REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

Hon. JACOB A. CANTOR, President, Borough of Manhattan:

Dear Sir—Pursuant to section 1544 of the Charter, I present the following report of the business of the Department of Public Works for the quarter ending December 31, 1903:

The following contracts were entered into: Thirty-two for paving and repaving, estimated cost \$520,347.49; 7 for regulating and grading, estimated cost \$250,026.65;

11 for sewers, estimated cost \$155,053.74; 2 for receiving basins, estimated cost \$1,880; 3 for flagging, fencing and crosswalks, estimated cost \$3,325.43; 13 for miscellaneous works, estimated cost \$2,011,888.50, making a total of 68 contracts entered into, at an estimated cost of \$4,455,595.93.

Contracts were completed as follows: Seventy for paving and repaving, cost \$722,691.09; 4 for sewers, cost \$20,369.87; 5 for regulating, grading, etc., cost \$43,136.70; 5 for miscellaneous works, cost \$29,027.98, making a total of 84 contracts completed, at an actual cost of \$815,225.64.

The streets regulated and graded were Kingsbridge avenue, from Wicker place to Terrace View avenue; Tenth avenue, from Academy street to Broadway, and Ninety-fourth street, from First avenue to the East river.

The principal items of work done under the contracts for regulating, grading, flagging, etc., are as follows: Six thousand four hundred and ninety-seven cubic yards of earth excavated, 8,140 cubic yards of rock excavated, 9,297 cubic yards of filling furnished, 3,647 linear feet curbstone set, 188 linear feet curbstone reset, 13,616 square feet of flagging laid, 3,053 square feet of flagging relaid, 5,000 square feet of sod laid.

New pavements were laid as follows: Sheet asphalt, 12.92 miles; asphalt block, 1.59 miles, and granite block, .08 miles, making 415.55 miles of paved streets at the close of the quarter.

The repair force took up and relaid 50,632 square yards of stone block pavement.

Permits were issued as follows: Forty-five to construct vaults, 55 to repair vaults, 8 to place guy posts, 224 to place kettles on streets, 75 to place boilers on streets, 13 to place banner poles, and 19 to repair pavements at the expense of the applicants.

The amount received for vault permits during the quarter was \$34,800.51.

The number of openings made in the streets for various purposes are: Two hundred and nine to lay and overhaul electric mains, 1,606 to lay and repair electric services, 10 to lay and overhaul gas mains, 1,064 to lay and repair gas services, 121 to lay and repair steam services, 315 to lay and overhaul water mains, 55 to lay and overhaul sewers, 226 to lay and repair sewer services, and 4 for other purposes; also 6,330 to construct and repair railways, making a total of 11,008, not including openings in the surface of pavements made by this Department, and by asphalt companies for the purpose of repairing defects in the pavement caused by wear and tear, nor openings in sidewalks, nor openings for temporary incumbrances, such as poles to support banners or derrick guys.

During the quarter sewers have been completed and accepted in One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, between Convent and Amsterdam avenues; in One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, between Convent and Amsterdam avenues; in One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, between the Boulevard and Amsterdam avenue; in Waverley place, between Bank and Perry streets, and in Exchange place, between Broad and William streets.

The total length of the sewerage system in the Borough of Manhattan is 504.68 miles, with 6,076 receiving basins.

A considerable amount of work has been completed which cannot be classified as accepted, because it has been impossible to get the pavement restored over the sewer trenches.

One hundred and ninety-nine permits for new sewers, and 254 permits for repairs to sewers, have been issued during the quarter.

The force of Mechanics and Laborers relieved 37 receiving basins, cleaned 3,016 receiving basins, 145 manholes, and 141,050 linear feet of sewer, relieved 48,743 linear feet of sewer, laid 426 linear feet of culvert, laid 12 linear feet of spur pipe, reset 58 manhole heads and 15 basin heads, put on 185 manhole covers and 23 basin covers, put in 22 basin hoods and 59 basin grates, built 1,607 cubic feet of brick work, relaid 296 square yards of pavement, and excavated 746 cubic feet of earth; also refilled the trenches and removed 8,393 cartloads of dirt.

Repairs have been made and supplies furnished to the various public buildings and offices in charge of this Department.

The free floating baths have been placed in winter quarters at the foot of Twenty-second street, Brooklyn.

The Rivington street bath has been open daily except for a few hours on one or two occasions to make repairs.

The Bureau of Incumbrances received and attended to 6,528 complaints of obstructions; made 257 seizures and removals of obstructions; issued 840 permits to place building material on streets; 116 permits to cross sidewalks with horses and carts, and 83 permits to erect temporary sheds over sidewalks; also removed 350 loads of dirt, stone and rubbish, and 61 fallen trees and dangerous stumps.

STATEMENT NO. 2.

REPORT OF CHIEF ENGINEER LOOMIS OF WORK COMPLETED AND IN COURSE OF CONSTRUCTION.

December 16, 1903.

Hon. WILLIAM H. MICHALES, Superintendent of Sewers:

Dear Sir—In compliance with your instructions, I hand you herewith a report of the work done under my supervision for the quarter ending December 31, 1903, with a statement of the work done by Mechanics and Laborers:

The present total length of the sewerage system of Manhattan Borough is 2,644,708 feet (504.68 miles), with 6,076 receiving basins, making the amount done and accepted during the quarter 2,208 feet of sewer and 1 receiving basin.

In addition to the above 1 repair work of 288 feet of sewer, which does not increase the mileage of the sewer system, has been completed.

The following are the works completed and accepted:

Sewer in One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, between Convent and Amsterdam avenues.

Sewer in One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, between Convent and Amsterdam avenues.

Sewer in One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, between Boulevard and Amsterdam avenue.

Sewer in Waverley place, between Bank and Perry streets.

Sewer in Exchange place, between Broad and William streets.

Repairs to sewer in Forty-fourth street at Hudson river.

During the quarter a considerable amount of work has been completed, but owing to the difficulty in having the streets properly repaved, most of them being asphalt, the works have not been formally accepted, and cannot be placed in the completed list and the amount of work done added to the sewerage system.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND OFFICES.

Hon. GEORGE LIVINGSTON, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—In accordance with your instructions I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of this Bureau for the quarter ending December 31, 1903:

Criminal Court Building.

The usual orders were issued for cleaning the glass in windows and doors, and for repairs to plumbing work. The customary Janitor's and Engineer's supplies were furnished.

One new 1 1/4-inch galvanized iron pipe was run in the west side of the building to replace supply line. The grate bars in four boilers were taken out and relined. The mason work in side walls and arches was rebuilt in a first-class and workmanlike manner. The heating and ventilating system recently installed in the above building has been tested and found satisfactory, and fulfills the conditions of the specifications.

The Elevators—Two new cables to the annunciators on the elevator cars in the above building were put in.

County Courthouse.

The usual order for a supply of steam was issued. Cleaning and Engineer's supplies were furnished. The glass in windows and doors was cleaned as is customary. The sewer and leader pipes were cleaned and repaired; 311 square yards of best quality plain brown linoleum were furnished and laid in Part VI. and XI. of the Supreme Court, also 298 yards of Wilton velvet carpet furnished and laid in the various court rooms, as directed. Four desks of special construction and two couches of special design, also three chairs, were furnished for use of the Judges' chamber. 125 yards of plain brown linoleum, A quality, furnished and laid in Part I. One screen for the use of Judge Davis was furnished. Electric wires in the Judges' private room and library of above building were extended, and electrical and gas fixtures were furnished and connected. Twenty-four semi-circular openings in the rotundas were covered with pine frames; one pair of fly doors at north entrance of vestibule recovered; the gas fixtures painted with metallic paint, as directed; inside sash put in library, Judges' private room in the northwest and southwest corners of the building. Inside sash built in Judges' private rooms and library; seat renewed in Judges' private room, space fitted up for telephone switchboard; pipes at sink in Janitor's quarters covered and space under stairs enclosed. All doors, glass and wire screens removed from side walls of main vestibule at north entrance and new paneling substituted, and new work on walls and ceilings painted as directed. The walls and trim in the Registration Bureau, Judges' dining room and library were cleaned off, prepared and painted as directed.

The following steamfitting was performed in the above building: Return main renewed and repaired; leaks on flanges in steam main and pump line repaired; radiator valves throughout the building renewed and repaired where necessary. Belts on engines and fans shortened.

City Hall.

The usual cleaning and Engineer's supplies were furnished, and the customary orders for supplies issued and the glass in windows and doors cleaned. The run of the gutter on the west side of roof was changed, and the gutter lined with best quality of charcoal tin, painted bottom and top. Necessary carpentering to raise the gutter was performed.

Two horse-power compound wound 230-volt motor operating a Quinby pump in the above building, was inspected and repaired. Steam radiators in the council chamber in the above building was disconnected to enable the painters to perform work and the same reconstructed. Walls, ceilings and woodwork in the hallways on the top floor and the stairways leading thereto, were cleaned off, prepared and painted.

Council Chamber—The centre panel in the Council Chamber damaged by rain storm refinished as directed. The pedestal busts of John Jay and John Marshall were provided with new marble bases, repaired, cleaned and placed in position as directed. Draperies were hung from rostrum canopy and relined as directed. Ninety-five yards of best Wilton velvet carpet were furnished, laid and lined as directed; 9 window shades furnished and hung on rollers.

Aldermanic Chamber—Ten window shades furnished and hung as directed.

Brown Stone Building.

The usual cleaning and Engineer's supplies were furnished, and the glass cleaned as customary. One steam pump repaired, elevators repacked.

Harlem Courthouse.

Customary cleaning and Engineer's supplies were furnished, and usual cleaning of the glass in windows and doors was done. New cistern was furnished and connected, and sewer pipes in cellar cleaned out, and piping adjusted to control the rising line of water pipe. A thorough examination of the elevators was made, piston rod and piston rod stuffing boxes renewed, and piston valves repacked as directed.

West Fifty-fourth Street Courthouse.

The cleaning and Engineer's supplies were furnished as usual. The customary cleaning of the glass in windows and doors performed. One feed pump repaired and placed in perfect working order as directed. Necessary repairs were made to the plumbing and steam leaks in the above building as directed.

Seventh District Courthouse.

The cleaning and Engineer's supplies were furnished as usual, and the glass in windows and doors cleaned in the customary manner. The plumbing system was repaired as directed.

First District Municipal Court.

Repairs were made to the gas fixtures and leaks in the plumbing system where directed. The usual Janitor's and cleaning supplies were furnished, and the glass cleaned as usual.

Fifth District Municipal Court.

Defective tin on main and extension roof of above building was cut out and replaced with new tin of best quality, and the usual Janitor's and Engineer's supplies furnished; also the glass in windows and doors cleaned as is customary.

Children's Court.

The usual Janitor's and Engineer's supplies furnished and obstructions in the sewer pipes removed, and two bell traps connected, as directed.

Essex Market Courthouse.

The usual cleaning supplies were furnished and repairs were made to the plumbing.

Jefferson Market Courthouse.

The walls and ceilings were cleaned off, prepared and painted, as directed. The usual Janitor's supplies furnished, and cleaning of the glass performed.

Twelfth District Municipal Court.

One Herring-Hall-Marvin safe, solid angle welded, round corner, 3-flange double door, fireproof, furnished and placed. One library table (short) and two long library tables, 4½ dozen bentwood chairs, 1½ dozen large chairs, 1 typewriter chair, 3 revolving chairs, 2 revolving chairs of different construction, 1 wardrobe furnished; telephone service furnished for the remainder of the year.

Thirteenth District Municipal Court.

Orders were issued for the use of telephone for the remainder of the year. One typewriter desk furnished; 3 library tables, 6 dozen bentwood chairs, 1 typewriter chair, 5 revolving chairs, 1 wardrobe, 2 heating stoves, with necessary connections, piping, etc., delivered and set up. Thirty running feet of wire bronze railing, about 4 inches high, with cash openings made of flat wire bronze, erected in the above courtroom. The doors were rearranged, necessary partitions erected, repairs made to desks, platform for the Judge furnished and made; also one for the jury. Pigeon-holes cases, etc., erected. The furniture, desks, partitions, platform, etc., were painted, stained and varnished, as directed, and wall paper furnished and put up in Clerk's office, where directed. One sign, 25 by 2 feet and 2 by 3 feet, furnished and lettered. One Herring-Hall-Marvin, solid angle welded, round-cornered, 3-flange, double-door, fireproof safe furnished and placed, as directed.

The above courts were created by the last Legislature, and it was necessary to fit them up and furnish them so as to enable them to perform the functions for which they were instituted.

Rivington Street Bath.

The usual cleaning and Engineer's supplies were furnished. Two boilers in the above building were relined, and the side walls and arches rebuilt.

County Jail.

The usual cleaning and Engineer's supplies were furnished.

The Markets.

Fulton Market—Four 1¼-inch turnbuckles and rods with bridle irons, wedges, knee-lag screws, eye beams and channel beams were installed in order to carry balcony at stand occupied by Ottmann & Co. in the above market. Flooring, etc., was hung from roof trusses, beams shored up where necessary, new foundations built for column, and new flooring put in where required.

Washington Market—New supply pipe, with necessary connections, etc., was put in at No. 18 Thompson avenue at above market. Defective tin on the roof over the stand occupied by Schweitzer was cut out and replaced with new tin of best quality, painted bottom and top.

West Washington Market—Defective tin over Stands Nos. 13 Grace and Thompson avenues, and at Nos. 34 to 42 Thompson avenue, and over stand occupied by Flecks, was cut out and replaced with new tin of best quality, painted bottom and top. Jefferson Market—Defective tin on roof of Greenwich avenue side of above market was removed and replaced with new tin of best quality.

City Paymaster's Office.

The usual supplies for cleaning were furnished, together with necessary cleaning of glass performed.

Comptroller's Office.

Broken parts of Welsbach lights replaced with new lights.

Bureau of Buildings.

One drop light furnished and put in place. Three pair of rubber boots and three rubber coats furnished.

Bureau of Highways.

One rotary office chair furnished.

Corporation Yard, Fifty-sixth Street and Eleventh Avenue.

Repairs made to Croton water pipe.

Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices.

Supplies have been furnished from the store room connected with the Bureau for the use of the Janitors of the various public buildings. The order for the use of horse and wagon for the Superintendent of the Bureau was renewed. The following supplies were distributed as needed: Coal and wood for heating, etc., ice, brooms, pails, soap, waste paper baskets, sapolio, sponges, mop handles, feather dusters, scrubbing brushes, ash cans, etc., for the use of the different public buildings, courts and offices in care of this Bureau. Among the many items of repairs made to the different public buildings, courts and offices not hereinbefore specifically mentioned, are plumbing, steamfitting, carpentering, roofing, plastering, mason work, painting, electrical work, repairs to safes, etc., and for the use of Mechanics in the employ of this Bureau a supply of lumber, hardware, paints, varnish, etc., were furnished.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC BATHS AND COMFORT STATIONS.

December 21, 1903.

Hon. WILLIAM H. WALKER, Superintendent, Public Buildings and Offices:

Dear Sir—I submit herewith the fourth quarterly report to date of the free floating baths, the Rivington Street Bath and Comfort Stations in Borough Hall Park.

There is little to be said concerning the free floating baths, as my third quarterly report gave the details for the past summer bathing.

The baths are now all safely in winter quarters at the foot of Twenty-second street, Brooklyn, with all movables safely housed and properly cared for.

The Rivington Street Bath has been open daily except for a few hours on one or two occasions to make repairs.

Not more than two complaints have been received from any source during the past quarter. From this I conclude the bath, as well as attendants, must be giving good satisfaction to the patrons.

As reported before this bath is very much in need of painting throughout the entire interior.

Three dozen new Gegenstroms have been put in during the quarter, which has resulted in better service and a considerable saving of fuel and labor.

The coal furnished this building for the whole season has been of a very poor quality, and has caused great inconvenience and waste.

The Public Comfort Station in Borough Hall Park, while seriously lacking in ventilation, has been of greater service and given better satisfaction than for any quarter during the year. Coat and hat racks have been placed in every toilet, which is a great improvement.

The entrance to the men's rooms has settled to such an extent that it has to be constantly watched for fear of an accident. This should be remedied.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks relative to a lease of a portion of the Pier at the foot of West Thirty-ninth street, North river, Borough of Manhattan, to the New York Butchers Dressed Meat Company:

NEW YORK, March 4, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Rogers, Peet & Company, of Room No. 404, in the building at No. 258 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, for the use of the Commissioners of Estimate and Appraisal in Condemnation Proceedings, for a term of two years, from May 1, 1904, at an annual rental of four hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$425), payable monthly, the lessors to furnish light, heat and janitor service, it being understood and agreed that the lease of Room No. 414 shall be canceled upon the execution and delivery of this lease; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, deeming the said rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Queens Borough Library, relative to a renewal of the lease of premises on Park street, between Myrtle avenue and the Brooklyn and Jamaica road, for the use of the Richmond Hill Branch:

This request of the Library Board is for the purpose of taking advantage of the renewal clause in the present existing lease, and I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a renewal upon the same terms and conditions as are in the present existing lease.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Records of the County of Kings, relative to a renewal of the lease of rooms in the Temple Bar Building, Borough of Brooklyn:

Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York, Hon. N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Secretary, No. 280 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, New York:

GENTLEMEN—Your circular letter received on the 28th inst., calling my attention to the resolution adopted by your Commission with regard to applications for renewals of leases to be made at least three months prior to the expiration thereof.

In reply I inclose copies of the correspondence between your Commission and my office last September—your communication of September 28, 1903, and my reply of September 29, 1903. I think these letters contain most of the information you ask for. I will, however, take up your items of inquiry seriatim and answer them.

1st. The name of the owner is David G. Legget.

2d. Clinton R. James, of No. 193 Montague street, Borough of Brooklyn, agent in charge of renting premises.

3d. The numbers of the offices are 500, 501, 502, 503, 504, 510, 600, 601, 606, 607, 611, 615, 616, 617 and 618.

4th. Six months from February 16, 1904, with privilege of another six months.

5th. Rental at the rate of \$8,411.25 per annum, payable in monthly installments, in advance.

6th. No alterations or repairs.

7th. Owner pays water rent.

8th. Owner pays for light, heat and janitor service.

9th. The necessity of the lease is that the additions and alterations to the Hall of Records will not be completed for at least six months and the offices for the Commissioner of Records will not be ready for occupancy before that time.

10th. The premises are recommended as the only ones in a fire-proof building and proper for the purposes of this office that can be obtained in the neighborhood.

11th. It is my impression that, under the general item of rental provided for in the last budget, provision was made for this rental, in case it should become necessary to renew the lease.

Leggett, of Rooms Nos. 500, 501, 502, 503, 504 and 510 on the fifth floor, and Rooms Nos. 600, 601, 606, 607, 611, 615, 616, 617 and 618 on the sixth floor, in the Temple Bar Building, Nos. 38-44 Court street, Borough of Brooklyn, for the use of the Commissioner of Records, Kings County, as temporary quarters, during repairs, alterations and additions to the Hall of Records, for a term of six months from February 16, 1904, with the privilege of a further renewal of six months, at a rental at the rate of eight thousand four hundred and eleven dollars and twenty-five cents (\$8,411.25) per annum, payable monthly, and to include light, heat, elevator and janitor service, otherwise, upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease—the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report relative to the applications of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, for additional room in the Municipal Building in the Borough of Brooklyn:

FEBRUARY 25, 1904.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—Hon. Martin W. Littleton, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, in a communication of February 8, 1904, addressed to the Hon. George B. McClellan, as Chairman of the Sinking Fund Commission, requests, on behalf of Charles C. Wise, Superintendent of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, that part of the office now occupied by the Engineer of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, be allotted to him by the Sinking Fund Commissioners, and inclosed a report of the Commissioner of Public Works and of Mr. Wise, together with a resolution providing for the space.

In Mr. Wise's communication, addressed to the President of the Borough, he states "that the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity occupies a space of 3,792 square feet, in which 27 persons are employed, and the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices occupies a space of 2,032 1/4 square feet, in which 32 people are employed. He also states that the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices employs about 285 people, whose duties call them to the office frequently. In addition to these there are merchants and parties doing work for the Bureau. It will be seen that the space occupied for offices is wholly inadequate for the amount of business transacted, and that the main object in asking for more room is to improve the entrance to the Bureau, which, as arranged now, is disgraceful, being between bookcases and desks, where passageway is but two feet wide."

These papers were transmitted to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for the purpose of obtaining from them a report thereon, and in a communication under date of February 23, 1904, the Hon. John T. Oakley, Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, replies thereto and transmits a "letter from the Deputy Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity in the Borough of Brooklyn and a report from the Chief Engineer of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Assistant Engineer of Lighting and the Engineer of Electricity, from which it is apparent that we not only cannot spare the rooms asked by the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, or any part thereof, but that, on the contrary, we are in urgent and immediate need of additional room and for the reasons clearly shown in the reports referred to."

In addition to the reports a resolution is inclosed, requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to assign to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity in the Borough of Brooklyn Rooms 29 and 33 on the third floor of the Municipal Building, both of which adjoin and should form part of the offices of the Deputy Commissioner, Chief Engineer and Assistant Engineer of Lighting and Electricity and Clerks.

Accompanying the Commissioner's letter is a communication from the Deputy Commissioner of the Borough of Brooklyn, and a full report from I. M. de Varona, with blue print, maps and photographs of the drafting-room on the fourth floor and small room on the third floor, which are submitted herewith.

I have personally made an examination of the Rooms 29 and 33 in question, and I find that Room 29, facing on Joralemon street and adjoining the office on the east of the Department of Water Supply, now used by the Department of Public Buildings, and unless rooms are leased in outside buildings I do not see how it is possible to turn over this room to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

What was known as Room 33 has been divided into two offices and the main room connects with Room 29 and is used by the Department of Public Buildings. There is an inner room, partitioned off, which is vacant, and from it a door leads into Room 33A, which connects with the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and this room not used by the Department of Public Buildings, could be very readily turned over to the Department of Water Supply.

The paragraph in the report of the Department of Water Supply, stating that no provision has been made in the new Municipal Building to house the Department of Public Buildings, does not necessarily mean that that Department will not be provided for in a public building, for the reason that a number of offices now in the Borough Hall are to be transferred to the new Municipal Building when the same is completed and there will be left a number of vacant rooms which could undoubtedly be occupied by the Department of Public Buildings.

Unless the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing the leasing of outside quarters for the Department of Public Buildings and Offices, I do not see how any assignment of rooms can be made, as requested by the two Departments for additional room, and I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund take no action in the matter of the reassignment of rooms and that the same be left entirely with the Hon. Martin W. Littleton, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, and the Hon. John T. Oakley, Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, for such mutual arrangement among themselves as can be conveniently made, believing that at the request of the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, the President of the Borough would release to the Commissioner of the Department of Water Supply the former Bookkeepers' Rooms 33 and 33A, which the Department of Buildings does not use, and which would afford additional space for the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

The Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance and offered the following resolutions, relative to the revised plans and specifications for the construction of a station-house, prison and stable for the Sixty-eighth Precinct, located on the northwest corner of Avenue U and East Fifteenth street, Borough of Brooklyn:

MARCH 8, 1904.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—The Police Commissioner on March 4, 1904,

"Ordered, That the revised plans and specifications for the Sixty-eighth Precinct be respectfully referred to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval, and that a copy of communication from Louis H. Voss, Architect, dated February 27, 1904, and from Messrs. Fuller & O'Connor be transmitted herewith."

I would report:

On September 22, 1903, in view of the statement furnished me by Mr. Louis H. Voss, Architect for the building, that the buildings, as per plans submitted by the Police Commissioner on September 21, 1903, could be erected for \$97,250, including Architect's fees, I advised that the plans might properly be approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

On opening bids for this work the lowest bid received was \$113,900 (for building alone, not including Architect's fees), and on January 8, 1904, the Police Commissioner requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize an additional \$26,000 in order to award the contract to Fuller & O'Connor for \$113,900. In reply to this request, on January 13, 1904, I suggested "that the application be returned to the Commissioner for his further consideration as to whether the specifications cannot be modified as to bring the amount within the appropriation without materially affecting the efficiency and durability of the building."

From an examination of the modified plans and specifications, as now submitted by the Police Commissioner, I am of the opinion that the total expenditure, site, cost of building and Architect's fees, will come within the original appropriation of \$100,000.

The Architect states that the specifications and plans have been so revised that the cost of Building will be about \$87,000 00 Architect's fees 4,400 00 Cost of site 5,500 00

\$96,900 00

He also adds, "that these figures may possibly vary a thousand dollars (\$1,000) either way, but the work will, I have reason to believe, come within the appropriation."

The present plans as to the layout and general arrangement are practically the same as the original plans, the details of which I fully set forth in my former report of September 22, 1903; as previously stated, the plans appear to be judiciously arranged, and the specifications call for a first-class building and well adapted for a station-house.

I am of the opinion that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may properly approve the modified plans as presented by the Police Commissioner on March 4, 1904; I would add that the resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on October 16, 1903 (see page 964), should be rescinded, as the present plans take the place of the plans then approved.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 350 of the Laws of 1892, as amended by chapter 495 of the Laws of 1895, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the plans for the construction of a station-house, prison and stable for the Sixty-eighth Precinct, located on the northwest corner of Avenue U and East Fifteenth street, Borough of Brooklyn, as submitted by the Police Commissioner, with communication dated March 4, 1904.

The report was accepted and the resolutions severally unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Corporation Counsel, relative to bonds and mortgages on East Side Park lands in his hands for foreclosure (see page 137).

NEW YORK, March 3, 1904.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of a communication signed by your Secretary bearing date February 15, 1904, transmitting an extract from the minutes of your meeting held on the 5th of February, 1904, containing a report of the Committee of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and asking for information "as to the present status of the bonds and mortgages mentioned in said report, which are in your hands for foreclosure."

In reply, permit me to state that the bonds and mortgages are four (4) in number and the present status is as follows:

1. In the case of Sarah Mildenberg, the judgment of foreclosure and sale was duly entered on January 15, 1902. The sale has not yet taken place because, as I am informed, of instructions from the Comptroller's office. I have been unable, however, to find any written request to that effect, and have therefore ordered the sale to be proceeded with.

2. In the case of Patrick Monahan, judgment of foreclosure and sale was entered on January 14, 1897, and sale was had under the judgment, which the purchaser refused to complete. A motion was made to compel him so to do, but the process server was unable to find him and nothing was ever done. Very recently the purchaser made a motion to be relieved from his purchase, and this was granted on the ground that, under the terms of sale, the City could not give a marketable title. The order upon this motion will be entered immediately and a resale had under proper terms of sale.

3. As to the two mortgages given by James Cavanagh, each due on December 31, 1898, one for \$1,120, and the other for \$553, the lands having been subsequently deeded to William Lane. I find no action has been commenced to foreclose either of those mortgages, owing to negotiations with said Lane and promises on his part to pay up. I have directed that suits be at once brought, and this office will prosecute the same to judgment at the very earliest possible date.

As this sum will not be sufficient to redeem said bonds I recommend that \$10,000 of the Corporate Stock of The City of New York held for said Sinking Fund be sold and transferred to the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, No. 2.

I present herewith a resolution to effect such sale and transfer.

Corporate Stock of The City of New York, for a bridge over the East river, between the boroughs of Manhattan and Queens, payable November 1, 1953, now held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, for the account of the Sinking Fund of Long Island City for the Redemption of Revenue Bonds, be transferred to the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, No. 2, and that a warrant be drawn on the said Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, No. 2, for the par value of said Corporate Stock and accrued interest thereon to date of transfer, in favor of said Sinking Fund of Long Island City for the Redemption of Revenue Bonds.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, requesting approval of his action in electing to acquire the bulkhead at the foot of Seventh avenue, Harlem river:

NEW YORK, March 3, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—In 1897 the Department of Docks, to meet the growing demands for wharfage accommodations and believing the premises to be the property of the City, constructed a bulkhead platform at the foot of Seventh avenue, on the westerly side of the Harlem river, in the Borough of Manhattan, which structure was completed on November 16 of that year, and at which the City has since collected wharfage. This platform in question is 121.85 feet long on the pierhead line, 146.31 feet long at the inshore side and has a width of 41 feet, and was constructed at a cost of \$4,456.61.

In 1900, an action was brought against the City by Charles Hueston Hastings, the United States Trust Company of New York, as trustee under the will of Charles C. Hastings, deceased, and Nathaniel Whitman to determine the provisions of a grant of land under water on the westerly side of the Harlem river, extending for a distance of 1,243 feet 4.1 inches from a point near the northerly side of West One Hundred and Fifty-first street to a point near the southerly side of West One Hundred and Fifty-second street, on the Harlem river, which grant was made by the City November 8, 1865, to Lucy S. Develin and others, the plaintiffs; the plaintiffs also asked for an order restraining the City from maintaining certain floats and other structures along the waterfront, between One Hundred and Fifty-second and One Hundred and Fifty-fifth streets, including a platform at the northerly end of Seventh avenue, Harlem river, and for an accounting of the moneys received and collected by the City for the use of said platform. This action was tried before Hon. Justice Scott, who, under date of January 2, 1904, signed an interlocutory judgment to the effect that the City is the owner of the lands within the boundaries of said grant within the lines of the exterior street and the projected streets, but that the plaintiffs owned the land within the boundaries of said grant between the projected streets and are entitled to the removal of the encroachments between the streets, and also to the wharfage received by the City from the bulkhead platform at the foot of Seventh avenue, Harlem river, since the date of its completion, November 16, 1897, as well as to the possession of the bulkhead platform itself, unless the City elects to keep the bulkhead, in which case payment for the permanent value of the property rights at the foot of Seventh avenue, Harlem river, must also be made by the City to the private owners; and the said judgment further provides that such election by the City must be made within three months from the date thereof or that otherwise the plaintiffs will be entitled to the possession of said bulkhead platform.

The permanent value of the property rights of the plaintiffs in the said premises, to be paid by the City, is, under the judgment, to be determined by the referee appointed, Mr. Lawrence Godkin, if the City elects to retain the bulkhead.

The Corporation Counsel, in an opinion dated January 30, 1904, states that the election to acquire the property rights in question should be made by the Commissioner of Docks with the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Believing that the best interests of the City would be conserved by retaining this bulkhead, I do hereby, subject to approval by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, elect to retain the property rights of the owners in and to the bulkhead at the foot of Seventh avenue, on the westerly side of the Harlem river, and I hereby respectfully request the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to approve such action.

The petition of the Brooklyn Trust Company respectfully shows:

That your petitioner is the executor of the last will and testament of Cornelia B. Remsen, deceased, late of the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York. Cornelia B. Remsen was, in her lifetime, with others, the owner of the premises situated on the southerly side of Lincoln place and the northerly side of Berkeley place, distant 109 feet east of Fifth avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, said premises being 140 feet in front on Lincoln place and Berkeley place, and 200 feet in depth. The Gowanus road ran through a portion of this property.

The Brooklyn Trust Company, as such executor, has agreed to sell the property hereinbefore described, and would like to obtain from the City a conveyance of all its right, title and interest in and to the said Gowanus road running through the premises.

Wherefore, your petitioner prays your Honorable Board that the City will execute and deliver to it the deed herein prayed for.

SIR—Hon. William N. Dykman, as attorney for the Brooklyn Trust Company as executor and trustee under the last will and testament of Cornelia B. Remsen, deceased, in a communication under date of February 2, attached to a verified petition, makes application to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for a release of the City's interest to a small portion of the old Gowanus road lying within the area of a plot of ground, which plot is bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the southerly side of Lincoln place, distant 109 feet 3 inches easterly from the southeasterly corner of Lincoln place and Fifth avenue; running thence southerly parallel with Fifth avenue 200 feet to the northerly side of Berkeley place; thence easterly along the northerly side of Berkeley place 140 feet; thence northerly and again parallel with Fifth avenue 200 feet to the southerly side of Lincoln place; thence westerly along the southerly side of Lincoln place 140 feet to the point or place of beginning.

This request for a release is in all respects similar to other requests for releases to parts of the old Gowanus road, and in view of the opinion of the Corporation Counsel, frequently expressed in previous similar cases, "that the old Gowanus road was a Dutch road, and upon its abandonment the title to the same reverted to the Government; that the interest of The City of New York in the land included within the limits is very slight and in no way substantial, and that a nominal sum would be sufficient for a quit-claim deed," and in view of the fact that similar releases to the one above requested and made to The City of New York under resolutions of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have been made for a nominal consideration, I would therefore recommend that this application be sent to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion as to whether the City's interest in the premises is material or a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner. If he shall certify that the City's interest is not material, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to section 205 of the Greater New York Charter, may properly authorize a release or quit-claim for a nominal consideration to the Brooklyn Trust Company as executor and trustee, etc., of all the right, title and interest of The City of New York to that portion of the old Gowanus road lying within the area of the property bounded and described as hereinbefore recited; that the petitioners shall produce evidence that all taxes, assessments and water rates due and unpaid against the said property shall have been paid before receiving said release from the City, and shall further produce evidence that any sales for the non-payment of taxes, assessments and water rates have either been redeemed or have merged into title before receiving such release from the City, and I would also recommend that the interest of the City be appraised at the nominal sum of \$1, and that the expense of such release, examination, etc., be fixed at \$100, to be paid by said petitioners before the delivery of said release.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—I have received, under date of February 19, 1904, a communication signed N. Taylor Phillips, Deputy and Acting Comptroller, transmitting for my consideration an application made to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by the Brooklyn Trust Company, as executor and trustee, for a release of a small portion of the old Gowanus road, and you ask to be advised.

"First—Whether the interest of the City as to this parcel of land is material or simply nominal and a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner. If the latter, please so certify that the matter may be presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund pursuant to section 205 of the amended Greater New York Charter. If you find that the City's interest is a mere cloud upon the title of a private owner, will you please prepare the proper releases in triplicate, approve them as to form and transmit the same to this office?

"Second—Whether in the matter of requests for releases as to the City's interest in all these old roads in the Borough of Brooklyn, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund should dispose of them at public auction to the highest bidder after appraisement, and at an upset price, or whether the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may properly release, after sale at public auction, the interest of the City in and to these old roads to the abutting property owners upon requests for such releases."

In answer to your first question I would say that the old Gowanus road, in the Borough of Brooklyn, was one of those old highways in the City of Brooklyn which have long since been closed to public use and included within the holdings of private persons. Taxes have been paid and assessments for local improvements have been levied and collected thereon.

The status of this old road is precisely similar to those concerning which many communications have been transmitted to you from the Corporation Counsel. The City has long since ceased to exercise any municipal control over it.

On March 31, 1879, the Common Council of the City of Brooklyn passed the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the Mayor and City Clerk be and they hereby are authorized and directed to issue and deliver to Edwin C. Litchfield, the usual quit-claim deed for the land on the old Gowanus road, to the centre thereof, opposite to and adjoining the lands now owned by him; the same to be given under the advice and direction of the Corporation Counsel, and upon the payment of the usual fee. Also that like deeds be given to such other adjoining owners along the line of said old road as shall apply therefor to the Corporation Counsel, upon complying with the same condition."

I am of the opinion, therefore, and so certify, that the City's interest in that portion of the old Gowanus road, in the Borough of Brooklyn, included within the premises hereinafter described, is a mere cloud upon the title of the private owner. Said property is bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the southerly side of Lincoln place, distant 109 feet 3 inches easterly from the southeasterly corner of Lincoln place and Fifth avenue; running thence southerly parallel with Fifth avenue 200 feet to the northerly side of Berkeley place; thence easterly along the northerly side of Berkeley place 140 feet; thence northerly and again parallel with Fifth avenue 200 feet to the southerly side of Lincoln place; thence westerly along the southerly side of Lincoln place 140 feet to the point or place of beginning.

In answer to your second question I would say that by section 205 of the Greater New York Charter as revised, it is provided that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall have power "to release such interests of the city in real estate as the corporation counsel shall certify in writing to be mere clouds upon titles of private owners, in such manner and upon such terms and conditions as in their judgment shall seem proper."

The avowed object of this provision is to quiet the title of owners of property where a possible interest of the City may operate as a cloud upon such title. This object could not be attained if competition was invited as to the purchase of the City's interests. The section further empowers the Commissioners to sell and convey the right, title and interest of the City in and to lands lying within any street, avenue, etc., that has been discontinued and closed to the owner of lands fronting on such street, avenue, etc., so discontinued and closed, on such terms and conditions and for such consideration as in the judgment of the said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall seem proper.

Of course, sale made under this provision cannot be made at public auction, as the Commissioners are directed to sell to the owner of the lands fronting on the street.

You also request that I prepare proper releases of the interest of the City in the premises referred to in your communication. I have been urged to hasten this communication so that the matter may be laid before the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at their next meeting. I will prepare the necessary releases and transmit them to you in a few days.

—the Corporation Counsel having certified to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under date of February 27, 1904, that whatever interest the City may have in the property is a mere cloud upon the title of the owners.

Resolved, That the interest of The City of New York in and to the same be and is hereby appraised at a nominal sum of one dollar (\$1), and the expense of such release, examination, etc., be and is hereby fixed at one hundred dollars (\$100), to be paid by the petitioners, and evidence produced showing that all taxes, assessments and water rates due and unpaid against the said property have been paid and also produce evidence that any sales for the non-payment of taxes, assessments and water rates have either been redeemed or have merged into title before the execution and delivery of such release.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

Alderman Philip Harnischfeger appeared before the Board in behalf of the Exempt Firemen Benevolent Association, who desire permission to occupy, for a nominal consideration, the premises of Engine Company 41, on Third avenue, opposite One Hundred and Forty-seventh street, Borough of The Bronx, about to be vacated.

The property being under the control of the Fire Department and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund having no jurisdiction in the matter, it was suggested to the Alderman that he see the Fire Commissioner and ascertain what disposition he intends to make of the property.


