AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their Office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, October 7, 1891, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Cannon.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of Voucher No. 7314, being final estimate for Section 16 of the New Aqueduct, amounting to \$50,661.03; also of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 7315 to 7329, inclusive, amounting to \$1,166.67.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Construction or Executive Committee presented the following communication, received from the Chief Engineer, and recommended that the same be spread in full on the minutes and filed:

NEW YORK, October 6, 1891.

To the Honorable the Committee on Construction:

GENTLEMEN—From the 29th ultimo, the date of my last report, the flow of water from Sodom Dam was continued at the rate of fifty million gallons per twenty-four hours until 8.30 A. M. on October 1, when, at the request of Chief Engineer Birdsall of the Croton Aqueduct, the flow was decreased to thirty million gallons per twenty-four hours, which is the present rate of flow. The water is now 34.31 feet lower than it was when the gates were opened for the first time.

NEW YORK, October 6, 1891.

To the Honorable the Committee on Construction:

GENTLEMEN—The work of improving and grading the grounds around the various shaft sites will soon commence, and it will be necessary for the Engineer in charge of that work to have a proper vehicle for the proper supervision of the same, as our present carriages are too heavy for that service. I understand that a suitable buggy can be purchased for the sum of \$100, and I hereby recommend that an appropriation for that amount be made for the same.

Resolved, That an appropriation of one hundred dollars is hereby made to cover the cost of a buggy to be used by the Engineer in charge of the work of grading, improving and fencing the grounds around several of the shafts of the New Croton Aqueduct.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, Transman Frank N. Speyer is hereby recommended to the Civil Service Commission for examination for promotion to the grade of Assistant Engineer.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the same was adopted.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, the accompanying bill of William H. Baker, being for additional work done at Shaft 21 of the New Aqueduct, amounting to eighty-five dollars and fifty cents, be and hereby is approved, and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The same was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Cannon—4.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the accompanying bill of Coldwell, Wilcox & Co., being for remodeling and resetting an iron grating at the bottom of Shaft No. 11A of the New Aqueduct, amounting to \$85.88, be and hereby is approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The same was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Cannon—4.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, the accompanying bill of the estate of Abram Acker, being for repairs to a buggy belonging to the Aqueduct Commissioners, amounting to \$120.50, be and hereby is approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

On motion of Commissioner Cannon, the same was adopted.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, Application has been made by Sullivan, Rider & Dougherty, contractors, for an extension of time for the completion of the East Branch Reservoir Dam; and the Chief Engineer having recommended that an extension of time to March 1, 1892, be granted; therefore,

Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners hereby grant to Sullivan, Rider & Dougherty, contractors, an extension of time to March 1, 1892, in which to complete the contract above referred to, providing their bondsmen shall, within ten days from the date hereof, enter into stipulations continuing their obligations for and during the completion of said contract under said extension of time which is hereby allowed to them as further time for the performance of said contract; and provided also that said contractors will take, at their own expense, all precautions for doing the work in cold weather, as may be ordered by the Engineer, and that they will waive all claims for damages whatsoever on account of any raising or lowering of the water in the reservoir that the Commissioners or their Engineer may order.

On motion of Commissioner Scott, the same was adopted.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, The Commissioner of Public Works submitted to the Aqueduct Commissioners, on the 18th day of August, 1885, maps of the property necessary for that part of a reservoir between Quaker Bridge and Croton Dam, marked Exhibit "DD," and the same having been referred to the Chief Engineer for report thereon, and the Chief Engineer having submitted a report, on October 8, 1890, recommending a modification of the plans heretofore submitted to the Aqueduct Commissioners for the construction of a high masonry dam near the mouth of the Croton river, and a public hearing having been given on said modified plans, we recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That, for the more efficient carrying out of the provisions of chapter 490, of the Laws of 1883, of the State of New York, and the acts amendatory thereof, we, the Aqueduct Commissioners, do hereby approve and adopt the amended plans now submitted by the Chief Engineer showing the lands necessary to be taken in order to build a high masonry dam near the mouth of the Croton river, being Parcels 9 to 15, inclusive, 18 to 29, inclusive, 57 and 60; also out of Parcel 6, 20.502 acres; out of Parcel 16, 10.567 acres; out of Parcel 30, .708 of an acre, shown on said maps, submitted on August 18, 1885, and direct that the same be duly certified and filed in this office and designated "Final Plan Sheet, Exhibit No. 5, of 1891;" and that a copy thereof be certified and transmitted to the Commissioner of Public Works for filing in his office, as required by section 2 of the aforesaid act; and the Commissioner of Public Works is hereby requested to transmit the six similar property maps showing the land so required for the construction of said high masonry dam.

The same were adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Cannon—4.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following preambles and resolution:

Whereas, The Commissioner of Public Works informally submitted to the Aqueduct Commissioners, on the 30th day of January, 1884, plans, specifications and estimates for the construction of a high masonry dam near the mouth of the Croton river, which were then considered by the Commissioners; and

Whereas, A formal report was afterwards, and on the 6th day of February, 1884, presented by the Commissioner of Public Works, with accompanying plans, specifications, estimates and exhibits of the aforesaid high masonry dam, and the same were ordered placed on file for future consideration; and the Chief Engineer having submitted a report, on October 8, 1890, recommending a modification of the plans heretofore submitted to the Aqueduct Commissioners for the construction of a high masonry dam near the mouth of the Croton river, and a public hearing having been given on said modified plans, we recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby requested to prepare and submit to the Aqueduct Commissioners a modification of the said plans, shown on Exhibits "F," "G," "H," "I" and "K," submitted by the Commissioner of Public Works on January 30, 1884, said modification to be in accordance with the plans submitted to the Aqueduct Commissioners by the Chief Engineer for the construction of a dam near the mouth of the Croton river, dated October 8, 1890, and as modified and adopted by the Aqueduct Commissioners on October 7, 1891.

The same were adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Cannon—4.

The Committee also presented the following communication received from the Chief Engineer:

NEW YORK, October 7, 1891.

To the Honorable the Committee on Construction:

GENTLEMEN—The accompanying communication received from Messrs. David R. Paige & Co., contractors, asking for an advance of \$5,000 on the percentage retained for work done under their contract for the Bog Brook Dams, has been referred to me by the President of the Aqueduct Commissioners.

You are well aware of the efforts of your Engineer to press this work; the importance of the completion of the dams to water-line is second only to that of completing Sodom Dam last spring. This statement is in my opinion the strongest recommendation that I can make to you to grant the request of Messrs. David R. Paige & Co., if you can do so consistently.

The amount now retained on this work is \$26,158.57, and considering the work remaining to be done, I do not see that the interests of the city can suffer from the action herein recommended.

That after examining into the matter I respectfully recommend the adoption of the said resolution annexed hereto.

Whereupon the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That this Board, deeming it for the public interest so to do, hereby respectfully requests the Counsel to the Corporation to take the necessary proceedings, in the name of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, to acquire title wherever the same has not been heretofore acquired, for the use of the public, to the lands required for the opening of Robbins avenue, from Westchester avenue to St. Mary's Park, as a street of the first class in the Twenty-third Ward of said city, and hereby determines that the entire cost and expense of said proceeding shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby, unless the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, who may be appointed in said proceeding, are of the opinion that said street is over one mile in length, in which case such cost and expense shall be assessed as is now provided by law in such cases.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Department of Public Parks, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards—6.

The following communication from the Counsel to the Corporation, relating to the opening of Intervale avenue, was presented and read:

V. B. LIVINGSTON, Esq., Secretary, Board of Street Opening and Improvement:

SIR—I have your letter of October 6, 1891, requesting to know whether the conditions upon which a resolution was passed by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement to open Intervale avenue, from the Southern Boulevard to Wilkins place, have been complied with. That resolution contains the following proviso: Provided that all the land within the lines of said Intervale avenue, north of Westchester avenue, except that belonging to the Ninth National Bank, be ceded to the City for a nominal award; and that the East Bay Land and Improvement Company dedicated to the City so much of its lands east of the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad as may be required for any purpose in connection with the opening of the said Intervale avenue.

All of the land within the lines of Intervale avenue, north of Westchester avenue, with the exception of that belonging to the Ninth National Bank, has already been dedicated to public use by the sale and conveyance of lots with reference to Intervale avenue. Accordingly compliance on the part of the East Bay Land and Improvement Company with the terms of the proviso is all that can be required.

I transmit herewith an agreement executed on the part of the East Bay Land and Improvement Company, by which it agrees to accept a nominal award of one dollar for any and all of its lands, to be taken or acquired for any purpose in connection with the opening of Intervale avenue, as now laid out or hereafter to be laid out.

The conditions imposed by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement are therefore substantially satisfied.

AGREEMENT.

Agreement made and entered into this 15th day of October, 1891, between the East Bay Land and Improvement Company of the City of New York, party of the first part, and the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, of the second part.

Whereas, The party of the first part is the owner in fee of certain lands in the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York, through a part of which certain streets or highways, and among them the street, avenue or highway hereinafter mentioned is proposed or projected to be laid out and opened; and

Whereas, Said party of the first part is desirous to have said street, avenue or highway hereinafter mentioned opened by proper authority; and

Whereas, Said party of the first part is the owner in fee of a large tract of land in that portion of the proposed street, avenue or highway east of the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad; and

Whereas, The said proposed street, avenue or highway is more than a mile in length; and

Whereas, It is provided by chapter 604 of the Laws of 1874, that where a street in said Twenty-third Ward proposed to be opened is more than a mile in length not more than one-half the cost of such opening shall be assessed upon or against the owners of property within the district of assessment, and that one-half of said cost shall be paid by the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York; and

Whereas, A petition was presented to the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York for the opening of Intervale avenue, from the Southern Boulevard to Wilkins place, in accordance with the lines and locations of said street as fixed and adopted by law; and

Whereas, The said Board of Street Opening and Improvement, acting for and on behalf of the said party of the second part, do not deem the opening of said avenue of such great public necessity or importance as to justify such opening at the present time, and having one-half of the cost thereof charged against the said party of the second part; and

Whereas, The said party of the first part, in order to procure the opening of said avenue, has agreed with the said Board of Street Opening and Improvement and the said party of the second part, to give to the said party of the second part so much of streets east of the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad owned by this company as may be required for any purpose in connection with the opening of said Intervale avenue for the nominal sum of one dollar; and

Whereas, Said Board of Street Opening and Improvement has, relying on said agreement, passed a resolution directing that proceedings be taken in due form of law for the opening of said avenue on condition that all the land within the lines of Intervale avenue except that belonging to the Ninth National Bank, be ceded to the City for a nominal award; and that the East Bay Land and Improvement Company dedicate to the City so much of its lands east of the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad as may be required for any purpose in connection with the opening of the said Intervale avenue;

Now, therefore, the said party of the first part in pursuance of said agreement, and for the purposes herein expressed, has agreed and does hereby agree with the party of the second part, to accept the sum of one dollar for so much of its lands east of the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad as may be hereafter required for any purpose in connection with the opening of Intervale avenue, or any part thereof as it is now or hereafter may be laid out in the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York.

And the said party of the first part further agrees with the said party of the second part, that for the said lands hereby dedicated as aforesaid to the said party of the second part and all its lands taken and condemned to public use for the opening of Intervale avenue, or any part thereof, it will accept as full payment and compensation a nominal award of one dollar.

Whereupon the following protest was presented and read:

NEW YORK, October 14, 1891.

Hon. HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor of the City of New York:

DEAR SIR—I understand that the matter of the opening of Brook avenue is to come before the Board of Street Opening at their next meeting, permit me to say through you, a member of the Board, that I most earnestly protest against the further opening of this avenue, from One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street north of Wendover avenue, for the following reasons:

1st. Because my property, being the most valuable on the line of the opening, will be ruined.
2d. Because those chiefly desiring the opening of Brook avenue are parties having dwellings on the line of opening, which must be paid for by the City at large, and thereby increase the assessment.

3d. Because Brook avenue being more than a mile long, the City becomes liable for one-half the cost, and as I own property in other localities in the City, I do not deem it just or fair, that such other property should be assessed for the opening of this avenue.

4th. Because of its nearness to Webster avenue.

5th. Because an avenue less than a mile long, could most conveniently and economically be opened along the west side of the Harlem Railroad, from One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street to Wendover avenue, which would fully answer all requirements, by giving property-owners the necessary outlet, and thereby protect the City at large from assessment.

After much discussion of the subject, the matter was laid over for future action. Mr. H. A. Shipman promising to be prepared at the next meeting of the Board to cede to the City all his rights to land acquired for the opening of the said avenue, and to regulate and grade the same at his own expense. He also promised to endeavor to obtain similar concessions from other owners of property.

The Board signed the petition to the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the matter of the opening of Intervale avenue.

On motion, the Board then adjourned.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repave, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
