The membership of the Commission, in accordance with the provisions of the Charter, consisted throughout the year of William J. Gaynor (Mayor), Robert W. de Forest (Vice-President of the Metropolitan Museum of Art), A. Augustus Healy (President of the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences), Francis C. Jones (painter), Herbert Adams (sculptor), Arnold W. Brunner (architect), R. I. H. Halsey (layman), Charles Howland Russell (layman), Frederic B. Pratt (layman), Hon. John Bigelow, (President of the New York Public Library), to May 3, 1910, on which date he appointed George L. Rives (Trustee of the New York Public Library) to represent him on the Board. Mr. Rives served until December 31, 1911.

At the first meeting of the Commission held January 11, 1910, the Commission organized by electing the following officers: Robert W. de Forest, President; Arnold W. Brunner, Vice-President, and Charles Howland Russell, Secretary.

Powers and Duties of the Commission.

Under the Charter, the Commission has jurisdiction over:

(a) All works of art to be acquired by The City of New York by purchase, gift or otherwise.

(b) The removal, relocation or alteration in any way of all works of art already possessed by the City.

(c) All designs of buildings, bridges, approaches, gates, fences, lamps or other structures erected or to be erected upon land belonging to the City, and in respect to the lines, grades and plotting of public ways and grounds, and in respect of arches, bridges, structures and approaches which are the property of any corporation or private individual, and which shall extend over or upon any street, avenue, highway, park or public place belonging to the City, and such Commission shall so act and its approval shall be required for every such structure which shall hereafter be erected or contracted for; except that in case of any such structure which shall hereafter be erected or contracted for at a total expense not exceeding \$250,000, the approval of said Commission shall not be required, if the Mayor or the Board of Aldermen shall request said Commission not to act.

(d) The selection of art productions, costing not to exceed \$50,000 in any one year, when such appropriation has been made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Works of art, as above defined, include all paintings, mural decorations, stained glass, statues, bas-reliefs or other sculptures, monuments, fountains, arches or other structures of a permanent character, intended for ornament or commemoration.

The Charter further provides that no work of art shall become the property of the City unless such work of art, or a design, together with a statement of the proposed location, shall have been submitted to and approved by the Art Commission. Until so approved it may not be erected or placed in, upon, or over any building, street, park or public place belonging to the City.

Further, no existing work of art may be removed, relocated or altered in any way unless the plan for such removal, relocation or alteration shall have been submitted to and approved by the Commission.

Matters Submitted in 1910.

The matters submitted to the Commission under these provisions during 1910 numbered 134. Six others were presented in 1909, but not disposed of before January 1 of this year, making a total of 140 considered during the current year. The total amount of money involved approximated \$15,000,000.

Fort Washington Park Monument—A natural stone boulder with inscription in Fort Washington Park. Given to the City by the Fort Washington Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution.

Grieg Bust—A bronze bust of Edward Grieg to be placed in Prospect Park. To be presented to the City by the Edward Grieg Monument Committee.

Maine Monument—A memorial to the men who perished in the United States Ship Maine, and to the sailors who died in the Spanish American War, to be placed at the 8th ave. and 59th st. entrance to Central Park. To be presented to the City by the National Maine Monument Fund Committee.

Action Upon Submissions.

For each one of the 139 submissions acted upon during the past year, from 1 to 25 plans have been examined and passed upon. In 115 submissions the designs were approved as submitted, and in 20 instances the Commission disapproved in whole or in part. These 20 submissions dealt with 19 different structures. For 8 of these structures amended plans were prepared, again submitted to the Commission and approved. For 11 of the structures new plans have not yet been submitted.

In four instances submissions were withdrawn. One submission remained unacted upon at the close of the year. This was received such a short time before December 31 that there had not been sufficient time within which to examine the plans and make report.

Thirteen meetings of the Commission have been held. Each submission is immediately referred to a Special Committee, to be examined and a report upon it prepared before it is considered by the full Commission. The Committees visit every location submitted for public monuments and other structures. They also hold frequent conferences with heads of departments and designers. It is in committee work, therefore, of which no record appears in the Minutes, that are found the more engrossing duties of the members of the Commission.

The provision requiring that all structures should be approved by the Commission did not become a law until July 20, 1907.

Restoration of the Borough President's Office.

In recent years there has been a greatly increased interest in historical associations and especially in historic architecture and with this has come a higher appreciation of the artistic merits of the New York City Hall. During its century of existence the exterior of this building has been but slightly altered except by the hand of time, but the interior has been changed at frequent intervals, usually in accordance with the taste or exigency of the period, without reference to the desirability of preserving the building as it was originally designed.

Even our appreciation of the beauty of its proportions and the charm of its details is only a renaissance of the admiration bestowed on it by its builders. The minutes of Common Council and the diary of John McComb, Jr., bear striking testimony to their high estimation, which was also evidenced in the great care exercised over every detail and the painstaking thoroughness of its entire execution. They fully realized that they were erecting an unusual building. Indeed, McComb succeeded in inducing the building committee to substitute marble for brown stone for "the front and two end views" upon the plea that "this building is intended to endure for ages, and in an architectural point of view, in fact, is to give a character to our city." In fact, it was for the New York of that day a monumental building intended to provide, as it did, offices for the entire city and county administration. During the first few years it is often referred to in the minutes of Common Council as "The New Court House."

It is an old saying that history repeats itself and this is true of our City Hall. When the building was completed in 1812 so many people wanted to visit it that the Common Council directed the custodian to put up placards stating at what hours the building might be seen by visitors, and, if the whole building were restored, it would be so attractive that similar placards probably would have to be hung out at the present time.

When, in the Spring of 1909, the restoration of the Governor's Room was completed, the citizens of New York began to realize how dignified and beautiful their City Hall must have been when first erected. But, the Governor's Room being merely an exhibition room, the question naturally arose, would other parts of the building be as beautiful if restored and adapted to practical uses.

The restoration of the Borough President's Office by President McAneny with the co-operation of the Art Commission has clearly demonstrated that even those portions of the City Hall used as offices are, when restored to their original style, just as dignified and beautiful as the Governor's Room.

The office of the Borough President occupies the second floor of the southwest wing. The principal room of this suite was designed for and used as the Common Council Chamber for many years. Mayor De Witt Clinton presided at the first meeting of the Council held there in 1812. During the preceding year the Common Council had held its meetings in what is now the Mayor's Reception Room, directly underneath.

At the time this restoration was begun, the Council Chamber with its domed ceiling was divided into many small rooms or compartments by wooden partitions from eight to ten feet in height. In addition the room was badly in need of repair. The wooden partitions were removed, a plain oak floor was laid and other features clearly not original were remodeled in accordance with McComb's designs. The fireplace in the west wall had been closed and the mantel had been removed, these were restored. Fortunately, the work of restoration could be made nearly perfect, for Mr. McComb's original drawings for this room were accessible and fairly complete in the library of the New York Historical Society. In addition a member of the Art Commission possessed an old print of this room made in 1830, undoubtedly before any alterations had been made. Now that the restoration is completed the room appears essentially as it did when first occupied by the Common Council in 1812, with only such minor rearranging as is necessary to make it suitable for an executive office instead of a legislative chamber.

Budget Exhibit.

The Budget Exhibit prepared by the Commission clearly reflected the general character and scope of its work. The exhibit embraced its publications, consisting of reports, catalogues and pamphlets on special topics; of photographs of a few typical cases of designs disapproved and beside each respectively, new designs approved for the same structure and according to which the building or monuments were erected. These contrasts showed the direct influence of the Commission upon the character of public architecture and monuments. Photographs were shown of designs approved as first submitted. In many cases the quality of these designs is due to the indirect influence of the Commission. Designers know that the Charter requires that designs must be approved before structures may be erected and also know that unless plans possess artistic merit they would not be approved by the Commission. This has stimulated those intending to submit designs to exercise greater care in their preparation in order that they should be meritorious enough to command immediate approval. The total mileage of pavements in the Borough on September 30, 1911, was 140,813 miles, of which 282 miles were medina block, 38,784 miles granite block, 40,740 miles sheet asphalt, 54,666 miles asphalt block, 3,567 miles wood block, and 741 miles brick; 1,545 miles iron slag pavement, and 488 trap.

The total amount paved during the quarter ending September 30, 1911, was 4,117 miles.

During the quarter ending September 30, 1911, 19,589 feet of vitrified pipe sewers from 8 inches to 30 inches in diameter, or 3.71 miles; 3,504 linear feet of concrete sewer 34 inches by 46 inches in diameter to 13 feet 9 inches by 8 inches double or .664 miles, making a total of 23,093 linear feet built during the quarter, thus making the mileage of the sewerage system 301.164 miles; 32 basins were also built, which makes a total of 3,436 basins connected with the sewerage system.

During the quarter ending September 30, 1911, there were entered into 47 contracts, amounting to \$595,732.13.

There were 38 contracts completed during the quarter to the amount of \$440,583.47, and work is going on in connection with 44 contracts, amounting to \$2,615,545.26 on which \$793,569.23 in payments have been made.

There are 6 contracts, representing an estimated cost of \$86,240.90, either executed or being advertised.

A total of 41 plans and specifications were prepared during the quarter for contract construction work, consisting of regulating, grading, paving, repaving, sewers and receiving basins.

Sixteen assessment lists were prepared and forwarded to the Board of Assessors during the quarter.

The work in the Bureau of Subsurface Records consisted in locating existing subsurface structures, to the number of 584, and measuring 77,930 linear feet of transit and offset lines.

Permits for openings in streets to the number of 2,417 were issued, and 563 permits for openings other than streets; number of permits renewed, 1,098, and 6 were revoked.

The total number of contracts entered into during the quarter was 47, apportioned among the Bureaus, as follows:

The Topographical Bureau reports for the quarter, the preparation of 5 rule maps for 5 streets, 9 damage maps for 9 streets, embracing 218 plots covering 362,504.97 square feet, or 145,001.9 City lots, 2 benefit maps covering 298 plots and 81 final damage and benefit maps.

The Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices expended \$3,892.87 on supplies furnished to the several public buildings of the Bureau for the quarter.

During the quarter 66 petitions were considered by the Local Boards of Morristania, Chester, Crotona and Van Cortlandt as follows:

Of the petitions considered 42 were adopted and resolutions forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval.

The total estimated cost of the improvements forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was \$559,805.

During the quarter there were 186 violations of the Building Law for defective plumbing, 6 for defective elevators, 473 for defective construction and material, 474 for erecting and altering without permit, and 137 for unsafe buildings, 17 cases for omitting to place fire-escapes on buildings. Notices were issued to remove violations of the law to the number of 1,403; to remove unsafe buildings, 328; to repair passenger elevators, 6, and to place fire-escapes on buildings, 31.

Complaints to the number of 286 were received, and, upon investigation, were remedied, except in 197 instances where complaints were unfounded and 89 cases notices were issued.

Passenger elevators to the number of 104 were investigated, and 6 were found not to be in compliance with the law.

The Building Bureau reports that during the quarter, plans and specifications were filed to the number of 228 for 359 buildings, the estimated cost of which is \$6,963,700.

Of the number of applications received, 94 were for other than frame dwelling houses, to cost less than \$20,000 each, estimated at a total of \$542,850; 62 for frame dwellings, estimated at a total cost of \$263,750; 17 stores at an estimated cost of less than \$15,000 each, to cost about \$147,025; 100 tenement houses over \$15,000 each, to cost in the aggregate \$3,790,000, and 4 tenement houses costing less than \$15,000 each to be built for \$44,000.

There were 148 alterations to buildings, plans being filed amounting to an estimated cost of \$570,880. Work was begun on 339 new buildings during the quarter,

and there were completed in the same time 372, leaving 813 new buildings in progress. Alterations were commenced on 149 buildings; alterations completed on 141 buildings, leaving alterations on 192 buildings in progress. Respectfully,

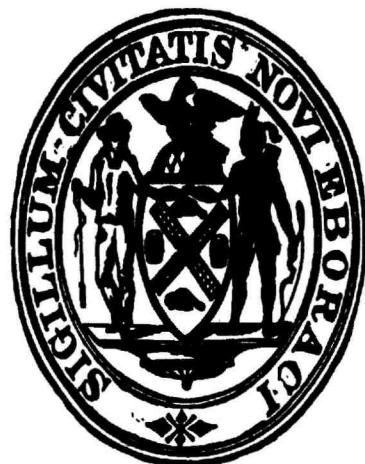

Whereas, The Postal Telegraph Cable Company has, under date of January 13, 1911, made application to this Board for the consent of The City of New York under section 102 of the Transportation Corporations Law (chapter 219 of the Laws of 1909) to the re-location of two conduits and cables (at present owned by The Commercial Cable Company) in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens and the laying of two additional conduits and cables from the junction of Dover and Water sts., Borough of Manhattan, across the East River and through the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens to the Beach at Far Rockaway; and

Whereas, The above petition was withdrawn at the meeting of this Board held February 9, 1911, and a new petition dated February 4, 1911, presented; and

Whereas, The Corporation Counsel has advised this Board that public notice should be given of the proceedings looking to the granting of this consent, in accordance with the provisions of section 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905; and

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws this Board adopted a resolution on January 19, 1911, fixing the date for a public hearing thereon as March 2, 1911, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, said date being continued for the second petition at the meeting of February 9, 1911, and publication was had for at least two (2) days in "The Sun" and "The Commercial," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of the hearing, and the public hearing was duly held on such date; now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the consent applied for by the Postal Telegraph Cable Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such consent, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Postal Telegraph Cable Company the consent of The City of New York as more fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all the terms and conditions, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract, made and entered into this day of _____, 1911, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Postal Telegraph-Cable Company, a corporation formed under and pursuant to the Laws of the State of New York (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

Whereas, The Company on or about the 10th day of August, 1883, filed a certificate of incorporation in the office of the Secretary of State as the New England Telegraph Company; and

Whereas, The said New England Telegraph Company on or about July 26, 1884, filed with the Postmaster-General of the United States of America a certificate of acceptance of the restrictions and obligations imposed on telegraph companies by an Act of Congress of the United States, passed July 24, 1866, entitled, "An Act to aid in the construction of telegraph lines and to secure to the government the use of the same for postal, military and other purposes," and by title 65 of the Revised Statutes of the United States; and

Whereas, The said New England Telegraph Company on or about April 20, 1910, assumed the name of Postal Telegraph-Cable Company, by which it is now known, pursuant to an order of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, authorizing it so to do; and

Whereas, The Company has now applied for the consent of the City to the laying of certain underground conduits between the Borough of Manhattan and Far Rockaway Beach, Borough of Queens, which consent, the Board is advised, is required under the provisions of section 102 of the Transportation Corporations Law (chapter 219 of the Laws of 1909); now, therefore, in consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions herein contained, the City and the Company covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby consents to the construction, erection, maintenance and operation by the Company of the following:

1. Two (2) conduits, each not more than three (3) inches inside diameter with the necessary junction boxes, manholes and appurtenances for the purpose of placing cables and conductors therein from a point at the intersection of Dover and Water sts., Borough of Manhattan; through and along Dover st. to South st.; thence through and along South st. to a point situated near the northern boundary of the property belonging to the City at the foot of Roosevelt st., now leased to the Clyde Steamship Company, and known as Pier (new) 22; thence underneath said property to the easterly extremity of the pier occupied by the Clyde Steamship Company; thence under the East River to a point near the northwestern extremity of the wharf belonging to the City at the foot of the tower of the Brooklyn end of the Brooklyn Bridge; thence beneath said wharf to a point in Water st., Borough of Brooklyn, near the northeastern corner of the aforesaid property; thence through and along Water st. to Dock st.; thence through and along Dock st. to Front st.; thence through and along Front st. to a point where they will join the route of the present conduits of The Commercial Cable Company; thence through and along Front st. to Hudson ave.; thence through and along Hudson ave. to Park ave.; thence through and along Park ave. to Vanderbilt ave.; thence through and along Vanderbilt ave. to Plaza st.; thence along Plaza st. to St. Johns place.

Together with the privilege of constructing and maintaining one (1) small cable house on the wharf or pier on each side of the East River for the purpose of connecting the underground land cables with the two cables to be laid under the East River.

2. Four (4) conduits, each not more than three (3) inches inside diameter, with the necessary junction boxes, manholes and appurtenances for the purpose of placing cables and conductors therein, from a point at the intersection of Plaza st. and St. Johns place, Borough of Brooklyn; thence through and along St. Johns place to East New York ave.; thence through and along East New York ave. to Liberty ave.; thence through and along Liberty ave. to Linwood st.; thence through and along Linwood st. to Belmont ave.; thence through and along Belmont ave. to Railroad ave.; thence through and along Railroad ave. to Pitkin ave.; thence through and along Pitkin ave. to the property, formerly of the Brooklyn City Water Works, now known as the Conduit lands (Conduit ave.); thence through and along the said conduit lands (Conduit ave.) to the boundary line between the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens; thence continuing along the conduit lands (about 4 1/2 miles) to the point of intersection of the said conduit lands with the Rockaway turnpike; thence through and along the Rockaway turnpike to the boundary line between The City of New York and the County of Nassau.

Also beginning at the intersection of Central ave. and McNeil ave., Far Rockaway, Borough of Queens; thence through and along McNeil ave. to Broadway; thence through and along Broadway to its intersection with Oak st., Rockaway turnpike and Jarvis lane; thence through and along Jarvis lane to a point where it joins or intersects Grand View ave.; thence through and along Grand View ave. and in a line therewith to the beach at Far Rockaway, there to connect with the ocean cables of The Commercial Cable Company, which are to be brought to a land connection at this point.

All as shown on a map or plan entitled: "Map or plan to accompany the petition of the Postal Telegraph-Cable Company, dated February 4, 1911, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for permission to construct conduits and draw cables therein from a point at the intersection of Dover and Water sts., Borough of Manhattan, through the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens to the beach at Far Rockaway, as more specifically set forth in the petition of the Company," and signed by C. C. Adams, as Vice-President, a copy of which is attached hereto, and is to be deemed a part of this contract.

Sec. 2. The consent hereby given is in consideration of and subject to the following provisions and conditions:

First—This contract is entered into on the mutual and express understanding and agreement by and between the parties hereto that the Company will not use the said conduits or conductors for which consent is hereby granted for any other purpose than as a telegraph line in connection with the cable lines of the Postal Telegraph-Cable Company, so-called.

Second—The said consent to construct, maintain and operate said conduits and their appurtenances shall continue and extend for the period of the duration of the Company and any renewals of its chartered existence in accordance with the laws of the State of New York.

Third—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, over or through the same route, hereinbefore described, or any portion thereof.

Fourth—The consent hereby granted shall not be assigned, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever,

either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Fifth—The Company shall commence construction of the conduits herein consented to within six (6) months from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and complete the construction of the same, and have the necessary cables and conductors drawn into the same and commence operation within two (2) years thereafter, otherwise, this consent shall cease and determine; provided that the period for commencement and the period for completion, here specified, may be extended by the Board; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvements, or from other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction shall be considered extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided, further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Sixth—Said conduits shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said conduits shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures in the streets and avenues over which such officials have jurisdiction and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Upon completion of the work the grantee shall furnish to the Presidents of the Boroughs plans of such character as they may direct, showing accurately and distinctly the location, size and type of construction and complete dimensions of the structures installed; also the location and dimensions of all substructures encountered during the progress of the work. The depth below the street surface of the new structures and substructures encountered must be shown; and their location with reference to the nearest curb line and the nearest curb line intersection.

Seventh—The Company where it has opened any street or avenue for the purpose of laying or repairing the conduits and cables herein consented to, shall properly restore said pavement and maintain the same for a period of one year, all at its own expense. If the Company shall, after five (5) days' notice from either the President of the Borough of Brooklyn or the President of the Borough of Queens, or any other proper City official, neglect to so restore or maintain said pavement, then the said Presidents, or either of them, or such other proper official, shall be authorized to do so at the expense of the Company, and the cost of such restoration and maintenance shall be a proper charge against the Company. No street or avenue which shall be opened for the purpose of this construction or for any repairs subsequent to the completion of such construction shall be kept open for a longer period than the local authorities may prescribe, or where no period is prescribed, not longer than is reasonably necessary.

Eighth—The Company shall not construct any overhead wires, conductors or cables or erect any poles upon or along the route for which consent is herein granted, or any part of the same, and it is distinctly understood and agreed that such conduits and cables, and every portion thereof shall be placed and constructed underneath the surface of the streets and avenues and other public places and property on such route.

Ninth—It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all work undertaken under the consent granted.

Tenth—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage systems or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the conduits, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Eleventh—It is agreed that the consent hereby granted to construct and operate these conduits and conductors shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said conduits and conductors in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the conduits, conductors and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twelfth—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the conduits are laid be changed at any time after the same have been constructed and during the term of this contract, the Company shall at its own expense, change said conduits and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets and avenues, the Company shall take care of and protect the conduits and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Thirteenth—The wires, cables, conductors and conduits to be laid shall be employed for no other purpose than that explicitly set forth herein, except by consent of the Board, and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate the said wires, cables, conductors and conduits for illegal purposes or to illegal places.

Fourteenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the

Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Fifteenth—If the Company shall fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, and in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, the City shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon.

Sixteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the conduits to be laid, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

The Company shall not, without the permission and consent of the lessee, enter into or use any wharves or piers or other public property affected by this contract, but which is leased by the City to any person or corporation.

Seventeenth—This consent is upon the express condition that the Company within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor and before anything is done in exercise of the consent hereby granted shall file with the Comptroller of the City the joint and several bond of the Company and The Commercial Cable Company in the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) conditioned that the Company will perform all the terms and conditions of this contract and each and every one thereof, and comply with all orders of the Board or other local authority acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the repairs of street pavement, quality of construction of the conduits and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions or upon its failure to comply with such orders or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof, after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from said Companies or either of them.

Eighteenth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Nineteenth—The words "streets or avenues" and "streets and avenues" wherever used in this contract shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, boulevards, concourses, drives, bridges, tunnels, parks, parkways, waterways, docks, bulkheads, wharves, piers or public grounds or waters," the City Aqueduct or Conduit Lands within and belonging to the City, and any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement, encountered in the route hereinabove described, and through or in which this contract shall operate.

Twentieth—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned, or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers, shall have all the powers, rights, and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Twenty-first—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues affected by this consent.

Sec. 3. Nothing contained herein shall be deemed to authorize the Company to use the land, formerly of the Brooklyn City Water Works, now generally known as the Conduit Lands, or the City Aqueduct, without the consent of the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund first had and obtained in the manner and in accordance with the procedure for such consent required by "The Greater New York Charter." And nothing contained herein shall be deemed nor is anything contained herein intended or to be construed as giving to the said Postal Telegraph-Cable Company the consent of this Board, under its authority conferred by "The Greater New York Charter," to the use of the said Conduit Lands for a further or longer term than the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund is authorized to grant either by permission or lease or otherwise, or to the use of any other property of the City as above for a longer period than the local authority or authorities having the control and management of the same are empowered to authorize. And the said right to use the said Conduit Lands and other City property shall be subject to such conditions and provisions as may be imposed by the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Sec. 4. This contract shall not take effect nor shall the Postal Telegraph-Cable Company exercise its privilege of constructing the underground conduits for which consent is herein granted, unless and until The Commercial Cable Company shall execute and file with the Board an instrument under seal, wherein it shall agree in consideration of the grant of the consent to be given by the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to the use of the City Aqueduct or Conduit Lands, to transfer to the City free of all cost and expense that portion of the present conduits, belonging to the said Commercial Cable Company between Plaza st., Borough of Brooklyn, and the cable landing at Manhattan Beach, Coney Island, which is to be abandoned and through which no further operations in connection with the conduits herebefore referred to are completed and placed in operation, such portion to be so transferred being shown on the map or plan attached hereto. In said instrument The Commercial Cable Company shall agree and bind itself to make such transfer to the City within six (6) months after the completion of the conduits herein consented to and the placing of the same in operation.

Sec. 5. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the laws of the State of New York.

Sec. 6. The consent herein granted is subject to the jurisdiction of the United States of America over navigable streams and waters.

Sec. 7. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to

and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held this day the following resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, The Bronx Traction Company has under date of November 24, 1911, made application to this Board for the grant of the right, privilege and franchise to construct, maintain and operate a double track street surface railway as an extension to its existing system upon and along Westchester Avenue from Westchester Square to Eastern Boulevard, Borough of the Bronx, and

Whereas, Section 172 of the Railroad Law and sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants; and

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws this Board adopted a resolution on November 29, 1911, fixing the date for public hearing thereon, as December 21, 1911, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least fourteen (14) days in "The New York Press" and "The New York Times," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly held on such day, and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for and proposed to be granted to the Bronx Traction Company, and the adequacy of the compensation to be paid therefor; now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the Bronx Traction Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced, and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Bronx Traction Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This Contract, made this day of 1912, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Bronx Traction Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesses:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a double track extension to its present street surface railway, with the necessary wires and equipment, for the purpose of conveying passengers only in the Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New York, upon the following route, to wit:

Beginning at and connecting with the existing double track railway of the Company at or near the intersection of West Farms road with Westchester Avenue; thence in, upon and along Westchester Avenue to its intersection with Eastern Boulevard, and to cross such other streets and avenues, named and unnamed, as may be encountered in said route.

The said route with turnouts, switches and crossovers hereby authorized is shown upon a map entitled: "Map showing proposed extension of The Bronx Traction Company in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York," to accompany petition dated November 24, 1911, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment," and signed by Edward A. Maher, President, and T. F. Mullane, Chief Engineer; a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, and is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description, and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within three (3) months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall within said three (3) months or within one (1) month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and terminate.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, until January 19, 1936, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other, fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the

annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract; and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500) in cash within three (3) months after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than one thousand five hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,550), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one thousand five hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,550). During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two thousand eight hundred dollars (\$2,800), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand eight hundred dollars (\$2,800).

During the third term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than three thousand one hundred dollars (\$3,100), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three thousand one hundred dollars (\$3,100).

During the fourth term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than three thousand four hundred dollars (\$3,400), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three thousand four hundred dollars (\$3,400).

During the remaining term expiring January 19, 1936, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than three thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$3,750), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$3,750).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross receipts of the Company as shall bear the same proportion to its whole gross receipts as the length of the extension hereby authorized shall bear to the entire length of the railway of the Company in operation within the limits of the City.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor. All annual charges as above shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding, provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, the sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

The annual charges herein provided are intended to include the percentages of gross receipts now required to be paid by railway companies to the City, pursuant to the Railroad Law, as amended.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any laws of the State of New York.

Fourth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payment for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fifth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions over the route hereinbefore described.

The use of the railway constructed by the Company under this contract, including the tracks, wires and other equipment or any structures used in connection therewith in streets and avenues hereinbefore described shall be permitted by the Company, to any individual or corporation to which the City may have granted, or may hereafter grant, the right or privilege to use such streets and avenues for street railway purposes, upon payment of an annual sum by such individual or corporation to the Company,

which shall equal the legal interest on such proportion of the actual cost of the construction of such railway and structures, and additions and betterments thereto, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the Company; and also such proportion of the cost of keeping the tracks and electrical equipment in repair, and the cost of additions and betterments thereto, such proportion of laying and repairing of pavement and removal of snow and ice and all other duties imposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract in connection with the maintenance or operation of said railway so used, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the Company then using the same, together with the actual cost of the power necessary for the operation of the cars thereon of such individual or corporation. Provided, however, that if, in the opinion of the Company, the legal rate of interest upon the cost of such railway shall be an insufficient sum to be paid for the use of such tracks, it may appeal to the Board and the Board may fix a percentage upon the cost to be paid to the Company, at a sum in excess of the legal rate of interest, if, in its opinion, such action is justified.

The Company shall not at any time oppose, but shall, upon the request of the Board, consent to the construction or operation of any street surface railway which may necessitate the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed by the Company pursuant to this contract.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipments of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual, it, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Eighth—The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within three (3) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are filed with the Board or from the date of the order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court made pursuant to section 174 of the Railroad Law confirming the determination of the Commissioners appointed thereunder, that such railway ought to be constructed, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within three (3) months from the date of filing such consents or the date of such order; otherwise this right shall cease and terminate, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City, provided that the period for commencement and the period for completion and placing the railway in full operation may be extended by the Board, but the total extension of time for either of such periods shall not exceed in the aggregate six (6) months; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Ninth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appliances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and terminate.

Tenth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railway shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues, over which such officials have jurisdiction and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Eleventh—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of The Bronx, or by any other motive power except locomotive steam power or horse power; which may be approved by the Board and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Twelfth—Upon six (6) months' notice by the Board to the Company, all wires for the transmission of power, except trolley wires for the operation of the railway, upon all or any portion of the route hereby authorized, shall be placed in conduits beneath or alongside of the railway. The Company shall provide in such conduits two

(2) ducts not less than three (3) inches in diameter for the exclusive use of the City. Such ducts shall be used only by the Company for the operation of its railway and by the City, as above.

Thirteenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride from any point on its road, or on any road, line or branch operated by it or under its control, to any other point thereof, or of any connecting branch thereof, within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Department of the City, when such employees are in full uniform.

Fourteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway.

Fifteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Sixteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Seventeenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Eighteenth—Cars on said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty (30) minutes, both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as may be directed by the Board.

Provided, however, that the Company during the first five (5) years of this contract shall not be required to operate its cars between the hours of one (1) o'clock a. m. and five (5) o'clock a. m. each day, unless the Board shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public convenience requires the operation of cars during said hours.

Nineteenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues in which said railway shall be constructed, shall, if directed by the President of the Borough of The Bronx, cause to be watered at least three (3) times every twenty-four (24) hours when the temperature is above thirty-five (35) degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets and avenues, except when the width of such streets and avenues shall exceed sixty (60) feet between curb lines, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only sixty (60) feet in width of such roadway, and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets and avenues in a satisfactory manner.

Twentieth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets and avenues upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Twenty-first—As long as said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in any street or avenue, the Company shall pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street or avenue in which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. In case of the neglect of the Company to make pavement or repairs after the expiration of thirty (30) days' notice to do so from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, said President may make the same at the expense of the Company. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street or avenue, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City official, at its own expense, and the provisions as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twenty-second—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage systems, or to any other substructure or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-third—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a street surface railway shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twenty-fourth—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the railway is hereby authorized be changed at any time after the railway has been constructed and during the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets and avenues the Company shall take care of and protect the tracks and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Twenty-fifth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1, of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number of passengers carried during the year.
16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.

17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.

18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-sixth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross receipts from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts, the total miles in operation within the limits of the City, and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-seventh—In case of any violation or breach of failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any order of the Board acting under the powers herein granted, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-eighth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-ninth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in full the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
