General Order No. 10.

The Police Commissioner on March 7, 1910, directed the following:

Ordered, That the rules and regulations of this Department be amended by adding thereto a rule to be known as Rule No. 89, to read as follows:

Rule 89.

Duties of Veterinary Surgeons and Treatment of Sick Horses.

1. The Chief Veterinary Surgeon reports direct to the Second Deputy Police Commissioner, and has general supervision of the work of the other Veterinary Surgeons.

2. He shall receive, tabulate and preserve the reports of the District Veterinary Surgeons, including his own. He shall keep in his office the sick record of each horse belonging to the Department. He shall receive, through official channels, and investigate complaints of neglect of duty or other derelictions of Veterinary Surgeons, and will report the result of his investigations, in writing, to the Second Deputy Police Commissioner.

3. He shall, in official matters, be the sole medium of communication between the Veterinary Surgeons and the Second Deputy Police Commissioner. He shall prepare quarterly and yearly reports of the veterinary work of the Department, containing such information as the Police Commissioner may direct.

4. He shall examine all new horses when purchased and at the end of the probationary period, and send a report of such examinations to the Division of Horses and Equipments.

5. He shall promptly notify the Division of Horses and Equipments of every horse ordered from or returned to service.

6. District Veterinary Surgeons receiving word of a sick or disabled horse shall visit it without delay, assuming exclusive control of such animal until its recovery, when they shall without unnecessary delay return the horse to service, with a written notice to the commanding officer. They shall visit sick or disabled horses as frequently as the conditions may require, and shall be entirely responsible for their treatment and care. If it is considered necessary to remove the horse to the training stable, the Chief Veterinary Surgeon will be notified.

7. The Chief or other Veterinary Surgeons visiting a Department stable shall cause the time of such visit and the purpose of same to be entered in the station blotter.

8. Veterinary Surgeons shall report to the Chief Veterinary Surgeon the condition of stables and horses in their district.

9. All Veterinary Surgeons must immediately telephone to the Division of Horses and Equipments notifying them of any horse ordered from or returned to service.

10. Precinct Commanders will send notice by telephone direct to the District Veterinary Surgeon of a sick or disabled horse. Whenever a District Veterinary Surgeon is not available, the Chief Veterinary Surgeon will be notified immediately, so that a substitute can be furnished.

11. Veterinary Surgeons shall allow no other business to interfere with their official duties.

12. The Veterinary Surgeons' Districts are as follows:

No. 1. All precincts and squads in the Borough of Manhattan south of Forty-second street.

No. 2. All precincts and squads in the Borough of Manhattan north of Forty-second street, and all precincts and squads in the Borough of The Bronx.

No. 3. Precincts Nos. 154, 155, 158, 159, 160, 161, 162, 163, 164 and 165 (Brooklyn), and all precincts in Queens, including the training stable.

No. 4. Precincts Nos. 143, 144, 145, 146, 147, 148, 149, 150, 151, 152, 153, 156, 157, 166, 167, 168, 169, 170, 171, 172, 173 and Traffic Precinct D (Brooklyn), and all precincts in the Borough of Richmond.

COMMISSIONERS OF ACCOUNTS.

Report upon an Examination of the Chamberlain's Accounts for the Year Ending December 31, 1909.

Office of the Commissioners of Accounts,

New York, February 23, 1910.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, and the Honorable Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Sirs—Section 195 of the Charter reads as follows:

" * * * The accounts of the chamberlain shall be annually closed on the last day of December, and shall be examined in the month of January in each year by the commissioners of accounts. Such commissioners shall examine the accounts and vouchers of all moneys received into and paid out of the city treasury during the year ending on the last day of December next preceding such examination, and shall certify and report to the mayor and board of aldermen in the following month of February the amount of moneys received into the treasury during such year, the amount of moneys paid out during the same period by virtue of warrants drawn on the treasury by the comptroller, the amount of moneys received by the chamberlain who shall be in office at the time of such examination, if he entered upon the execution of his duties since the last preceding report; the balance in the treasury on the last day of December preceding such examination, the amount of moneys borrowed for or on the credit of the city during such year, and the amount of the bonds of the city issued during such year, with the purposes for which and the authority under which such bonds were issued. Such commissioners shall also compare the warrants drawn by the comptroller on the treasury during the year ending on the last day of December preceding such examination, with the several laws and ordinances under which the same shall purport to have been drawn, and shall in like manner certify and report whether the comptroller had power to draw such warrants; and if any shall be found which, in their opinion, he had no power to draw, they shall specify the same in their report, with their reasons for such opinion."

The great volume of detail comprehended in an examination and comparison of the vouchers and warrants issued and paid in the course of the calendar year, if sought to be completed in the month of January following, as prescribed, would require the concentration of a much larger force of Assistants than could be spared for this work at one time without seriously affecting other examinations and investigations. In practice, therefore, the examination provided for in the above quoted section of the Charter is continuous throughout the year, seven Accountants and seven Clerks being assigned thereto.

Certification.

I hereby certify that all warrants paid in the year 1909, together with the supporting vouchers thereof, have been examined; that it appears the Comptroller was duly authorized by the several laws and ordinances to draw the warrants examined, and none was found which was improperly drawn. The accounts of the City Chamberlain for the year 1909 as to moneys received into and paid out of the City Treasury have also been examined.

It should be stated here that the annual examination provided for by law to be made by the Commissioners of Accounts, under section 195 of the Charter, in its results is merely an audit of the Chamberlain's receipts and disbursements, verifying the cash balances in the books at the beginning and close of the calendar year and certifying to the amount of corporate stock and bonds issued.

Nowhere in the Charter is it provided that an examination and report be made, either by the Commissioners of Accounts or any other agency, which should comprehend the City's income and expense accounts.

In the report of the Commissioners of Accounts covering the year 1907 in this connection, the following comment appears:

"If the City's accounts were upon an income basis and all the assets and liabilities were set up on the books, it would be feasible to prepare at stated periods a proper balance sheet and an income and expense account which would exhibit, respectively:

"A," the City's true financial condition, and "B," all the income and expenditure during the period following the date of the next preceding balance sheet and accounting for the changes occurring in the City's surplus or deficit in the current balance sheet, as compared with that appearing on the previous one.

The importance of such statements as a source of information regarding the City's affairs cannot be overestimated. The improved accounting methods by which such statements would be arrived at, necessarily involving the use of controlling accounts over the City's income and expenditure, would greatly aid toward a far more efficient audit of the City's business than is at present possible under the system of bookkeeping which obtains, at the same time rendering it practicable for the proper officials to satisfy themselves that the City was receiving all the income it should receive, something which at present cannot be accomplished without great labor.

"To prepare statements as outlined above from the present records would involve an immense amount of work and would necessitate the taking of inventories of all the City's assets and liabilities of every description, and this, of course, is not within the scope of our duties."

I understand that under the direction of the Comptroller a new system of accounting is in course of installation in the various departments and offices of the City which will ultimately serve to render possible the desired end as outlined above.

The contract drawings for the Fourth Avenue Subway call for raising the grade of the Extension between Fulton Street and Fleet Street to a maximum height of four feet which occurs at DeKalb Avenue. At the time those plans were adopted it was assumed that the necessary steps had been taken to carry the proposed change into effect. The matter had been taken up with and generally approved by the former President of the Borough of Brooklyn more than a year ago, but through some misunderstanding was not presented by him to the Board of Estimate and Apportion-

ment, and while the subway contracts were approved and consented to by that Board, this point does not seem to have been called to its attention.

The change of grade proposed constituted an important element in the subway plans, for by it was obviated the necessity for (1) lowering the subway into water bearing strata at an estimated additional cost of one hundred and forty thousand dollars (\$140,000.00), or (2) definitely abandoning the possibility of connecting the subway now in Flatbush Avenue with that under construction in the Extension. The adoption of the latter alternative would be detrimental to the interests of the city so that it becomes a question whether it is advisable to change the grade or to expend one hundred and forty thousand dollars in lowering the subway.

It seems to the Commission that looking at the subject from all aspects it would be better to change the grade of the street. The change will result in a manifest improvement of the highway. This is also an opportune time, for there are few buildings in the Extension and the damage will largely be confined to a comparatively cheap class of buildings on DeKalb Avenue and Debevoise Place. The most important building on the Extension that will be affected is the Crescent Theatre, but the front of that building will have to be rebuilt in any event because of the subway extending under a part of it. Between it and Fulton Street all the other buildings will have to be razed during the course of construction. It would therefore seem that the proposed change of grade can be made at a small cost as compared with the expense of lowering the subway and it eliminates the delay and expense that would be involved in redesigning the subway structure.

A drawing entitled, "Plan and Profile showing changes of grade of Flatbush Ave. from Fleet St. to Fulton St., of DeKalb Ave. from Fleet St. to Hudson St. and of Debevoise Place from DeKalb Ave. to Lafayette St. in the Eleventh Ward, Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York" showing the change proposed is transmitted herewith.

The Commission therefore respectfully requests that you take such action as you may be advised in order to carry the change of grade proposed into effect.

FOURTH AVENUE SUBWAY—DISPOSITION OF EXCAVATED MATERIAL—COMMUNICATION TO BOROUGH PRESIDENT OF BROOKLYN

On motion, duly seconded, the Secretary was authorized and directed to transmit to the President of the Borough of Brooklyn the following form of communication:

HON. A. E. STEERS, President, Borough of Brooklyn, Borough Hall, Brooklyn, New York.

DEAR SIR:—As you are probably aware, a large amount of excavation will be taken from the Fourth Avenue Subway which will be available for fill in various parts of South Brooklyn. A considerable correspondence took place in June, 1907, between Borough President Coler and Engineer Kreuzbauer and between the Borough President and the Rapid Transit Board on this subject. Six sections of this subway have been let, extending to the neighborhood of 41st Street. In only one of these contracts is the contractor under any obligation to deliver fill at specific places if required. This is the case of the section under contract 11-A-4, E. E. Smith Contracting Company, contractor, and provision is made that the fill may be delivered to the Eighth Ward market place or Bay Ridge Parkway. An effort was made on all the contracts to have amounts and localities designated by the park or borough authorities before the contracts were let, but this could not be accomplished. It is probable that the freedom of soil disposal is reflected in the contract prices. Nevertheless, it would seem unfortunate to have any of this fill go to sea while so many parts of South Brooklyn are in need of it. The Commission will do everything possible to assist any of your departments in obtaining this fill for use in streets or otherwise.

AGREEMENT, made this day of January, in the year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Ten, between THE CITY OF NEW YORK (hereinafter called the "City") acting by the PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION FOR THE FIRST DISTRICT (hereinafter called the "Commission") party of the first part, and JOHN B. McDONALD, of the City of New York, (hereinafter called the "Contractor"), and INTERBOROUGH RAPID TRANSIT COMPANY, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of New York (hereinafter called "Interborough Company"), parties of the second part, WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, heretofore and on or about the 21st day of February, 1901, the City, acting by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York (hereinafter called the "Board"), entered into a contract with the Contractor for the construction and operation of a Rapid Transit Railroad in the City of New York as therein mentioned, (hereinafter called "the Railroad") which contract has been from time to time modified by certain agreements between the parties, and which contract as so modified is hereinafter called the "Contract"; and

WHEREAS, the Contractor has deposited with the Comptroller of the City security for the performance of the said contract for construction and operation on his part, and has given certain bonds as further security for such performance, and upon such bonds there are surties as follows: Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, United States Fidelity & Guaranty Company, The Empire State Surety Company, American Surety Company of New York, National Surety Company, and Fidelity & Deposit Company of Maryland; and

WHEREAS, by written instruments bearing date the tenth day of July, 1902, the Contractor, with the written consent of the Board, concurred in by six members thereof, duly assigned the right and obligation to maintain and operate the Railroad for the term of years specified in the Contract and all rights included in the leasing provisions of the Contract, together with the obligation to provide equipment for the Railroad unto Interborough Company, which Company also guaranteed the performance by the Contractor of the provisions of so much of the Contract as was not so assigned to it; and

WHEREAS, the Commission has succeeded to all the powers and duties of the Board; and

WHEREAS, it is provided in the Contract that the Board, or its successors, shall have the right to require additional work to be done or additional materials to be furnished, or both, within the general purview of a rapid transit railroad as therein described, the reasonable value of which shall be additionally paid to the Contractor; and

WHEREAS, in the opinion of the Commission the platforms of the stations forming part of the Railroad should be lengthened in order to increase the capacity of the Railroad; and

WHEREAS, the Contractor and the Interborough Company desire, and the Commission approves a modification of the Contract to provide for the necessary changes in the Railroad in order that the station platforms may be lengthened; and

WHEREAS, the Contract provides that no change shall be made therein except by a written instrument duly authorized by the Board, or its successors, and consented to by the Contractor and the sureties upon his said bonds; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City by resolution adopted on the 8th day of October, 1909, authorized and directed the issue of corporate stock to an amount not exceeding one million one hundred and fifty thousand (\$1,150,000) dollars to provide means for lengthening the station platforms of the Railroad;

Now, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises but subject to the consents hereinafter provided,

IT IS AGREED that the Contract be and the same hereby is modified as follows:

and the Contractor undertakes and agrees to do such work in accordance with such drawings and the Contract and the specifications forming a part thereof, together with all work of constructing or reconstructing sewer or water pipes or other surface or sub-surface structures that may be interfered with during the progress of the work whether such structures are indicated on the drawings or not and all work of changing signal apparatus or other equipment and all incidental work of whatsoever character that may be rendered necessary and to construct the additional parts of the platforms and all station finish work in connection therewith so that the new work shall harmonize with the station of which it is to form a part and to do all of said work in accordance with the directions of and subject to the approval of the Chief Engineer to the Commission at an expense not exceeding one million one hundred and fifty thousand (\$1,150,000) dollars, to be paid by the City, and agrees to complete such work within a period of eighteen (18) months from the date of the issuance of a permit to do such work, unless such time shall be extended in writing by the Commission.

AND IT IS HEREBY FURTHER AGREED that the reasonable value of the work herein provided for (not exceeding however the aforesaid sum of one million one hundred and fifty thousand (\$1,150,000) dollars) shall be deemed a part of the cost of constructing the Railroad and shall be ascertained and determined and paid to the Contractor in the manner provided in the Contract in addition to the amounts in the Contract originally agreed to be paid the Contractor, and that such additional amounts so paid shall be included in the total cost of the construction of the Railroad in determining the amount of rental to be paid under the Contract in like manner as if the work herein provided for had been originally required by or authorized therein;

AND IT IS HEREBY FURTHER UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED that in computing the rental payable under the Contract the interest actually paid by the City on bonds heretofore issued, or that may hereafter be issued, for construction, shall be the basis of the said computation notwithstanding the rate of interest so paid may exceed three and one-half (3½) per cent., the rate which was limited by law at the time the Contract was made.

PROVIDED, HOWEVER, that this agreement shall take effect if and when and only when the following consents hereto shall be duly had, to wit:

AGREEMENT made this day of January, in the year Nineteen hundred and ten, between THE CITY OF NEW YORK (hereinafter called the "City"), acting by the PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION FOR THE FIRST DISTRICT (hereinafter called "the Commission"), party of the first part, and RAPID TRANSIT SUBWAY CONSTRUCTION COMPANY, a corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of New York (hereinafter called "the Contractor"), and INTERBOROUGH RAPID TRANSIT COMPANY, a corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of New York (hereinafter called "Interborough Company"), parties of the second part, WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, heretofore and on or about the 21st day of July, 1902, the City, acting by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York (hereinafter called "the Board"), entered into a contract with the Contractor for the construction and operation of a Rapid Transit Railroad in the City of New York as therein mentioned, (hereinafter called "the Railroad"), which contract has been from time to time modified by certain other agreements between the said parties, and which contract as so modified is hereinafter called "the Contract"; and

WHEREAS, the Contractor has deposited with the Comptroller of the City certain security for the performance of the Contract on its part, and has given certain bonds as further security for such performance and upon such bonds there are now sureties as follows: The United States Fidelity & Guaranty Company, The Empire State Surety Company, National Surety Company, Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland and the Aetna Indemnity Company; and

WHEREAS, by written instruments bearing date the tenth day of August, 1905, the Contractor, with the written consent of the Board, concurred in by six members thereof, duly assigned the right and obligation to maintain and operate the Railroad for the term of years specified in the Contract and all rights included in the leasing provisions of the Contract, together with the obligation to provide equipment for the said Railroad unto Interborough Company, which Company also guaranteed the performance by the Contractor of the provisions of so much of the Contract as was not so assigned to it; and

WHEREAS, the Commission has succeeded to all the powers and duties of the Board; and

WHEREAS, it is provided in the Contract that the Board or its successors shall have the right to require additional work to be done or additional materials to be furnished or both, within the general purview of a rapid transit railroad as therein described, the reasonable value of which shall be additionally paid to the Contractor; and

WHEREAS, in the opinion of the Commission the platforms of the stations forming part of the Railroad should be lengthened in order to increase the capacity of the Railroad; and

WHEREAS, the Contractor and the Interborough Company desire, and the Commission approves, a modification of the Contract to provide for the necessary changes in the Railroad in order that the station platforms may be lengthened; and

WHEREAS, the Contract provides that no change shall be made therein except by a written instrument duly authorized by the Board, or its successors, and consented to by the Contractor and the sureties upon its said bonds; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City by resolution adopted on the 8th day of October, 1909, authorized and directed the issue of corporate stock to an amount not exceeding \$350,000 to provide means for lengthening the station platforms of the Railroad;

Now, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises, but subject to the consents hereinafter provided,

IT IS AGREED that the Contract be and the same hereby is modified as follows:

and the Contractor undertakes and agrees to do such work in accordance with such drawings and the specifications forming a part thereof, together with all work of constructing or reconstructing sewer or water pipes or other surface or sub-surface structures that may be interfered with during the progress of the work whether such structures are indicated on the drawings or not and all work of changing signal apparatus or other equipment and all incidental work of whatsoever character that may be rendered necessary and to construct the additional parts of the platforms and all station finish work in connection therewith so that the new work shall harmonize with the stations of which it is to form a part and to do all of said work in accordance with the directions and subject to the approval of the Chief Engineer to the Commission at an expense not exceeding three hundred and fifty thousand (\$350,000) dollars to be paid by the City and agrees to complete such work within a period of eighteen (18) months from the date of the issuance of the permit to do the work unless such time shall be extended in writing by the Commission.

AND IT IS HEREBY FURTHER AGREED, that the reasonable value of the work herein provided for (not exceeding, however, the aforesaid sum of three hundred and fifty thousand (\$350,000) dollars), shall be deemed a part of the cost of constructing the Railroad and shall be ascertained and determined and paid to the Contractor in the manner provided in the Contract, in addition to the amounts in the Contract originally agreed to be paid the Contractor; and that such additional amounts so paid shall be included in the total cost of the construction of the Railroad in determining the amount of rental to be paid under the Contract in like manner as if the work herein provided for had been originally required by or authorized in the Contract.

NEW YORK CENTRAL AND HUDSON RIVER RAILROAD COMPANY ET AL.—TRAIN SERVICE IN THE BRONX AND RATES OF FARE

James J. Russell, recalled, testified for the complainant as to the number of local passengers and the passenger revenue on the Harlem electrical division between the Grand Central station and the Wakefield station for 1894, 1900, 1907 and 1908. W. G. Carlton testified for the complainant as to the cost and amount of electric power for operating the trains between the Grand Central station and Wakefield and the system of, and structures and equipment for, generating and distributing electricity. Isaac S. Barrett, an employee in the City Comptroller's office, testified for the complainant as to the accounts of advances by the city to the defendant companies for the Fourth Avenue and Park Avenue improvements. Clinton L. TURNER PLACE—SEWER, between Coney Island avenue and East Eleventh street. Area of assessment: Both sides of Turner place, from Coney Island avenue to Stratford road. **EAST SEVENTH STREET—SEWER**, between Church avenue and Johnson street. EAST EIGHTH STREET—SEWER, between Johnson street and Church avenue, and OUTLET SEWER IN CHURCH AVENUE, north side, between East Eighth street and Coney Island avenue. Area of assessment: Both sides of East Eighth street, between Johnson street and Church avenue; west side of Coney Island avenue, from Johnson street to Church lane; south side of Johnson street and both sides of Montgomery street and north side of Church lane, from Coney Island avenue to East Seventh street, including Lot No. 60 of Block 5330, and west side of Coney Island avenue, from Johnson street to Ocean parkway.

EAST TWENTY-THIRD STREET—REGULATING, GRADING, CURBING AND FLAGGING, between Avenues F and G. THIRTIETH WARD, SECTION 17. FORTY-SEVENTH STREET—SEWER, between Tenth avenue and a point 290 feet west of Fort Hamilton avenue. Area of assessment: Both sides of Forty-seventh street, between Tenth and Fort Hamilton avenues, including Lot No. 1 in Block 5620 and Lot No. 1 in Block 5621. **FIFTY-SECOND STREET—SEWER AND OUTLET**, between Fourteenth and Fifteenth avenues, and between Fifteenth and Sixteenth avenues, and in SIXTEENTH AVENUE, between Fifty-second and Fifty-third streets. THIRTIETH WARD, SECTION 18. BASINS at the east and south corners of FIRST AVENUE and SEVENTY-THIRD STREET. Area of assessment: Both sides of Seventy-third street, from Ridge boulevard (Second avenue) to Colonial road (First avenue), including Lot No. 1 of Block 5916. **FOURTH AVENUE—SEWER**, east side, between Sixty-fourth and Sixty-fifth streets. Area of assessment: East side of Fourth avenue, between Sixty-fourth and Sixty-fifth streets. **FOURTH AVENUE—SEWER**, east side, between Sixty-fourth and Sixty-fifth streets. BASIN at east corner of WAKEMAN PLACE AND SECOND AVENUE. Area of assessment: Block bounded by Second and Third avenues, Wakeman place and street formerly known as Sixty-sixth street.

And the proper corpse for that purpose, attached to any such person, when issued, shall be preserved and returned to the Department, as its regulations may require, by the proper officer or person on each boat or vessel, and by the proper person in charge of any train of cars or vehicle on which any dead body may be carried from said city, preserved, however, that the same shall be given.

under this section, to transit permits issued severally by boards of health of cities, towns or villages in the state of New York, or by boards of health that may be hereafter organized, pursuant to laws of the state of New York, or when issued by the health officer of any such city, town or village, as to a transit permit issued from this board, when the death of the person named in the permit shall have occurred in the city, town or village from which such permit shall have been issued. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, or any clerk or officer thereof, or any officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
