GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my supervision for the quarter ending April 30, 1890.

NORTH RIVER.

West Washington Market Section—Unanimous Resolution of Board, February 6, 1889.

DREDGING.

20,890 cubic yards of mud were excavated and removed from the line of the bulkhead-wall.

TEST PILING.

The test piles driven through the old cribwork in line of bulkhead-wall, were pulled up by the derrick "City of New York."

PIER, NEW 14, N. R.

Mud was excavated and removed under Treasurer's Order No. 13907; and mud and cribwork under the unanimous resolution of the Board, from the site of pier north of Pier, old 21, North river, by the Union Dredging Company.

Franklin Street Section—Unanimous Resolution of Board, October 6, 1887.

SECRETARY'S ORDER NO. 9886.

A new plank approach, of 4-inch spruce was laid.

FILLING IN REAR OF BULKHEAD-WALL.

384 loads of earth filling were received on tickets and placed in rear of the bulkhead-wall. Total to date 17,083 loads on tickets, 2,431 loads from the Department of Street Cleaning, and 162 loads free. Grand total, 19,676 loads.

Laight Street Section—Unanimous Resolutions of Board, July 30 and November 3, 1880, and September 20, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

DREDGING.

4,957 cubic yards of mud, 1,282 cubic yards of bridgework, known as Class "A," and 426 cubic yards of bridgework, known as Class "B," under Treasurer's Orders Nos. 14492 and 14544, were excavated and removed from the line of the bulkhead-wall, by the Union Dredging Company.

Contract No. 321.

1,717 cubic yards of mud were excavated and removed from the line of the bulkhead-wall, by William M. Tebo.

STONE FILLING.

2,359 cubic yards of rip-rap stone and 2,221 cubic yards of cobble-stone were deposited in line of bulkhead-wall. End piling was bulkheaded with 2-inch plank, to retain the filling.

VERTICAL PILING.

31 vertical piles were driven, regulated and staylathed.

CAPPING.

1 cross-cap was placed and fastened with six 2-inch and twenty 3-inch treenails.

DECKING.

Deck plank was laid and fastened on caps.

CLEARING FOUNDATION.

Pile bark was cleared from wall foundation.

REMOVING OLD CRIBWORK.

Old timber was taken up from in front of Pier, old 39, North river, and the material rafted.

MASONRY.

115 pieces of granite were set in wall and backed up with 325 batches of concrete.

PIER, NEW 29, N. R.

Unanimous Resolution of the Board, October 10, 1889.

REMOVING OLD WORK.

Piles and timber were taken up from the old pier and material rafted.

DREDGING.

10,632 cubic yards of mud were excavated and removed, 2,523 cubic yards of cribwork, known as Class "A," and 245 cubic yards of cribwork, known as Class "B," by the Union Dredging Company, under Treasurer's Orders Nos. 14228, 14305 and 14493.

Contract No. 321.

9,704 cubic yards of mud were excavated and removed from the site of pier by William M. Tebo.

Contract No. 317.

BUILDING THE PIER.

Piles were driven for the inner 100 feet of pier.

West Thirty-second Street Section—Unanimous Resolution of Board, October 22, 1885.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

3,752 loads of filling from the Department of Street Cleaning were received and placed in rear of bulkhead-wall. Total to date, 73,844 loads.

West Thirty-third Street Section—Unanimous Resolution of Board, October 22, 1885.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

Contract No. 328.

16,954 cubic yards of mud were excavated and removed from area of bulkhead-wall by the Atlantic Dredging Company.

PIER AT FORTY-FIFTH STREET, N. R.

Pier, new 75, N. R.

A new pier at the foot of Forty-fifth street, North river, was partly built by the contractor, John W. Flaherty.

DREDGING.

Contract No. 328.

4,308 cubic yards of material were excavated and removed from the site of proposed pier by the Atlantic Dredging Company.

PIER, NEW 80, N. R.

BUILDING PIER.

Contract No. 314.

A new pier at the foot of Fiftieth street, North river, was partly built by the contractor, Barth. S. Cronin.

West Fifty-second Street Section, South End—Unanimous Resolutions of Board, October 6, 1887, and February 6, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

MASONRY.

Coping stones were dressed and cut for this section.

West Fifty-seventh Street Section—Unanimous Resolutions of Board, December 20, 1888, and August 1, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

DREDGING.

8,944 cubic yards of mud were excavated and removed, under Treasurer's Order 14227, by the Union Dredging Company; 2,175 cubic yards of cobble and 4,781 cubic yards of rip-rap stone were deposited in line of bulkhead-wall; 362 vertical piles were driven, regulated and stay-lathed; 3 extra foundation piles were driven; 37 bracing piles were driven and regulated; the area of the bulkhead-wall was cleared by divers; 528 linear feet of longitudinal capping and 54 cross-caps were placed and fastened with 386 2-inch and 129 3-inch treenails; binding frames were made, sunk and keyed to place by divers; deck plank was placed and fastened on caps; 175 pieces of granite were set in wall, and backed up with 468 batches of concrete; 3 pieces of coping were set in wall, and coping was cut and dressed for this section; 13 concrete blocks were set on wall foundation.

20,602 loads of earth filling were received and placed in rear of bulkhead-wall. Total to date, 37,967 loads.

Pier at West Fifty-sixth Street—Unanimous Resolution of Board, September 12, 1889.

BUILDING PIER.

Piles were driven, regulated and stay-lathed, and horizontal braces were put on; chocks were placed for mooring posts, and decking was put down and fastened. Cross-caps were put in, and horizontal sheathing placed and fastened.

West Fifty-seventh Street Timber Basin—Unanimous Resolution of Board, February 6, 1889.

Work of removing the timber basin was done by building float stages, driving piles and fastening the floats to same, and moving the timber from the old to the new basin. Finished February 1, 1890.

Pier at West Fifty-seventh Street—Unanimous Resolution of the Board, February 6, 1889.

Piles were driven and regulated; cross caps were prepared, horizontal braces were made, rangers were put on and deck plank was laid and fastened; small mooring-posts were placed and fastened.

Concrete Block Platform—Unanimous Resolution of Board, February 6, 1889.

Piles were driven for concrete block platform, and longitudinal caps were put on; the fender piles around the old pier at foot of Fifty-seventh street were pulled and the material rafted up; concrete material was removed from old to new concrete platform; timber was rafted and transferred from old to new basins.

EAST RIVER.

East Twenty-fourth Street Section—Unanimous Resolution of Board, April 25, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

8,284 cubic yards of mud were excavated and removed from the site of the bulkhead-wall, by the Union and Atlantic Dredging Companies; a portion of the old pier was removed, to make way to build the new bulkhead-wall.

Bellevue Section—Unanimous Resolution of Board, April 25, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

Piling and woodwork of the wall has been done and concrete base blocks set.

Pier at Twenty-eighth Street, E. R.

Contract No. 321.

1,023 cubic yards of crib-work, known as Class "A," were excavated and removed by William M. Tebo.

Resolution August 16, 1889.

582 cubic yards of mud were excavated and removed by the Union Dredging Company, under a Treasurer's order therefor.

Contract No. 312.

Barth S. Cronin, Contractor, is building the new pier as called for under the contract. Begun September 26, 1889. Finished, all except the inner one hundred feet in length of pier, April 26, 1890. Work still in progress.

East Ninety-fourth Street Section—Unanimous Resolution of Board, April 25, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

Piling and woodwork have been done and concrete base blocks and granite set.

Filling-in between East Ninety-fourth and East Ninety-fifth Streets.

Secretary's Order No. 9324.

833 loads of earth filling on tickets were received and placed in rear of wall. Total received to date, 15,004 loads.

Secretary's Order No. 9800.

The work of filling over the flats between East Ninety-fourth and Ninety-fifth streets, was to have been done by Mr. Miller, under permit of the Board. The order was returned March 6, 1890.

East One Hundred and Tenth Street Section—Unanimous Resolution of Board, April 25, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

Piling and woodwork have been done and concrete base blocks set in place.

DREDGING.

4,406 cubic yards of mud and 3,721 cubic yards of sand were excavated and removed from the site of the bulkhead-wall.

East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Street Section—Unanimous Resolution of Board, March 28, 1889.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

The rock bottom has been blasted off and foundation for base blocks leveled with concrete.

WORK OF CONSTRUCTION NOT UNDER NEW PLAN.

Crib-bulkhead from One Hundred and Thirty-eighth to One Hundred and Fortieth street, H. R.

The work of building a crib-bulkhead from East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to north of East One Hundred and Fortieth street, Harlem river, and for dredging thereat, by Messrs. Fogg & Scribner, contractors, under Contract No. 318, was commenced December 23, 1889, has been continued during the quarter, and is in progress.

One Hundred and Fiftieth Street, H. R.—Secretary's Order No. 9317.

The work of erecting a crib-bulkhead and the necessary filling-in behind same by W. Astor, under permit of the Board, was commenced September 30, 1889, and has been continued during the quarter; in progress.

One Hundred and Fiftieth Street, Cromwell's Creek, H. R.—Secretary's Order No. 9318.

The work of erecting a crib-bulkhead and the necessary filling-in behind same, by W. W. Astor, under permit of the Board, was commenced September 30, 1889, and continued during the quarter. In progress.

Department Yards.

WEST FIFTY-SEVENTH STREET YARD.

The blacksmith has done ironwork, as required, for construction work at the different sections, also for general repairs, floating property and the surveying party. Concrete moulds and cores were made and set up from time to time, as required, and new sand and stone cars were made. The turning platform was repaired, and new pipes, wedges, etc., were made. Eight concrete foundation blocks, 264.24 cubic yards, were made. 250 barrels of cement were received under Treasurer's orders therefor, and were stored for Department use after tests were made. Cement, sand and broken stone, stored at the yard, were issued to various sections of the work.

The Yard has been maintained in good order.

TESTING CEMENT.

Tests were made of a sample of the following brand of Portland cement, and the result reported and recorded:

"Eagle brand," Secretary's Order No. 9830.

EAST SEVENTEENTH STREET YARD.

The granite being repaired at the yard under Treasurer's Order No. 14267, was inspected. The granite delivered under Contract No. 316 was inspected. All the granite returned from the sections north of Twenty-third street, North river, was discharged in the yard. Ironwork was made and repaired by the blacksmith for work of construction on the East and Harlem rivers. 81 barrels of Portland cement were received and stored for Department use, and samples sent to the West Fifty-seventh Street Yard, to be tested and recorded. 20 concrete base blocks were made, containing 609 cubic yards of concrete. Concrete moulds, cones and pipes were made, to make the low grade blocks for the East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth Street Section. Concrete moulds were altered to make a special block for the Bellevue Section, and a new standard mould is being made. Centres and templates were made for the East Ninety-fourth street and East One Hundred and Tenth street sections sewers. The floor of the new engine-house in front of the furnace was floated off with cement and gravel, and rollers placed on posts for falls to connect the yard derrick with the new engine. Granite for the East Ninety-fourth, East One Hundred and Tenth and East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street sections was dressed at the yard.

The Yard has been maintained in good order.

100-TON DERRICK "CITY OF NEW YORK."

The Divers have examined the bottom of the derrick, and found the same to be in good condition.

DECK SCOWS.

The deck scows have been in use and have been kept in order.

TUG "MANHATTAN."

The tug "Manhattan" has done towing for the Department, and has been kept in good order.

PILE-DRIVERS.

The 10 pile-drivers have been employed on the work, and repairs have been made to keep them in good order.

Deck scows "B," "C," "D," "F," "H," "I," "K" and "L" have been in commission and been used on the work.

Deck scows "Jim" and "Willie" are used for storing timber, etc., at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard.

BORING MACHINE "WOODCOCK."

The boring machine "Woodcock" has been in commission from time to time and has been kept in good order.

DIVERS' SCOWS.

Divers' scows "A," "G" and "N," have been in use and kept in order. Small Divers' scow is laid up at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard and is used for storing lines, etc. The naphtha launch has been in use for examinations of the water-front and for carrying small parcels of materials and tools to the different parts of the work. The small boats, yawls, skiffs, bateaux, etc., have been kept in order and serviceable condition.

Materials and Supplies.

Various materials and supplies for the use of floating property have been received and expended in part, and the remainder has been stored for future use, as required.

Miscellaneous.

Various small pieces of work have been done at the West Fifty-seventh Street Yard for the use of floating property and for other work, such as changing fenders for scows, straight edges, ladders, danger signs, pike piles, etc. The force of floating property has also been employed in filing saws, spinning oakum, heating pitch, pumping out and caring for scows, and in general care of floating property laid up at the Yard.

General Expense.

PIER "A," NORTH RIVER.

Secretary's Order No. 9991.

A platform stand was erected on surface of pier, for use of auctioneer, at auction sale of wharf property, and taken down after said sale. Begun April 14 and finished April 18, 1890.

WEST FIFTY-SEVENTH STREET YARD.

Secretary's Order No. 10018.

A Dock Master's office was placed on Scow "B," and subsequently was towed to Pier, new 29, East river. Begun April 28 and finished April 29, 1890.

WEST FIFTY-SEVENTH STREET BASIN.

Engineer's Order.

The yellow pine timber and other material stored in the basin were watched and cared for and the same rafted.

Surveying Party.

In connection with the construction of the bulkhead or river wall and the new piers at the different sections on the North, East and Harlem rivers, base lines and bench marks have been frequently verified, and from them grades, measurements, etc., have been furnished from time to time as required, during the progress of the work.

Lines, grades, etc., have also been furnished for the work of repairs under contract.

Surveys and examinations have been made over 52,621 linear feet of water-front on the North, East and Harlem rivers, as required. These surveys have been plotted and placed on file in the office of the Engineer-in-Chief, and tracings have been prepared therefrom.

18,863 disk soundings, to ascertain the depth of water, have been taken in 95 slips and 3,684 rod soundings, to ascertain the depth of soft mud, have been taken in 42 slips by the surveying and soundings parties, of which 7,830 disk soundings in 40 slips and 784 rod soundings in 9 slips were on the North river, and 11,033 disk soundings in 55 slips and 2,900 rod soundings in 33 slips were on the East and Harlem rivers.

Of the above 3,671 disk soundings in 42 slips and 2,172 rod soundings in 23 slips were for construction and 10,192 disk soundings in 53 slips and 1,512 rod soundings in 19 slips were for general repairs and examinations. Soundings taken before and after dredging. Of the soundings above reported, 145 disk soundings in 1 slip have been taken on the North river, and 150 disk soundings in 2 slips have been taken on the East and Harlem rivers, and work was done by the regular sounding parties, under resolution of Board of September 19, 1883. Most of the soundings have been plotted and placed on file.

Measurements testing the dimensions of piers, etc., have been taken.

The dredging done by lessees, alleged owners and others under permit or order of the Board of Docks has been attended to.

The measurement of all material dredged by the Department of Docks has been made.

Reports, estimates, etc., of work done, have been prepared and receipts given.

The automatic tide gauges have been attended to.

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

It becomes my duty as Commissioner of Public Works and custodian of the many and immense interests involved in the City's water supply, to briefly present to the people of the City the present condition of the supply, and the extreme necessity for care and economy in the use of the water.

For a number of years past and up to the present time, the old Aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit have delivered in the City all the water which they are capable of carrying, the supply thus remaining stationary when the City has been constantly growing in population, buildings, manufactures and commerce, creating new and additional demands upon the water service. The consequence is that at certain seasons of the year, notably in extreme cold weather, when the habit of wasting water from faucets to prevent freezing in the pipes prevails, and in warm and dry weather, when various methods of waste are in vogue, the daily consumption exceeds the supply which can by any possibility be received through the old Aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit, the excess of consumption being drawn from the city reservoirs, diminishing the depth of water and the pressure in the distributing mains. There is no possibility of increasing the water supply received in the City until the new Aqueduct is brought into operation, and in the meantime the only reliance for a fair and equal distribution of water throughout the city is care and economy in its use on the part of the people. Already the depth of water in the reservoirs is being diminished at the rate of one inch per day, and if this should continue for any length of time, the pressure in the distributing mains would be so reduced that it would be impossible to deliver water in thousands of houses located on high ground, and in some other locations even in the basements or cellars.

I, therefore, most earnestly appeal to all citizens, residents and people carrying on business in this city to be careful and economical in the use of water, in justice to themselves, to the people at large, and especially to those who are so located as to be already suffering inconvenience from insufficient supply of water.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot, that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.
