedules supporting any of the appropriations against which all or any part of the moneys involved in said payrolls is to be charged, and that this recapitulation shall contain the full schedule supporting any (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the full schedules

as changed. (c) That each payroll of any Department, in addition to any other departmental number, shall be numbered during the year serially, beginning with number one for each specific account, and such payroll shall bear a certificate signed by a person cognizant of the fact, stating that the recapitulation attached thereto is the correct recapitulation for the payroll bearing said number.

(d) That in all instances where changes in schedule items have been made by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, all sums which have been expended against such schedule items as are changed shall the 1914 Budget shall make an inventory on January 1, 1914, to determine the number

be apportioned against the new lines in the same ratio as the new totals of the schedule items bear to the old totals.

(e) That on all payrolls against schedules entitled, "Salaries Regular Employees," and "Wages Regular Employees," there shall be set forth the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules, or in case the items on such schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules as changed.

(f) That there shall be affixed to all payrolls a certificate made by the person preparing such payroll to the effect that there is a time record on file in said Board, Office, Bureau or Department, certified by the person or persons having knowledge of the facts, showing the character of service and the exact time of employment of such person or persons, except heads of departments, and excepting bureau and division heads relieved by the head of their department from the duty of keeping such record on said payrolls, and that the distribution or division of the time of such person or persons as shown on such payrolls is in accordance with such time record.

Resolved, That wherever an appropriation under the classification of "Supplies," "Purchase of Equipment," "Materials," "Contract or Open Order Service," "Contingencies" or "Fixed Charges and Contributions" is supported by a schedule, all expenditures against such appropriation shall be made in accordance with such schedule and no voucher shall be passed by the Department of Finance for a sum exceeding the amount shown in said schedule, except when such schedule shall have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that the heads of the several Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County Gov-

ernments shall transmit to the Department of Finance on the first day of each month, or as soon thereafter as possible, a statement showing, firstly, the aggregate liabilities incurred against such schedules for which vouchers have been transmitted to the Department of Finance, and, secondly, all additional liabilities incurred against such schedules for which vouchers have not as yet been transmitted. -Be it further

Resolved, That wherever an appropriation under the classification of "Supplies," "Purchase of Equipment," "Materials," "Contract or Open Order Service," "Contingencies" or "Fixed Charges and Contributions" is supported by a schedule, such schedule shall be conclusive as to the amount allowed for each function or subdivision, and the heads of departments shall submit to the Department of Finance on the first day of each month, or as soon thereafter as possible, a statement showing the amounts consumed the previous month chargeable against each supporting schedule line of the appropriation, which monthly amount, in the aggregate, shall not exceed the amount specified in the schedule, unless modified by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Esti-

mate and Apportionment.

-Be it further Resolved, That all appropriations under a classification other than "Personal Service," to any Board, Office, Bureau or Department of the City or County Governments, made in this Budget, be made under the following conditions:

Third-That all open market orders issued by any Department for supplies and materials, for which standard specifications shall have been prescribed, shall contain description of the goods ordered, conforming with such standard specifications.

Fourth-That the Comptroller shall, in auditing claims for goods delivered on open market orders, determine, through inspection or otherwise, whether the goods delivered conform to such standard specifications. -Be it further

No. 103. AN ORDINANCE to amend "An Ordinance relative to Speed Regulations proposed by the Special Committee on Speed Regulations," adopted April 15, 1913, and approved April 29, 1913.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. Section 5 of "An Ordinance relative to Speed Regulations proposed by the Special Committee on Speed Regulations," which was adopted April 15, 1913, and approved by the Mayor April 29, 1913, is hereby amended to read as follows

5. Violations-Punishment for First, Second, Third and Subsequent Offenses.-Any person who shall operate, drive or propel and also any owner thereof riding thereon or therein who shall cause or permit any vehicle subject to the provisions of section one (1) of this article, to be operated, driven or propelled in violation of any of the provisions of this article, shall, upon conviction for the first offense, be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five (25) dollars nor more than one hundred (100) dollars or by imprisonment for a term of not less than two (2) days nor more than fifteen (15) days, or by both; and shall upon conviction for the second offense, within one (1) year from the commission of the first offense, be punished by a fine of not less than fifty (50) dollars, nor more than one hundred (100) dollars or by imprisonment for a term of not less than three (3) days nor more than thirty (30) days, or by both; and shall upon conviction for the third offense, and for each and every offense subsequent thereto, within one (1) year from the commission of the first offense, be punished by a fine of one hundred (100) dollars or by imprisonment for a term of not less than five (5) days nor more than sixty (60) days, or by both.

Provided, however, that in construing this section the unit of any one year shall be the basis for determining the "first," "second" or "third" offense, the numerical order changing when succeeding convictions occur, and more than one year has elapsed after an original "first," "second" or "third" offense.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

No. 104. AN ORDINANCE amending the ordinance relative to public worship in the streets. Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. Section 4 of the ordinance approved December 28, 1903, as amended, relating to public worship in the streets, being section 497 of article 8 of chapter 13 of the Code of Ordinances comprising "Miscellaneous Ordinances," is hereby amended to read as follows:

Nothing contained in the three preceding sections of this article shall be construed to prevent any clergyman or minister of any denomination or any person responsible to or regularly associated with any church, missionary association or incorporated missionary society located in or working for New York City, or lay-preacher or layreader, from preaching in any specified place or places in the City of New York, providing that such person shall have obtained the written permission of the Mayor of the City therefor.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately. Adopted by the Board of Aldermen March 10, 1914. Approved by the Mayor March 18, 1914.



It shall be the duty of every person having knowledge of the existence of any person afflicted with any one of the following infectious diseases: typhoid fever, measles, diphtheria (croup), scarlet fever, small-pox, chicken-pox, epidemic cholera, typhus fever, rubella (rotheln), plague, tuberculosis and whooping cough, who he has reason to think requires the attention of the Department of Health, to at once report to the Department all facts in regard to the disease; and no person shall interfere with or obstruct the entrance, inspection for examination of any building or house, or the occupants thereof, by the inspectors and officers of this Department, when any case of one of the infectious diseases above specified has been reported as existing in such house or dwelling; nor shall any person interfere with or obstruct, mutilate or tear down any notices of this Department posted in or on any premises in The City of New York.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
