Three double patrol wagons in Manhattan and one double and three single patrol wagons in Brooklyn have no precinct assignment, but are used for emergency purposes, or as substitutes for wagons undergoing repairs.

New patrol wagons should be provided, and where necessary horses and equipments furnished for the Seventh, Tenth, Eleventh, Thirteenth, Fiftieth, Fifty-third, Sixty-fourth, Sixty-sixth, Sixty-eighth, Seventieth and Eighty-third Precincts, and the old wagons at the Fiftieth, Sixty-third, Sixty-fourth and Sixty-sixth Precincts should be overhauled and repaired and used as emergency wagons or as substitutes for wagons undergoing repairs.

During the year new patrol wagons were provided and assigned to the Thirty-first, Forty-fourth, Forty-seventh and Sixtieth Precincts. Patrol wagon service was also instituted at the Seventy-second Precinct, using one of the extra patrol wagons for that purpose.

Several precinct patrol wagons and other department vehicles, in Manhattan and The Bronx, were overhauled and repaired under contract and placed in good condition.

Besides the persons technically charged with violation of one or more of the various statutes relative to gambling of all kinds, the above figures also include, in some cases, the persons arrested in pool-rooms, gambling-houses, etc., when raided, and arraigned as "disorderly persons."

Among the gambling material seized were 341 packs of cards, 9,018 chips, also quantity of chips not counted and described as 2 bags and 1 box of chips; 112 dice, 5 roulette tables, 2 roulette wheels, 7 faro tables, 9 poker tables, 22 slot machines, 123 lottery tickets, 3 dealing-boxes, 3 sweat-boards, 5 crap cloths, and a large quantity of pool-room, gambling and policy material, policy slips, etc.

## SANITARY REPORT OF STATION-HOUSES.

*First Precinct.*

Lack of heating facilities.  
Drainage from cells and yard empties into subsoil. Connection should be made with sewage-pipe.

Good condition.

*Second Precinct.*

Old but in good condition.

*Third Precinct.**Fourth Precinct.*

This building was originally the private residence of Dr. Andrew Otterson. It was built about fifty years ago. It is a four-story and basement brick building about 60 feet long and 35 feet wide. Only the basement is used as a station-house, the upper floors being used by the administrative offices of the Brooklyn Bridge.

No reserves are kept in this house. There are no sleeping-rooms. There is a small room for the Captain, but none for the Sergeants. There are 53 lockers around the walls for 127 men. In some cases four men occupy one locker. The lockers are small and badly ventilated.

The toilet-rooms are in the rear and there are five closets and three urinals, all in good condition, having been renovated and new ones supplied within the past year.

The quarters are inadequate. There is more sickness, time lost and visits in this precinct than in all the other four combined, and the crowded condition, lack of suitable means of drying clothing, lack of ventilation and general unhygienic condition of this house is probably responsible in a great measure for those facts.

*Fifth Precinct.*

In good condition.

*Sixth Precinct.*

Sanitary condition of Sixth Precinct Station, fair.

The lower cells of prison are below level of the street and should not be used for confinement of prisoners. The top floor of the prison (lodging-room) might be arranged for use as prison instead.

*Seventh Precinct.*

In fair condition.

*Eighth Precinct.*

Is in fair condition with the exception of a cold wind which comes through the wall back of the Sergeant's desk.

*Ninth Precinct.*

In good condition.

*Tenth Precinct.*

In good condition.

*Eleventh Precinct.*

In good condition.

*Twelfth Precinct.*

In good condition.

*Thirteenth Precinct.*

Inadequate sleeping accommodation. Lack of paint and necessary repairs.

*Fourteenth Precinct.*

Precinct Station, fair. Dormitories are cold.

*Fifteenth Precinct.*

Precinct Station is bad. Dormitories are overcrowded. Prison is below the level of the street. Vent-pipes from taps open into soil-pipe instead of separate vent-pipes.

*Sixteenth Precinct.*

In good condition.

*Seventeenth Precinct.*

Antiquated, unsanitary, overcrowded and unfit for police habitation.

*Eighteenth Precinct.*

Windows sadly in need of repairing.

*Nineteenth Precinct.*

In fair condition.

*Twentieth Precinct.*

In fair condition.

*Twenty-first Precinct.*

Three water-closets for men's toilet out of order; otherwise sanitary condition is good.

*Twenty-second Precinct.*

The sanitary condition of the Twenty-second Precinct Station-house is bad. The house is a very old one and is practically beyond repair. The dormitories are crowded and poorly ventilated, those on the top floor particularly. Many cases of illness can be directly attributed to this.

*Twenty-third Precinct.*

In good condition, but not housed in a building controlled by Police Department.

*Twenty-fourth Precinct.*

Dormitories cold and uncomfortable; steam heaters placed in upper halls would remedy this condition. Stairs leading from first floor rear to cellar in dangerous condition and should be repaired at once; otherwise the condition of the station-house is good.

*Twenty-fifth Precinct.*

Sanitary condition of the station-house is good.

This is in the Eighth Surgical District, comprising the Twenty-fifth and Twenty-eighth Precincts and House of Detention.

*Twenty-sixth Precinct.*

The station-house of this precinct is modern and is in a fair sanitary condition.

*Twenty-seventh Precinct.*

Station-house is in a good sanitary condition.

*Twenty-eighth Precinct.*

Sanitary condition of the station-house is good.

This is the Eighth Surgical District, comprising the Twenty-fifth and Twenty-eighth Precincts and House of Detention.

*Twenty-ninth Precinct.*

Fair condition, except insufficient heat.

*Thirtieth Precinct.*

The Captain's quarters contain a bathroom with a bathtub and water-closet in good condition. The tank of the latter is an old pattern and should be replaced by a new syphon cistern. The Sergeant's quarters have a room containing a urinal and a water-closet in fair shape. The tank here, as in the Captain's quarters, is old-fashioned and should be replaced.

The men's quarters have no conveniences whatever above the cellar. There is no running water (hot or cold) above the first floor. There is not hot water at all in the house; no bathing facilities; no heat, except in the cellar and prisons and on the first floor. These places are heated by large stoves.

*Thirty-first Precinct.*

At this station-house is located the office of the Inspector of the Fifth District, which has a bathtub and water-closet in good condition.

*Thirty-first Precinct.*

The Captain and Sergeants have also a bath and water-closet in good condition. The men's quarters. The same condition that prevails in the Thirtieth Precinct prevails here. There is, however, this exception, that they have a shower bath in the cellar, and hot and cold water in the cellar and on the first floor. Above the cellar there are no conveniences.

*Thirty-second Precinct.*

Sleeping rooms extremely cold, sitting-rooms disgracefully unclean and plumbing poor.

*Thirty-third Precinct.*

In excellent condition. No cause for complaint on any ground.

*Thirty-fourth Precinct.*

Newly built houses. Complaint is made by occupants of the temperature of the porcelain-covered water-closet seats. Temporary wood covers would be of advantage during the winter months. General condition very good.

*Thirty-fifth Precinct.*

Sleeping accommodations inadequate; otherwise sanitary condition good.

*Thirty-sixth Precinct.*

Dormitories overcrowded, cold and draughty. Sergeant's rooms badly ventilated and directly over stables; sanitary condition very bad.

*Thirty-seventh Precinct.*

Newly-built house. Sanitary condition excellent, but the female prison is extremely cold.

*Thirty-eighth Precinct.*

Sanitary condition is good.

*Thirty-eighth Sub-station.*

Sanitary condition is good.

*Thirty-ninth Precinct.*

At this station-house the conditions beggar description. Men and officers to the number of fifty-eight are crowded into the loft of an old fire-house. The walls and ceilings of the dormitories are not plastered. The roof leaks incessantly in stormy weather. The water-closets are insufficient. The sewage flows into a cesspool under the building and in direct proximity to the room occupied jointly by the Sergeants and Roundsmen.

The house is entirely inadequate for the service and its general and sanitary conditions are a disgrace to the City.

*Fortieth Precinct.*

Newly-built houses. Complaint is made by occupants of the temperature of the porcelain-covered water-closet seats. Temporary wood covers would be of advantage during the winter months. General condition excellent.

*Forty-first Precinct.*

In good condition.

*Forty-second Precinct.*

In good order.

*Forty-third Precinct.*

In good order.

*Forty-fourth Precinct.*

The painted walls and ceilings are unclean and should be repainted. The floor drains in the prison are not properly trapped and allow offensive gases to vitiate the air. Proper bell traps should be put in these drains.

*Forty-fifth Precinct.*

In good order.

*Forty-sixth Precinct.*

Fairly good.

*Forty-seventh Precinct.*

In good order.

*Forty-eighth Precinct.*

In good order.

*Forty-ninth Precinct.*

The painted walls and ceilings of this house are unclean and should be repainted.

*Fiftieth Precinct.*

The painted walls and ceilings of this house are filthy, and repainting them is a necessity.

There is at times no flow of water on the upper floors of this house, and the water-closets are not flushed; and the offensive odor therefrom is a menace to the health of the men sleeping in the nearby rooms. I would recommend that a tank on the roof be provided to contain sufficient water so that a flow of water can be had at all times to properly flush the plumbing fixtures.



The hot water pipe is broken so that there is not hot water above the ground floor. I would recommend that this pipe be repaired at once.

The old tin bath is filthy and offensive and I would recommend that it be replaced by an enameled bath tub.

The tin roof over the prison leaks, and the glass in skylight over same is broken, causing dampness. Recommend that the roof be repaired so as not to leak and that all broken glass in skylight be replaced.

*Fifty-first Precinct.*

In good condition.

*Fifty-second Precinct.*

Kept clean, well ventilated and in good sanitary condition.

*Fifty-third Precinct.*

Kept clean, well ventilated and in good sanitary condition.

*Fifty-fourth Precinct.*

Is a comparatively new house with stable attached; it is in excellent sanitary condition, and is habitually so maintained.

*Fifty-fifth Precinct.*

Kept clean, well ventilated and in good sanitary condition.

*Fifty-sixth Precinct.*

This is also a new house in excellent condition and is habitually in good condition. Women prisoners are sent to the Fifty-fifth Precinct station-house. There is a stable at this house also.

*Fifty-seventh Precinct.*

This is a three-story basement and station-house, built in 1890. It is in low-lying ground and is in deplorable sanitary condition. Women prisoners are received here from about five precincts. There are two matrons here.

The location of this house is at so low a level that at high tide water comes into the basement, and at frequent intervals within the past years there has been from one to three feet of water in the cellar. The lower part of the building is constantly damp in consequence of this defective drainage. There is no back pressure valve on the house drain or on the soil-pipe. Overflows occur frequently with heavy rains.

There are ample section rooms, well lighted and heated on the two upper floors, four in all, accommodating 40 beds easily. Smaller rooms on these floors for Roundsmen and Sergeants.

The bathtubs were taken out from each wash room nearly a year ago. They have never been replaced, and so there are no bathtubs and the plumbing is still open. These should be supplied at once.

On the main floor and corridor from the cells and the stable opens as this corridor is neither lighted nor heated nor ventilated. There is a constant smell of the stable in the building.

There is a good-sized court yard between the house, corridor and stable, but no way of entering it, and the construction of a door and steps to this court yard from the men's sitting-room in place of one of the three windows would add much to the comfort of the men in the summer.

As a consequence of the undermining of the water at the foundation of the building the corridor wall adjoining the court yard is undermined, badly cracked and in imminent danger of falling. This is a continued source of danger and should be corrected and rebuilt at once.

*Fifty-seventh Precinct.*

There should be a skylight and ventilator over both groups of cells and in the corridor to keep them free from the stable odors. This, too, should be attended to at once.

The stable is in excellent condition. There is no manure pit, but the manure is kept in metal vans and called for at frequent intervals.

The Matron's room is well lighted and heated and has toilet facilities and running water.

The drainage is worst of all and is in a measure the cause of many of the above-mentioned defects. There should be back-pressure valves supplied at once, and such broken cement and defective walls as have existed should be at once repaired.

Several broken windows should also be repaired.

This house is in about the worst sanitary condition of any house in the Borough of Brooklyn.

*Fifty-eighth Precinct.*

Kept clean, well ventilated and in a good sanitary condition.

*Fifty-ninth Precinct.*

In good condition. Taps to washstands leak.

*Sixtieth Precinct.*

The building is old and the plumbing old fashioned. Taps to washstands leak; one water-closet needs repairing; there is a sewage leak in the Captain's room; several closets are out of order and two radiators are leaking. Showers and bath tubs are needed.

*Sixty-first Precinct.*

Building old, but in fairly good condition. It needs painting very badly. Taps to washstands leak, and plaster has fallen in one of the closets.

*Sixty-second Precinct.*

House in good condition, but walls need painting badly. Traps that flush urinals do not work and water taps leak. Closet in stable out of order.

*Sixty-third Precinct.*

House is old and plumbing also; should be entirely renovated. The closets in the cells of all the precincts should be trapped. A constant odor of urine is evident throughout.

*Sixty-fourth Precinct.*

A new house and by far the best in all respects in the Twenty-third Surgical District; in excellent condition throughout.

*Sixty-fifth Precinct.*

Kept clean, well ventilated and in a good sanitary condition.

*Sixty-sixth Precinct.*

Kept clean, well ventilated and in a good sanitary condition.

*Sixty-seventh Precinct.*

Could be improved.

*Sixty-eighth Precinct.*

As a new house is to replace this one I have made no recommendation.

*Sixty-ninth Precinct.*

This house needs to have the painted walls and ceilings repainted.

*Seventieth Precinct.*

Totally unsanitary.

*Seventy-first Precinct.*

In good condition.

*Seventy-second Precinct.*

Condition very bad indeed.

*Seventy-third Precinct.*

Condition good.

*Seventy-fourth Precinct.*

In pretty good sanitary condition as regards the station-house.

*Seventy-fifth Precinct.*

So unfit for habitation, owing to defective plumbing, lighting and ventilation. The water-closet accommodation is inadequate, so is the sleeping accommodation, but a new station-house is being constructed opposite and is partly completed.

*Seventy-sixth Precinct.*

In pretty good sanitary condition as regards the station-house.

*Seventy-seventh Precinct.*

In pretty good sanitary condition as regards the station-house.

*Seventy-ninth Precinct.*

In pretty good sanitary condition as regards the station-house.

*Seventy-eighth Precinct.*

This is unfit for occupancy as there are absolutely no water-closet accommodation in the cells (buckets being employed to receive human excreta). There is only one water-closet in the entire building that can be used, and this is on the first floor for use of the public who assemble at Town Hall, as well as for police. There are open soil and waste-pipes on the second floor from which sewer gas escapes. These are directly back of the sleeping rooms.

*Eightieth Precinct.*

Is in good condition.

First sub-station, Tottenville, is in good condition.

Second sub-station, New Dorp, is in good condition.

*Eighty-first Precinct.*

At West New Brighton needs a thorough renovation. Part of the ceiling is down in dormitory and the toilet room and the walls need kalsomining and the woodwork fresh paint.

*Eighty-second Precinct.*

Condition good.

*Eighty-third Precinct.*

In pretty good sanitary condition as regards the station-house.

*Central Office.*

Condition fairly good.

Also the amount of money paid to the Treasurer of the Police Pension Fund, collected from the owners of steam boilers for certificates of inspection, as provided by chapter VIII. of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897 (Charter).

The sum of \$445 was received for pistol permits, and the amount paid into the Police Pension Fund, pursuant to law.

The Police Department has in operation for telephone purposes a total of 1,335 miles of wire, as follows:

In the Borough of Manhattan the police wires are almost all in cables under ground. These cables have required considerable repairs owing to the various kinds of construction throughout the City during the past few years. In many cases new sections of cable will have to be supplied.

In the Borough of The Bronx the police wires are all overhead. Provision has been made for placing the lines in this borough underground during the next year.

In the Borough of Brooklyn the wires are all on poles and elevated railroad structures, with the exception of a few thousand feet in the vicinity of Headquarters, No. 16 Smith street. An appropriation has been allowed in the Department estimate of 1904 for placing these wires in the subways.

The police wires in Queens and Richmond were rebuilt two years ago, so that they will require no special attention during the coming year.

## EQUIPMENT.

There are 761 telephone stations connected on police lines in the five boroughs consisting of police stations, court squads, public departments, public societies, and patrol, signal and telephone stations.

At each Borough Headquarters there is a switchboard to which all borough lines are connected; also all offices and bureaus at Headquarters. There are trunk lines connecting the several boroughs with each other over which are transmitted all messages, orders and general alarms intended for all stations.

These switchboards are also connected with the public telephone exchanges:

By means of these exchange lines the public are enabled to have telephone communication with the stations connected with the police telephone system, which is allowed under certain restrictions.

At each Borough Headquarters and at each station a telephone blotter in which is kept a record of all official orders and messages. No entry is made of messages of a conversational character, as it would be almost a physical impossibility to record them.

## POLICE SIGNAL SYSTEM.

A contract was executed with the New York Telephone Company for the installation of a system of telephone communication for patrol service in the Borough of Manhattan. There are to be 661 stations established and maintained at an annual cost of \$20,855.20. These stations will be located one on each post or at the intersection of two posts so that all the officers on patrol can report regularly. If desirable, the Police Commissioner can allow keys of these boxes to be given to responsible citizens, officers of banks, exchanges, and other public institutions, to enable them to communicate directly with the police stations in case of emergency.

The installation of this system was begun last August and is now in operation in the First, Second, Fifth, Sixth and Eighth Precincts. The other precincts are to be supplied as soon as possible. The good results already achieved have fully demonstrated what an indispensable auxiliary it is to a well-equipped police department.

In the Borough of Brooklyn the signal system equipment in some of the stations have been in use for many years and in some cases are entirely worn out. They will require considerable repair during the coming year. I would recommend that the signal system be installed in precincts not already equipped; it is especially required in Forty-third, Forty-seventh, Fifty-third, Fifty-seventh, Sixty-second and Sixty-fifth Precincts.

## BANKS AND EXCHANGES.

The lines connecting the banks and exchanges with the police stations are in good order and have worked satisfactorily during the year.

SIR—In compliance with your orders, I herewith submit a report showing the work performed by the members of my command and the steamer "Patrol" for the year 1903.

The steamer "Patrol" attended the International Yacht Races, serving as a Hospital Ship, and to render whatever assistance necessary in case of accident to any of the large fleet of vessels attending the races. The steamer "Patrol" has constantly patrolled the Kill Von Kull and Staten Island Sound and the practice of stealing coal from the barges in transit has been reduced to a minimum.

The "Patrol" attended and assisted at all fires along the river front, and on different islands within the waters of Greater New York.

Arrests have been made of deserters from the United States Navy by boarding incoming vessels, the deserters being delivered to the Commander of the Brooklyn Navy Yard. Many persons were rescued from drowning, and many bodies recovered from the river, and assistance rendered to vessels in distress.

The members of this command have performed special duty on shore in various parts of Greater New York during this year.

Mr. M. J. Rickard, Acting Superintendent, reported as follows:

It is recommended that two additional nurses be assigned to the Alcoholic Ward for Men.

At 12.30 A. M. on the 7th of June, while returning from call to the Park Avenue Hotel, our ambulance No. 2, driven by Thomas Coughlin, was struck by a Third Avenue electric surface car at Thirty-second street and Third Avenue. Doctor Pearson was seriously injured and was brought back to the hospital in another ambulance and placed in the Annex of Ward 23, his wounds having been dressed in Ward 15. The Driver was placed in Wards 8 and 9 and was later transferred to the Sturgis Pavilion. Doctor Pearson's condition is much improved but he is not entirely out of danger. Driver Coughlin will probably be discharged from the ward in a day or two. The patient who was in the ambulance at the time of the accident does not seem to have been injured in any way, although no definite information can be obtained on this point until Doctor Pearson has sufficiently recovered to make a statement. The witnesses and the Police officers say that the Driver was in no way to blame. The photograph presented herewith was taken the day after the accident and speaks for itself.

The only bid on horses, amounting to two hundred and ninety dollars, was received and opened by Mr. Tack on June 1. This figure is too high and the inclosed list will show what other departments are paying. Miss Gainsforth, who was in need of a horse at Harlem Hospital, was given permission to hire one from J. Powers of No. 124 East One Hundred and Twenty-first street at \$1.50 per day.

The milk furnished by the Slawson-Decker Company of No. 585 Park Avenue has not been of good quality during the past week. The reports from the Board of Health show that there have been as many as two thousand colonies per cubic centimeter. The company has been directed to look into the matter at once and take the necessary steps to furnish milk of a better quality.

A communication has been received from Philip H. Smith, Acting Steward, asking that the allowance of fresh fruits and vegetables in the Commissary Mess be increased from thirty-five to sixty dollars per month, and it is respectfully recommended that, inasmuch as the number of persons has been increased from thirty-six to fifty-four with the permission and at the direction of Doctor Mabon, this request be granted, sufficient money being in the supply account to pay for the same.

A communication under date of June 13 from Doctor James Alexander Miller, the Director of the Tuberculosis Clinic, stating that a room for the purpose of teaching physical diagnosis to students is urgently needed, is respectfully submitted to your Board with the recommendation that a room of that kind might be placed in the space between the Mills' Training School and the Out-Patient Building. It is not likely that this will cost more than one hundred dollars, and the work on the same may be begun as soon as the tent for the children is completed.

A communication, under date of June 9, has been received from David Collins, Foreman of Drivers in this institution, suggesting the employment of an additional Ambulance Driver, so that the regular Drivers may be enabled to take their vacations. As one of the Drivers was injured in the accident, and, as it is difficult with the present number of Drivers to supply the places of those in Gouverneur, Harlem and Fordham during the two weeks' vacation, it is recommended that an additional Driver be employed for a period of two months.

Bids on the coil in the dry-room of the laundry have been asked for and are being received. This coil is in very bad condition.

Estimates on the work of enlarging the Prison Ward for Men were received, with the permission and at the direction of the President of the Board of Trustees, and the contract for this work has been awarded to the Hinkle Iron Company, of No. 534 West Fifty-sixth street, at \$207. At times there were from 10 to 12 patients on the floor of this ward.

Dr. Erdwurm, Junior Assistant on the First Medical Division of Bellevue Hospital, was seen this morning by a representative of the Board of Health, and his case was pronounced one of diphtheria. Arrangements have been made for his reception in the Minturn Hospital.

## BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

AN ORDINANCE granting to the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company the right to cross certain streets and highways and to construct and operate a four-track railway above or below said streets or highways of The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby grants to the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right to cross certain streets and highways and the privilege to construct and operate a four-track railway, with all connections, turnouts, switches and cross-overs necessary for the accommodation and operation of said railway, by means of electricity, except the overhead trolley system, or by any other mechanical motive power which may be lawfully employed upon the same, except steam locomotive power; in, upon and across the following-named streets, avenues, parkways, highways and public places, and upon the following route, all situate in the Borough of The Bronx, City, County and State of New York, namely:

First—Main Line: Beginning at a point on the Harlem river, between Lincoln avenue and Third avenue, and then running northerly substantially parallel to Lincoln avenue and crossing the Southern Boulevard, One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, between Lincoln avenue and Third avenue; then crossing One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street, at or near its intersection with Lincoln avenue; then crossing Lincoln avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street; then crossing One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, between Alexander avenue and Third avenue; then crossing Alexander avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-ninth and One Hundred and Fortieth streets; then running substantially parallel to One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, and crossing Willis avenue, Brook avenue and St. Ann's avenue, between One Hundred and Thirty-ninth and One Hundred and Fortieth streets; then crossing One Hundred and Fortieth street, between St. Ann's avenue and Cypress avenue; then crossing Cypress avenue and One Hundred and Forty-first street at or near their intersection; then crossing Powers avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-first and One Hundred and Forty-second streets; then crossing Robbins avenue and One Hundred and Forty-second street, at or near their intersection; then crossing St. Mary's street, between Robbins and Concord avenues; then crossing Concord avenue, between St. Mary's and St. Joseph's streets, crossing St. Joseph's street, between Concord and Wales avenues; then crossing Wales avenue and Crane street at or near their intersection, and crossing Beach avenue and Dater street at or near their intersection; then crossing Union avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-ninth street and the Southern Boulevard; then crossing One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, between Union avenue and the Southern Boulevard; then crossing Prospect avenue and St. John's avenue, between Fox street and the Southern Boulevard, and crossing Leggett avenue and Fox street at or near their intersection; then running substantially parallel with Fox street and crossing Craven street, Longwood avenue, Intervale avenue, Tiffany street and Barretto street, between Fox street and the Southern Boulevard; then crossing Dongan street at or near the intersection of Fox street; then crossing Southern Boulevard and Aldus street at or near their intersection; then crossing Hoe street and Guttenberg street at or near their intersection; then crossing Westchester avenue, between Faile street and Hoe street; then crossing One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street, between Bryant street and West Farms road; then crossing Bryant street, between One Hundred and Sixty-seventh street and West Farms road; then crossing West Farms road at or near its intersection with Longfellow street, Home street and Freeman street; then crossing Jennings street, between Longfellow street and Boone street; then running substantially parallel with Longfellow street, and crossing One Hundred and Seventy-second street, One Hundred and Seventy-third street and One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, and One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street, between Longfellow street and Boone street; then crossing Rodman place, between Longfellow street and West Farms road; then crossing West Farms road, between Rodman place and Boston road; then crossing the Bronx river, southerly from Tremont avenue or West Farms road, and running substantially parallel with West Farms road or Tremont avenue to or near the point of crossing the West Farms road, and crossing that road and Bronx Park avenue at or near their intersection; then crossing Lebanon street and One Hundred and Eightieth street, between Bronx Park avenue and Morris Park avenue; then running between Bronx Park and Morris Park avenue, and crossing old West Farms road; then crossing Unionport road, between Mian-na street and Birchall avenue; then crossing Oakley street, between Mianna and Sagamore streets; then crossing Brown avenue and Sagamore street at or near their intersection; then crossing Hunt avenue, between Mianna street and Bear Swamp road; then running substantially parallel with Morris Park avenue, and crossing Lincoln street, Jefferson street, Madison street and Bear Swamp road (Bronxdale avenue); then crossing Bronx and Pelham parkway and Williamsbridge road at or near their intersection; then crossing Saw Mill lane, between Williamsbridge road and Eastchester road; then crossing Eastchester road, between Kingston avenue and Birch street at or near their intersection; then crossing Cedar street and Oak street, between Kingston avenue and Cornell avenue; then crossing Cornell avenue and Walnut street at or near their intersection; then crossing Chestnut street, between Cornell avenue and Boston road; then crossing Boston road and running approximately parallel with Boston road and crossing Schieffelin's lane, Fifth avenue, road to White Plains, and Fisher's Landing road, and continuing approximately parallel with Boston road to the northerly line of The City of New York. All as shown on maps entitled "Map and Profile of the Amended Route of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, Section 1," adopted by the Board of Directors of said company on the twentieth day of

May, 1904, and signed by Wm. L. Bull, President; John Bogart, Engineer, and H. C. Winchester, Secretary, under seal, and "Map and Profile of the Amended Route of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, Section 2," adopted by the Board of Directors of said company on the seventh day of April, 1904, and signed by Wm. L. Bull, President; John Bogart, Engineer, and Thomas W. Baker, Secretary, under seal, and which maps and profiles were filed in the office of the County Clerk of the City and County of New York on the 23d day of June, 1904, or any lawful amendment thereof consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Second—Branch Line: Beginning at a point on the main line of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway at or near One Hundred and Eightieth street and running southerly, crossing One Hundred and Eightieth street, Lebanon street, West Farms road, One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street and One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street, between Morris Park avenue and Bronx Park avenue (with a curved connection also joining the main line near One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street which crosses One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Bronx Park avenue at or near their intersection); then crossing the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad and running southerly crossing Westchester avenue; then running southerly and crossing the Clason Point road near Clason's Point and running substantially parallel with the United States bulkhead-line, in the vicinity of Clason's Point; then crossing Pugsley's creek and Westchester creek and Baxter creek, and then running easterly along Throggs Neck and crossing Throggs Neck road with a terminal near the lines of the United States Reservation property. All as shown on a map entitled "Map and Profile of the Amended Route of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, Section 3," adopted by the Board of Directors of said company on the 6th day of May, 1904, and signed by Wm. L. Bull, President; John Bogart, Engineer, and H. C. Winchester, Secretary, under seal, and which maps and profiles were filed in the office of the County Clerk of the City and County of New York on the 23d day of June, 1904, or any lawful amendment thereof consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Third—General: And such other streets, avenues, highways, public places, etc. (named and unnamed), as may be hereafter opened or encountered in such routes or amended routes; and also such other streets, avenues, highways, public places, etc. (named and unnamed), now open or in use, or as may be hereafter opened or put in use, which it may be necessary for said railway to cross in order to make connections with any other railway within one thousand (1,000) feet of said routes; provided that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall first have given permission for such connection or connections, and provided further that such connections shall be limited to two in number.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions:

First—The provisions of section 6 of the Railroad Law shall be fully complied with, and in addition to the maps required to be filed with the Railroad Commissioners, it shall be incumbent upon the grantee to file with the Comptroller of The City of New York, and also with the President of the Borough of The Bronx, a map or maps showing the number of tracks and the length and direction of each crossing of all streets legally open, in use, or for which proceedings have been initiated to open, accurately determined by measurements to be taken after the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railway.



pany, its successor or assigns, shall have previously procured a new grant for the same from The City of New York.

Fourth—The New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, its successor or assigns, shall pay for this privilege to The City of New York the following sums of money: During the first ten years, commencing upon the day when this ordinance shall be approved by the Mayor, an annual sum of eight thousand (\$8,000) dollars, and during the succeeding fifteen years an annual sum of sixteen thousand (\$16,000) dollars. From the date of the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railway until the end of the first ten years of this grant, an additional sum of forty (40) cents per linear foot per annum for each line of single track railway within the lines of all streets in use, legally opened streets, or streets for which proceedings to open have been initiated, and for the succeeding fifteen years an additional sum of eighty (80) cents per linear foot per annum, in lieu of said sum of forty (40) cents. Such payments shall likewise apply to all streets hereafter opened during the term of this grant, unless the land required for the opening of such street across the right of way of the railway company shall have been ceded free of cost to The City of New York. All such payments shall be made to the Comptroller of the City in equal payments at the end of each quarter year on the 1st day of January, April, July and October in each year. The terms hereafter to be fixed for any renewal term of this grant shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually during the last year of the original grant, and no renewal of such grant shall provide for a further renewal.

Fifth—The said annual charge or payment shall continue throughout the whole term of the privilege hereby granted, whether original or renewal, as hereinbefore provided, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway company providing for payments for railway rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this grant; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said condition as to payment, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this grant. Nothing herein contained shall apply to any mortgage or mere lien, but shall apply to any purchaser upon foreclosure or under or by virtue of any provision of a mortgage or lien.

Sixth—The rights and privileges granted hereby shall not be assigned either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto or right, interest or property therein pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, its successor or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents. This provision, however, shall not apply to the making of a mortgage, but shall apply to a sale under foreclosure.

Seventh—No street shall be crossed by the railway at grade, and all streets now open or in use, or streets hereafter opened crossing the line of said railway shall be carried over or under said railway by the grantee, at the sole cost and expense of the grantee. The costs of all approaches to said crossings and any damages to property incurred by such change of grade shall likewise be borne and paid by the grantee.

Eighth—All viaducts over streets and all tunnels under streets and all bridges necessary to carry the streets over an open cut, shall be constructed at the expense of the grantee, and in such manner as shall not interfere with the ordinary use of the street as a public highway. All viaducts over streets shall have a height of at least sixteen feet in the clear throughout, and in the case of arch construction not less than sixteen feet in the clear at the centre and ten feet in the clear on the building or side line of said street. In the case of tunnel construction under a street, there shall be at least four feet between the grade of the street and the exterior surface of the arch of said tunnel.

Ninth—Any superstructure of the railway crossing a street and having a length of seventy-five (75) feet or less, shall be constructed in a single span; if more than seventy-five (75) feet in length, intermediate columns to support the structure may be placed in the street in such manner as may be approved. The width of such superstructure of the railway shall not exceed sixty (60) feet when measured over all.

Tenth—The plans for all structures over or under any street must first be submitted to and approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and all such structures shall be constructed of either steel, concrete or masonry, or a combination of these materials.

Eleventh—The railway shall be constructed in the most modern and approved manner of railway construction. The roadbed shall be ballasted throughout its entire length within the limits of The City of New York, with a sufficient quantity of either blast furnace slag or broken trap rock of a hard and durable quality, and no dirt, sand, gravel or cinders shall be used in such ballast.

Twelfth—The roadbed within the limits of The City of New York shall be watered daily whenever the thermometer is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit. For any failure to comply herewith, the railway company shall be liable for a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day.

Thirteenth—The entire right of way of the company within the City limits shall be fenced throughout.

Fourteenth—All abutments or foundations for bridges, viaducts and stations and the stations proper, except intermediate supports for viaducts, as hereinbefore provided, shall be placed on the land of the company. There shall be constructed along the line of the route of the main line of the railway as proposed, for the accommodation of local passenger traffic, at least six (6) stations between the Harlem river and the Bronx river, and at least four (4) stations between the Bronx river and the northern line of The City of New York as now fixed; provided, however, that if the railway is constructed only as far south as the intersection of the Southern Boulevard and Westchester avenue, then there shall be at least three (3) stations west of the Bronx river. On the branch line there shall be constructed at least three (3) stations east of Westchester avenue.

Fifteenth—The said railway may be operated by electrical power, except the overhead trolley system, or by any other mechanical motive power

which may be lawfully employed upon the same, except locomotive steam power; provided, however, that steam locomotive power may be used for switching and shunting trains when specifically authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the said Board.

Sixteenth—No wires for the transmission of power shall be permitted except they be placed in conduits, and in any conduits laid by the company for the transmission of power for its own use, provision shall be made to carry three (3) cables for the use of the police, fire and ambulance service of the City without charge therefor.

Seventeenth—The railway company shall not carry power along its structure for any purpose except the operation of its railway, except as provided above.

Eighteenth—The railway company shall operate a train schedule on the main line of at least sixty (60) trains in either direction daily, stopping at all of the stations within the City limits, and at no time either day or night shall there be greater headway between such trains than thirty (30) minutes; provided, however, that said railway company during the first five years after the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railway shall not be required to operate its trains within the City limits between the hours of 1 o'clock and 4 o'clock A. M., each day, unless the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall determine, after a hearing had thereon, that public convenience requires the operation of its cars during such hours.

Nineteenth—All cars on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, and any failure to keep the temperature of any of the cars of the company above 50 degrees Fahrenheit, shall make the company liable for a penalty of fifty (50) dollars per car per day for each offense.

Twentieth—All cars operated by the company shall be vestibuled and the system of lighting same shall be adequate and be made satisfactory to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Twenty-first—During the first twenty-five (25) years of this grant the rate of fare upon said railway within the limits of The City of New York as now fixed shall not exceed five (5) cents for any passenger. The said company shall not charge any passenger more than such sum for one continuous ride from any point on said railway or a line or branch operated in connection therewith and controlled by it, to any point thereof or of any such connecting line or branch thereof, within the limits of The City of New York, as such limits now exist, during such term.

At the expiration of twenty-five years the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall be entitled, after due hearing and determination of the reasonableness thereof, to require for the term of the renewal of said grant that the fare for each passenger within the City limits, as they may then be constituted, shall not exceed five (5) cents.

The rates for the carrying of property upon the routes of the grantee within the limits of The City of New York shall in all cases be reasonable in amount and shall be subject to the control of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, and may be fixed by such Board after notice and hearing to the grantee, and when so fixed such rate shall be binding upon said grantee, its successor or assigns, and no greater sums shall be charged for such service than provided for by it.

Twenty-second—The said railway company shall carry free within the limits of The City of New York during the existence of this grant or its renewal, all letter carriers of the United States Government, and members of the Police and Fire Departments of The City of New York, when such employees are in full uniform.

Twenty-third—The said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of the City.

Sec. 3. In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained this grant may be forfeited and avoided by The City of New York by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, breach or failure to comply with any of said provisions of the said City shall cause notice in writing thereof to be served upon said company, and said company shall remedy such violation, breach or failure within ten (10) days thereafter, and in default thereof then, and not otherwise, said right of forfeiture shall accrue and may be enforced by the said City; provided, further, that if the said railway company, grantee hereunder, shall within said ten (10) days commence to remedy said violation, breach or failure and shall prosecute the work of completing such remedy with diligence and with the utmost practicable dispatch until the same shall be completed, then no right of forfeiture shall accrue.

Sec. 4. The grant of this privilege shall not affect in any way the right of The City of New York to grant a similar privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions to any other person or corporation.

Sec. 5. Said railway company shall commence actual construction within one year from the date of the signing of this ordinance by the Mayor, and shall complete a four-track railway upon the main line, from the northern line of the City as far south as the intersection of the Southern Boulevard and Westchester avenue, within five years from such date, otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Said railway company shall expend the sum of at least one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for construction within the limits of The City of New York within two years from the date of the signing of this ordinance, which sum shall be exclusive of any moneys expended for right of way.

A statement of the moneys so expended for construction shall be submitted to the Comptroller of The City of New York, who shall, after investigation, report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment his opinion as to whether such sums have been actually expended, and if in the opinion of the said Board the grantee has not proven an expenditure of the said sum within the time given, then said Board may declare that this grant has ceased and determined, and the said action of said Board shall be prima facie evidence of said forfeiture.

Any portion of the route covered by this grant which shall not be completed and in full operation within seven years from the date of the signing of this ordinance shall be deemed to have been abandoned, and all rights hereby granted in and to such portions of said railway shall cease and determine.

And in the event that the said railway company shall not, within the said seven years, construct its main line south of the intersection of the Southern Boulevard and Westchester avenue and to the Harlem river, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in office, may fix and finally determine such additional compensation as shall be imposed upon said railway company because of such failure.

A majority vote of the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall be prima facie evidence in regard to the forfeiture of any or all the rights under this grant, as provided for in this section. Before action is taken by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under the

provisions of this section, the grantee shall have at least thirty (30) days' notice of the intention of said Board to take action, and at such time as is appointed, shall be allowed a hearing. In case any or all of the rights hereby granted are forfeited, it is a condition of this grant that all sums theretofore paid to The City of New York, together with the deposit of \$20,000 as provided for in section 14 of this ordinance, and all structures erected by said grantee, its successor or assigns, within the lines of any street, shall be forfeited to and become the property of The City of New York.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall have power to extend the time provided for in this section for the completion of the railway and for the work to be performed and expenditure to be made, as above, for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate two years, but such extension shall not be made unless the reasons given by the grantee for non-fulfillment are, in the opinion of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for causes over which the grantee had no control and was in nowise responsible.

Sec. 6. The grantee shall assume all liability by reason of the construction and operation of the railway and the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property by reason of its construction or operation.

As a condition of this grant, the grantee, its successor or assigns, hereby agrees to repay to the City any damages which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the railway company, its successor or assigns.

Sec. 7. Any portion of the right of way of the said railway company falling within the lines of a street now shown on the map of The City of New York, which it may be necessary for the City to subsequently acquire, shall be ceded to the City, without cost to it, subject to the company's easement therein.

Sec. 8. In case the City shall acquire the land necessary for a street across the grantee's right of way and such land for the street is not ceded by the said grantee, then the railway company shall pay the same rates for the privilege of crossing said street as are provided for in paragraph fourth of section 2 of this ordinance.

Sec. 9. In case any of the streets as now shown on the map of The City of New York and crossed by the said railway above grade are altered or widened after the grantee has completed its railway, and such widening requires the alteration of the superstructure of the railway, the grantee and The City of New York shall each pay one-half of the cost of such alteration as may be necessary.

Sec. 10. In case the route as laid out shall make it necessary in the opinion of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to change the map of The City of New York, in order to avoid unnecessary or undesirable crossings or for other reasons purely on account of the location of the railway, and by such change or alteration additional streets bounding the grantee's right of way are determined upon, then the grantee shall acquire such streets at its own expense.

Sec. 11. Any alterations which may be required to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any subsurface structures, pipes, etc., laid in the streets, on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the railway company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Sec. 12. All construction of railway crossings shall be done in such manner as shall not substantially interfere with the ordinary use of any street as a public highway, and all streets in any way disturbed by such construction shall be restored to their original condition. In case of failure on the part of the grantee to restore such streets within a reasonable length of time, The City of New York shall have the right, under resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished after due notice and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the fund herein provided.

Sec. 13. The company's property and structures shall not be used for advertising purposes in any way, under a penalty of fifty (50) dollars per day for each offense. Such restriction shall not apply to the interior of stations or cars.

Sec. 14. This grant is upon the express condition that the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, within thirty days after the said company has been duly authorized to operate its railway and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred thereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000), either in money or in securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by such company of the terms and conditions of this grant, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the privilege and the penalties herein provided, and in case of default in the performance by said company of such terms and conditions, The City of New York shall have the right, after due notice, to collect the same from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the payment of the annual charges shall collect the same, with interest, from such fund after ten days' notice in writing to the said company. In case of any drafts so made upon this security fund, the said company shall, upon thirty days' notice in writing pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of twenty thousand dollars, and in default thereof the grant hereby made may be canceled and annulled at the option of the Comptroller of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said City. No action or proceeding shall affect other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

Sec. 15. That if the said New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, its successor or assigns, shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and all street crossings in good condition throughout the full term of its occupancy of said streets, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City may give written notice to remedy the same within a reasonable time, and upon the failure of said company to remedy its said default within a reasonable time, said company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to The City of New York the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed and liquidated damages, or the said City in case said structures over or under streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the company, in which case the said company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon; all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinbefore provided.

Sec. 16. This grant shall not become operative until said railway company shall duly execute, under its corporate seal, an instrument in writing wherein said company shall promise, covenant and agree on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this ordinance fixed and contained, and file the same in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York, within ten days after the adoption of this ordinance.

Sec. 17. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

#### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there
