BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN, THE BRONX AND RICHMOND.

Personnel, etc.

On March 31, 1906, the active personnel of the Department in these boroughs numbered 2,514, the fire extinguishing force comprising 2,185 members, assigned (with the exception of 37 chief officers) to the companies of the 21 battalions. And the companies are classified as follows:

Of the above companies twelve are known as combination companies, each being equipped with an engine and hook and ladder truck. Twelve of the engines and five hook and ladder companies are known as double companies, equipped with two sets of apparatus, one of which remains in the quarters to cover the unprotected territory while the other is absent in response to an alarm for fire. One of the engine companies and three of the hook and ladder companies are equipped with water towers. One engine company and one hook and ladder company are each equipped with searchlight engines.

NOTABLE FIRES.

January 9, 1906, 6.59 p. m., Station 77.

Fire occurred at No. 26 Cherry street, a four-story brick building, 25 by 100 feet, occupied by paper dealers.

Fire originated on the first floor and extended to second, third and fourth floors and roof by elevator shaft and pipe recesses, considerably damaging building.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Gooderson, Chiefs of Battalion Terpeny and Worth and Acting Chiefs of Battalion Brogan and Sullivan.

The services of eight engine companies and three hook and ladder companies were required, and the duration of the fire was thirty minutes.

Cause unknown; of suspicious origin.

At 7.17 p. m. and 7.41 p. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

January 27, 1906, 12.06 p. m., Station 158.

Fire occurred at Nos. 643 and 645 Water street, No. 340 Front street, south side of Jackson and Gouverneur slip, a three-story brick building, 50 by 150 by 25, occupied by dealers in oils.

Fire originated on the first floor and extended to second and third floors and roof by open shafts and through flooring, considerably damaging same; also to No. 641 Water street, a three-story and basement brick, 25 by 40, occupied by James Halvey as a dwelling, by burning through roof; damage trifling.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Kruger, Chiefs of Battalion Hayes, Kenlon, Worth and Crawley, and Acting Chief of Battalion McDonald.

The services of eleven engine companies and four hook and ladder companies were required, and the duration of the fire was ten hours.

Cause unknown.

At 12.14 p. m. and 12.39 p. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

February 3, 1906, 4.02 p. m., Station 277.

Fire occurred at Nos. 186 to 194 Lewis street, east side, between Fifth and Sixth avenues, a four-story brick building, 125 by 50, occupied for business purposes.

Fire originated on the third floor and extended to fourth, second, first floors and roof by elevator shaft, considerably damaging same.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Acting Deputy Chief of Department Worth, Chiefs of Battalion Hayes, Shay, Gray and Kenlon, and Acting Chiefs of Battalion Brogan, Sullivan and Norton.

The services of thirteen engine companies and four hook and ladder companies were required; also Search Light Engine No. 1 and Water Tower No. 2 were required, and the duration of the fire was twelve hours.

Cause unknown.

At 4.10 and 4.14 p. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

February 4, 1906, 8.12 a. m., Station 4-288; 8.13 a. m., Station 167.

Fire occurred at Nos. 107 to 113 Grand street, a six-story brick building, 75 by 100, occupied by dealers in silk yarns, etc.

Fire originated on the third floor and extended throughout building by way of pipe recesses, stairway, windows, etc., considerably damaging building.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Kruger, Chiefs of Battalion Worth, Lucas, Terpeny, Hayes.

The services of nineteen engine companies, five hook and ladder companies and Water Towers Nos. 1 and 2 were required, and the duration of the fire was five hours.

Cause unknown.

At 8.23 a. m., 8.24 a. m., and 8.36 a. m., respectively, second, third and fourth alarms were sent out.

February 7, 1906, 8.38 p. m., Station 87.

Fire occurred at No. 70 Duane street, south side, between Broadway and Elm street, a five-story brick building, occupied for business purposes.

Fire originated in the cellar and confined to same, considerably damaging building.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Kruger, Chiefs of Battalion Kruger, Terpeny and Crawley and Acting Chief of Battalion Reilly.

The services of eight engine companies, four hook and ladder companies and Search Light Engine No. 1 were required and the duration of the fire was ten minutes. Cause unknown.

At 8.45 p. m., and 8.54 p. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

February 11, 1906, 7.39 a. m., Station 4-279; 7.40 a. m., Station 342.

Fire occurred at Nos. 836 and 838 Broadway, and Nos. 72 and 74 East Thirteenth street, a six-story brick and iron building, 50 by 100 feet, occupied by manufacturers of shirts, hats and clothing.

Fire originated on the second floor and extended to first, third, fourth, fifth and sixth floors and roof, by stairway, elevator shaft, pipe recesses and burning through floors, considerably damaging same.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Kruger, Chiefs of Battalion Shay, Worth, Ross and Howe.

The services of fourteen engine companies, five hook and ladder companies and Water Towers Nos. 2 and 3 were required, and the duration of the fire was twenty hours.

Cause unknown.

At 7.43 a. m. and 7.54 a. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

February 17, 1906, 9.59 p. m., Station 165.

Fire occurred at Nos. 5 and 7 York street, a six-story brick building, 60 by 100 feet, occupied by manufacturers of blank books.

Fire originated in cellar and extended to first, second and third floors by elevator and pipe recesses, considerably damaging building.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Kruger, Chiefs of Battalion Crawley, Terpeny, Worth and Acting Chief of Battalion Reilly.

The services of ten engine companies, four hook and ladder companies and Search Light Engine No. 1 were required and the duration of the fire was fifty minutes.

Cause unknown.

At 10.07 p. m., third alarm was sent out.

March 2, 1906, 2.43 a. m., Station 120.

Fire occurred at No. 354 Broadway, east side, between Leonard and Franklin streets, a five-story brick and iron building, 20 by 200 feet, occupied by Messrs. B. McCabe & Co., carpet dealers.

Fire originated in subcellar and extended to cellar, first, second, third, fourth and fifth floors and roof by stairway, elevator shafts and pipe recesses, considerably damaging same.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Kruger, Chiefs of Battalion Terpeny, Worth, Lucas and Duffy.

The services of fourteen engine companies, four hook and ladder companies, Search Light Engines Nos. 1 and 2, and Water Tower No. 1 were required, and the duration of the fire was five hours.

Cause unknown.

At 2.48 a. m. and 2.50 a. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

March 4, 1906, 7.44 p. m., Station 242.

Fire occurred at Nos. 653 and 665 West Forty-second street, a three-story brick building, 75 by 200 feet, occupied by the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, as car barns and offices.

Originated on the first floor and extended to second and third floors, by stairway, hoistway and burning through flooring, considerably damaging building; also extended to No. 651 West Forty-second street, a four-story brick building, 25 by 65 feet, occupied as a hotel, damage trifling; also extended to No. 630 West Forty-third street, a three-story frame building, 25 by 60 feet, occupied as stables, damage trifling.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Langford, Chiefs of Battalion Devanny, Ross, Kenlon, Kane and Shay and Acting Chief of Battalion Fox.

The services of twenty engine companies, five hook and ladder companies and Search Light Engine No. 2 were required, and the duration of the fire was two hours.

Cause, defective insulation of an electric car.

At 7.59 p. m., 8.03 p. m. and 8.49 p. m., respectively, second, third and fourth alarms were sent out.

March 10, 1906, 2.12 p. m., Station 536.

The fire occurred at Nos. 817 to 829 Eighth avenue, a three-story brick building, 175 by 200 feet, occupied as a garage, considerably damaging building.

Fire originated on third floor and confined to same.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Langford, Chiefs of Battalion Devanny, Graham and Kane and Acting Chief of Battalion McGuire.

The services of thirteen engine companies, four hook and ladder companies were required, and the duration of the fire was two hours.

Cause unknown.

At 2.15 o'clock p. m. and 2.28 o'clock p. m., second and third alarms were sent out.

March 13, 1906, 9.14 p. m., Station 266.

Fire occurred at Nos. 15, 17 and 19 East Fourth street, northwest corner of Lafayette street, a five story brick and iron building, 75 by 125 feet, occupied for business purposes.

Fire originated in the cellar and extended to first, second, third, fourth and fifth floors by stairways, pipe holes, elevator shaft, archways and windows, considerably damaging same; also extended to Nos. 11 and 13 East Fourth street, a five-story brick and iron building, 50 by 75 feet, occupied by manufacturers of overcoats, considerably damaging building.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Kruger, Chiefs of Battalion Worth, Shay, Lucas, Hayes and Acting Chief of Battalion Sullivan.

The services of nineteen engine companies, five hook and ladder companies, Search Light Engines Nos. 1 and 2 and Water Towers Nos. 1 and 2 were required, and the duration of the fire was seven hours.

Cause unknown.

At 9.26 p. m., 9.35 p. m. and 10.38 p. m. second, third and fourth alarms were sent out.

March 17, 1906, 10.39 p. m., Station 145.

Fire occurred at No. 58 Walker street, a five-story brick and stone building, 25 by 100 feet, occupied by dealers in underwear, etc.

Fire originated in the cellar and extended to first, second, third, fourth and fifth floors and roof by elevator shaft, stairways and pipe recesses, considerably damaging building.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Kruger, Chiefs of Battalion Terpeny, Lucas, Duffy and Acting Chief of Battalion Norton.

The services of fourteen engine companies, four hook and ladder companies, Search Light Engine No. 1 and Water Tower No. 1 were required, and the duration of the fire was one hour.

Cause unknown.

At 10.58 p. m. and 11.24 p. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

March 26, 1906, 12.29 p. m., Station 256.

Fire occurred at Nos. 35 to 43 Downing street, and Nos. 31 to 37 Bedford street, a seven-story and basement brick building, 85 by 95 feet, occupied as a factory.

Fire originated on third floor and extended to basement, first, second, fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh floors, considerably damaging same; also extended to No. 45 Downing street, a four-story brick building, 15 by 35 feet, occupied as a dwelling, considerably damaging same; also extended to No. 47 Downing street, a four-story brick building, 15 by 35 feet, occupied as dwellings, considerably damaging same; also extended to Nos. 49 and 51 Downing street, a four-story brick building, 50 by 75 feet, occupied as a stable, considerably damaging building; also extended across street to Nos. 34 and 36 Downing street, a five-story brick building, 50 by 25 feet, occupied as store and dwelling, considerably damaging building; also extended to No. 38 Downing street, a five-story brick building, 25 by 50 feet, occupied as a liquor store and dwelling, considerably damaging same; also extended to No. 40 Downing street, a five-story brick, 25 by 50 feet, occupied as a dwelling, slightly damaging same; also extended to Nos. 28 and 30

Bedford street, a five-story brick building, 50 by 25 feet, occupied as dwelling, slightly damaging same; also extended to No. 60 Carmine street, a three-story brick and frame building, 25 by 50 feet, occupied as fruit store and dwelling; also extended to No. 62 Carmine street, a three-story brick and frame building, 18 by 25 feet, occupied as store and dwelling, considerably damaging building; also extended to No. 62½ Carmine street, a three-story brick and frame building, 18 by 35 feet, occupied as dwellings, considerably damaging same; also extended to 64 Carmine street, a three-story brick building, 18 by 35 feet, occupied as a restaurant and dwelling, considerably damaging building; also extended to No. 64½ Carmine street, a three-story brick and frame building, 18 by 25 feet, occupied as dwellings, considerably damaging same; also extended to No. 66 Carmine street, a four-story brick building, 25 by 50 feet, occupied as store and dwelling, considerably damaging same.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Kruger, Chiefs of Battalion Lucas, Ross, Worth, Terpeny, and Acting Chief of Battalion Skelly.

The services of eighteen engine companies, five hook and ladder companies, Search Light Engine No. 2, and Water Tower No. 2 were required, and the duration of the fire was one hour and thirty minutes.

Cause unknown.

At 12.36 p. m., 12.42 p. m. and 12.47 p. m., respectively, second, third and fourth alarms were sent out.

March 31, 1906, 7.34 p. m., Station 2-415.

Fire occurred at east side of Mott avenue, between One Hundred and Fifty-first and One Hundred and Fifty-third streets, occupied by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, a one-story brick building, 100 by 300 feet, as a round-house.

Fire originated on the first floor and extended to roof, considerably damaging building.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief Ahern, Chiefs of Battalion Gray, Sloan and McCartney and Larkin.

The services of six engine companies and five hook and ladder companies were required, and the duration of the fire was two hours.

Cause unknown.

At 7.49 o'clock p. m. and 7.49½ p. m., respectively, second and third alarms were sent out.

The underground system consists of 130.53 miles of cable in subways, or 1,049.65 miles of conductor. During the quarter 5,750 feet of cable were laid, of which 5,190 feet were for alterations and repairs and 560 feet for extending the system.

10.12 miles of wire were put up, of which 7.92 miles were for alterations and repairs and 2.2 were for extending the system.

2.44 miles of wire were taken down, 24 poles set, 6 poles reset and 51 poles taken down.

NOTABLE FIRES.

March 1, 2.23 a. m., Station 585.

Fire occurred at Nos. 36 and 38 Throop avenue, three-story frame building, 20 by 50 feet, occupied as boarding house. Fire originated on first floor and extended to second floor, considerably damaging building and contents; also extended to two-story frame building, 20 by 30 feet, in rear of No. 36 Throop avenue, occupied as boarding house, considerably damaging building and contents; also extended to three-story frame building, 20 by 45 feet, No. 38 Throop avenue, occupied as dwelling, slightly damaging building and contents; also extended to six-story brick building, 60 by 90 feet, Nos. 172 and 174 Lorimer street, occupied as factory, considerably damaging building and contents.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department in charge boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens Thomas Lally, Deputy Chief of Department Burns, Chiefs of Battalion Graham, Matschke and McCarthy, and Acting Chiefs of Battalion Braisted and McCarthy.

The services of twelve engine and four hook and ladder companies were required, and the fire was under control in about two hours.

At 2.33, 2.44 and 2.52 a. m., respectively, second, third and fourth alarms were sent out.

Request to eliminate Ten Broeck avenue, from the final maps of The City of New York on which said Department desires to build a vaccine laboratory.

And we, the said Commissioners, will be in attendance at our said office on the 24th day of July, 1906, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon of that day, to hear the said parties and persons in relation thereto; and at such time and place, and at such further or other time and place as we may appoint, we will hear such owners in relation thereto, and examine the proofs of such claimant or claimants, or such additional proofs and allegations as may then be offered by such owner or on behalf of The City of New York.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Council, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
