PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS.

No. 809 (Ord. No. 88).

The City Club of New York—Communication Transmitting Proposed Ordinance to Amend Section 240 of Article 17, of Chapter 23 of the Code, Relating to Vaults.

The City Club of New York, 55 West 44th Street, September 25, 1918.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, City Hall:

Sir—The City Club having examined the present City practice with respect to vault rentals and the practice suggested in the report of the Commission on New Sources of City Revenue, begs to suggest for your consideration the following:

Present Ordinance—Persons desiring to construct vaults apply to the Borough President for permits, and in making application are obliged to state the number of square feet of ground desired and the dimensions. A charge of not less than 30 cents nor more than \$2 per square foot of ground is made by the Borough President. This is not an annual charge but is levied only once. Provisions are included for refund of overcharge and a penalty of double the amount is charged whenever the vault exceeds the dimensions specified in the permit. Other provisions relate to construction, protection of openings, railing and covers.

Mr. Lewis' Report—In a report made in 1909, Mr. Nelson P. Lewis, Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate, examined eighteen vaults typical of those in use in Manhattan. These vaults for which permits were issued between 1857 and 1906 have yielded the City a total of \$18,742.08 on the initial payments and have paid no revenue or rental since the issuance of the permits. Mr. Lewis proposed a charge which should be the sum obtained by multiplying the number of square feet in the vault by 5 per cent. of the value of the average square foot of the abutting land. On this basis he estimates that the City would receive an annual rental of \$108,014.51 from these eighteen vaults.

Objections to Mr. Lewis' Method—Our feeling is that his charge would be unjustly levied in that differences in depth of lot vitally affect the sum and would provide different rentals for identical vaults side by side. The Commission itself recognizes this fact on page 24 of its report in the following language:

"It has been suggested, and might be contended with merit, that the value of vaults is reflected by the value of frontage of the abutting property and the depth of such lots is of no consequential consideration in the determination of the same. If such be the case, it follows that the basis of rental should be upon the frontage value of the abutting property and not upon the value of the entire lot. A specific illustration that would more forcibly bring out this point is a case where there are two adjoining lots, both of the same frontage dimensions, but of different depths, vaults adjoining these lots and of the same measurements, all other things being equal, would be of the same value, and yet rentals based upon the average value per square foot of the abutting property would subject these vaults to additional sums of rental."

The system prevailing in Chicago, wherein the depth of the proposed vault effects the rental is worthy of mention. In some instances the sub-surface space extends to the depth of several floors and utilized by the abutting property owner for commercial as well as pecuniary advantage, it is not unfair to exact a proportionate increase for such additional use."

The Commission therefore in its recommendations suggests an annual rental determined by multiplying the area of the vault by one-half of one per cent. of the value of the average square foot of the abutting property when computed on the basis of a standard inside lot 100 feet in depth. On this basis the eighteen typical vaults cited in the Lewis report would yield annual rentals of \$6,092.77 as against the Chief Engineer's estimated \$108,014.51.

Application—On this basis the City Club's coal bin, for example, would yield about \$38.75, a sum which we would be glad to pay annually to the City. The bin occupies a space approximately 10 by 20 feet. The assessed value of the Club's plot, which is an inside lot 100 feet in depth is \$155,000. The value of the average square foot is therefore, \$38.75. One-half of one per cent. of this multiplied by the area of the vault also equals \$38.75. This may be high rental for a coal bin, but we have the space and it is not the City's fault that we choose to use it for that purpose. Practically all the big department stores have basements extending under the sidewalks in which to retail goods. Horn & Hardart's restaurant at 42d street near 5th avenue is almost entirely beneath the sidewalk. Haan's restaurant in Park row has three or more small dining rooms below the sidewalk. On this publicly owned space these concerns make a substantial return for which they make no regular payment—

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen, City Hall, N. Y.:

Gentlemen—Would respectfully request your permission to purchase in the open market, without public letting, butter for the Departments of Public Charities, Correction, Health and Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for the month of October in an amount not to exceed \$38,129.

On September 18, 1918, the Central Purchase Committee held an advertised bid opening for supplying, through contract, butter for the above named departments. Only two bids were received at this opening, which were as follows:

\$0.584 and \$0.64 per pound.

As the successful bidder proposed to furnish storage butter, having written same on his bid, the bid was declared informal and therefore rejected, and steps taken to prepare a new contract.

Due to the United States Government taking over 60 per cent. of the supply of butter for the use of the Army and Navy, no doubt it will be impossible for this Committee to contract for it during the month of October except at an exorbitant price. The commodity being scarce on the market, makes it impossible for any one

concern to guarantee delivery in any large quantity, thereby preventing them from entering into a contract.

We know it will be to the advantage of the City to purchase our supply of butter weekly, as this will enable us to watch the market conditions and purchase quantities of butter from any dealer or dealers according to the supply they might have on hand. By doing this it will enact quite a saving to the City rather than by having the butter contracted for.

An Ordinance to Amend Article 2 of Chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to "Traffic Regulations," and Particularly to "Rules of the Road."

By Alderman Curley—

AN ORDINANCE to amend article 2 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "traffic regulations," and in particular to "rules of the road."

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision 13 of section 11 of article 2 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

13. Obstructing traffic. No vehicle shall be allowed to remain upon or be driven through any street, so as [willfully] to blockade or obstruct the traffic of that street.

Sec. 2. Subdivision 1 of section 17 of article 2 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

1. General provisions. No person shall operate, drive or propel, and no owner thereof riding thereon or therein shall cause or permit to be operated, driven or propelled, on any street or public place, any bicycle, tricycle, velocipede, motorcycle, motor-tricycle, motor delivery wagon, or motor vehicle, however propelled, or any vehicle which runs on rails or tracks or is drawn by horses or other animals, recklessly or negligently, or at a speed or in a manner so as to endanger, or to be likely to endanger, the life or limb or property of any person. A rate of speed exceeding 15 miles per hour shall constitute prima facie evidence of a prohibited rate of speed and manner of driving, and of a violation of the provisions of this section; a rate of speed exceeding 20 miles per hour shall constitute a prohibited rate of speed and manner of driving, and a violation of the provisions of this section, and a rate of speed exceeding 25 miles per hour, on a public highway which passes through country or outlying sections that are substantially undeveloped and sparsely settled, shall constitute a prohibited rate of speed and manner of driving, and a violation of the provisions of this section.

Section 3. Subdivision 6 of section 17 of article 2 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

6. Exceptions. Nothing contained in any of the provisions of subdivision 1 of this section as to specific rates of speed, nor in any of the provisions of either subdivisions 2, 3, 4 or 5 hereof, shall apply [to vehicles which run only on rails or tracks nor] to any of the following vehicles, when the same are responding for emergency work in case of fire, accident, public disaster or impending danger, to wit: wagons, trucks and apparatus of the fire department, the insurance patrol, the police department, the bureaus of buildings or the militia; ambulances, or the emergency repair wagons of public service corporations.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

An Ordinance Establishing a Division of Oral Hygiene in the Bureau of Child Hygiene of the Department of Health.

By Aldermen Lee, Calman and Braunstein—
AN ORDINANCE establishing a Division of Oral Hygiene in the Bureau of Child Hygiene of the Department of Health.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

Section 1. There shall be established a Division of Oral Hygiene in the Bureau of Child Hygiene in the Department of Health.

Sec. 2. The purpose of such division shall be to establish and maintain such clinics and other agencies as may be necessary to secure for the children of the public schools adequate prevention and protection from dental deterioration and disease.

Sec. 3. The grades of positions within the said division shall be such as may be from time to time determined by the Board of Aldermen upon the recommendation of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Commissioner of Health.

Sec. 4. The said division shall be organized immediately and upon its organization shall take over and operate the dental clinics now existing under the jurisdiction of the said Department of Health.

Sec. 5. The said division shall immediately upon its organization proceed to establish at least nine additional dental clinics in those public schools where the greatest need is found to exist, and shall from time to time continue the establishment of such further clinics as may be found necessary to carry out the provisions of this act.

Sec. 6. The Commissioner of Health shall include in the Department of Health estimates for 1919 a sum sufficient to meet the cost of the said division for the said year.





TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchman or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid, and that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.
