The underground system consists of 130.53 miles of cable in subways, or 1,049.65 miles of conductor. During the quarter 5,750 feet of cable were laid, of which 5,190 feet were for alterations and repairs and 560 feet for extending the system.

10.12 miles of wire were put up, of which 7.92 miles were for alterations and repairs and 2.2 were for extending the system.

2.44 miles of wire were taken down, 24 poles set, 6 poles reset and 51 poles taken down.

4,570 feet of aerial cable were strung, of which 2,170 feet were for alterations and repairs and 2,400 feet for extending the system.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
