

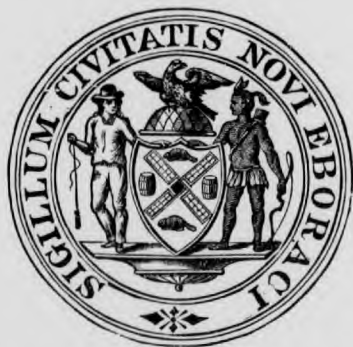

Whereas, The Board of Police has received a communication from the Board of Excise, inclosing schedule of druggists whom they allege are selling liquor in violation of law; therefore,

Resolved, That the Superintendent be and he is hereby directed to issue a general order commanding the members of the Police force to rigidly enforce the Excise Law, and especially to see that the sale or disposition of liquors, wines and ales in any place, without a license therefor, be, so far as possible, suppressed.

Whereas, At a meeting of the Board of Police, held February 27, 1885, Sergeant Elbert O. Smith was promoted to the rank of Captain, provided the said Smith will not require examination under the Civil Service rules; therefore,

Resolved, That the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation be and is hereby respectfully requested, whether the Board of Police has the authority to advance Sergeants to the grade of Captain of Police without submitting candidates for such promotion to competitive examination by the Civil Service Examining Boards.

Resolved, That in pursuance of section 181 of the Laws of 1882, application is hereby made to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to authorize the lease of premises No. 34 East Twenty-ninth street, for the purposes of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York (for the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York), as a Station-house, Lodging-house and Prison for the Twenty-fifth Police Precinct, for one year, from May 1, 1885, at the yearly rent of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500) and taxes, assessments and Croton water rents, and the same covenants and conditions, provided that notice be given to the lessor by the Board of Police, on or before February 1, 1886, of their intention to renew and further extend said lease for one year at such increased rental of two thousand dollars (\$2,000).

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending March 14, 1885, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending March 7, 1885.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 777 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, March 14, 1885, which is an increase of 1, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 144 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1884. The actual mortality for the week ending March 7, 1885, was 779, which is 89.4 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 29.26 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,384,637.
