 2 MR. SZARPANSKI: Good evening,
 3 my name is Harry Szarpanski, I'm
 4 Assistant Commissioner for the
 5 Department of Sanitation bureau of long
 6 term export of the City of New York. I
 7 welcome the opportunity to appear
 8 before you tonight.
 9 I'm joined by two members of my
 10 staff, Sarah Dolinar and Vaughan
 11 Arnold. We also have representatives
 12 here from our consulting firm; we have
 13 Susan Raila and Dan Harkins with the
 14 firm Henningson, Durham and Richardson,
 15 HDR; HDR is responsible for conducting
 16 the environmental review for the
 17 Department's projects. Also,
 18 representatives of the firm of Ecology
 19 and Environment helped organized this
 20 meeting and they're here also tonight.
 21 As you may know, the Department
 22 of Sanitation is preparing a new
 23 comprehensive solid waste management
 24 plan for the City to replace the plan
 25 that will expire at the end of October

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 2 of this year.
 3 The new solid waste management
 4 plan or as we refer to it, the new
 5 SWMP, will replace -- will plan for the
 6 management of all of the solid waste
 7 generated in the City over the next 20
 8 years.
 9 We expect to issue a draft of
 10 the new SWMP in September; it will need
 11 to be approved by the City Council and
 12 by the State. The new SWMP will be
 13 supported by an environmental impact
 14 statement.
 15 The new SWMP will rely on
 16 current programs to recycle, compost
 17 and prevent or reduce waste. A key
 18 component of the new SWMP is the
 19 long-term export of solid waste managed
 20 by the Department through the state-of
 21 -the-art marine transfer station
 22 facilities that are proposed to be
 23 built at the City's eight existing
 24 marine transfer station sites in
 25 Brooklyn, Manhattan, Queens and the

1
 2 Bronx. These facilities will
 3 containerize waste and transport it by
 4 barge for disposal.
 5 The proposed Hamilton Avenue
 6 converted MTS would handle the
 7 Department-managed waste for Brooklyn
 8 community districts 2, 6 through 11, 14
 9 and 16 through 18 only, as in the past.
 10 This program to build new marine
 11 transfer stations is called the MTS
 12 conversion program.
 13 We are before you tonight to
 14 hear your comments on the environmental
 15 review and the proposed Hamilton Avenue
 16 converted marine transfer station. In
 17 addition, we seek your comments on all
 18 of the proposed actions including the
 19 MTS conversion program and alternatives
 20 that were outlined in the draft scoping
 21 document we issued on May 17th.
 22 The draft scoping document was
 23 mailed to all of the elected officials
 24 and community boards as well to
 25 environmental organizations and to our

1
 2 regulators. It was placed on the
 3 Department's website and in public
 4 repositories in your community and nine
 5 other communities that are the proposed
 6 sites for the new marine transfer
 7 stations or for alternatives.
 8 My comments tonight will be
 9 brief. I will make a short power point
 10 presentation before the public portion
 11 of the meeting begins.
 12 Copies of my statement and
 13 presentation will be available at the
 14 end of the meeting. Headsets are also
 15 available at the sign-in desk for those
 16 who require Spanish translation of
 17 tonight's meeting.
 18 Because the real focus of this
 19 public meeting will be your comments,
 20 please make sure that you take a moment
 21 to complete a speaker sign-up sheet if
 22 you plan to make a statement for the
 23 record. You will be assigned a number
 24 and I will call your name when it is
 25 your turn to speak.

1
 2 We're interested in making a
 3 complete record of your comments so
 4 please state your name clearly and
 5 slowly for the stenographer.
 6 And typically we would ask
 7 people to limit their statement to
 8 three minutes, but we don't have that
 9 many speakers so if you need to go
 10 beyond three minutes, by all means,
 11 make it reasonable.
 12 Thank you for coming tonight
 13 and I'll begin my short presentation.
 14 (Showing slides) The
 15 initiatives included in the new solid
 16 waste management plan will address
 17 long-term export of waste, new
 18 recycling facilities in the City and
 19 how commercial waste will be managed.
 20 As I mentioned, we're here
 21 today to receive your comments and you
 22 can provide us comments either verbally
 23 tonight or you can fill out a comment
 24 sheet that we have out front; you can
 25 submit a written statement that you

1
 2 have prepared or you can mail comments
 3 to me by July 9th to the address listed
 4 or to our consultant at the address
 5 below, and the handouts that we will
 6 give you will contain these addresses.
 7 The draft EIS will look at the
 8 proposed action, which is the marine
 9 transfer station conversion program and
 10 we'll look at alternatives being
 11 evaluated; those alternatives are:
 12 Rail/barge export of waste from private
 13 transfer stations in the Bronx,
 14 Brooklyn and Queens; rehabilitating the
 15 existing marine transfer stations to
 16 barge waste to an out-of-city unloading
 17 facility and the delivery of waste in
 18 collection vehicles or barges to an
 19 out-of-city waste disposal facility.
 20 This map shows the locations of
 21 all of our marine transfer stations
 22 throughout the City. It also shows in
 23 this area, the Hamilton Avenue MTS and
 24 the location of the 52nd Street barge
 25 staging area.

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 2 The facility being planned to
 3 be converted, the MTSSs, three are in
 4 Manhattan, three in Brooklyn, one in
 5 Queens, and one in the Bronx and also
 6 the 52nd Street Barge staging area.
 7 The objectives of the program
 8 are: To export waste by barge or rail;
 9 reduce the in-city transfer trailer
 10 traffic; utilize more economical
 11 disposal capacity and provide more in
 12 transport and disposal options.
 13 This drawing shows the various,
 14 the three wastesheds in Brooklyn whose
 15 waste will be allocated to each of the
 16 three MTSSs to be converted. The area
 17 in blue is the Hamilton Avenue
 18 wasteshed.
 19 This is a typical cross-section
 20 of the Hamilton Avenue MTS. The trucks
 21 will be entering the facility by going
 22 up a ramp at the right side, and once
 23 they're up the ramp in the facility,
 24 they will back up on the tipping floor
 25 and then unload their waste to a lower

1
 2 rapid-roll up doors so that doors don't
 3 stay open more than they need to; an
 4 interior water misting system inside
 5 the building to reduce the exhaust dust
 6 and a state-of-the-art odor control
 7 system to neutralize rather than just
 8 mask odors in the building exhaust air
 9 so that there's no detectable odors at
 10 sensitive receptors outside of the
 11 building.
 12 This map shows the location of
 13 the marine transfer station, the New
 14 York City DOT truck routes and the
 15 nearest sensitive receptor.
 16 The design of the facility is
 17 such that there will be no trucks
 18 queuing on the street. The access
 19 ramps are longer, the ramps are
 20 designed to support the weight of the
 21 trucks, and within the building, 12
 22 collection vehicles -- at the site
 23 itself, 12 collection vehicles can
 24 queue and the tipping space inside the
 25 building exists for six trucks at a

1
 2 level which is the loading floor.
 3 At the loading floor, front-end
 4 loaders will push waste into one of
 5 four openings in the floor. Just below
 6 each of the four openings will be
 7 containers that will receive the waste
 8 and once the waste is in the container
 9 and it is tamped down, the container
 10 will slide over to the next area and
 11 the lidding operation will occur there.
 12 This is where the lids will be
 13 placed on top of the container and the
 14 containers will be sealed. All this
 15 occurs while inside the building. And
 16 once the containers are sealed, they'll
 17 move over to the outside of the
 18 building where a gantry crane will pick
 19 up the containers and place them onto a
 20 barge.
 21 The odor control system plan
 22 for these facilities include a
 23 ventilation system to prevent air from
 24 escaping the processing of the building
 25 even when the doors are open;

1
 2 time.
 3 This is an aerial photo showing
 4 where the existing marine transfer
 5 station is, and I don't know if you can
 6 see it, it's outlined in red; the
 7 shaded area is where the new facility
 8 will be built.
 9 The existing facility will
 10 first be demolished as will the
 11 existing incinerator and the new
 12 transfer station will sit over the
 13 space, mostly over where the
 14 incinerator existed.
 15 The containerization operation
 16 includes specially-designed intermodal
 17 containers. They have leak-proof
 18 seals. The lidding all will occur
 19 inside the building and once the
 20 containers are outside of the building,
 21 they'll be loaded onto the flat bed
 22 barges so that no waste will be exposed
 23 to the outside of the building.
 24 This shows a typical piece of
 25 equipment that is used for lifting

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2 containers.

3 The draft EIS will evaluate the
4 following alternatives: Rehabilitate
5 the existing MTS to barge waste to an
6 out-of-city unloading facility.

7 Just to give everyone a rough
8 timeframe when the public will be able
9 to review and be involved with this
10 process, the public scoping meeting
11 that we're holding tonight is actually
12 the sixth of ten public scoping
13 meetings that will run through July
14 1st, the end of next week. We are
15 asking for comments on the scoping
16 document by July 9th if they're mailed
17 to us or you can submit it by fax up to
18 July 11th.

19 We expect to issue a final
20 scoping document on July 14th. The
21 draft EIS is expected to be issued on
22 August 6th and since the state has to
23 be involved in the permitting process,
24 we anticipate that the state will hold
25 the Part 360 permit hearings some time

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2 there's so many questions that your
3 presentation was not complete.

4 We try in this community to
5 cooperate and that's the problem here,
6 when we cooperate, unfortunately we
7 don't get cooperation with other
8 people.

9 If there's eight stations that
10 you plan on building; now, from the
11 records and it was very vague in your
12 report, there's a lot of paper in those
13 books, but I -- what I got out of it
14 was, the ten community boards are going
15 to return about 400 truck trips per
16 day, 400 Sanitation trucks, that's on
17 one load. On a good day they can do
18 three or four loads. That's 1200
19 trucks per day from ten community
20 boards to here. That's a problem, but
21 if everyone cooperates, I guess that's
22 what we got to do.

23 The problem is the sites you
24 picked, the eight sites. Of the eight
25 sites, they're not going to happen,

1

2 between September 8th through the 28th
3 and then the City Council will hold
4 hearings on the solid waste management
5 plan some time in September.

6 The comments on the draft EIS
7 will be received between August 6th and
8 October 8th. We expect to publish a
9 final EIS on December 9th.

10 We've established a toll-free
11 hot line for people who want more
12 information, or who want to call to
13 provide comments by phone and that
14 number is 888-NYC-SWMP.

15 We've also made available
16 documents for review at various public
17 repositories. There are two such
18 repositories in this area. And I will
19 now turn it over to people who wanted
20 to make comments.

21 The first speaker is Edward
22 Wade.

23 **MR. EDWARD WADE:** Thank you.
24 Thank you, Mr. Szarpanski, I read your
25 -- I read -- I read your books, but

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2 we're going to get, we guarantee we're
3 going to get West 59th Street
4 Manhattan.

5 Governor Pataki said that's
6 going to be a park. He went on
7 television and he's putting a park in
8 that area, going to build a stadium
9 there, going to put a 600 million
10 dollar -- you think they're going to
11 put a garbage dump there?

12 West 91 Street. I'm sorry,
13 East 91st Street, right up the block
14 from Gracie Mansion. You think they're
15 going to put a garbage dump right next
16 to Bloomberg's home? That's never
17 going to happen.

18 West 135th Street, that's right
19 by Clemente Park, right where Donald
20 Trump is trying to build new buildings.
21 That's not going to happen either, just
22 like the generators, we're gonna get
23 it.

24 Greenpoint's already fighting
25 this, that's the other site. South

1
 2 West Brooklyn down by Bay Parkway, the
 3 Senator here who is a friend of
 4 Bloomberg and Pataki said that's not
 5 going to happen. So that leaves us
 6 with one in Queens, which if they
 7 dredge, they can do it. So it looks
 8 like us and the South Bronx are the two
 9 left.

10 But what really bothers me is
 11 your math, what I have here, left out
 12 Staten Island. Now, Staten Island
 13 makes garbage, there's a -- every man,
 14 women and child in this country
 15 generates nearly a ton of garbage a
 16 year.

17 So, I guess we don't know where
 18 their garbage is going, but I can guess
 19 it's coming over the Verrazano Bridge.
 20 So there's no marine transfer stations
 21 in Staten Island.

22 So the problem I have is, that
 23 you have one thing you put in here, one
 24 big map, primary wasteshed; the primary
 25 wasteshed for us is ten community

1
 2 boards, and in that map, we are the
 3 secondary wasteshed? The secondary
 4 wasteshed for Hamilton Avenue is the
 5 entire city. We can get garbage from
 6 the entire city and this doesn't
 7 include commercial garbage, because
 8 they're going to run sanitation trucks
 9 from eight a.m. to eight p.m. in this,
 10 but eight p.m. to eight a.m., are the
 11 commercial trucks. And in that map on
 12 the truck routes they left out, that's
 13 an incomplete map. The trucks that go
 14 through Windsor Terrace and Sunset Park
 15 streets which they put up, they put
 16 them in there, they didn't include in
 17 that map, they're going to come down on
 18 residential streets.

19 So be aware you're going to get
 20 1200 trips during the day. I don't
 21 know how many commercial trucks at
 22 night. And I guess we got to do it,
 23 but if we're going to be one of two for
 24 millions and millions of tons of
 25 garbage, then I don't think it's right,

1
 2 this whole thing is based on eight
 3 drops and I can't see five of these
 4 ever happening because the Hudson River
 5 is going to parkland, that was
 6 guaranteed by Economic Development, the
 7 state and the Federal Government.
 8 They're not going to build them on the
 9 west and certainly not the Upper East
 10 Side. So it boils down to us, the
 11 Bronx and maybe Greenpoint. So I'm
 12 very upset that is going to happen this
 13 way; I'll share whatever we have, but I
 14 don't think we should bear a burden for
 15 the whole City.

16 **MR. SZARPANSKI:** Thank you for
 17 your comments. Our next speaker,
 18 Italia Guerren.

19 **MS. ITALIA GUERREN:** Hi, how
 20 are you? Good evening, I have very
 21 brief comment from the Borough
 22 President's office, that it was brought
 23 to our attention that the notices for
 24 the public scoping meetings were in
 25 English only, and correct me if I'm

1
 2 wrong, I don't know, I didn't see them
 3 myself, but if you really want the
 4 comment from the community they should
 5 have been in Spanish and perhaps
 6 Chinese as well.

7 Now, I did see outside that you
 8 have the fact sheets in both English
 9 and Spanish and you have a translating
 10 service, which is great, but if the
 11 notice isn't in Spanish, then you
 12 really can't get the whole community.
 13 That's it, thank you.

14 **MR. SZARPANSKI:** Just a point
 15 for clarification, we did put notices
 16 out in papers in English, Spanish and
 17 is it Korean also? I think it was
 18 Korean also.

19 **MS. ITALIA GUERREN:** I'm just
 20 responding to the comment we received
 21 at the office though.

22 **MR. SZARPANSKI:** Okay, thank
 23 you.

24 **MS. ITALIA GUERREN:** You're
 25 welcome.

1
 2 **MR. SZARPANSKI:** Our next
 3 speaker is Nicole Tai.
 4 **MS. NICOLE TAI:** Good evening,
 5 I am the chair of, co-chair of the
 6 Sanitation Committee here at Community
 7 Board Seven, but we don't have any
 8 comments specifically tonight so I'm
 9 just going to kind of take it
 10 individually so that maybe your -- my
 11 questions can be answered on some of
 12 the documents you're going to be
 13 generating. But I already anticipate
 14 some of the questions that we're going
 15 to be asking ourselves and that we're
 16 going to have people asking us.
 17 So, one of the things we're
 18 really concerned about is solid numbers
 19 and making it clear to the public what
 20 those numbers are and the number of
 21 truck trips a day from DSNY and the
 22 number of commercial trucks a day. And
 23 how much tonnage they're going to be
 24 generating because we asked a number of
 25 people in our neighborhood that would

1
 2 like to know, you know, how efficient
 3 the trucks are going to be. So, we
 4 like, if you can get the tonnage
 5 numbers to us, that would be great too.
 6 Let's see, we're concerned also
 7 that commercial traffic may not be
 8 using this station 'cause we like to
 9 see some consolidation of the various
 10 transfer stations that we do have here
 11 into the MTS. So if you can address
 12 those and anything I ask, that would be
 13 great.
 14 Also, we like to see some
 15 alternatives to disposal presented; you
 16 said something about including some
 17 recycling alternatives and loosening
 18 the recycling infrastructure, if you
 19 can get more detailed and specific as
 20 to what you mean by that and what that
 21 entails, if that entails reading or
 22 education; if there's going to be more
 23 industrial parks generating products
 24 out of recycled material and reused
 25 materials, that would be really

1
 2 interesting to know.
 3 So I think that's about it.
 4 We'll probably have some written
 5 comments for you after our meeting in
 6 July. So, thank you very much for
 7 coming down.
 8 **MR. SZARPANSKI:** Thank you for
 9 your comments. Our next speaker is
 10 Fred and I...
 11 **MR. FRED XUEREB:** Fred Xuereb,
 12 Community Board Seven.
 13 **MR. SZARPANSKI:** Xuereb, thank
 14 you.
 15 **MR. FRED XUEREB:** Thank you.
 16 I'm not representing the board, but I'm
 17 a board member.
 18 What I wanted to know was,
 19 Great Kills, Staten Island, I
 20 understand it's closed, yet from the
 21 Space Shuttle, they can see it, that's
 22 how huge it is.
 23 You mean to tell me with all
 24 that huge property that can be seen
 25 from outer space, they can't put a

1
 2 facility in Staten Island? And think
 3 about it, all right.
 4 **THE AUDIENCE:** Harry, why don't
 5 you tell him.
 6 **MR. FRED XUEREB:** Is there a
 7 particular reason?
 8 **MR. SZARPANSKI:** All right, I'm
 9 sorry, I should have mentioned as part
 10 of my opening remarks, that there is a
 11 facility that's already under
 12 construction in Staten Island, handles
 13 Staten Island waste; construction's
 14 expected to be completed in October of
 15 this year and it will handle Staten
 16 Island waste. Initially it will truck
 17 waste out of Staten Island, but there's
 18 a rail extension being built so that
 19 waste can be railed out of that
 20 borough.
 21 **MR. FRED XUEREB:** Because you
 22 didn't have it on the map.
 23 **MR. SZARPANSKI:** I apologize,
 24 we are really focusing here on the
 25 marine transfer station conversion

1
2 program, but I should of mentioned the
3 entire City's waste.

4 MR. FRED XUEREB: So they're
5 not going to have a marine transfer --
6 transfer station there at all?

7 MR. SZARPANSKI: They have a
8 land-based transfer station.

9 MR. FRED XUEREB: Okay,
10 land-based, all-righty.

11 What Ed Wade had mentioned
12 about 59th Street, you're really going
13 to put one there? 59th, Manhattan,
14 West Side; is that one of them?

15 MR. SZARPANSKI: Let me just
16 clarify, the point of this session is
17 for you to make comments and ask for --

18 MR. FRED XUEREB: All right, I
19 just wanted to know --

20 MR. SZARPANSKI: --
21 clarification.

22 MR. FRED XUEREB: -- if it
23 would be on West 59th.

24 MR. SZARPANSKI: Just so you
25 know, and as I said in my presentation,

1
2 you did, okay.

3 MR. EDWARD WADE: What about 7?

4 MR. SZARPANSKI: It's not part
5 of this wasteshed.

6 MR. EDWARD WADE: That's
7 districts 6 through 11.

8 MR. SZARPANSKI: 6, I'm sorry,
9 6 through 11 we said.

10 MR. FRED XUEREB: And what
11 happens if the shipping companies go
12 out on strike, is there anything
13 contingent, anything to do with that?
14 Suppose the fellows that run the ships
15 decide to go on strike, what happens to
16 all the collection? Do you have
17 containers --

18 MR. SZARPANSKI: We'll address
19 that in our response to your questions.

20 MR. FRED XUEREB: Okay, that's
21 it. Thank you very much.

22 MR. SZARPANSKI: Thank you.
23 Our next speaker, Nancy Walby.

24 MS. NANCY WALBY: Feel like I'm
25 back.

1
2 West 59th Street is one of the eight
3 marine transfer stations that's
4 proposed to be converted to
5 containerization, that's correct.

6 MR. FRED XUEREB: All right,
7 now, I count seven communities, 2, 6,
8 8, 10, 14, 16 and 18 and someone had
9 mentioned is 10 going to be at that
10 station to be used?

11 MR. EDWARD WADE: Community
12 board?

13 MR. FRED XUEREB: That's what I
14 count here on the blue page.

15 MR. SZARPANSKI: I'll repeat
16 what I said before, districts 2, 6
17 though 11.

18 MR. XUEREB: Oh, 6, 3 and 11.

19 MR. SZARPANSKI: 6 through; 6,
20 7, 8, 9, 10, 11.

21 MR. FRED XUEREB: Oh, I see, I
22 see what you got.

23 MR. SZARPANSKI: 14 and then
24 16, 17 and 18.

25 MR. FRED XUEREB: I see what

1
2 Good evening, my name is Nancy
3 Walby, I'm speaking for myself this
4 evening and I'm usually representative
5 of the Brooklyn Solid Waste Advisory
6 Board and we will be submitting written
7 comments at a later time. But I do
8 have some questions regarding
9 specifically some things that I saw in
10 the draft scope -- scoping document for
11 Hamilton Avenue.

12 Let me start by saying
13 something more general, most of the
14 issues that affect Brooklyn communities
15 can be put into one of three categories
16 that we, the SWMP has followed; one is
17 the negative impacts due to truck
18 traffic; another is negative impacts in
19 the environment from improper or poor
20 siting in operation of transfer
21 stations; and a third is negative
22 impacts due to inadequate or lack of
23 enforcement of the regulations.

24 Now keeping this in mind, I
25 have some questions about the

1
2 information and section of the draft
3 scoping document that deals with the
4 traffic and transportation.

5 Some parts of that section
6 concerned me and I'll summarize those
7 parts briefly; one, I think it's on --
8 well, on page 69 of my copy, it's says,
9 and I summarize here, "A detailed
10 traffic analysis may not be done at the
11 proposed action and this case the
12 Hamilton Avenue converted MTS is
13 projected to generate 50 or fewer peak
14 hour vehicular trip ends." And then
15 several pages later it's -- it appears
16 from the table 2.2-4 that 27 collection
17 vehicle trip ends are projected for the
18 Hamilton Avenue converted MTS during
19 the projected peak hour which is
20 assumed to be nine to ten a.m.

21 And then several pages later on
22 page 74 it says no weekend, and I put
23 this in, "traffic" I assume it's a
24 traffic analysis, will be conducted
25 because one, the facilities would not

1
2 shoppers; there's the Lowe's and
3 Pathmark and it's attracting a lot more
4 traffic than Hamilton Avenue.
5 So even though you don't
6 project 27, only 27 vehicles according,
7 I think that it really warrants a
8 traffic study 'cause there's going to
9 be a large increase in traffic for
10 other, due the other facilities.

11 I also believe that it would be
12 a mistake not to do a weekend analysis
13 just for, again for that very reason,
14 specifically on Saturday, because
15 Saturday background traffic is not very
16 likely to be lower than on weekday
17 traffic.

18 I have traveled, I don't live
19 in the area, but I work in the area and
20 I have traveled down here on Saturday
21 and there's the entrance to the bridge
22 and again, the increase in the traffic
23 that the neighborhood seems to trying
24 to generate, you know, commercial
25 business is going to, I think have a

1
2 operate on Sundays and of course that
3 makes sense, but two, the Saturday
4 background traffic and converted MTS
5 traffic are lower than the weekday
6 traffic.

7 That may or may not be true. I
8 have some questions regarding those,
9 what I just said.

10 One, does this mean then that
11 no traffic analysis will be done for
12 the Hamilton Avenue converted MTS?

13 Two, how were the projected
14 collection vehicle trip ends determined
15 and how accurate does the Department of
16 Sanitation believe those projections to
17 be?

18 Three, I think it would be a
19 mistake not to do a traffic analysis
20 for the Hamilton Avenue MTS because any
21 increase in truck traffic in this area
22 will have some impact, especially due
23 to the plans that I understand that are
24 going on to the building of Ikea,
25 making this area more attractive to

1
2 great impact.

3 As I stated before, the
4 Brooklyn SWAB will be submitting more
5 detailed comments in the future but I
6 just wanted to ask those questions
7 specifically about traffic. Thank you
8 very much.

9 **MR. SZARPANSKI:** Thank you. Is
10 there anybody else who signed up and
11 wants to speak?

12 **MR. JEREMY LAUFER:** Where do I
13 sign?

14 **MR. SZARPANSKI:** We'll wait for
15 you.

16 **MR. JEREMY LAUFER:** Okay, I'll
17 be back.

18 **MR. SZARPANSKI:** Our next
19 speaker is Jeremy Laufer.

20 **MR. JEREMY LAUFER:** Good
21 evening, I am the district manager for
22 Community Board Seven, but the
23 community board is not taking a
24 position on this issue as of yet, so I
25 am not representing the community board

1
2 tonight.
3 I used to work in this
4 community in a different capacity and
5 in that capacity, I did a great deal of
6 research on sanitation when the former
7 Mayor had proposed a plan that was not
8 similar to this and relied heavily on
9 trucking and I think this could be
10 beneficial to the community, but what
11 we haven't talked about and what I
12 think would make it beneficial to the
13 community is the commercial waste
14 stream.

15 If we could recapture the
16 commercial waste stream and bring it
17 back into the MTSS as was done prior to
18 1986 when it was -- when the law was
19 changed to allow for the commercial
20 waste facilities in order to reduce the
21 burden on Freshkills, we need to bring
22 that back into the MTSS in order to
23 close some of these facilities that are
24 around mainly Brooklyn, actually 'cause
25 I believe 50 percent of the commercial

1
2 all of the residential trash back into
3 the MTSS, but we allow the commercial
4 stations to continue, they're going to
5 maximize their profits and bring more
6 trash into the community in order to
7 reach their current capacity. So thank
8 you.

9 MR. SZARPANSKI: Thank you for
10 your comments. Nancy Zambello?

11 MS. NANCY ZAMBELLO: Yes, I
12 live on 19th Street between 4th and 5th
13 Avenue and I'm representing the 19th
14 Street Block Association, residents.

15 We just want -- our concern is
16 because as it is now, the Department of
17 Sanitation has their garages down, not
18 very close by where you're going to be
19 putting some facility and we do have
20 problems with dealing with garbage
21 trucks from different districts, not
22 even our own district coming up our
23 block right now.

24 And I'm just wondering how much
25 more are we going to be getting in

1
2 trash comes to Brooklyn.
3 We will be able to alleviate
4 some of the burdens on our community
5 such as what's taking place on 50th
6 Street in Sunset Park where we have a
7 commercial transfer station which is
8 only one block away from residents
9 which has trucks that go down
10 residential streets, which has queuing
11 right next to residential buildings.

12 If we can recapture the
13 commercial waste, I think that would be
14 beneficial to the community as a whole.
15 And that's not something that I've
16 heard tonight, I think it's something
17 that needs to be said and I think needs
18 to be brought out before the public
19 'cause we can't decide whether or not
20 this is going to be beneficial unless
21 we know that it is going to be
22 recaptured, otherwise we run the risk
23 of bringing additional garbage into
24 this community, assuming that all of
25 these facilities get built, if we bring

1
2 traffic into our streets with this
3 oncoming; we already have a problem now
4 with the Department of Sanitation with
5 their trucks. So, our concern is you
6 know, is this going to impact more into
7 our area which we already have now.

8 MR. SZARPANSKI: Thank you. Is
9 there anybody else who wants to speak?
10 If not, I encourage you if you think of
11 any other comments you want to make,
12 just write to us or just fax the
13 information to us and we'll address the
14 comments.

15 I see there's one more speaker
16 signing up.

17 (Pause in the proceedings.)

18 MR. SZARPANSKI: Marian Palm.
19 Just in time, come right in.

20 MS. MARIAN PALM: High, I'm
21 here representing St. Jacobi Lutheran
22 Church, Trinity Lutheran Church and the
23 Sunset Home Association, the League of
24 Cooperatives around Sunset Park and
25 they wanted me to reflect on the fact

1
 2 that this meeting was held on this day
 3 when many people are already away from
 4 town, that it was hard for them to get
 5 here; it was difficult to get the
 6 materials from the library; that
 7 materials to read about the
 8 environmental impact statement were
 9 only available during one evening for a
 10 couple hours and it's thicker than
 11 President Clinton's biography,
 12 autobiography to read.

13 So and another concern they had
 14 was that the notice of the meeting and
 15 the materials for the meetings, they
 16 would of liked to have in Spanish and
 17 in Chinese and English because they
 18 wanted to be part of the process.

19 For myself, my own personal
 20 concern as a parent of two sons with
 21 asthma, and who was granted, and I
 22 didn't follow up on it, a filter to use
 23 after 9/11 because the cloud passed
 24 over here, my personal concern is about
 25 the air quality that will be, and also

1
 2 how this is going to effect the trucks
 3 and the traffic on the Gowanus and the
 4 new high school site which, I don't
 5 really understand from looking at the
 6 impact statement, how -- where the
 7 school's located and how this is all
 8 going to fit together.

9 So those were concerns. I only
 10 bring them forward to you this way, I
 11 don't have a feeling about it one way
 12 or the other, I'm just like the
 13 advocate or the person in the community
 14 who's, I'm multilingual too -- who can
 15 bring forward the questions that the
 16 people ask me to bring, okay.

 3 people that aren't here or at least

 6 bring this information to, okay. Thank

 10 speak? Nobody else out there?

11 Thank you all for coming. And
 12 as I said, I encourage you to write in
 13 if you think of any other comments you
 14 want to make and I'll be around after
 15 this formal part of the meeting ends
 16 and we can chat. Thank you all.
