

FOR FURNISHING AND DELIVERING 0,000 CUBIC YARDS SCREENED GRAVEL, OF THE QUALITY KNOWN AS ROA HOOK GRAVEL, WHERE REQUIRED ON THE CENTRAL PARK AND RIVERSIDE PARK AND AVENUE.

All the gravel to be furnished and delivered shall be of the kind generally known as Roa Hook Gravel, and equal in all respects to that taken from the gravel bank situate on the east side of the Hudson river, north of Peekskill and known as the Roa Hook Gravel Bank. It shall be of the best quality double-screened gravel, and clean and free from loam and dirt, and shall be com-posed of stones such as will pass through a screen with a one and one-half inch mesh, but not to contain more than ten per cent, and not less than five per cent, of material that will pass through a screen with a one-quarter inch mesh.


