PROCLAMATION.

MAYOR'S OFFICE.

By virtue of the authority vested in me by the following ordinance passed by the Common Council on the 27th day of May, 1874, I, Wm. F. HAVEMEYER, Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby give notice, that the said ordinance will be enforced on and after Thursday, the 11th day of June, 1874.

The Pound is located in West Thirty-seventh street, between the Tenth and the Eleventh avenues, and will be open between the hours of 8 a. m. and 5 p. m., every day except Sundays.

AN ORDINANCE to provide for the killing of Dogs in the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Hereafter it shall not be lawful to permit any dog to go abroad loose, or at large, in any of the streets, lanes, alleys, where not enclosed, highways, parks, piers or public places within the corporate limits of the City of New York, unless the head of every such dog shall be encased in a wire muzzle sufficiently large to cover the head entirely, but so constructed as to admit of the dog opening its mouth to the fullest extent, and in no case to permit the nose of the dog to protrude; the muzzle to be securely fastened around the throat and behind the ears of every such dog, under a penalty of three dollars for each offence, to be recovered against the owner, possessor, or person who harbored such dog within three days previous to the time of such dog being so found going abroad loose or at large.

SECTION 2. The Mayor of the City of New York is hereby authorized and empowered to take such measures as he may deem most efficient to carry into effect the provisions of section 1 of this ordinance; and for that purpose is further authorized and empowered to appoint persons, or direct any person now attached to his office, to capture all such dogs found running abroad, loose or at large, paying for every such dog so captured and delivered at a place to be provided and designated by the Mayor, the sum of fifty cents, and a like sum shall be paid at the place so designated to any person, whether appointed by the Mayor or not, for the capture and delivery of any and every such dog. Such dogs, when so captured and delivered as aforesaid, if not claimed by the owner thereof, or any other person, within a period of forty-eight hours thereafter, shall, within six hours after the expiration of the time, be killed and destroyed in such manner as may be determined upon by the Mayor. Any owner or other person who may claim such dog shall, before being placed in possession thereof, pay therefor the sum of three dollars.

SECTION 3. The person authorized to pay for the capture of such dogs shall render, under oath, semi-monthly, a statement of all dogs so captured and killed, and the amount paid therefor, to the Mayor of the city, who shall thereupon certify the same to the Comptroller, when a warrant for the amount shall be drawn in favor of the said Mayor for the sum thus expended, which shall be paid, until otherwise ordered, from the appropriation for "City Contingencies."

SEC. 4. All money paid for fines for violation of section 1 of this ordinance, and for redemption of dogs as provided in section 2, shall be retained by the Mayor and applied to the payment of the expenses of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance, but a statement showing the aggregate amount thus received shall be submitted quarterly to the Comptroller of the City of New York.

SEC. 5. The provisions of this ordinance shall apply only to dogs owned or claimed by residents of this city, and any person who shall present any such dog and claim payment for the capture thereof which shall not be owned or captured within the corporate limits of this city, shall thereby incur a penalty of ten dollars. This ordinance shall apply only to any such dogs of the age of six months and upwards.

SEC. 6. Chapter XLIV. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, and all other ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SEC. 7. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

REVISED ESTIMATE FOR 1874.

Whereas, Chap 303 of the Laws of 1874, entitled "An act in relation to the estimates and apportionment for the support of the government of the County of New York," provides as follows, to wit:

SECTION 1. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, constituted by section one of chapter seven hundred and seventy-nine, of the Laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-three, is hereby authorized, by a concurrent vote of all the members thereof, at any time before the first day of July, eighteen hundred and seventy-four, to reconsider, revise, and redetermine the estimate heretofore made under the provisions of said act for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-four, and the estimate so reconsidered, revised, and redetermined and approved by the concurrent vote of all said members shall thereby be appropriated as the amount of money required to defray all the various expenses necessary for conducting the county government, and for supporting inmates of asylums, reformatory and charitable institutions chargeable by existing provisions of law upon the County of New York, and for defraying all legal charges against the County of New York under special laws, and also for paying the interest on the county debt and the principal of such debt falling due in the year eighteen hundred and seventy-four, and the proportion of the State tax for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-four, payable by said county, and thereupon to fix and determine the amount of such estimates and various expenses and charges, after deducting the estimated amount of county revenue not otherwise appropriated by law, which amount, when so fixed and determined, shall be certified to the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York by the Comptroller; and said Board of Supervisors are hereby empowered and directed to cause the amount so certified to be levied and collected in the year eighteen hundred and seventy-four, by tax upon the estates within the County of New York, subject to taxation. But the aggregate amount of the estimate for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-four, to be made by the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, shall not exceed the amount of the estimate heretofore made by the said Board as aforesaid. In the estimate so to be made no sum shall be included except the same be appropriated for a specified department or purpose, and no sum shall be appropriated for special contingencies.

And Whereas, Chapter 308 of the Laws of 1874, entitled "An act in relation to the estimates and apportionment for the support of the government of the City of New York," provides as follows, to wit:

SECTION 1. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, constituted by section one hundred and twelve of chapter three hundred and thirty-five of the Laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-three, is hereby authorized, at any time before the first day of July, eighteen hundred and seventy-four, by the concurrent vote of all the members of said Board, to reconsider, revise, and redetermine for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-four, heretofore made under the provisions of said act, and of section twenty of chapter seven hundred and fifty-seven of the Laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-three, and the amount of the estimate so reconsidered, revised and redetermined and approved by the concurrent vote of all the members of said Board, shall thereby become appropriated as the amount of money required to defray the expenses of conducting the public business of the City of New York, and of the various departments, boards and commissions thereof, whether administrative, executive, or judicial, and for paying the interest on the city debt and the principal of such debt falling due in and for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-four, and for all liabilities of the City of New York, by reason of the annexation thereto of territory lately a part of Westchester County, and for the expenses of conducting the public business of said annexed territory for and during said year, and the liabilities incurred by the Board of Education of said territory during the year eighteen hundred and seventy-three, which are hereby made an obligation of the City of New York; and the aggregate amount of said estimate, after deducting the estimated amount of the revenues of the general fund of the City of New York, not otherwise specifically appropriated by law, including surplus revenues of the sinking fund for the payment of interest on the city debt, shall be established and be the amount to be raised for all such purposes, by tax, within the City and County of New York, for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-four, and the amount thus established shall be certified to the Board of Supervisors by the Comptroller; and the said Board of Supervisors are hereby empowered and directed to cause the amount so certified to be raised and collected in the year eighteen hundred and seventy-four, by tax upon the estates by law, subject to taxation within the City and County of New York. But the aggregate amount of the estimates for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-four, to be made by the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, shall not exceed the amount of the estimate heretofore made by the said Board as aforesaid. In the estimate, so to be made, no sum shall be included except the same be appropriated for a specified department or purpose, and no sum shall be appropriated for special contingencies.

And whereas, Chapter 304 of the Laws of 1874, entitled "An act to consolidate the government of the City and County of New York, and further to regulate the same," provides as follows, to wit:

SECTION 1. The County of New York and the corporation known by the name of "The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York," shall be one body corporate and politic by the said name, and all the rights, property, interests, claims and demands of the County of New York and of the Supervisors or Board of Supervisors of the said County of New York, are hereby vested in and shall henceforth belong to the said corporation; but nothing contained in this act shall abrogate or impair or in anywise affect any existing right or interest, except to vest it in the said corporation.

SECTION 2. For all purposes the local administration and government of the City and County of New York shall be in and be performed by the one corporation aforesaid. All charges and liabilities now existing against said county or which may hereafter arise or accrue in said City and County of New York, and which but for this act would be charges against all liabilities of said county, shall be henceforth deemed and taken to be charges against or liabilities of the said corporation, and shall be defrayed and answered unto by it. All bonds, stocks, contracts and obligations of the said county and of the said Board of Supervisors, now existing, shall henceforth be deemed such of and against said corporation; and all such that are or may be authorized or required to be hereafter issued or entered into shall be issued or entered into by and in the name of the said corporation.

Therefore, resolved, That in pursuance of the authority contained in the foregoing and other provisions of law, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, now duly convened this 29th day of June, 1874, all the members thereof being present, does hereby, by the concurrent vote of all the members of said board, reconsider the estimates for the year 1874, heretofore made, and in said two first-mentioned acts referred to, for the support of the government of the City and County of New York, and does hereby, by the concurrent vote of all the members of said Board, revise and redetermine and approve the same, as so revised and redetermined, as follows:

AN ORDINANCE to amend an ordinance entitled "An ordinance for the better protection of strangers and the traveling public, and to license steamboat, steamship, and railroad runners," approved June 15, 1874.

SECTION I. The above-entitled ordinance is hereby amended, and shall read as follows:

AN ORDINANCE for the better protection of strangers and the traveling public, and to license steamboat runners.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, in Common Council convened, do ordain as follows:

SECTION I. The Mayor of the City of New York may, from time to time, grant licenses to such persons as he shall think proper to exercise and carry on the business of soliciting passengers for steamboats landing at any pier or wharf in this city, or carrying passengers to or from this city, and he may suspend or revoke any or all of such licenses at his pleasure.

SEC. 2. Every person receiving such license shall pay therefor to the Mayor, for the use of the city, the sum of twenty-five dollars, and every such license shall expire, unless sooner revoked, one year from the date thereof.

SEC. 3. Every such licensed person whenever employed in soliciting passengers for steamboats, shall wear conspicuously on his coat, a metal badge, containing the number of his license; and no person, except he be so licensed, shall wear such badge, or any badge purporting to be the

badge of such licensed person, under a penalty of ten dollars for every such offence. The Mayor of this city shall determine the form and material of said badge.

SEC. 4. No person, except he be licensed as aforesaid, shall exercise or carry on the business of soliciting passengers in any way whatever for steamboats landing at any pier or wharf in this city, or carrying passengers to or from this city, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for every such offence, to be recovered in the manner now provided by law for the recovery of penalties for violations of the ordinances of the Common Council.

SEC. 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

All persons licensed as aforesaid to keep public carts shall be deemed to be public cartmen within the meaning of this chapter; but it shall not be lawful for any person to receive or to hold a license to keep public carts, or to be a public cartman, unless he be a citizen of the United States, and a resident within the State of New York, and is the actual owner of the cart or carts, with good horses therefor, so licensed to be kept as public carts; and the Mayor may examine under oath all persons applying for or holding any such license, or the renewal thereof, touching their qualifications as aforesaid; and all licenses other than to persons so qualified shall be void.

Sec. 2. Section 3, of article 1, of the said ordinance, is hereby amended and shall read as follows:

§ 3. The Mayor shall require and receive for the use of the city from every person to whom he may grant license to keep public carts as aforesaid, for every four-wheel truck, to be drawn by two horses or other animals, five dollars; and for every four-wheel truck, to be drawn by one horse or other animal, three dollars; and for every two-wheel cart, to be drawn by one horse or other animal, two dollars; and half these sums respectively, for the license for each truck or cart renewed, as hereinafter provided. The Mayor shall also require and receive for the use of the city from every person licensed as aforesaid to be a public cartman, one dollar, and a like amount for every such license renewed.

Sec. 3. All ordinance or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE to amend an ordinance, entitled "An ordinance for the better protection of strangers and the traveling public, and to license steamboat runners," approved May 22, 1874.

SECTION 1. The above-entitled ordinance is hereby amended, and shall read as follows:

AN ORDINANCE for the better protection of strangers and the traveling public, and to license steamboat, steamship, and railroad runners.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, in Common Council convened, do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. The Mayor of the City of New York may from time to time grant licenses to such persons as he shall think proper to exercise and carry on the business of soliciting passengers for steamboats, steamships and railroads landing at any pier or wharf or railroad depot in this city, or carrying passengers to or from this city; and he may suspend or revoke any or all such licenses at his pleasure.

SEC. 2. Every person receiving such license shall pay therefor to the Mayor, for the use of the city, the sum of twenty-five dollars, and every such license shall expire, unless sooner revoked, one year from the date thereof.

SEC. 3. Every such licensed person, whenever employed in soliciting passengers for steamboats, steamships, or railroads, shall wear conspicuously on his coat a metal badge containing the number of his license, and no person, unless he be so licensed, shall wear such badge, or any badge purporting to be the badge of such licensed person, under a penalty of ten dollars for every such offence.

The Mayor of this city shall determine the form and material of said badge.

SEC. 4. No person, unless he be licensed as aforesaid, shall exercise or carry on the business of soliciting passengers in any way whatever for steamboats, steamships, or railroads landing at any pier, wharf, or railroad depot in this city, or carrying passengers to or from this city, under a penalty of twenty-five dollars for every such offence, to be recovered in the manner now provided by law for the recovery of penalties for violations of the ordinances of the Common Council.

SEC. 5. Any person licensed as steamboat runner, while such license remains in force, shall be considered as duly licensed to solicit passengers for steamships or railroads, and any person licensed to solicit passengers for steamships or railroads shall be considered as duly licensed to solicit passengers for steamboats.

SEC. 6. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 20, 1874:

The total number of inspections made by the inspectors were 2,084, as follows: 13 public buildings, 1,317 tenement houses, 299 private dwellings, 97 other dwellings, 9 manufactorys and workshops, 40 stores and warehouses, 147 stables, 5 markets, 24 slaughter-houses, 2 gut cleaning establishments, 3 manure dumps, 2 dumping grounds, 7 fat rendering establishments, 4 public sewers and drains, 3 uninhabitable dwellings, 73 sunken and vacant lots, 102 yards, courts, and areas, 75 cellars and basements, 98 waste-pipes and drains, 236 privies and water-closets, 67 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 14 dangerous stairways, 4 cisterns and cesspools, 26 other nuisances, together with 17 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The whole number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 1,133.

During the week ending June 20, 1874, 134 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 73 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 53 houses, 53 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Eight cases of small-pox were removed to the hospital, and one dead body to the Ambulance Corps.

Permits have been granted consignees of 98 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of this Port.

Two hundred and forty permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy vaults.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported for the week ending June 20, 1874: Typhus fever 2, typhoid fever 2, scarlet fever 67, cerebro-spinal meningitis 3, measles 25, diphtheria 39, and small-pox 17.

The amount of meat and fish condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending June 20, 1874, was as follows: Cattle, 2 carcasses; calves, 3 carcasses; calves (case), 1 carcass; sheep, 2 carcasses; lambs, 2 carcasses; beef, 690 pounds; poultry, 80 pounds; and fish, 700 pounds.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK,
BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS,
June 23, 1874.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

In the week ending on Saturday, the 20th inst., there were 39 deaths in this city against 444 in the week that ended on the 13th, and against 474 deaths reported in the corresponding week last year. As last week was most signal the period of lowest mortality witnessed in this city in the month of June in any year since 1868, and the least in any week, indeed, since December, 1868, the facts relating to this remarkably low death-rate are well worth our notice:

1st. The fatality of scarlatina increased to the extent of destroying 44 lives (43 children), or 14 more than in the previous week. There was also a slight increase (of 3) of mortality from diarrhoeal diseases. By these causes only the total number of deaths by zymotic diseases (131) was increased over that of the previous week, yet this class of the causes of death gave a total mortality, less by 20, than their average in the second week of June for the past five years. So much for diseases that gave any increase over the previous week.

2d. Constitutional and chronic diseases of all kinds had a greatly diminished fatality. Phthisis, for example, caused only 46 deaths, against an average of 67 in the second and third weeks of June in the past five years; and the total deaths in public institutions amounted to only 69, against an average of 100 in the corresponding week in the five years past. In like manner the local and inflammatory diseases decreased; their total was 147 last week, against an average exceeding 170 in the corresponding days of the past five years. So of the developmental diseases, which are characterized by defects of organization and vitality; their deaths amounted to 27, against an average of 30 and upwards in the same week in past years.

3d. Infant life was unusually secure in the city; only 113 children under a year, and 191 under five years of age died; while the average of the same period, in five years past, was 30 greater in these ages. Old age, and all causes of deaths in persons over 70 years old, took off only two-thirds the usual number.

Alcoholism, violence, and pneumonia were charged with their full quota of deaths.

The condition of the atmosphere was eminently favorable to perfect health during the week. The mean temperature was at 67 degrees Fahrenheit, with a moderate range that barely reached 80 degrees. The average degree of atmospheric humidity was but little above the half-saturation point; the winds were mostly brisk, and moved a total distance of 1,288 miles in the seven days.

The city is and for three weeks past has been in a more cleanly condition than usual; the food supplies are excellent, and fruits abundant. Added to these conditions favorable to the public health, are the sanitary cleanings and improvements in

the common dwellings and tenement houses, which have been increased by the general sanitary inspection now in progress. Such a week's experience in all its relations has in it useful instruction.
