AN ACT to amend chapter three hundred and thirty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-three, entitled "An act to reorganize the local government of the city of New York," as amended by chapter four hundred of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy eight.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows

Section 1. Section four of chapter three hundred and thirty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-three, entitled "An act to reorganize the local government of the city of New York," as amended by chapter four hundred of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, is hereby amended so as to read as follows :

amended of by chapter four hour advector for the taws of eighteen inducted and seventy-tight, is hereby amended so as to read as follows: § The board of aldermen, now in office, shall hold office until the first Monday in January, in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-two, the same being the term for which they were elected. There shall be twenty-four aldermen elected at the general election, which shall occur in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-one, one of whom shall be elected in the territory embraced in each assembly district, as the same existed on the first day of January, eighteen hundred and eighty-one, and shall be residents of the district in which they are elected. The members of the board of alder-men shall hold office for the space of one year, and shall take office on the first Monday in January next succeeding their election, at noon. Annually thereafter at the general election there shall be elected a full board of aldermen as hereinbefore provided. Any vacancy now existing or which may hereafter occur in the board of aldermen by reason of the death or resignation, or of any other cause, of a member of said board, shall be filled by election by said board by a vote of a majority of all the members elected to said board; and the person so elected to fill any such vacancy shall serve until the first day of January, at noon, next succeeding the first general election occurring not less than thirty days aiter the happening of such vacancy, but not beyond the expiration of the term in which the vacancy shall occur; at such election a person shall be elected to serve the remainder, if any, of such unexpired term. From and after the termination of the term of office of the board of assistant aldermen, as herein provided, the board of aldermen shall alone constitute the common council, and shall exercise the entire legislative powers of the said city. § 2. This act s'.all take effect immediately. Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 8, 1881.
