The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the Comptroller:

No. 894.

Comptroller—Communication Relative to Sums Included in the Budget for 1919 for Educational Purposes.

The City of New York, Department of Finance, Comptroller's Office, November 9, 1918.

To the Members of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sirs—The sums for educational purposes included in the tentative and proposed budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment were the result of conferences held by its Committee on Finance and Budget and members of the Board of Education. As a result of such conferences, certain requests, submitted by the Board of Education in its itemized annual estimate and supplements thereto, were modified and reduced.

The Committee on Finance and Budget of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment received assurances from the members of the Board of Education that the detailed and revised statements and schedules necessary to give effect to these revisions would be furnished to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the Board of Education in ample time to properly print the proposed budget. There was great delay in this, however, which appears to have been due to a disinclination on the part of subordinates and employees of the Board of Education to supply the material promised to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The result was that there was no substantial compliance with the assurances given to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, such information as was furnished being received entirely too late for use in the printed budget. In the meanwhile, however, anticipating some such action, the material which should have been furnished by the Board of Education was assembled, necessarily under some difficulties, by the Committee on Finance and Budget of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

As a result of the pressure under which the proposed budget was then required to be printed, it appears that an insufficient explanation is shown of the item included in schedule No. 97 of the General School Fund, appearing at page 172b of the budget as transmitted to your Board. The schedule, No. 97, has reference to the schedule of that number appearing at page 47 of the budget estimate of the Board of Education adopted August 29, 1918. The item as printed in the budget is as follows:

"97 German* \$412,905 03"

The asterisk under the word German refers to a footnote printed on page 13 of said estimate of the Board of Education. Such footnote reads as follows:

"Since the preparation of this schedule, certain persons, indicated above as Teachers of German, have been reassigned to other subjects, as follows: Spanish, fifty-three (53); French, thirty-one (31); commercial branches, eleven (11); English, ten (10); history, five (5); civics, four (4); mathematics, three (3); Latin, two (2); physical training and hygiene, two (2); science, one (1), and stenography, one (1)."

Another note is appended to schedule No. 97, as printed in detail on page 47 of the Board of Education's itemized estimate. The note in question reads as follows:

"Since the preparation of this schedule, 123 Teachers of German have been assigned to teach other subjects."

The Finance and Budget Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment received information that the study of German in the elementary schools has been abandoned, as also for beginners in the subject in the high schools. The minutes of the Board of Education for May 24, 1918, at page 482, contain the report of the hearing with respect to instruction in German, and also contain the following:

"27. German. The following resolution, offered by Mr. Tildsley on the 19th inst., was considered:

"Resolved, That the Board of Superintendents recommends to the Board of Education that in September, 1938, and for the duration of the war, no classes in beginning German be organized in any public school of the City of New York.

"Adopted."

You will also find reference to action by the Board of Superintendents in its minutes for May 28, 1938, at pages 529-530. The action there referred to appears to have been approved by the Board of Education on June 5, 1938 (Minutes, p. 717). This followed earlier action by that Board, in relation to this subject, on June 5, 1938 (Minutes, pp. 702-704).

The representation made to the Finance and Budget Committee was that the expenditure covered by this General School Fund Schedule No. 97, was necessary because the Teachers included therein were already on the payroll of the Board of Education and provision must be made for the payment of their salaries, the Teachers in the meanwhile having been assigned to duties other than the teaching of German.

The omission to print the explanatory note in connection with this item may tend to obscure this situation. It may also be that there is an over-appropriation in this item, and a readjustment thereof required to meet conditions which should be more fully disclosed.

I bring the matter to your attention because of the possibilities of oversight or misunderstanding that might otherwise result, and for such consideration and action as your honorable Board deems proper. Very truly yours,

Jamouneau Co., Inc., from overtime charges amounting to \$1,830, due on contract No. 42394, dated May 24, 1935, for furnishing awnings and screens at the Harlem Hospital.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to section 418 of the Greater New York Charter, hereby determines that the deduction of one thousand eight hundred thirty dollars (\$1,830), as liquidated damages for sixty-one days' overtime, at thirty dollars (\$30) a day, made by the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals from the final payment due on their contract No. 42394, dated May 24, 1935, with the Wm. H. Jamouneau Company (Inc.), for furnishing awnings and screens at Harlem Hospital for the lump sum of four thousand seven hundred ninety dollars (\$4,790), was and is unwarranted; that the City suffered no damage by delay in the performance of said contract, and the contractor was not at fault for any delay therein; that said contractor completed the contract work within sixty days after the City had the place ready for the performance thereof; that within the first sixty days after the work started the contractor completed approximately half of the entire contract and then had to postpone the balance of the work for over six months while the City was providing places for the residue; that the said contractor was entitled under the contract to sixty working days' time to perform it, but was denied such time; that the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals erroneously failed to make any allowance for the necessary time to complete approximately half of the work required to be done after the building was in fact ready to receive the same; that the contractor should be released from the said fine, penalty or overtime charge of one thousand eight hundred and thirty dollars (\$1,830) aforesaid, and said amount should be paid to Wm. H. Jamouneau Company (Inc.), as a final payment on said contract upon the delivery to The City of New York, its duly executed release in form to be approved by the Corporation Counsel, and that the Comptroller should be authorized to make payment thereof out of the moneys applicable to said contract No. 42394, or any available fund; and be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen be and it is hereby recommended and requested to release the said Wm. H. Jamouneau Company (Inc.) from the said overtime charge of one thousand eight hundred and thirty dollars (\$1,830), and to authorize the Comptroller to pay said amount as a final payment on said contract No. 42394 as aforesaid.

I, Charles L. Craig, as Comptroller of The City of New York, do hereby report: That on June 21, 1938, there was before your Board (Calendar No. 61) for consideration the petition dated June 12, 1938, of the Wm. H. Jamouneau Company, Inc., asking for release, under section 418 of the Greater New York Charter, of \$1,830 which had been deducted from moneys payable under Contract No. 42394 as liquidated damages for sixty-one days' overtime at \$30 per day imposed by the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, which petition was referred to me for report.

That I have investigated the facts and circumstances and find that Contract No. 42394, dated May 24, 1935, between Bellevue and Allied Hospitals and the Wm. H. Jamouneau Company (Inc.) is for furnishing awnings and screens at Harlem Hospital for the lump sum of \$4,790 to be completed in sixty working days with a provision for liquidated damages of \$30 a day for overtime; that said contract was executed on a printed form intended and prepared to cover contemplated work, including building alterations, at a cost of \$30,000, which called for liquidated damages of \$30 a day for overtime; that the said contemplated work was ultimately split up into several independent contracts, one of which the Jamouneau Company was awarded, the aforesaid No. 42394; that by inadvertence the said provision for liquidated damages of \$30 a day was not changed to \$5 a day to conform with the established rate for contracts amounting to \$5,000 or less; that the said Jamouneau Company was ordered to start work under said contract on June 11, 1935; at that time the places for the screens and awnings were not all ready and some windows were not in existence; an independent contract had been entered into for the alteration of the building, including windows for screens and awnings, which contract was not finished until February 4, 1936; that the Jamouneau Company started their work on June 11, 1935, and promptly installed all the window screens as called for which the building was ready to receive; that the specifications called for twin sliding screens, two to an opening secured to the window frames, which description the architect contended included the transoms over the windows, but to include the transoms therein the screens could not be secured to the window frames and would have to be attached to the brick wall outside of the window frames, and this the contractor re-

fused to do; that because of dispute as to the meaning of the specifications and on account of delay in the alterations under the construction contract, the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals extended the time for completion of Contract No. 42394 from August 10, 1915, to October 10, 1915; that prior to the expiration of said extension the Jamouneau Company had performed about half of their contract work and all of it that the building was ready to receive at that time; that when the construction work for alteration of the building was finished on February 4, 1916, the Jamouneau Company resumed their work and within sixty days thereafter and on April 5, 1916, had fully completed their contract and had furnished and installed twin sliding screens and all the awnings called for; and, later, as a compromise, in settlement of the controversy over the specifications the Jamouneau Company during the month of July, 1916, furnished separate screens, of wooden frames with wire mesh, for all transoms above the windows and satisfactorily installed them; that subsequently and on November 23, 1917, nearly eighteen months after the date of substantial completion of the work the Trustees issued a final certificate stating the work under said Contract No. 42394 had been substantially completed and accepted as of April 15, 1916, and containing therein an estimate of the elapsed time to that date from June 11, 1915, the date the work started, as 389 days from which they deducted only 60 calendar days for the time allowed by contract and 61 days for their extension to October 10, 1915, and 117 days for delay of the construction contractor to February 4, 1916, and 10 days for their delay in accepting the work after substantial completion thereof on April 5, 1916; but they made no allowance for necessary time to do the 50 per cent. of entire work required to be done and which could not be done until after the building was finished and made ready therefor on February 4, 1916, and instead of such allowance they charged the Jamouneau Company with the entire period after said date to April 5, 1916, as 61 days' overtime at \$30 a day, amounting to \$1,830, by which sum the final payment was reduced to \$1,625; that before making the said final certificate the said Trustees discovered they had failed to change the overtime provisions in the printed form of contract from \$30 a day to \$5 a day, and desiring so to do asked advice of the Corporation Counsel as to their power to make such change and were instructed by the Corporation Counsel that they could not alter the terms of the contract after its execution and if the contractor desired relief therefrom he must make an application under section 418 of the Charter.

That there is no evidence that the City suffered any damage by delay on the part of the Jamouneau Company nor is there any evidence that any delay was the fault of said contractor; on the contrary, the evidence shows that the City failed to provide the places in the building for all of the screens and awnings to be installed for use during the summer of 1915, and that all the contract work was substantially performed on April 5, 1916, within sixty days after the building was finished on February 4, 1916, and that such contract work was accepted as of April 15, 1916, in ample time for use during the summer season of 1916.

That a deduction \$1,830 for sixty-one days' overtime on a contract involving a cost of only \$4,790, is unwarranted under the circumstances in this case.

In my opinion the allegations of the petition are sustained by the evidence, and the contractor, Wm. H. Jamouneau Company (Inc.) is entitled to have the liquidated damages of \$1,830 for alleged overtime on said Contract No. 42394 remitted, released and discharged and to be paid the said \$1,830 as the final payment under said contract and in full thereof, upon the delivery to the City of an unreserved release in form to be approved by the Corporation Counsel.

It is therefore recommended that the prayer of said petition be granted and a resolution adopted accordingly for action thereon by the Board of Aldermen.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the Central Purchase Committee:

No. 899.

Central Purchase Committee—Request for Authority to Purchase Milk, Cream and Condensed Milk Without Public Letting.

The City of New York, Central Purchase Committee, Municipal Building, November 11, 1938.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Gentlemen—I would respectfully request your permission to purchase in the open market, without public letting, Milk, Cream and Condensed Milk for the Departments of Public Charities, Health, Correction, and Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, from November 1, 1938, to April 30, 1939, at the prevailing prices set by the United States Food Administrator.

The Central Purchase Committee has experienced considerable difficulty in contracting for Milk, Cream and Condensed Milk to meet the needs of the above departments. As a matter of fact, three bid openings were held without any practical results being obtained. They were as follows:

On October 11, 1938, bids were requested for supplying the above departments during the month of November. Of fifty-two items advertised bids were submitted by two concerns on eleven items only, and as the prices were high they were rejected and steps taken to have items readvertised. On the readvertised opening, held October 30th, only two bids were received, covering twenty-three items out of the fifty-two, and as these only represented a small portion of the quantity required they were rejected.

The situation became so serious that on November 1st the majority of the hospitals and institutions were without milk, although every endeavor was made to obtain it from all the principal milk dealers in the city.

This Committee held a conference at 2 p. m. on November 1st with the representatives of the following milk concerns: Borden's Farm Products Co., Levy Dairy Co., Sheffield Farms Co., in an endeavor to obtain a supply of milk for all of the departments. At this conference the representatives agreed to cover the requirements of the institutions to the best of their ability if they were assured that the order for milk would be issued to them on an open market order on a monthly basis for a period of six months from November 1st, in accordance with the prices fixed by the U. S. Federal Food Administrator. As milk at the present time is considerably below the normal requirements and as the principal milk concerns would be obliged to curtail their regular trade by helping the City, thereby losing permanent customers, arrangements were made for them to supply milk until such time as the matter could be taken up with your Honorable Board. The institutions at the present time are receiving their normal supply of milk.

I also would say that an opening held November 6th for supplying the departments for the month of December, no bids were received.

In view of the scarcity of milk and the difficulty experienced in contracting for it, and as the prices are fixed by the U. S. Federal Food Administrator, I trust your Honorable Board can grant this request, thereby eliminating the possible shortage of milk in any of the City's institutions and preventing any hardships being incurred by the patients and inmates. Gentlemen—You are hereby requested to permit this Department to purchase in open market, without public letting, the following materials, to the amounts indicated:

Wood Paving Blocks	\$5,000 00

Proper Wheels	15,000 00
Boiler Tubes	10,000 00
Spruce Lumber	3,500 00

The reason for making this request for the first four items is based on the fact that funds for their purchase were not made available until November 8, 1938, and there is not sufficient time to prepare contracts for their purchase between now and the first of the year.

The fifth item, viz., spruce lumber, at the present market price for this material, is about \$58 per thousand. During the past summer arrangements were made through the U. S. Shipping Board for 32,000 feet of this material, at a price of \$50 per thousand feet. It is expected that this Department will be able to purchase about 70,000 feet of this lumber at a price of \$50 per thousand feet. Yours truly,

ORDENANCES AND RESOLUTIONS.

No. 901.

Resolution Instructing the Committee on General Welfare to Prepare and Submit a Proposed Ordinance Insuring the Protection of the Traveling Public on the Transit Lines of This City.

By Alderman Haubert—

Whereas, This Board has learned with profound regret of the death of nearly one hundred citizens and the maiming of many others by accident on the Brighton Beach line of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, on the first of November last; and

Whereas, It is alleged that this appalling catastrophe was in a considerable measure due to the wilful neglect of this public utility corporation, to reinstate competent motormen who were dismissed from the service because of their affiliations with a Labor Union, and further because of the failure and neglect of this corporation to install steel cars for the protection of the traveling public; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York urges upon the prosecuting authorities the necessity of a most thorough and searching investigation to the end that justice may be had; and be it further

Resolved, That the Committee on General Welfare be and it is hereby instructed to seek the advice and assistance of the Corporation Counsel for the purpose of ascertaining what power may be vested in The City of New York relative to the franchise of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company and the future operation of its properties in the interest of public safety, and report thereon to this Board; and be it further

Resolved, That the Committee on General Welfare, with the advice and assistance of the Corporation Counsel, be and it is hereby instructed to prepare and submit to this Board, a proposed ordinance or series thereof that would insure the protection of the traveling public on the transit lines of this City and prevent a recurrence of the recent disaster.

No. 902 (Ord. No. 98).

An Ordinance to Amend Sections 1 and 2 of Article 1 of Chapter 14, Relating to Licenses, and to Amend Said Chapter by Adding Thereto a New Article Requiring the Licensing of Motormen on Elevated and Subway Cars.

By Alderman Falconer—

AN ORDINANCE to amend sections 1 and 2 of article 1 of chapter 14, relating to licenses, and to amend said chapter by adding thereto a new article requiring the licensing of motormen on elevated and subway cars.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 1 of article 1 of chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

§1. When required.

In addition to the businesses, places, trades, occupations and things required to be licensed by statute or by other chapters of this code, the following must be duly licensed as herein provided, namely:

- (a) Billiard and pool tables;
- (b) Bowling alleys;
- (c) Dealers in second-hand articles;
- (d) Dirt carts;
- (e) Drivers or chauffeurs of hacks, cabs, taxicabs and expresses;
- (f) Expresses and expressmen;
- (g) Exterior hoists;
- (h) Hacks, cabs and taxicabs;
- (i) Hand organs;
- (j) Itinerant musicians;
- (k) Junk dealers;
- (l) Massage operators and institutes;
- (m) Motormen on elevated and subway cars;
- (n) Peddlers, hawkers and vendors;
- (o) Public carts and cartmen;
- (p) Public porters;
- (q) Shooting galleries;
- (r) Street musicians;
- (s) Stands within stoop lines and under the stairs of elevated or subway stations.

No person shall engage in, or carry on any business, trade or occupation or maintain any place or thing specified in this section without a license therefor (C. O., sections 305, 306).

Sec. 2. Section 2 of article 1 of chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

§2. Licensees must be citizens.

No person shall be licensed under any provision of this chapter or of chapter 3 of this ordinance except a citizen of the United States, or one who has regularly declared his intention to become a citizen [1], but this section shall not apply to licensees for motormen.

Section 3. Chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by the addition of a new Article, to be numbered 16, and to read as follows:

ARTICLE 16.

Motormen on Elevated and Subway Cars.

Section 178. Licenses.

179. Application for licenses.
180. Issuance of licenses.
181. Licenses during strikes.
182. Responsibility of superiors.
183. Violations.

Section 178. Licenses. No motorman not employed as such by a subway or elevated railway company in this City on December 1, 1938, shall operate any subway or elevated car in this City without a license from the Commissioner of Licenses. No motorman employed as such by a subway or elevated railway company in this City on December 1, 1938, shall operate any subway or elevated car in this City after March 1, 1939, without a license from the Commissioner of Licenses.

Section 179. Applications for licenses. Applications for licenses shall be submitted and signed by the company in this City employing or desiring to employ the applicant, shall be countersigned by the applicant and shall contain the full name, address and age of the applicant and a sworn statement verified by the company and the applicant, certifying in detail to his previous experience, training and fitness as a motorman, and that he is not addicted to the use of intoxicating liquors.

Section 180. Issuance of licenses. If the Commissioner determines that the applicant is an inhabitant of the State of New York, is of the age of 21 years, is not addicted to the use of intoxicating liquors, and is fit and competent to act as motorman on a subway or elevated car he shall issue the license accordingly; otherwise the license shall not be issued. No applicant shall be deemed fit and competent to act as motorman unless he is able to read and write the English language.

Section 181. Licenses during strikes. In the event of a strike, or the probability of a strike, of motormen in this City of the company submitting the application, the Commissioner shall act upon the application within forty-eight hours of the time of its filing. In the event of the failure of the Commissioner to act on any such application within forty-eight hours the applicant may be employed without a license until such time as the Commissioner has acted, but in no case for a period in excess of one month.

Section 182. Responsibility of superiors. No officer or employee of a company having authority or supervision over any such motorman shall knowingly permit or suffer him to violate any of the provisions of this article.

Section 183. Violations. Upon the conviction of any person for any violation of a provision of this Article he shall be punished by a fine of not over \$50, or imprisonment for a term not exceeding 30 days, or both, and in the case of a licensee the Commissioner of Licenses may also, in his discretion, upon such conviction, or pending or in advance of the criminal prosecution of such licensee, suspend or revoke his license.

Sec. 4. The table of Article headings of Chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof the following:

16. Motormen on Elevated and Subway Cars.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect December 1, 1918.

An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 19, Article 2 of the Code of Ordinances by Adding a Section Thereto Prohibiting the Employment of Untrained Motormen on Street Railways and Rapid Transit Lines.

By Alderman Wolf—

AN ORDINANCE to amend chapter 19, article 2 of the Code of Ordinances by adding a section thereto prohibiting the employment of untrained motormen on street railways and rapid transit lines.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

(1) Article 2 of chapter 19 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by the addition of a new section, to be known and styled as section 13, and to read as follows:

Sec. 13. Motormen. 1. No operating or other official, of any railroad company whose cars or trains are propelled or driven by power other than horses within the limits of the City of New York shall employ or cause to be employed as a motorman, engine-man or driver on any car or train, on any street surface, elevated, subway or other line, any person who has not fulfilled the following requirements to establish the ability of the said person to operate a car or train without endangering the welfare and safety of the passengers or other persons using the said car or train or of persons and vehicles using the streets and highways:

(a) Instruction for at least six hours each during twenty-four working days, under a competent and experienced motorman, engine-man or driver who has had at least one year's experience in the operation of cars or trains on the lines of the company he serves;

(b) Such instruction must be such as to familiarize the prospective motorman, engine-man or driver with the power and machinery he is about to control and with the practical handling of cars or trains on the lines over which he is about to operate.

(c) During at least six days instruction out of the twenty-four the prospective motorman, engine-man or driver shall be trained in the actual operation of cars or trains over the lines on which he is about to be employed.

(2) Evidence that the above requirements have been met shall be in the form of a certificate of proficiency issued by the commissioner of licenses, which certificate shall bear a certification signed by the operating or other official employing such prospective motorman, engine-man or driver that such motorman, engine-man or driver has received the instruction provided for in subdivision 1 of this section and is otherwise qualified in habits, physical ability and intelligence for the position he is about to occupy, and which certificate shall bear also the signature of the commissioner of licenses.

(3) Such certificate of proficiency shall be issued free of any charge except such as will cover the actual cost of issuance.

(4) Such certificate shall be good until revoked but it shall not be revoked for any cause except upon good and sufficient evidence that the holder is physically or mentally unable to act further as a motorman, engine-man or driver.

(5) A complete record of the issuance of such certificates shall be kept by the commissioner of licenses, such record to contain the name, address and employing company of the operating or other official who made certification thereon.

(6) Any such operating or other official who employs or causes to be employed any person as motorman, engine-man or driver who has not fulfilled the requirements and received the certificate prescribed in this section shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by imprisonment for not less than six months nor more than one year.

Resolution Creating a Special Committee to Investigate the Ways and Means by Which the City May Acquire and Operate the Transportation Lines of the City and to Prepare Suitable Legislation to That End.

Whereas, The unspeakable tragedy which occurred on the Brighton line of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company on Friday, November 1st, is the latest and most ghastly evidence that the continued operation of the transportation lines of the city by private corporations is a menace to the health, welfare and safety of the people of New York; and

Whereas, There is only one permanent guarantee against such occurrences and against the manifold dangers and indignities which the people must face daily on the transportation lines of the city; and

Whereas, That one guarantee is the permanent withdrawal of these properties from the hands of private individuals who operate them primarily for their own private gain, and the transfer of these lines to the City, which must operate them without profit and in the interest of all the city's inhabitants; therefore be it

Resolved, By the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York,

(1) That a special committee of the Board on municipal ownership be and it is hereby created, to consist of five members elected to the Board of Aldermen, and to be appointed by the Committee on Rules; and

(2) That this committee be and it is hereby authorized and empowered to investigate fully and completely the ways and means by which the City may now or hereafter acquire and operate the transportation lines within the limits of the City; and

(3) That this committee be and it is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to prepare and introduce in this Board, on the basis of this investigation, such legislation as shall embody a comprehensive and constructive program for such acquisition and operation by the City as may be consistent with the powers granted it under the constitution and laws of the State.

At this point Alderman Squiers arose and asked what answer, if any, had been received from his Honor the Mayor and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to questions contained in the resolutions adopted October 29, 1938 (for text of resolutions see Minutes at page 125), requesting information in regard to the re-establishment of the garbage plant at Barren Island, at the same time noting the presence of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

President Riegelmann made answer, during which he had read a letter transmitted by him to his Honor the Mayor and an acknowledgment of the receipt thereof.

At the request of Alderman Squiers said letters were made of record and are as follows:

October 31, 1938.

Hon. JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor, City of New York:

My Dear Mr. Mayor—I am writing this letter in order that you may have before you more fully the views I presented to you informally at our interview this morning relative to the question of garbage disposal.

My whole effort, as explained to you, is to prevent the re-establishment of the Barren Island plant, and when this subject was discussed by us for the first time in August last, after a delegation of the Flatbush Chamber of Commerce had waited upon me at my office to protest against the plan, I believed that this step would be avoided.

After discussing with you on Friday last following the meeting of the Board of Estimate the question of garbage disposal, and the proposed reopening of the discarded Barren Island reduction plant, to inform myself more fully on the subject and perhaps offer suggestions which might aid in its solution, I personally visited the new garbage incinerator at Ravenswood in Queens Borough, the Barren Island reduction plant of the New York Sanitary Utilization Company in Brooklyn, the incinerator at Staten Island operated by The City of New York and the reduction plant of the Metropolitan By-Products Co. at Fresh Creek, Staten Island, the company which had the garbage removal contract from the City and has just abandoned it.

Following these inspections I conferred with you on Monday and informed you of my desire to secure certain information in the various City Departments, to which you readily assented. Since then I have conferred with the Corporation Counsel, the Street Cleaning Commissioner, the Health Commissioner and Mr. George M. Moffat, the receiver of the Metropolitan By-Products Co. Following these conferences and my examination of the Metropolitan By-Products Company's contract with the City, and the various documents bearing on the subject, and upon the information thus secured, I respectfully submit for your consideration the following conclusions and suggestions which may probably prevent the reopening of the Barren Island plant.

Knowing the time, care and patience you have given all summer to the solution of this subject, and feeling that you are conscientiously endeavoring to solve an extremely difficult problem, I should not assume to address you now even in the most friendly spirit were it not for the tremendous public importance of the question, the

vital and far reaching effect the present action will have on Brooklyn, and the feeling that no matter how sanguine we may be that the resumption of the nuisance at Barren Island will be only temporary, countless difficulties will arise to prevent its discontinuance once it is re-established.

It will perhaps be beneficial to consider briefly the history of the Staten Island plant, although no doubt you are entirely familiar with it.

The contract with the Staten Island Company is dated January 2, 1916, and runs for a period of five years from January 2, 1917, giving the Company one year to construct the plant.

The capacity of the plant was to be 2,000 tons a day. The method employed was to be approved by the City and all garbage from Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx was to be removed at the expense of the contractor from twelve waterfront dumps provided by the City.

The contractor agreed to comply with all the provisions of the Board of Health, and a bond of \$200,000 was furnished, together with a deposit of \$50,000 additional to insure performance of the contract.

The default clause in the contract provides that pending the execution of a new contract, the City may take possession of the plant of the contractor after default, charging to the contractor any excess cost entailed by the City and allowing the City to retain for its own use any profits or returns that might be derived from the operation of the plant.

The contractor agreed to pay the City \$191,000 a year, which by gradual increases made the total \$900,000 in five years.

Following the execution of the contract, because of the opposition of the people of Staten Island, considerable difficulty was incurred in securing the necessary building permits from the Richmond Building Bureau. Much litigation followed, the resultant delays nearly doubled the cost of the plant, and compelled the Company to rent the Barren Island plant at the best terms it could secure (which was for a period of two years at \$250,000 a year) in order to commence the performance of its contract pending the completion of its plant.

These added financial burdens placed the Company in difficulties. Its plant was never completed to the capacity of 2,000 tons a day. As a result garbage was allowed to lay around in scows for weeks, and from the day the plant commenced operation it was forced beyond its capacity. The garbage treatment was very imperfect, with the result that a nuisance of the most pronounced type was produced, and the plant commenced to break down under the strain. None of these things, however, in any way affect the system of garbage reduction employed, and I am advised that the system is in operation successfully in various parts of the country.

My information is that it would not, as has been stated, require an expenditure variously estimated at between \$250,000 and \$1,000,000 to put the plant in shape before it could be run; on the contrary, with very small expenditure for minor repairs, the plant could be put in operation, so that at least 500 tons of garbage could be treated each day without creating a nuisance. The larger expenditure would not in any way improve the efficiency of the plant or change the method of operation; it would only increase the plant to the capacity originally planned of 2,000 tons a day.

The City, I understand, has seven bottom-dumping scows in which garbage could be taken to sea. The total output of garbage in the City of New York is approximately one scow and a half per day on an average, it being estimated that 1,000 tons of garbage would constitute a scow. I am advised that fourteen scows would be necessary to carry all the garbage to sea. If a joint method of operation were adopted, namely, using the Staten Island plant to dispose of 500 tons a day, dumping some of the garbage at sea, and consuming, if possible, some of it in the incinerators completed and nearing completion in Queens Borough, the garbage of the City could be handled at this time without resuming operation at Barren Island. Everybody concedes that the Barren Island plant would constitute a nuisance as soon as operations are resumed, and this is quite apart from the question of what the same would cost. I believe the proposal to pay the Barren Island people \$1,000 a day would not be the economical way to handle the proposition. Under the terms of the Staten Island contract the City may take over the plant, and even if it hired some one to operate the plant on its behalf, the expenditure would not equal \$1,000 a day and there would be some return from the by-products. If, on the other hand, the garbage were taken to sea, and the cost was \$300 per scow, as I am advised, this item would be considerably less than the \$1,000 a day, although cost should not be considered when the public health is concerned.

Regarding the statement made, that it would be unwise to expend City money upon the plant of a private corporation, I might say that the City could even undertake to do this, and be fully protected. When the receiver was in difficulty, about August last, some of the \$50,000 deposit was returned to him to enable him to purchase coal to keep the plant in operation, and the City took as security the equivalent in receivers' certificates. Receivers' certificates, as you know, take priority over all other liens, mortgages and encumbrances upon property in the hands of a receiver, and I think it might be easily arranged, subject to the sanction of the Court, to have the receiver issue receivers' certificates for every dollar of City money expended on the plant, and, if upon the dissolution or final termination of the company's affairs its property was sold, the holders of the receivers' certificates would be paid before anyone else. This, I think, would afford the City ample protection for any money it might put in the plant, regardless of the fact that it has also, in addition, the contractor's bond of \$200,000.

In view of the above, I respectfully ask you to consider the suggestions made herein, but I wish to urge upon you, as strongly as it is within my power to do so, that under no circumstances should the Barren Island plant be re-established. Brooklyn, as you know, is today the largest borough in point of population, numbering upwards of 2,000,000 people. It would hardly seem to be prudent to establish an open and acknowledged nuisance if only for a temporary period within a community of this size. My information is that the people of Staten Island would not object to the plant down there if operated by The City of New York. I believe that I have shown sufficient reasons to the effect that the nuisance was due to the mismanagement of the plant, and that its resumption under proper conditions would not constitute a nuisance.

I am not advocating that the City purchase the Staten Island plant. I have no interest in what may be the final outcome of this matter. I am simply presenting to you suggestions which I think will enable us to meet this difficult situation without opening the Barren Island plant, and these reasons to my mind, have the added advantage that it will not cost the City \$1,000 a day, or, in fact, any great expenditure of money to put the suggestions into operation.

I have endeavored in the limited time at my disposal to give full consideration to the various aspects of the question and I wish you to know that the views here presented are given in the most friendly spirit of co-operation and are given solely to aid in a solution of the question.

As you know, I have been importuned on all sides for several days past to give public expression to my views, but I have preferred in the first instance to present them to you, because I know you have labored hard upon the subject to reach a satisfactory conclusion in the public interest.

Following this, and during consideration of the matter, interrogations were made by several members of the Board.

The President of the Borough of Richmond made answer to President Riegelmann of the Borough of Brooklyn, during which he had read a letter from his Honor, the Mayor, which was also, at the request of Alderman Squiers, written in the record.

The same is as follows:

City of New York, Office of the Mayor, November 1, 1938.

My Dear Mr. President—Enclosed find copy of letter which I have forwarded to the so-called Brooklyn Chamber of Commerce relative to the garbage matter.

Dear Sirs—Your letter of October 29th is received, and, from its contents, the

object is very evident, to have the City take over the Staten Island garbage plant at a cost of a few million dollars, which no doubt would go into the pockets of Greve, Bailey, Reynolds, Dobson and others. It is to be regretted that the old Brooklyn League crowd, which was run by the B. R. T. and the Brooklyn "Eagle," were allowed to assume such an impressive name as the Brooklyn Chamber of Commerce, and to use same to accelerate the Greve-Bailey-Reynolds-Dobson scheme to exploit and foist on the City a garbage plant which that combination could not operate successfully, and which was also put into the hands of a receiver, appointed by the Federal Court, who could not operate it successfully.

These schemers, along with a few others, do not want the garbage taken to sea. They do not want it disposed of at Barren Island, or in any way except at the Greve-Bailey plant in Staten Island, which would cost the City a few million dollars to purchase.

Under the law, the City cannot take over the Staten Island garbage plant, and if it could, the Greve-Bailey combination is very anxious to have the City pay several million dollars more for it than it is worth.

The garbage plant at Staten Island is in the hands of a receiver appointed by the Federal Court, and if the City attempted to operate the plant, it would cost over a quarter of a million dollars to put it into condition to operate. The receiver, under the order of the United States Court, could sell the plant within sixty days after this expenditure was made, and the City would lose over a quarter of a million dollars by this transaction.

The people elected me to protect their interests and I do not propose to have fakery and accelerators tie the hands of the City and its officials in such a way that it will have to accept a proposition which will cost millions of dollars.

The Staten Island garbage crowd and their receiver refused to pay the City the sum that they agreed to, and the City even went so far as to advance them many thousands of dollars to keep their plant going. When they closed down, they left about 17 flat-bottomed scows of garbage around the docks of New York, which cost the City \$14,000 to reload to sea-going dumpers. The garbage is now being shipped from Corey Island to Wallabout Basin, so that it can be reloaded to bottom-dumping scows, which can be taken to sea, the water being so shallow at the Corey Island dump that only a flat-bottom scow can be used there. This same condition exists at many of the docks. As soon as we get the dredger in shape, these slips will be dredged as rapidly as possible, so that sea-going bottom-dumpers can be used in these slips.

I wish to assure the people of Brooklyn, other than the cheap garbage gang accelerators, that we will have the slips ready and sufficient sea-going bottom-dumpers to send the garbage to sea long before the first of April.

However, if the Brooklyn League, now the Chamber of Commerce, and the Brooklyn Eagle, "Noisy Snyder" and Alderman Squires, who is always with the interests, and others, who are whipped into line, think they are going to stampede me into a position where the Greve-Bailey-Reynolds-Dobson combination can exploit the City, they are very much mistaken: Camouflaging and lying propaganda of this kind will not influence me in the least. Report of the Committee on Public Letting in Favor of Adopting Resolution to Authorize the President, Borough of Brooklyn, to Purchase 1,500 Yards of Wilton Carpet Without Public Letting.

The Committee on Public Letting, to which was referred on July 2, 1918 (Minutes, page 12), the annexed resolution of request of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn for authority to purchase 1,500 yards of Wilton carpet, without public letting, respectfully

REPORTS:

That the reasons for this request are set forth very clearly in the accompanying letter of application.

Your Committee believes the request reasonable, and recommends the adoption of the accompanying resolution.

Resolved, That, in pursuance of provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the President of the Borough of Brooklyn be and he is hereby authorized and empowered to contract in the open market, without public letting, for the purchase of 1,500 yards (approximately) best grade Wilton velvet carpet, to cover fourteen Judges' private offices, one consultation room, two library rooms, fourteen platforms (Judges' benches), at a total cost not to exceed \$6,000. These carpets are to be used in the reconstructed Court House, Kings County.

That Mr. Hull, Secretary of the Borough of Manhattan, appeared before the Committee in regard to this matter and stated that it was impossible to secure bids for gasoline owing to market conditions and that 15,000 gallons would be necessary for the needs of the department for the balance of the year 1918. He also called attention to the error in figuring the sum necessary to purchase this amount of gasoline at 24½ cents a gallon and that the cost would be \$3,675 and not \$1,850, as stated in the request.

Inquiry disclosed the fact that the various concerns supplying this material were reluctant to bind themselves under a yearly contract, on account of the unsettled condition of the market, and the probable demands of the Government upon them for the materials in their possession.

Under date of April 2, 1918, a resolution was adopted by your Honorable Board authorizing the purchase in the open market without public letting, of 25,000 gallons of gasoline.

This quantity has been purchased and approximately used and there will be required for departmental use to the end of the year about 15,000 more gallons at an estimated cost of \$1,850, the prevailing market price being 24½ cents per gallon.

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on April 9, 1918 (Minutes, page 51), the annexed ordinance to amend article 1 of chapter 19 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to the riding of passengers on rear-end platforms, respectfully

REPORTS:

That, on account of the dangers occurring from lighted cigars and cigarettes being thrown from the platforms, and also of the many nuisances reported as being committed by passengers riding on the rear-end platforms of elevated trains, your Committee deems this to be a desirable ordinance and hence recommends the adoption of the same, with the elimination of the words, "or car," which are considered superfluous.

AN ORDINANCE to amend Article 1 of Chapter 19 of the Code of Ordinances relating to the riding of passengers on rear-end platforms of trains.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Article 1, Chapter 19, of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended by adding thereto after section three of said article, new sections as follows:

§4. Passengers riding on rear-end platforms of trains. No passenger on any elevated railroad train or car, whether operated over, upon or under the surface, in the City of New York, shall ride on the rear platform of the rear car, where such rear platform is not enclosed by vestibule. Provided, however, that the term "passenger" shall not include, or be construed to include, any officer, agent or employee of such elevated railroad, or any public officer or public employee, whose duties may require the riding on any such rear platform. Any person who shall violate any provision of this section shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not more than \$10, or by imprisonment for not exceeding 10 days or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Report of the Committee on General Welfare in Favor of an Ordinance to Amend the Code of Ordinances Relating to "Fires and Fire Prevention" and in Particular to "Fire-Alarm and Fire-Extinguishing Appliances."

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on September 24, 1918 (Minutes, page 153), the annexed communication from the Bureau of Municipal Research, suggesting for amendment of the Code relative to power of the Fire Commissioner to install apparatus in piers, pier sheds and other water-front structures, respectfully

REPORTS:

That, having examined the subject, your Committee believes this to be a very necessary regulation, as there have been too many water-front fires, and the necessary means should be installed to cope with fires at such places.

It therefore recommends the adoption of the accompanying ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 20, article 2, chapter 12 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "fires and fire prevention," and in particular to "fire-alarm and fire-extinguishing appliances."

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Section 20 of article 2 of chapter 12 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "fires and fire prevention," and in particular to "fire-alarm and fire-extinguishing appliances," is hereby amended to read as follows:

§20. Fire-alarm and fire-extinguishing appliances. The owners and proprietors of all manufactories, hotels, tenement-houses, apartment houses, office buildings, boarding and lodging-houses, warehouses, stores and offices, theatres and music halls, and the authorities or persons having charge of all hospitals and asylums, and of the public schools and other public buildings, churches and other places where large numbers of persons are congregated for purposes of worship, instruction or amusement, and all piers, bulkheads, wharves, pier sheds, bulkhead sheds or other water-front structures, shall provide such means of communicating alarms of fire, accident or danger to the police and fire departments, respectively, as the fire commissioner or the police commissioner may prescribe, and shall also provide such fire hose, fire extinguishers, buckets, axes, fire hooks, fire doors and other means of preventing and extinguishing fires as the fire commissioner may direct. (Ord. effective Jan. 1, 1912.)

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen, City of New York: Dear Mr. Smith—At a meeting of the Board of Standards and Appeals on August 27th, it developed that the section of the Code of Ordinances under which the Fire Commissioner has been accustomed to order the installation of fire prevention and fire fighting apparatus, does not confer upon him the necessary power to order such installations in piers, pier sheds and other waterfront structures.

It seems to me therefore that section 20 of chapter XII of the Code of Ordinances should be amended to include at the proper points the words "pier, bulkhead, wharf, pier shed, bulkhead shed or other structure." We beg to suggest therefore that you refer this matter to the appropriate committee of the Board of Aldermen for independent inquiry and action. Yours faithfully,

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Thursday, Oct. 17, 1918, at 3:30 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. O'Keefe, Stern, Farley and Wright, Trustees. Excused—Mr. Paulding, Trustee, and Mr. Cole, Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities, ex-officio.

Dr. O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

I regret to report the death of Miss Mary McCusker, Acting Assistant Superintendent at Fordham Hospital, which occurred on Oct. 12; also the death of J. R. Pennington, Interne on the Second Medical Division, which occurred on the 14th; Miss Smith, Pupil Nurse at Bellevue, on the 14th; Miss Miller, Pupil Nurse at Bellevue on the 16th, and of Miss Payne, affiliaing Nurse at Gouverneur, whose death occurred on the 16th. The cause in each of these cases was influenza and pneumonia. There are still many Nurses sick at each of the hospitals, some of them in critical condition.

In response to our appeals, a number of voluntary workers have offered their services to the hospital and are being used, so far as possible. The Red Cross Mo-

tor Corps and the Motor Corps of the National League for Women's Service have supplied ambulances and Drivers at each of the hospitals since last Sunday. Except for their assistance it would have been impossible for us to care for the ambulance service, owing to the large number of calls, and the illness of several of the Drivers.

All admissions to the surgical wards of the hospitals of the Department have been limited to urgent cases, and the operations reduced to the minimum. Patients on the eye ward at Bellevue, with the approval of Dr. May, have been sent to their homes, and this ward made available for medical cases.

I am in receipt of a request, through Miss Brass, from the authorities at Fort Tilden, for permission to use one ward of the Neponsit Beach Hospital to care for men ill with grippe and pneumonia now stationed at the fort. Miss Brass states that by re-arranging and reassigning the children in the wards, this can be done and she will be glad to have them use this ward, if it meets with your approval.

There is a small amount of money available in the appropriation for wages, making it possible to give the automatic increases to a limited number of Hospital Helpers in each of the hospitals of the

Department. Your authorization for this modification is requested.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

It was resolved to instruct the Secretary to convey to the parents and relatives of Dr. Pennington, Miss McCusker, Miss Smith, Miss Miller and Miss Payne, the profound sorrow of the Trustees at the death of such faithful and efficient employees, who served so well in the hospitals of the Department and whose work was appreciated by every member of the Board. The Trustees have spread upon the minutes their deep appreciation of their exemplary, self-sacrificing services. The Secretary was instructed to convey to the Motor Corps of the National League for Women's Service and the Red Cross Motor Corps their sense of appreciation of the services rendered to Bellevue and its allied hospitals in supplying ambulances and Drivers during the present epidemic. The request of the authorities at Fort Tilden for permission to use one ward of the Neponsit Beach Hospital for the care of men now stationed at the fort was approved. The modification of salary schedules to supply automatic increases for Hospital Helpers was authorized, the names to be presented

for record at the next meeting. The limitation to urgent cases only of admissions to surgical wards and such other measures taken to provide additional space for medical cases during the present epidemic was authorized.

After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried to request the Board of Aldermen for permission to purchase in the open market, without public letting, the following supplies required in the hospitals of the Department: Muslins to the extent of \$5,000; blankets to the amount of \$2,400; crockery to the extent of \$1,500; to meet the needs suddenly created by the influenza epidemic. Also the purchase in the open market, without public letting, of gauze to the amount of \$5,000, which is made necessary by reason of the fact that the hospitals of the Department could not obtain gauze without a priority order from the Government, and this priority order could not be obtained until after the order for the goods had been placed, making it impossible to buy under contract. The authority to purchase likewise sugar to the extent of \$4,000, as the Department cannot obtain bids on sugar, as its distribution is controlled by the food administrator, and the contractors refuse to bid, and the purchase of butter required during the month of October, amounting

to approximately \$3,300. The request is made necessary for the reason that the Trustees were precluded from accepting recent bids for better for reasons beyond their control. In considering the report from the Purchasing Agent to the General Medical Superintendent under date of October 17, relative to the cost of beef received for two weeks under the new specifications, which provide for a minimum weight of 500 pounds per carcass, as compared with a minimum of 650 pounds per carcass prevailing under the former standards of the City, and inability to obtain good meat for the use of the patients of the Department under the revised specifications, to say nothing of the great amount of waste in accepting lightweight material, it was moved, seconded and carried to request the Board of Estimate to change the revised specifications to conform with the former standards of a minimum weight of 650 pounds per carcass, providing the request is not in conflict with the orders, rules and requests of the Government authorities.

Mr. Wright referred to the advisability and feasibility of inoculating all the Doctors and Nurses in Bellevue and its allied hospitals with the anti-influenza serum developed by Dr. Park in the laboratories of the Department of Health. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried to refer the subject to a committee, consisting of Dr. Brannan, Dr. O'Hanlon and Mr. Wright to proceed with such inoculation, should it be considered wise to do so.

Miss Hilliard, Superintendent of Training Schools, conferred with the Trustees with a view to providing ways and means of meeting the demands upon the nursing staff by reason of the growing influenza epidemic, and called attention to the fact that on that day 49 Nurses at Bellevue were ill, and, as additional wards were opened for influenza cases and the boat "Helen C. Juillard" placed in service and the hospital census on that day amounted to 1,770, the greatest number of patients ever in the history of Bellevue, it becomes necessary to take radical measures to meet the situation, and she presented for consideration the suggestion of closing the hospital and likewise the admission of new patients to maintain not more than the present census, or to curtail all services and to use whatever space and employees that are available to care for influenza cases. After discussion and careful consideration of the grave situation confronting the hospitals of the Department, it was voted that, as the institutions are emergency municipal hospitals, the Trustees could not decline to receive patients or close the doors to patients, and that the Department should make provision, as best it could, to provide for all serious cases that require hospital treatment. A committee was appointed, with power, consisting of Dr. Brannan, President of the Board, and Dr. O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, to confer at once with Dr. Copeland, Commissioner of the Department of Health, with a view to providing, if possible, sufficient employees and Nurses to meet the situation and to take such other measures as may be necessary. The General Medical Superintendent was authorized to use every proper means of publicity in advertising in prominent newspapers to obtain Nurses, Nurses' aides and employees for the hospitals of the Department.

On motion of Mr. O'Keefe, seconded by Mr. Stern, the following motion, with relation to the resignation of Mr. Sachs from the Board of Trustees, was unanimously adopted:

The Board of Trustees hereby expresses in a formal way its loss in and sincere regret at the resignation of Mr. Samuel Sachs. Mr. Sachs, having been a member of the Board since its inception in 1902, has exercised a very potent influence in the management and development of the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. Though a very busy man, he took time, not only to attend all meetings, but also gave much time to committee work, formulating budgets, considering financial matters, advising in administrative problems and acting as chairman of the Advisory Committee on Nursing. One reform of supreme importance was primarily due to his initiative and perseverance. It was the appointment of chiefs of service, involving also the grouping under one control, such as children, tuberculosis and special services, classes of cases which were formerly cared for separately in connection with each of the four divisions, which reform has greatly improved the medical service in Bellevue Hospital. His judgment and counsel were always wise and judicious; his courage unaffected by personal result; his valuable time was given wholeheartedly to the City's interest and the tender care of its sick poor. His resignation is a distinct loss to the Department and to each member of the Board who valued his congenial and personal co-operation.

Dr. Brannan referred to a letter, dated Oct. 11, from the Mayor, in regard to furnishing information relative to in-

creases given to employees since January 1, 1918, which information is now being compiled and will be transmitted as soon as finished.

On the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried to grant the Rangeley Construction Company an extension of time to Nov. 1 on their contract for the alterations to Harlem Hospital, on account of labor and material conditions prevailing at the present time and the inability of the contractor to obtain a priority order to insure prompt delivery of steel. This action was based upon the request of the Rangeley Construction Company, under date of Oct. 22, and the recommendation of Joseph H. Freedlander dated Oct. 10. The Trustees, at their meeting on Sept. 19, declared abandoned the contract of Charles J. Daly for the alterations to Harlem Hospital, and called upon the surety, the Globe Indemnity Company, to complete. The surety, under date of Oct. 17, reported that they waive its option to complete the contract. After consideration, on the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried to authorize advertisement for bids to finish the work, the difference to be charged to the contractor and the surety, the Globe Indemnity Company.

COMMUNICATIONS.

A letter dated Oct. 15 was presented from the Corporation Counsel, rendering an opinion that the City cannot pay for the services of a maid assigned to the apartment of the Assistant Superintendent at Harlem Hospital, which services were rendered to his family while on vacation. On motion, duly seconded and carried, a copy of this communication was forwarded to Mr. O'Neil.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for Oct. 9 were presented. The resolution of the Executive Committee, setting forth their appreciation of the faithful devotion to duty and loyalty to the interests of the patients exhibited during the present epidemic by the graduate and undergraduate Nurses of the hospital also expresses the sentiment of the Trustees. The request that C. J. Strong, Consulting Physician, resume active duty in the place of Alexander Lambert, absent on military duty, was approved.

A communication, under date of Oct. 11, was presented, from the Department of Finance, approving an arrangement to provide funds to pay for the overtime of employees in the laundry at Bellevue Hospital, who are called upon to work several nights a week from 6 to 9 p. m.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was moved, seconded and carried.

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

Special Regulation for Vehicular Traffic.
By virtue of the authority vested in me by
law, I do hereby make and adopt the following
rules and regulations for the conduct of vehicular
traffic in the use of the public streets, squares and
avenues in the City of New York, to take effect
Nov. 14, 1918:

Traffic Regulations.
Between the hours of 7 a. m. and 7 p. m., or
whenever time I may hereafter deem necessary,
drivers of vehicles will observe the following
designated thoroughfares when proceeding north
and south in the Borough of Brooklyn:
Thoroughfares Designated for Passenger Vehicles.
Manhattan ave., from Ash st. to Driggs ave.
Thoroughfares Designated for Commercial Vehicles
in Whatever Manner or by Whatever Force or
Power the Same May Be Propelled.
Oakland st., from Ash st. to Greenpoint ave.
Enterprises.

For the purpose of collecting and delivering
merchandise or transacting any other business
and provided that such business requires several
stops within a radius of five (5) blocks, drivers
of vehicles may use any of the above named
thoroughfares for that purpose, irrespective of
class designation; otherwise vehicles must enter
and leave these designated thoroughfares at the
nearest intersecting streets.

These rules and regulations do not apply to
the following vehicles when engaged in the per-
formance of their duties:
Fire Department, Fire Patrol, U. S. Mail,
duly licensed physicians, military, City Depart-

Amendments to Sanitary Code.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health of the City of New York, held in the said City on the 30th day of October, 1918, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 53 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended and made to read as follows:

Section 53. Nuisances, Conditions Dangerous and Prejudicial to Life or Health; Duties of Owners, Tenants, Lessees, Occupants, and Persons in Charge of Buildings and Lots.—Every owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or person in charge of any building or premises within or adjacent to the built-up portions of the City of New York shall keep and cause to be kept the sidewalks, flagging and curbside showing on said building or premises free from obstructions and nuisances of every kind, and shall sweep and remove or cause to be swept and removed therefrom all garbage, refuse, filth, dirt, and other offensive material and shall keep such sidewalk, flagging and curbside free from garbage, refuse, filth, dirt and other offensive material. Every such sidewalk, flagging or curbside shall be sprinkled with wet sawdust, paper or sand, sprinkled with water, or some other equally effective method or material used, to prevent and avoid the raising of dust when such garbage, refuse, filth, dirt or other offensive material is swept or removed therefrom. Such garbage, refuse, filth, dirt and other offensive material removed from the sidewalk, flagging or curbside may be piled in the gutter or roadway between the hours of six and eight o'clock in the morning
