The 771 deaths represent a death-rate of 21.69, against 22.94 for the previous week and 20.31 for the corresponding week of 1894.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a marked decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 227, 236, 63, 6 and 0, against 218, 277, 91, 4 and 0 for the previous week, a total of 532 against 590. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Ninth, Eighteenth and Twenty-third Wards, and the decrease in the Tenth and Twelfth Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Seventh, Ninth and Fourteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Tenth, Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Twenty-first Ward, and the decrease in the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards. Five of the 6 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and the remaining one was between Park Row and the East river. No case of small-pox was reported. reported. By order of the Board,
