

Communication from the Board of Excise asking "a report upon the character of each place in the city where liquor or ale and beer are usually sold," was ordered on file, and the following letter ordered to be signed by the President, and forwarded to the Board of Excise:

Dear Sir—The resolution of the Board of Excise requesting from the Board of Police "a report upon the character of each place in the city where liquor or ale and beer are usually sold," is re-

ceived. Though disposed to render reasonable assistance to enable your Board to perform its duties with success, the Board of Police are not willing to undertake to respond to a request so indefinite and comprehensive as this. The service asked is in no respect police duty; and if performed would practically transfer from the Board of Excise to the Board of Police the discretion and responsibility which the law conferred and imposed upon the Board of Excise. Inasmuch as the records of the Excise Commission for years past must contain much, if not all the information which the Police could furnish, it does not seem proper to withdraw from police duty officers in each precinct to make a complete and exhaustive report upon every place in the city.

If, in the course of your business, special cases occur where the facts upon which to decide whether an application should be granted are not within your reach, by an application in writing to the Superintendent you will receive such information as he possesses or can obtain.

SALE OF FERRY FRANCHISE.

THE FRANCHISE TO RUN THE FERRY FROM James Slip, East river, to Hunter's Point, Long Island City, and a lease of the wharf property at said

ferry, will be sold at public auction to the highest bidder, at the office of the Comptroller of the City of New York, on Friday, April 19, 1878, at 12 o'clock, noon, for the period of five years from May 1, 1878.

Bidders must bid for the franchise and lease of wharf property of said ferry separately, but no bid will be received unless it includes an offer for both the ferry franchise and wharf property.

The form of the lease required to be executed by the highest bidder can be seen at the office of the Comptroller.

All bids will be regarded as made with reference to said form of lease, and in case the highest bidder shall neglect to execute a lease according to said form for ten days after said sale, bis bid will, at the option of the Comptroller and the Board of the Department of Docks, be rejected.
