

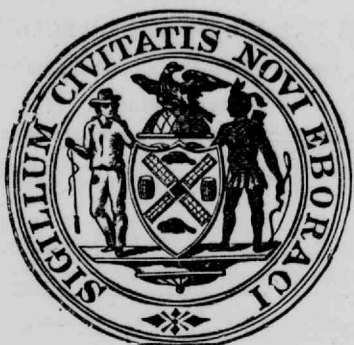

BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVEMENT.

Minutes of December, 1881.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met in the Mayor's Office on Saturday, December 9, 1881, at 3 P. M.

The following members were present, viz.:

Wm. R. Grace, Mayor; Allan Campbell, Comptroller; Hubert O. Thompson, Commissioner of Public Works; Patrick Keenan, President of the Board of Aldermen.

The reading of the minutes of the last meeting was, on motion, dispensed with.

Mr. Bartlett, on behalf of Messrs. J. J. Astor and Wm. Astor, appeared before the Board and argued against the proposed widening of Gansevoort street.

Mr. Goelet appeared and expressed his opposition to the widening of Thirteenth street, south side.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement deem it to be for the public interest to widen Gansevoort street twenty (20) feet, from Washington street to the intersection of Gansevoort street and West Thirteenth street, the lands necessary for the proposed widening to be taken on the north side of Gansevoort street.

Which was lost by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor and the Comptroller.

Negative—The Commissioner of Public Works and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

The Commissioner of Public Works offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement deem it to be for the public interest to widen, and they propose to widen, Gansevoort street twenty (20) feet, from Washington street to the intersection of said Gansevoort street and West Thirteenth street; that said Board also deem it to be for the public interest to widen, and they propose to widen, West Thirteenth street twenty (20) feet, from Eighth avenue to the intersection of said West Thirteenth street and said Gansevoort street; that the land necessary for said proposed widening of said Gansevoort street be taken from the lands situated and lying north of the present lines of said Gansevoort street, and the land necessary for said proposed widening of said West Thirteenth street be taken from the lands situated and lying south of the present lines of said West Thirteenth street and Gansevoort street.

The Chairman put the question upon the adoption of the foregoing resolution.

Which was lost by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Commissioner of Public Works and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

Negative—The Mayor and the Comptroller.

The Comptroller thereupon renewed his motion for the adoption of the resolution previously offered by him.

Which was lost by the same vote as before.

The Commissioner of Public Works thereupon offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement deem it to be for the public interest to widen, and they propose to widen, Gansevoort street twenty (20) feet, from Washington street to the intersection of said Gansevoort street and West Thirteenth street; and that said Board also deem it to be for the public interest to widen, and they propose to widen, West Thirteenth street ten (10) feet, from Eighth avenue to the intersection of said West Thirteenth street and said Gansevoort street; that the land necessary for said proposed widening of said Gansevoort street be taken from the lands situated and lying north of the present northerly line of said Gansevoort street, and the land necessary for said proposed widening of said West Thirteenth street be taken from the lands situated and lying south of the present southerly line of said West Thirteenth street and Gansevoort street.

The Chairman put the question upon the adoption of this resolution.

Which was adopted by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

The President of the Board of Aldermen offered for adoption the following resolution: Resolved, That the proposed action of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, as stated in the foregoing resolution, be laid before the Board of Aldermen, and that the same be published for ten days in the CITY RECORD.

Which was adopted by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

The meeting then adjourned.

Minutes of March, 1882.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met at the Mayor's office at 12 o'clock, M., Monday, March 13, 1882.

The following members were present, viz.:

Wm. R. Grace, Mayor; Allan Campbell, Comptroller; Hubert O. Thompson, Commissioner of Public Works; William Sauer, President of the Board of Aldermen.

The Mayor read the following communication:

NEW YORK, February 27, 1882.

Hon. WM. R. GRACE, Chairman Board of Street Opening, etc.:

SIR—I hereby tender my resignation as Secretary of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement.

Upon motion of the Commissioner of Public Works, the resignation was accepted and ordered on file.

The Comptroller then moved that Mr. William M. Ivins be appointed Temporary Secretary. The motion was unanimously adopted.

The minutes of the last meeting were, upon motion, read by the Temporary Secretary.

Upon motion of the Comptroller, the minutes were approved.

The Commissioner of Public Works offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That this Board address its notice, in the form following, to the Counsel to the Corporation, relative to its proceedings in the matter of the widening of Gansevoort and Thirteenth streets:

Hon. WM. C. WHITNEY, Counsel to the Corporation:

SIR—In accordance with the resolutions adopted by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement on the 13th day of March, 1882, copies of which are hereto annexed, you are hereby required, pursuant to the provisions of section 105 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, entitled "An act to reorganize the local government of the City of New York," to take proceedings, in the name of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, to acquire title for the use of the public to the land required for the widening of Gansevoort and West Thirteenth streets, as set forth in said resolutions and as shown on the map accompanying this requisition.

The resolution was adopted, all the members voting in the affirmative.

The Commissioner of Public Works moved the adoption of the resolution.

Which, being seconded by the Comptroller, a vote was taken, with the following result, viz.: Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

The resolution was declared adopted.

Mr. Hubert O. Thompson, Commissioner of Public Works, offered the following resolution:

Whereas, At a meeting of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, held on the 9th day of December, 1881, it was resolved, that the said Board "deems it to be for the public interest to widen, and it proposes to widen, Gansevoort street twenty (20) feet, from Washington street to the intersection of said Gansevoort street and West Thirteenth street; that the said Board also deems it to be for the public interest to widen, and it proposes to widen, West Thirteenth street ten (10) feet, from Eighth avenue to the intersection of said West Thirteenth and said Gansevoort streets; that the land necessary for the proposed widening of said Gansevoort street be taken from the lands situated and lying north of the present northerly line of said Gansevoort street, and the land necessary for said proposed widening of said West Thirteenth street be taken from the lands situated and lying south of the present southerly lines of said West Thirteenth and Gansevoort streets;"

Whereas, Said proposed action of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement has been communicated to and laid before the Board of Aldermen, and full notice of the same has been published for ten days in the CITY RECORD; therefore

Resolved, By the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, that Gansevoort street, from Washington street to the intersection of said Gansevoort and West Thirteenth streets, be and the same is hereby widened twenty (20) feet, and that West Thirteenth street, from Eighth avenue to the intersection of said West Thirteenth and Gansevoort streets, be and the same is hereby taken from the lands situated and lying north of the present northerly line of said Gansevoort street, and the land necessary for said widening of said West Thirteenth street be and the same is hereby taken from the lands situated and lying south of the present southerly lines of said West Thirteenth and Gansevoort streets;

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be instructed to take the necessary proceedings to acquire title to the lands required for the widening of Gansevoort and West Thirteenth streets, as set forth in the foregoing resolution, and for this purpose to make application to the Supreme Court for the appointment of commissioners of estimate and assessment, in the manner provided by law, for acquiring title to lands required for the widening of streets in the City of New York.

Which was adopted by the following vote, viz.:

The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, and the President of the Board of Aldermen.

Upon motion of the Comptroller, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the maps which have been prepared and which show Gansevoort and Thirteenth streets as widened and altered, be filed, one in the Department of Public Works and one in the office of the Corporation Counsel, and that the said maps be certified to by this Board in form following:

We certify that the above is a correct map, showing Gansevoort street, from Washington street to the intersection of Gansevoort and West Thirteenth streets, from Eighth avenue to the intersection of Gansevoort and West Thirteenth streets, as widened by the Board of Street Opening and Improvement on the 13th day of March, 1882.
