Whereas, The sum of \$8,000.16 was transferred by request of this Board during the year 1874, from the Health Fund for contingencies, etc., to Health Fund, for removal of night-soil, dead animals, etc., and was not used or required for the latter purpose by reason of a reduction in the cost of removing night-soil, dead animals, etc., but is now needed to pay contingent expenses of this Department for the year 1874; therefore,

Department for the year 1874; therefore,
Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and
Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to re-transfer the sum of \$8,000.16 from
the Health Fund for 1874, for the removal of
night-soil and dead animals, etc., to the Health
Fund for contingencies, etc., for said year.
That upon the report of the Sanitary Superintendent, to the effect that the process, apparatus,
and implements of the Odorless Excavating Company for the removal of night-soil from privies,

sinks, etc., are satisfactory for the purpose, and in accordance with the Rules and Regulations for Scavengers, and the provisions of the Sanitary Code, this Board respectfully recommends to his Honor the Mayor that a license as scavenger be granted to said Odorless Excavating Company, for one year from February 1, 1875.

one year from February 1, 1875.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to grant no permits, after this date, to remove nightgrant no permits, after this date, to remove night-soil from privies, sinks, etc., except to persons licensed by the Mayor, in accordance with the Rules and Regulations made in January, 1875, under chapter 251, Laws of 1873, and chapter 636, Laws of 1874, and the provisions of the San-itary Code.

That the officers detailed for the inspection of milk offered for sale in this City be instructed to forward complaints, based upon section 45 of the Sanitary Code, against all dealers hereafter violat-

ing the provisions thereof.

That the Attorney be instructed to commence action for penalties against offenders reported under the foregoing resolution.

That William Roberts be continued temporarily in the employment of this Board, and be detailed for duty under the Sanitary Superintendent, with compensation to be hereafter designated.

That Mrs. M. J. Bowers be appointed Matron of the Reception Hospital, to date from January 20, 1875, with salary at the rate of \$300 per annum.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 30, 1875. The number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,946, as follows:

5 public buildings, 1,250 tenement houses, 131 private dwellings, 146 other dwellings, 15 manufactories and workshops, 10 stores and warehouses, 34 stables, 55 slaughter-houses, 3 manure dumps, 10 fat-rendering establishments, 2 gut-cleaning establishments, 2 public sewers and drains, 1 smoke-house, 9 sunken and vacant lots, 47 yards, courts, and areas, 64 cellars and basements, 51 waste-pipes and drains, 70 privies and water-closets, 8 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 15 dangerous stairways, 3 dangerous and smoky chimneys, 15 other nuisances, together with 88 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 459.

During the past week 65 complaints have been received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 101 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 98 houses, 98 privysinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

53 Cases of small-pox were removed to the hospital, and 7 dead bodies to the Morgue by the Ambulance Corps.

34 Permits were granted to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

63 Permits were granted scavengers to empty,

63 Permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported during the week ending January 30, 1875: Typhoid fever 7, scarlet fever 42, measles 6, diphtheria 113, small-pox 98, and cerebro-spinal meningitis 6.

101 loads of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city, during the week ending January 30, 1875.

The following amount of meat was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food, during the week ending January 30, 1875, viz.: Calves (bob), 7 carcasses; sheep, 9 carcasses; hogs, 8 carcasses; beef, 409 pounds: veal, 90 pounds; and poultry, 166 pounds.

During the week ending January 30, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 576 burial permits for city deaths, 22 for bodies in transitu, and 40 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 576 deaths, 125 marriages, 507 births, 40 still-births, 22 applications for transit permits, and 60 returns from Coroners. There were 39 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths, and 9 transcripts of birthrecords, 5 of marriage, and 25 of death were issued from this Bureau; 2 cases of death were referred to the Coroners.

SIR-In the week that ended on the 16th of SIR—In the week that ended on the 16th of January there were 696 deaths; in the week ending on the 23d there 624; and last week there were 576 deaths reported. The decrease of 120 from the week ending on the 16th occurred in such classes and localities and from such causes as may justly encourage both the sanitary and charitable care which are bestowed upon the poor classes. There was a decrease of mortality from all diseases of the respiratory organs, from diseases all diseases of the respiratory organs, from diseases of the brain and nervous system, diseases of the heart, and from diphtheria, scarlatina, and all other contagious diseases, except small-pox and where the same statement of the same statem

The death-rate was equal to 31.20 in the 1,000 yearly, for the week ending on the 23d instant, and last week our reported mortality was equal to 28.80 in the 1,000. This still exceeds the average deathm the 1,000. This still exceeds the average death-rate for the year 1874, and is associated with ex-cessive fluctuations of temperature, and an excessive prevalence of congestive and inflamma-tory diseases. The death-rate in 21 chief cities of Great Britain in the week ending January 9 was equal to 39 per 1,000 yearly. It was equal to 35 per 1,000 in London, 42 in Dublin, 45 in Edin-burgh, and 66 in Glasgow.

President: depot No. 83 Fourth avenue and No. 411 Seventh avenue.

Except in the case of the first-named company, the condensed milk is retailed to customers at 28

cents per quart.
The American Condensed Milk Co. claim that they supply a superior article, and the charge is 40 cents per quart. The samples purchased at the above-mentioned places, yielded on analysis the following results:

In a report to the Commissioners of Charities and Correction in 1871, regarding the condensa-tion of milk, Dr. Chandler gave as the percent-age composition of the product, resulting from the condensation of milk in the proportion of 430 quarts to 100, the following:

This, as may be seen, corresponds very well with the above analysis of the American Company's milk, as regards the water, though the milk from which the above sample was condensed, appears to have been somewhat richer in butter.

From a calculation based on the experiments made by Dr. Chandler at that time, it appears extremely probable that the American Company maintains its old method of reducing 430 quarts of ordinary milk to 100 quarts, while the Eagle and New York Companies condense about 400 quarts to 100, and the National probably condenses about 475 to 100.

quarts to 100, and the National probably con-denses about 375 to 100.

The fluidity of the condensed milk is by no means an indication of the degree of condensation, but rather indicates the temperature at which the condensation has been effected; since, with the temperature above a certain point, the albuminous principles in the milk would be more or less coagu-lated, which would cause the milk to thicken. The analysis indicated that such was probably the case, for some of the best fluid samples showed the analysis indicated that such was probably the case, for some of the best fluid samples showed the largest proportion of water. A higher temperature in condensation was also suspected, from detecting what has been called the "boiled taste" in the flavor of those samples.

No adulterations of any kind were detected in any of the samples examined.

CHARGE-NEGLECT OF DUTY.

SPECIFICATION.

In this, to wit: On the 11th day of January nstant, the Superintendent of Police ordered said Captain Jacob Siebert to attend at a public meeting to be held at the Cooper Institute, on the evening of that day, and to detail of sufficient number of his men to attend under his command, and to keep the peace, preserve order, and pro-tect the persons there assembled. That said Captain neglected to obey said order, and neg-lected to detail a sufficient number of men, and neglected to attend in person at the time and place until too late to carry the said order into effect.

Guilty of charge and specification: In this, that said Captain Jacob Siebert, of the Seventeenth Precinct, did not make the necessary and proper police arrangements for the meeting held on the evening of the 11th instant, and did not order a sufficient number of men to preserve order, and neglected to attend said meeting at the head of his command at the proper time.

Judgment-Fined fifteen days pay

It would appear from the evidence in the case that the Superintendent confided too much in the judgment of Captain Siebert; the orders given were not of that explicit and concise character that the occasion required. On similar occasions the Superintendent is hereby directed in the future to give full and explicit orders in writing.
