Negative—The President, Aldermen Cole, Gilon, Gross, Gunter, Lysaght, McCarthy, Power, Purroy, Robinson, Seery, Shandley, and Strack—13.

Alderman Morris moved to amend by fixing the amount of rental at fifteen hundred dollars per annum for the full term.

Alderman McCarthy moved that the subject be laid over and made a special order of business for the next meeting of the Board.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with the motion of Alderman McCarthy.

Which was decided in the affirmative.
