The Honorable HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor :

SIR-As required by section 49 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882 we make this REPORT

of the "operations and action" of this Department for the three months ending September 30,

The books containing the assessment roll of real estate in the several wards and of personal estate, duly certified, were delivered to the Board of Aldermen on the first Monday of July, as required by law.

Upon delivery of these books to the Board of Aldermen we advertised, as required by section 9, chapter 269, Laws of 1880, that the assessment roll would be open for inspection for the period of fifteen days in the office of the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen, and during that time there were served upon us several writs of certiorari by corporations and individuals, which were duly transmitted to the Counsel to the Corporation for his official action.

Upon the receipt of these books by the Board of Aldermen, the President of that Board made a request in writing upon us to have computed the tax upon the assessed valuations of real and personal property contained in such roll and, in compliance with such request, we caused such computation of the tax to be performed by the clerical force of the Department and without additional expense to the City.

We desire here to call attention to the yearly increasing volume of work of this Department, that properly belongs to it, and which we are now handling without either increased facilities or adequate help, and feel, in view of these circumstances, that the work of computing this tax, which by law should be done by the Board of Aldermen, is an additional burden upon this Department, and justifies us in asking that we be allowed facilities commensurate with this important work.

For such purpose, the books containing such assessment roll were received from the Board of Aldermen on the 25th day of August and returned to said Board, with the computation of the tax completed, on the 22d day of September, 1892.

In connection with this, we are gratified to be able to state that our interview with the State Board of Assessors has been productive of beneficial results.

When we had the pleasure of meeting these gentlemen we made known to them the injustice that had been inflicted upon this city by the State Board of Equalization for years past, by increasing the assessed valuation of real estate in this city, until this city is now called upon to pay nearly half the entire State Tax.

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THE CITY RECORD.

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MARCH 13, 1893.

We furnished the State Assessors with data showing the assessed valuation of real estate in the different counties throughout the State, that a comparison might be made with the valuations as put upon this city, and asked that justice be done the taxpayers, by relief from such arbitrary discrimination.

As shown in the foregoing equalization table, the amount of \$80,997,890 was added by the State Board of Equalization to the assessed valuation of the real estate in this city, as fixed by this Department, which is in marked contrast with the action of that Board in years past, as will be seen from the following statement of amounts added for the last twelve years.

-showing, in comparison with the action of the State Board of Equalization of the previous year, a large reduction in the amount added to our valuations. While this reduction shows a gratifying result, we still insist that the addition by the State Board of Equalization of any amount to the valuations fixed by this Department is inequitable and unjust to this city, and that we hope, from this evidence of intention to do justice, that the whole amount so added will be stricken off in the near future.



The 877 deaths represent a death-rate of 24.48, against 22.15 for the previous week and 27.70 for the corresponding week of 1892. Contagious and infectious diseases show a slight decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, typhus fever and small-pox being respectively 119, 96, 185, 10, 5 and 9, against 113, 82, 187, 9, 29 and 9 for the previous week, a total of 424 against 429. The increase of diphtheria was most marked in the Eleventh, Seventeenth, Eighteenth, Nine-teenth, Twenty-first and TwentjethWards, while there was a decrease in the Fifth, Tenth, Twelfth, Thirteenth and Twentieth Wards, and decreased in the Eleventh Ward. Scarlet fever increased chiefly in the Twelfth and Twentieth Wards, the decrease being most marked in the Twenty-first Ward. Typhus fever showed a very marked decline. The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act : When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are torever released from all obligation under the grant in espect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in ront of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assess-ment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Com-mon Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereatter.
