Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, April 15, 1913.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair, and Messrs. Farley, Paulding, Robbins, Sachs and Stern, Trustees. Excused, Messrs. Drummond and O'Keefe. The minutes of the meeting of April 1 were approved.

Bills, amounting to \$35,975.45, were approved and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

Subject to the approval of the Board, the appointment of Dr. Louis E. Klingon as Admitting Physician at Bellevue Hospital, in place of Dr. Drury, resigned, is reported. The appointment of August B. Schoenherr is also reported, subject to approval, as Assistant Investigator at Gouverneur Hospital, to succeed Dr. Workman. Mr. Schoenherr was first on the Civil Service list submitted for this appointment.

Owing to the illness of four Nurses at Harlem Hospital, and the inability to fill the four positions, it has been necessary to employ two graduates at \$50 per month for a temporary period of two weeks.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment having approved the request for revenue bonds to provide an additional ambulance, authority is requested to make application to the Board of Aldermen to purchase the same without public letting.

The following is submitted in regard to the recommendations of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital, which were referred to the General Medical Superintendent for report: In reference to the establishment of a syphilitic clinic at that hospital, it would seem desirable to establish this as a genito-urinary clinic rather than as a syphilitic clinic, providing it could be arranged for the same evening that the dispensary is now open for the tuberculosis clinic, otherwise it would be necessary to provide additional employees, such as a Registrar, Nurses, etc., to keep up this work. In the matter of rescinding the department rule in regard to applying an anesthetic in obstetrical cases, the report from the Visiting Obstetricians would seem to make it advisable that this rule be rescinded.

Action was taken upon the report of the

General Medical Superintendent as follows:

The appointment of Dr. Louis E. Klingon, as Admitting Physician at Bellevue Hospital, to succeed Dr. Drury, and of A. B. Schoenherr, as Assistant Investigator at Gouverneur Hospital, to succeed Dr. Workman, was approved.

The employment of two Graduate Nurses at Harlem Hospital for a temporary period of two weeks was approved.

It was resolved to request the permission of the Board of Aldermen to purchase an automobile ambulance in the open market, without public letting, at a cost not to exceed \$4,000.

It was resolved to establish a night genito-urinary clinic at Harlem Hospital, provided it can be arranged on the same evenings as the dispensary is now open, and the General Medical Superintendent was directed to consider what can be done in regard to establishing a similar clinic at Bellevue Hospital.

The report of the General Medical Superintendent, in regard to administering anesthetics on the obstetrical service, was considered, together with letters from Dr. J. Clifton Edgar and Dr. Austin Flint, Jr., and, in accordance with their recommendation, it was resolved to rescind the department rule requiring the attendance of a Visiting Physician or his Assistant when an anesthetic is given, as far as obstetrical cases and cases of abortion requiring curettage are concerned, the anesthetic to be given by a properly qualified member of the house staff who has received instruction in anesthesia, and whom the Instructor in Anesthesia of the hospital has certified as being properly qualified for this service.

Reports of Committees.

The Building Committee reported on the request of Joseph Di Benedetto for an extension of forty-three working days to complete his contract for the erection of the roof ward at Fordham Hospital, and submitted a second communication received from the architect recommending an allowance of fifty calendar days, because of the impossibility of proceeding rapidly with this work on account of the cold weather and excessive rain. An extension of fifty calendar days, to complete the contract, was granted.

The Building Committee reported on the recommendation received from McKim, Mead & White to obtain estimates

on plastic linoleum, tile and oak floors for pavilions L and M directly from concerns supplying such flooring. This had been investigated by the Chairman of the Building Committee, and on his recommendation the opinion of the Corporation Counsel was requested as to the authority of the Trustees to have this work given out under a separate contract, directly to a firm supplying the flooring material which they may select, and to deduct from the contract amount an allowance of 60 cents per square foot.

The Building Committee suggested, in view of the President's intention to attend a meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission in regard to another matter, that he take up the action of the Commission in certifying John J. Kenny as General Inspector of Construction and disapproving the reinstatement of Louis C. Frees and ordering the termination of his services. This matter was referred to the President for conference with the Civil Service Commission.

The Finance Committee reported that it had investigated the recommendation that revenue bonds be requested to meet the anticipated deficit in the appropriations for the year 1913, and found that the probable deficit, due to the increased cost of food stuffs and supplies and the deductions made in the Budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, would be \$56,836, in accordance with the following statement:

After consideration, on the recommendation of the Finance Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried, to request the Board of Aldermen to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of \$56,836.

The Committee on Officers and Employees reported that a request for a readjustment of the salary schedules, to become effective from April 1, had been forwarded to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and this action was approved.

Communications.

The Secretary reported that after receiving the approval of the individual Trustees he had addressed a communication to the Municipal Civil Service Commission, requesting the appointment of Dr. George O'Hanlon as General Medical Superintendent, under rule 12, paragraph 5 of the Civil Service regulations, and presented a communication dated April 10, from the Municipal Civil Service Commission, stating that a hearing had been ordered for April 16 in connection with this application, and requesting that a representative of the Department be present and make a statement for the record. The action of the Secretary was approved, and the President was designated as the representative of this Department to make the statement for the record.

A communication was presented from the Director of the Municipal Efficiency Exhibit, requesting information as to what this Department has to exhibit to show methods of efficiency. The General Medical Superintendent was directed to furnish this Committee with information and plans of such an exhibit as the Department will be in a position to make.

Communications were presented from R. F. Almiral, recommending the acceptance of an estimate of \$297 from the contractor, Joseph Di Benedetto, for widening five doors and making other changes in connection with the roof ward at Fordham Hospital. This matter had already been investigated by the Building Committee, and, in accordance with their recommendation and that of the architect, the acceptance of this bid was approved.

A communication was presented from Dr. James Alexander Miller, Director of the Tuberculosis Service at Bellevue Hospital, requesting an additional Nurse for the orthopedic service in the Out-patient Department.

Resolved, To direct the General Medical Superintendent to assign a Nurse from the tuberculosis wards to attend to this clinic.

The minutes of the meeting of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital, held on April 1 were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the nominations of Dr. J. M. Hanford as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients, and of Dr. A. J. Brown as Surgeon to Out Patients, and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Surgeon, were referred to the Conference Committee. The report of the Executive Committee, that for the present it will not be necessary to open a special operative service for the treatment of tonsils and adenoids was noted.

The minutes of the meeting of the Fordham Hospital Medical Board, held on March 11 were presented. The nomination of Dr. A. C. Butts for the place of Assistant Visiting Obstetrician was referred to the Conference Committee.

Communications were presented from the Municipal Civil Service Commission, stating that they had decided to make no change in the classification of the position of Nurse, and had withdrawn their objection to the assignment of Nurses in the non-competitive class in this Department to social service work. These communications were ordered placed on file.

A communication was presented from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting certified copy of resolution authorizing a lease of the premises at 197 Monroe st. This communication was placed on file.

A communication was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copies of five resolutions adopted on March 27 (1), transferring \$3,505.38, within the appropriations for the year 1912, (2) transferring \$420, within the appropriations for the year 1911, (3) transferring to the funds of this Department \$750 from the appropriations of the Board of Inebriety and \$19.17 from the appropriations of the Department of Parks of Brooklyn, (4) transferring \$20.38 from the appropriations of the President of the Borough of Richmond for the year 1912 to this Department, and (5) revising schedule 204 for the year 1912. This communication was placed on file.

The minutes of the meeting of the Gouverneur Hospital Medical Board, held on April 1 were presented. The request of Dr. Herbst for permission to use nitrous oxide gas in operations in the dental clinic was approved. The supplemental report of the Special Committee appointed to consider the communication from the New York City Visiting Committee of the State Charities Aid Association in regard to the children's service, was referred to the Conference Committee. The resignation of Dr. Louis Lefrak as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients was accepted. The recommendations in regard to the nose and throat clinics were referred to the General Medical Superintendent. The nomination of Dr. Alexander Rovinsky as Assistant Physician to Out Patients (eye clinic) was referred to the Conference Committee, and the request for the assignment of a Nurse for service in the dental clinic was referred to the General Medical Superintendent.

The Chairman of the Building Committee submitted a communication received from R. F. Almiral, together with an estimate from the Luke A. Burke & Sons Company, amounting to \$6,412 for running a tunnel to carry piping between the new Nurses' residence and the power house at Harlem Hospital. The Committee reported that, in their opinion, this bid was excessive, and recommended that they be authorized to obtain estimates for this work through Mr. Freedlander. The Building Committee was authorized to obtain these bids through Mr. Freedlander.

A communication was presented from H. F. J. Porter, Industrial Engineer, inquiring what provisions had been made by the Trustees to insure the safety of the occupants of the hospitals in case of fire, and calling attention to methods he had installed in the hospitals of the Department of Public Charities. This communication was referred to the Building Committee for investigation and report, particularly as to what is being done by the Department of Charities on Blackwells Island, and whether these methods would be applicable to the buildings of this Department.

New Business.

Mr. Stern referred to a petition to the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries from the Local Auxiliary Committee which is concerned with the treatment and care of tuberculous patients on the boat "Westfield," asking that one or more of the upper stories of the new pier to be erected at the foot of Jackson st. be devoted to the purposes of this clinic, and requested the endorsement and co-operation of the Trustees if this petition met with their approval. After consideration, it was resolved to inform the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries that the Board approves of the suggestion of the Local Committee, and that the President or one of the other Trustees would be glad to accompany the Commissioner should he desire to look over the situation in person.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but not to be applied at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all person interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
