Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock a. m., on Wednesday, March 26, 1913.

Present—John Parroy Mitchel, Acting Mayor; Douglas Mathewson, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; Robert R. Moore, Chamberlain, and Henry H. Curran, Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution, relative to a lease of rooms in the Park Row Building, Nos. 13-21 Park Row, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity:

March 25, 1913.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:
Gentlemen—On March 13, 1912, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorized a lease of the following rooms in the Park Row Building, Nos. 13-21 Park Row,

Borough of Manhattan: Rooms 1318, 1322, inclusive, 1330 and 1331, 1501 to 1539, inclusive, 1715 to 1731, inclusive, 1818, 1819, 1823 and 1824, 1901 to 1915, inclusive, 1930 to 1939, inclusive, 2001 to 2039, inclusive, 2301 to 2304, inclusive, 2312 to 2339, inclusive, 2415 to 2419, inclusive, 2423 and 2424, 2429 and 2430, 2502 to 2505, inclusive, 2513 to 2522, inclusive, for use of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, for a period of one year from April 1, 1912, at an annual rental of \$59,516.90, payable quarterly.

These rooms contain a combined area of 32,841 square feet, and the rent is at the rate of \$1.81 per square foot.

On May 8, 1912, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorized a lease from the Park Row Realty Company of rooms 2310 and 2311 in the Park Row Building for use of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, for a period of eleven months from May 1, 1912, at a rental at the rate of \$852 per annum. These rooms contain an area of 385 square feet, and the rent paid is at the rate of \$2.21 per square foot.

On October 9, 1912, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorized a lease from said Company of room 2512 in this building for use of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, for a period from October 15, 1912, to April 1, 1913, at a rental at the rate of \$360 per annum. This room contains an area of 153 square feet, and is at the rate of \$2.35 per square foot.

At a meeting held on November 27, 1912, a lease of room 2309 was authorized for a period from November 1, 1912, to April 1, 1913, at a rental at the rate of \$630 per annum. This room contains an area of 273 square feet, and the rent is at the rate of \$2.31 per square foot.

At the same meeting a lease of rooms 837, 838 and 839 in this building was authorized for a period of four months from December 1, 1912, at a rental at the rate of \$1,028 per annum. These rooms contain an area of 514 square feet, and the rent is at the rate of \$2 per square foot.

On January 29, 1913, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorized a lease of rooms 2528 and 2529 in said building for a period from February 1, 1913, to April 1, 1913, at a rental at the rate of \$708 per annum. These rooms contain an area of 310 square feet, and the rent is at the rate of \$2.28 per square foot. Instead of room 2529, this should have been room 2530, and in another communication I am recommending that the resolution of January 29, 1913, be amended.

The combined area of all the rooms above mentioned is 34,476 square feet, and the rent thereof is \$63,094.90 per annum, which is at the rate of \$1.83 per square foot.

The owners of this building are willing to renew this lease for a period of one year at the same rental, and under the same terms and conditions, with the privilege of cancellation by the City at any time after the first six months, upon giving thirty (30) days' notice to the lessor of its intention so to do.

"Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute a renewal of the lease to the City of rooms 1018-1019 on the tenth floor and all of the eleventh floor, with the exception of room 1124, in the Barclay Building, No. 299 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, for a term of six months from May 1, 1913, with the privilege to the lessee of renewal from month to month thereafter up to May 1, 1914, upon its giving thirty (30) days' previous written notice of its intention to accept such renewal term of one month, at a rental at the rate of sixteen thousand and seventy-six dollars and fifty cents (\$16,076.50) a year, payable quarterly, the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, and furnish heat, light, elevator and janitor service; lessor, the Barclay Realty Company; rent payable to William C. Walker's Sons, Wright Barclay, Agents; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interest of the City that such lease be made."

The resolution mentions room 1019 on the tenth floor, which is really four rooms in one, originally numbered 1019 to 1022, inclusive. The resolution also says all of the eleventh floor with the exception of room 1124. Room 1124 is really 1123 and 1124, now used as one room, and leased to another tenant.

The lessor, the Barclay Realty Company, has consented to an amendment of the wording of the terms of the renewal of the lease after six months.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the above resolution be rescinded, and in place thereof, the following resolution be adopted:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute a renewal of the lease to the City of rooms 1018 to 1022, inclusive, on the tenth floor, and rooms 1101 to 1122, inclusive, on the eleventh floor, in the Barclay Building, No. 299 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, for a term of one year from May 1, 1913, with the privilege to the lessee of cancelling and terminating said lease at the end of any month after the first six months upon its giving thirty days' previous written notice of its intention so to do, at a rental of \$16,076.50 a year, payable quarterly, the lessor to pay taxes and water rates and furnish heat, light, elevator and janitor service; lessor, the Barclay Realty Company; rent payable to William C. Walker's Sons, Wright Barclay, Agents; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made. Respectfully,

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held March 19, 1913, authorizing a renewal of the lease to the City of rooms 1018 and 1019 on the tenth floor, and all of the eleventh floor, with the exception of room 1124 in the Barclay Building, No. 299 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, for a term of six months from May 1, 1913, with the privilege to the lessee of renewal from month to month thereafter up to May 1, 1914, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute a renewal of the lease to the City of rooms 1018 to 1022 inclusive on the tenth floor, and rooms 1101 to 1122 inclusive on the eleventh floor, in the Barclay Building, No. 299 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, for a term of one year from May 1, 1913, with the privilege to the lessee of cancelling and terminating said lease at the end of any month after the first six months upon its giving thirty (30) days' previous written notice of its intention so to do, at a rental of sixteen thousand and seventy-six dollars and fifty cents (\$16,076.50) a year, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates and furnish heat, light, elevator and janitor service; lessor, The Barclay Realty Company, rent payable to William C. Walker's Sons, Wright Barclay, Agents; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted, and the resolutions severally adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a lease to the City, of premises No. 29 3d avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Department of Health:

March 25, 1913.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—The Secretary of the Department of Health in a communication to your Board under date of March 17, 1913, states that the Board of Health at a meeting held March 11, 1913, adopted a resolution requesting that a lease be secured of the premises No. 29 3d avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, owned by the Brooklyn Central Dispensary, for use of the Department of Health as a hospital admission bureau and tuberculosis clinic, for a period of five years from April 1, 1913, with the privilege of renewal for an additional five years upon the same terms and conditions, at the nominal rental of \$1 a year, payable annually.

This is a four-story brick building 25 by 94 feet on a lot 25 by 100 feet, located on the east side of 3d avenue, 50 feet south of State street.

The property is assessed: land, \$5,000; building, \$13,500; total, \$18,500. Appraisal by Division of Real Estate: land, \$6,000; building, \$14,000; total, \$20,000.

This property has been occupied as a dispensary for more than twenty years. The lease is to be for five years with the privilege of renewal for an additional five years upon the same terms and conditions, viz.: \$1 a year.

The property is exempt from taxation, but the City must pay water rates and furnish heat, light and janitor service and make all inside and outside repairs, including painting and repairs to the roof. The owners grant to the City the privilege of making such slight interior alterations as may be required for occupancy.

As the rent is merely nominal and the premises are needed by the Department of Health, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a lease of the four-story brick building 25 by 94 feet on lot 25 by 100 feet, at No. 29 3d avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Department of Health, for a period of five years from April 1, 1913, with the privilege of renewal for an additional five years upon the same terms and conditions, at a rental of \$1 a year, payable annually, the lessee to furnish heat, light, water and janitor service, pay taxes, should any be imposed, and to make such inside and outside repairs, including painting and repairs to the roof, as it may deem necessary. Lessor, Brooklyn Central Dispensary, address care of Edward C. Blum and George V. Brower, No. 420 Fulton street, Borough of Brooklyn. Respectfully,

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City from the Brooklyn Central Dispensary, of the 4-story brick building 25x94 feet on lot 25x100 feet, at No. 29 Third avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Department of Health, for a period of five years from April 1, 1913, with the privilege of renewal for an additional five years upon the same terms and conditions, at a rental of one dollar (\$1.00) a year, payable annually; the lessee to furnish heat, light, water and janitor service, pay taxes should any be imposed and to make such inside and outside repairs, including painting and repairs to the roof, as it may deem necessary; and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made; the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute the same when prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel as provided by sections 149 and 217 of the Greater New York Charter.

The report was accepted, and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The following communication was received from the Board of Education turning over as no longer required the leased premises known as the Grinnell Mansion, on Grinnell avenue, Corona, Borough of Queens:

March 12, 1913.

Mr. JOHN KORB, Jr., Secretary, Sinking Fund Commission:

Dear Sir—I beg to advise you that at a meeting of the Board of Education held this day the following preamble and resolution was adopted:

"Whereas, The lease of the premises known as the Grinnell Mansion on Grinnell avenue, Corona, Queens, heretofore occupied as an annex to Public School 15, will expire on September 24, 1913, and said premises are no longer required for the purposes of the Department of Education; therefore be it

"Resolved, That the above mentioned premises be turned over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on and after March 15, 1913, for such action as may be deemed advisable by said Commissioners."

Respectfully yours, A. E. PALMER, Secretary, Board of Education.

In connection therewith the Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

March 25, 1913.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On October 25, 1911, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorized a lease from Thomas Koch of the building known as the Grinnell Mansion, on Grinnell avenue, 320 feet north of Jackson avenue, Corona, Borough of Queens (with the exception of the basement, which was reserved for the sole and exclusive use of the owner), together with sixteen lots, beginning at a point on the easterly side of Grinnell avenue, distant 120 feet southerly from the southeast corner of Grinnell avenue and Smith avenue, and running thence southerly along the easterly line of Grinnell avenue 160 feet; thence easterly and parallel with the southerly line of Smith avenue 225 feet to the westerly line of Benjamin street; thence northerly along the said line of Benjamin street 160 feet; thence westerly and parallel with the southerly line of Smith avenue 225 feet to the point or place of beginning, being more particularly known and described as Lots 22, 23, 27, 28, 42, 43 and 48, in Block 103, Ward 2, Corona, Borough of Queens, for a period of two years from September 24, 1911, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year, at an annual rental of \$1,500, payable quarterly, for use of the Board of Education; the lessor to retain possession of the basement and to pay taxes and make outside repairs; the City to pay for the water used on the school premises, furnish heat, light and janitor service, and to make any interior repairs that it may deem necessary.

On March 12, 1913, the Board of Education adopted a resolution stating that these premises are no longer required for the purposes of the Department of Education, and recommending that they be turned over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on and after March 15, 1913, for such action as may be deemed advisable by said Commission.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Comptroller be directed to derive such revenue as he may from the above mentioned premises until the expiration of the lease thereof. Respectfully,

Whereas, The Board of Education by resolution adopted March 12, 1913, having turned over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund as no longer required, the leased premises known as the Grinnell Mansion on Grinnell avenue, 320 feet north of Jackson avenue, Corona, Borough of Queens (with the exception of the basement, which was reserved for the sole and exclusive use of the owner) together with 16 lots, the lease of which expires September 24, 1913, it is

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to derive such revenue from the premises as may be had until the expiration of the lease.

The report was accepted, and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Committee to which was referred the matter of the resolution authorizing a conveyance of the City's interest in certain lands on the easterly side of Park avenue between 67th and 68th streets in the Borough of Manhattan, to the Hahnemann Hospital, reported that the opinion of the Corporation Counsel had just been received, and they were not as yet prepared to make their report. The matter was again laid over, and the Secretary directed to have a copy of the opinion made and given to Hon. Edward M. Grout, who represented the Hahnemann Hospital.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to the sale and removal of buildings acquired by the City for the widening of Canal street from the Bowery to Chrystie street, the Borough of Manhattan:

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—a request has been received from the President of the Borough of Manhattan for the removal of the buildings acquired by the City for the widening of Canal street from the Bowery to Chrystie street, in the Borough of Manhattan, to permit the completion of the intended improvement.

I therefore request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to the authority vested in them by Section 1553 of the Revised Charter, adopt a resolution authorizing the sale of said buildings, and such resolution is herewith transmitted.

Whereas, The President of the Borough of Manhattan has requested the sale of certain buildings, etc., hereinafter described, located in the Borough of Manhattan, acquired for street widening purposes;

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by virtue of the powers vested in them by law, hereby authorize and order the sale at public auction or by sealed bids, at the highest marketable prices, of all the buildings, parts of buildings, etc., acquired for the widening of Canal street, from the Bowery to Chrystie street, in the Borough of Manhattan, all of which are more particularly described on a certain map on file in the office of the Collector of City Revenue, Department of Finance, No. 280 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, upon the terms and conditions for the sale of buildings, etc., as authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held October 4, 1910.

The report was accepted, and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, transmitting for approval a new plan for the improvement of the waterfront between Chambers and Canal streets, North River, Borough of Manhattan. A public hearing being necessary, the following resolution was offered for adoption:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby fix 11-10 o'clock in the forenoon on Wednesday, April 16, 1913, in room 16, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, as the time and place for a public hearing, relative to a request of the Commissioner of Docks that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve a new plan for the improvement of the waterfront between Chambers and Canal streets, North River, Borough of Manhattan, made and adopted by the Commissioner of Docks in accordance with law March 26, 1913.

Which resolution was adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The above plan, together with the plan for the improvement of the waterfront between West 44th and West 46th streets, North River, in the Borough of Manhattan, the hearing in regard to which was also fixed for April 16, 1913, were referred to a Committee consisting of the Mayor, Comptroller, and President of the Board of Aldermen, for consideration and report.

The Committee to which was referred at the last meeting the matter of the vacant property under the control of the various departments, which they refuse to turn over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in order that some advantageous disposition of the same may be made, with instructions to draft an amendment to the charter which will cover the difficulty met by the Committee in connection with the matter, submitted the following:

AN ACT to Amend the Greater New York Charter in Relation to the Powers of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund Over Certain Property.

The People of the State of New York, Represented in Senate and Assembly, do Enact as Follows:

Section 1. The Greater New York Charter, as re-enacted by chapter four hundred and sixty-six of the laws of nineteen hundred and one is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 205. The said board shall, except as in this act otherwise specifically provided, have power to sell or lease for the highest marketable price or rental at public auction or by sealed bids, and always after public advertisement for a period of at least fifteen days in the City Record, and after appraisal under the direction of said board made within three months of the date of sale, any city property except parks, wharves and piers and land under water, except as hereinafter provided, but no such lease shall run for a term longer than ten years nor a renewal for a longer period than ten years. If such property be market property it shall be sold only pursuant to a resolution adopted by an unanimous vote of the commissioners of the sinking fund, concurred in by the board of aldermen. The commissioners of the sinking fund shall have power to assign to use for any public purposes any city property, for whatsoever purpose originally acquired, which may be found by the department having control thereof to be no longer required for such purpose.

If such property be vacant or unimproved or if improvements situated thereon, in the opinion of the commissioners of the sinking fund, are or have become unsuited to the uses to which they are or are about to be put, and if the use of such property by the department holding control thereof is, in the opinion of the commissioners of the sinking fund, not essential to the conduct of the work of that department, the same may be transferred to another department, sold or leased, without the consent of the department holding control thereof, pursuant to an unanimous vote of the commissioners of the sinking fund. Such unanimous vote of the commissioners of the sinking fund shall be deemed to be a voluntary surrender by the department holding control thereof. The proceeds of said sale or leasing shall on receipt thereof, after paying necessary charges, be immediately paid to the credit of the sinking fund for the redemption of the city debt. Said commissioners of the sinking fund shall have power by unanimous vote, to settle and adjust by mutual conveyances or otherwise, and upon such terms and conditions as may seem to them proper, disputes existing between the city and private owners of property, in respect to boundary lines, and to release such interests of the city in real estate as the corporation counsel shall certify in writing to be mere clouds upon titles of private owners, in such manner and upon such terms and conditions as in their judgment shall seem proper.

The commissioners of the sinking fund are hereby authorized to approve agreements, submitted by the commissioner of docks, fixing, determining upon and establishing the line of high water as provided for in section eight hundred and eighteen-a and are further authorized to sell and convey to the upland owner lands under water inside of such line, to purchase from the upland owner any lands outside of such line and to exchange lands under water inside of such line for lands outside of such line upon such terms and conditions as in their judgment shall seem proper.

Said commissioners of the sinking fund shall also have power to sell and convey the right, title and interest of the city in and to lands lying within any street, avenue, road, highway, alley, lane or public place or square that has been discontinued and closed, in whole or in part, by lawful authority, to the owner of lands fronting on such street, avenue, road, highway, alley, lane or public place or square so discontinued and closed, on such terms and conditions and for such consideration as in the judgment of the said commissioners of the sinking fund shall seem proper, provided the said commissioners of the sinking fund shall first determine that the said lands or the part thereof so sold and conveyed, are not needed for any public use. Said commissioners of the sinking fund shall have discretion to direct the demolition or removal of all buildings or other structures, the title to which has been acquired by the city in condemnation proceedings or by purchase, and not needed for any public purposes, in the same manner as now provided by law for the demolition and removal of unsafe buildings, and in such cases the expense of such demolition and removal shall be paid in the same manner as is now provided for the demolition and removal of unsafe buildings. They may also, prior to the confirmation of the report of commissioners of estimates of appraisal, or prior to the purchase of the premises upon which said buildings or parts of buildings or other structures are erected, or prior to the vesting of titles therein, agree with the owner or owners thereof, or any person having a beneficial interest therein, in case title has not vested in the city, and in the case title has vested in the city, with the person or persons entitled to the award or awards, therefor, as to the cost and compensation to be allowed and paid to said owner or owners, or other persons for the removal of said buildings or parts of buildings or other structures, as the compensation to be awarded by said commissioners or allowed for the damage done said building or buildings or other structures in the acquisition of title thereto, and it may also, as a condition of the sale by the city at private sale of its interest therein after vesting of title in said building or parts of buildings or other structures to the owner or owners of the award or awards therefor, or other persons having an interest therein, agree that damages to be awarded by the commissioners shall be the agreed compensation for the purpose of the removal thereof, provided, however, that such

buildings or parts of buildings or other structures shall not, in any case, be relocated or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement.

Commissioners of estimate and appraisal shall accept such agreed amounts of compensation for the removal of buildings or parts of buildings or other structures as the amounts to be awarded as such compensation and include the same in their reports. Said commissioners of the sinking fund shall prescribe such conditions in the terms of sale which, if broken, shall entitle the city to a resale of said property, and which shall revert title to same in the city.

Said commissioners of the sinking fund shall also have power to lease all or any part of the right, title and interest heretofore or hereafter acquired by the city in and to any lands outside the limits of said city for the sanitary protection of the water supply, and to grant in perpetuity, or for shorter periods, rights, easements, or rights-of-way in, over or across any such lands, for highway purposes or for the improvement of the facilities and public service of railroad heretofore located thereon upon such terms and conditions, for such consideration, and subject to such restrictions as in the judgment of said commissioners shall seem proper; provided that no such lease or grant shall be made unless the said commissioners shall first determine that the said lands or interests therein, so granted or conveyed, are to be used or enjoyed for a purpose which is consistent with the sanitary protection of the water supply of said city, and provided that every such grant or lease shall contain covenants restricting the use of such lands, or interests therein, in accordance with the determination of said commissioners and providing for the forfeiture to the city of the lands or interests therein upon breach of any of said covenants. The provisions of existing laws or ordinances relative to the investment of moneys and assets of the several sinking funds hereby made subject to the control of the commissioners of the sinking fund as hereby constituted, in bonds, stocks, or obligations of the municipal or public corporations or parts thereof hereby consolidated into the City of New York, including the counties of Kings and Richmond, shall hereinafter apply to investments thereof in the bonds or stocks of the corporation of the City of New York, issued on and after January first, eighteen hundred and ninety-eight, provided, however, that such bonds or stock shall not thereupon or thereafter be cancelled except as herein otherwise specifically provided but the same shall upon their maturity be paid off, liquidated or discharged in the same manner as they would be if held by private creditors. It shall be lawful for the commissioners of the sinking fund in their discretion, and they are hereby empowered in such discretion to cancel from time to time, but not before maturity, bonds and stock of any of the municipal and public corporations or parts thereof forming part of the corporation of The City of New York, as hereby constituted, and of the counties of Kings and Richmond, which may be held by any of said sinking funds on December thirty-first, eighteen hundred and ninety-seven, providing said bonds and stocks are by law redeemable from the sinking funds in which the same are held. It shall also be lawful for the commissioners of the sinking fund in their discretion and they are hereby empowered in such discretion, to cancel from time to time, but not before maturity, any portion of the indebtedness of The City of New York, as hereby constituted, incurred on or after January first, eighteen hundred and ninety-eight, which may be held by them in the sinking fund of The City of New York, as hereinafter constituted, and which may by law be redeemable from said sinking fund as herein or elsewhere provided, and all such similar indebtedness incurred to provide for the supply of water, which may be held by them and redeemable from the water sinking fund of The City of New York as hereinafter constituted. The funds to be known as the sinking fund of The City of New York as hereinafter constituted, shall be administered by the commissioners of the sinking fund, in like manner as provided by the ordinance of the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of The City of New York, approved by the mayor, February twenty-second, eighteen hundred and forty-four, so far as the same may be applicable; provided, however, that nothing contained in said ordinance shall affect or alter the composition of the board of commissioners of the sinking fund, as by this act constituted. The rate of interest on all corporate stock, bonds or other obligations for the payment of money of whatsoever kind or description issued by The City of New York except certificates of indebtedness or other evidences of indebtedness, issued pursuant to the provisions of section one hundred and eighty-seven of this act, shall be prescribed by the commissioners of the sinking fund. The commissioners of the sinking fund may by resolution assign the places where the several municipal courts shall be held within their respective districts and may assign such place in said city as may to it seem most conducive to the public convenience for the holding of the courts of general and special sessions, and, upon the application of the board of city magistrates, may designate additional places for the holding of magistrates' or police courts and jail delivery to be held in and for the said city; notice of any change of the places of holding such courts shall before the same takes effect, be published in the City Record and the corporation newspapers for a period of not less than two weeks. Said publication shall be made under the direction of the comptroller. The commissioners of the sinking fund may by resolution designate from time to time any building or buildings within the city to be the common jails of said city or of any of the counties contained within its territorial limits, for all the purposes for which common jails may by law be used, and such building or buildings so designated shall be such common jails until changed by a like resolution of the commissioners of the sinking fund. The sinking fund commissioners of The City of New York shall not have the power in any event to compromise or release any existing liability or obligation to The City of New York or to the mayor, aldermen or commonalty of The City of New York or to any of the municipalities or parts of municipalities consolidated with the former City of New York, under the provisions of chapter six hundred and forty-two of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-six or under chapter four hundred and thirty-four of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-three, but such liabilities and obligations shall be and remain inviolable. (As amended by L. 1911, ch. 694.)

On motion the proposed amendment was approved for transmission to the Legislature, subject to the approval of the Mayor.

Contractors or Builders shall provide or cause to be provided temporary privies for the use of the men employed during construction work, at some convenient place upon the premises or which shall be readily accessible, and the same shall be properly screened to prevent the entrance of flies thereto. The contents of such privies shall be disinfected and removed and shall not be allowed to accumulate thereat. Contractors, builders or other persons having the management and control of construction work shall prevent the commission of any nuisance by workers, employees or other persons in and about such work or premises connected therewith, and require workers and employees to use the privies so provided.

It is hereby made the duty of each owner or occupant of any premises on which a privy is located or used to cause the same to be properly screened so that flies shall not have access thereto or to the contents thereof.

None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids, and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all person interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
