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LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

From the proceedings of the Board of Aldermen, Thursday, April 29, 1875.

Alderman Gross called up
G. O. 173,

being a resolution, as follows:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to re-lease the premises in Ninety-ninth street, between Ninth and Tenth avenues, now used as a reception hospital, for the period of five years, from the first day of May, 1875, at a rent of fifteen hundred dollars for the first year, and two thousand dollars for the balance of said term, said premises to be used as a reception hospital under the charge of the Commissioners of Charities and Correction. Said rentals to be paid from the amounts appropriated for the maintenance and support of the Department of Charities and Correction.

Alderman Southworth moved to strike from the resolution the words "fifteen hundred dollars for the first year and two thousand dollars for the balance of said term," and insert in lieu thereof the words "one thousand dollars per annum."

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the negative by the following vote:

Affirmative—Aldermen Billings, Deane, Howland, Morris, Simonson, and Southworth—6.

Negative—The President, Aldermen Cole, Gilon, Gross, Guntzer, Lysaght, McCarthy, Power, Purroy, Robinson, Seery, Shandley, and Strack—13.

Alderman Morris moved to amend by fixing the amount of rental at fifteen hundred dollars per annum for the full term.

Alderman McCarthy moved that the subject be laid over and made a special order of business for the next meeting of the Board.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with the motion of Alderman McCarthy.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to set apart and designate a certain piece of property in the Nineteenth Ward, now owned by the city, to wit.: On the north side of Sixty-seventh street, between Third and Lexington avenues, and being contiguous to and immediately east of property now used as a fire engine house, on said block—said property so set apart to be in size fifty feet front and one hundred feet in depth, and to be used for the erection of a police station-house thereon.

On motion of Commissioner Voorhis, it was

Resolved, That the Superintendent be and hereby is directed to cause a report to be made forthwith by the several Captains of each and every place in their respective Precincts where intoxicating liquors are sold or given away, and which places are the resort of or are frequented by thieves, prostitutes, gamblers, vagrants, disorderly or suspicious characters; and that a copy of such report, on completion, be transmitted to the Board of Police; and also a copy prepared for transmission to the Board of Excise—all voting aye.

On recommendation of the Committee on Rules and Discipline, it was

Resolved, That Rule 85 of the Rules and Regulations be and is hereby amended by adding after the word "wreath," "Roundsmen shall wear on each arm of overcoat, dress coat, and blouse, a United States Infantry chevron of two stripes, above the point of the elbow.

"Mounted Roundsmen shall wear as above-mentioned the United States Cavalry chevron."

Resolved, That the portion of the territory of the Second Precinct lying south of the centre line of Fulton street be added to the First Precinct, and the portion of the territory lying north of the centre line of Fulton street be added to the Fourth Precinct.

That the territory of the First Precinct is bounded and described as follows: North by the centre line of Battery place and Fulton street; east by the East river; south by New York bay; and west by the centre line of Broadway and the waters of New York bay.

That the territory of the Fourth Precinct is bounded and described as follows: Southerly by the centre line of Fulton street; northwesterly by the centre line of Broadway, Park row, Chatham street, and East Broadway; northeasterly by Catharine street; and southeasterly by the East river.

Resolved, That the force of Patrolmen of the Second Precinct shall be disposed of by assigning twenty-nine of the number to duty in the First Precinct, and twenty-three of the number to duty in the Fourth Precinct; and that it be referred to the Superintendent to select and report the names of the Patrolmen to be assigned to duty in the First and Fourth Precincts respectively.

Resolved, That the portion of the territory of the Third Precinct lying south of the centre line of Warren street be annexed to the Twenty-seventh Precinct, and that portion of the territory of the Third Precinct lying north of the centre line of Warren street be annexed to the Fifth Precinct.

That the territory of the Twenty-seventh Precinct is bounded and described as follows: South by the centre line of Battery place; westerly by the North river; northerly by the centre line of Warren street; and east by the centre line of Broadway.

That the territory of the Fifth Precinct is bounded and described as follows: South by the centre line of Warren street; west by the North river; north by Canal street; and east by the centre line of Broadway.

Resolved, That the force of Patrolmen of the Third Precinct shall be disposed of by assigning forty-one of the number to the Twenty-seventh Precinct, twenty-four of the number to the Fifth Precinct, and five of the number to the Fifteenth Precinct.

That it be referred to the Superintendent to select and report the names of the Patrolmen to be assigned to the Twenty-seventh, Fifth, and Fifteenth Precincts respectively.

Resolved, That the portion of the territory of the Twenty-eighth Precinct lying south of the centre line of Houston street be annexed to the Eighth precinct—that portion of the territory of the Twenty-eighth Precinct lying north of the centre line of Houston street be annexed to the Ninth Precinct—that portion of the territory of the Eighth Precinct lying north of the centre line of Houston street be annexed to the Fifteenth Precinct.

That the territory of the Eighth Precinct is bounded and described as follows: South by the centre line of Canal street; west by the North river; north by the centre line of Houston street; and east by the centre line of Broadway.

That the territory of the Ninth Precinct is bounded and described as follows: South by the centre line of Houston street; west by the North river; north by the centre line of Fourteenth street; and east by the centre line of Sixth avenue, Carmine street, Bleeker street and Hancock street, or Cottage place.

That the territory of the Fifteenth Precinct is bounded and described as follows: South by the centre lines of Bleeker and Houston street; west by the centre lines of Hancock (or Cottage place), Bleeker, Carmine streets, and Sixth avenue; north by the centre line of Fourteenth street; and east by the centre lines of Fourth avenue, Bowery, and Broadway.

Resolved, That the force of Patrolman of the Twenty-eighth Precinct shall be disposed of by assigning twenty-three of the number to the Eighth Precinct, and thirty-one of the number to the Ninth Precinct.

That it be referred to the Superintendent to select and report the names of Patrolmen who shall be transferred to the Eighth and Ninth Precincts respectively.

Resolved, That the quotas of Patrolmen in the several precincts, the boundaries and areas of which have been changed, shall be as follows:
