

Hearings.

Samuels against Frank Swift & Co., adjourned to Tuesday, December 28.

The Board gave a hearing to the Committee on Street Cleaning of Police Department, and the application for permission to deposit street dirt and ashes between One Hundred and Thirty-seventh and One Hundred and Fortieth streets, near Fifth avenue, was referred to the Sanitary Committee.

That the pay-rolls of this Department, for the month of November, 1875, when approved by the Chairman of the Finance Committee, shall be duly certified by the President and Secretary, and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

That section 100 of the Sanitary Code be amended, so as to read as follows:

Sec. 100. That every owner, lessee, tenant, and occupant of any stall, stable, or apartment in which any horse, cattle, or swine, or any other animal shall be kept, or if any place in which manure or any liquid discharge of such animals shall collect or accumulate, within the built-up portion of said city, shall cause said liquid and manure to be at once removed to some proper place, and shall at all times keep or cause to be kept such stalls, stables, and apartments, and the drainage, yard, and appurtenances thereof, in a cleanly and wholesome condition, so that no offensive smell detrimental to health shall be allowed to escape therefrom; and when within three hundred feet of any occupied dwelling-house, or of any manufactory where more than five persons are employed, the removals from the stable shall not be made, nor shall the manure or refuse from the stable be allowed to remain on any street or place near such stable, any time between ten o'clock A. M. and six o'clock P. M., without a permit from this Board. Every such stall, stable, or apartment, where horses or cattle are kept, shall have an underground and properly covered manure vauit of not less than sixty-four cubic feet capacity. But the Sanitary Superintendent is authorized to issue permits to be regularly reported to this Board regulating such removal within said hours.

That such amended ordinance be duly published in the City Record in the manner provided by law.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be authorized to issue permits to empty privies to scavengers

using tubs for that purpose, during one week from this date.

That the affidavits of certain oystermen from Throgg's Neck, be referred to the Sanitary Superintendent to ascertain whether the tugs and scows named therein were employed in removing night-

That a copy of the report of the Sanitary Superintendent, in respect to the use of pier at foot of East Forty-second street, be forwarded to the Department of Docks; and that said Department be respectfully requested to assign some other dock in that vicinity to the use of the contractor for the

That the Attorney and Counsel be authorized and directed to commence an action against Dr. J.

#### Sanitary Burcau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 27, 1875: The total number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,408, as follows: I public buildings, 700 tenement houses, 127 private dwellings, 56 other dwellings, 8 manufactories and workshops, 8 stores and warehouses, 52 stables, 55 slaughter-houses, 1 fat-rendering establishment, 3 public sewers and drains, 10 other nuisances, 23 sunken and vacant lots, 37 yards, courts and areas, 40 cellars and basements, 61 waste-pipes and drains, 96 privies and water-closets, 37 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 13 dangerous stairways, 2 cisterns and cesspools, 1 violation of Sanitary Code, 87 visits to contagious diseases. visits to contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 550. During the past week 55 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation

45 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

65 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 34 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and lumigated 32 houses, 32 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

18 cases of small-pox were removed to Hospital and two dead bodies to the Morgue by the Ambu-

lance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported during the week ending November 27, 1875: Typhoid fever, 18; scarlet fever, 39; cerebro-spinal meningitis 2; measles, 13; diphtheria, 108, and small-pox, 36.

1,229 cans and 4 tanks of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city during the week ending November 27, 1875.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food, during the week ending November 27, 18\$\(\frac{15}{5}\): Calves (bob), 4 carcasses; calves (case), 1 carcass; sheep, 1 carcass; beef, 16 pounds; veal (bob), 60 pounds; peultry, 127 pounds; and sausage, 200

#### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending November 27, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 492 burial permits for city deaths, 26 for bodies in transitu, and 49 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 492 deaths, 138 marriages, 431 births, 49 still-births, 26 applications for transit permits, and 62 returns from Coroners. There were 14 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 4 transcripts of marriage record, and 10 of death were issued from this Bureau. Six cases of deaths were referred to Coroners.
