

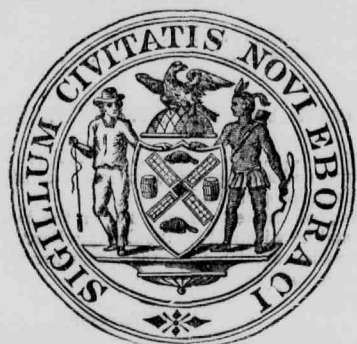

### APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances, resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the Week ending November 29, 1879.

Resolved, That the Department of Public Parks be and is hereby requested and, so far as this Board has the power, directed to refuse consent to the erection of any more buildings or other incumbrances upon the Battery Park by either of the elevated railway companies; and be it further

Resolved, That the said elevated railway companies be and they are hereby directed to construct their tracks only upon, in, and through the streets laid down and designated therefor by the Common Council of this city, by the proceedings had and taken and resolutions passed, September 6, 1875.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, October 17, 1879.

Approved by the Mayor, November 10, 1879.

Whereas, The Association of the Bar of the City of New York, through Elliott F. Shepard, Esq., committee for that purpose, have petitioned this Body to set apart suitable rooms in the County Court-house for the use of the lawyers of said city during their attendance at said court-house, said petition being concurred in and recommended by Judges of the various courts held in said building; and

Whereas, The two rooms on the main floor of the County Court-house, heretofore occupied by the Commissioner of Jurors, have been vacated, and are no longer required by said Commissioner; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the two rooms on either side of the main entrance on Chambers street, of the County Court-house of the City and County of New York, heretofore occupied and now vacated be the Commissioner of Jurors, be and are hereby set apart for the exclusive use of the members of the Bar while in attendance upon the Courts sitting in said building, during the pleasure of the Common Council, and the Commissioner of Public Works is directed to carry this resolution into effect.

Approved by the Mayor, November 24, 1879.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the owners of property on Christopher street, between Greenwich and Washington streets, to straighten and widen sidewalk on the northerly side thereof, so that said sidewalk will be of a uniform width of twenty feet from Washington street to a point seventy-five feet from Greenwich street, and from that point to the present curb at the corner of Greenwich and Christopher streets of the width included in a straight line between these points, as shown on the annexed diagram, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

GENTLEMEN—At a special meeting of the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, called pursuant to the provisions of section 112 of chapter 335, Laws of 1873, for the consideration and investigation of the Provisional Estimate for the year 1880, held in the chamber of the Board, in the City Hall, on Monday, November 24, 1879, the said Provisional Estimate was duly considered, and the following amendments or rectifications made thereto, viz.:

Department of Police—Salaries of Clerks, Deputies, Stenographers, etc., increased from \$40,000 to \$60,000.

Fire Department—Repair Shop Pay-roll, increased from \$45,000 to \$50,000.

Fire Department—Bureau of Chief of Department Pay-roll, increased from \$32,700 to \$37,700.

Common Council—Salaries of Clerks and officers of the Board of Aldermen, increased from \$16,200 to \$18,000.

Hon. EDWARD COOPER, Mayor, and Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—I would respectfully request that the following sums be transferred from the respective appropriations, for the purposes of which they are not needed, to the appropriations hereinafter named.

The sum of four thousand three hundred dollars (\$4,300) from the appropriation "Public Buildings—Construction, and Repairs;" and the sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200) from the appropriation "Free Floating Baths—For Bath at foot of Seventeenth street, East river," both of 1879, to the appropriation "Supplies for and Cleaning Public Buildings," for 1879.

Hon. EDWARD COOPER, Mayor, and Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—The exigencies of the works under the charge of this Department require that some additions be made to several of its appropriations, and the sums so required may be taken from other appropriations made to the Department, being in excess of the requirements of such appropriations.

I would, therefore, respectfully request your Board to make the following transfers:

First—From the appropriation for "Repaving Streets and Avenues, under chapter 476, Laws of 1875," for 1879, the sum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500); from the appropriation for "Wells and Pumps, Repairing and Cleaning," for 1879, the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000); and from the appropriation for "Bridge across Fourth Avenue, at One Hundred and Sixteenth street," the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000)—being a total sum of forty-five hundred dollars (\$4,500), to the appropriation for "Repairing and Renewal of Pipes, Stopcocks, etc.," for 1879.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

The Trustees of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge have applied for a final payment on the appropriation for the construction of the bridge, under chapter 300, Laws of 1875.

As the amount of any payment due depends upon the legal interpretation of the provision of section 4 of said act, relative to the charge to be made of interest on the bonds issued, I have requested the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation on this point, and I herewith submit my communication to him with his reply, for the consideration of the Board, and such action thereon as may be deemed proper.

All the bonds authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment have been issued, and the amount paid over to the Bridge Trustees, and, as stated in my communication, requisitions have been made by the Trustees for the whole amount of the appropriation.

On November 1, 1879, the apparent balance, after deducting payments and interest to that date, was \$221,916.35.

Hon. WILLIAM C. WHITNEY, Counsel to the Corporation:

SIR—The Trustees of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge have applied for the payment of the balance due by the City of New York on the appropriation made by chapter 300 of the Laws of 1875, for the construction of the Bridge.

I desire your opinion upon the provision contained in section 4 of the act, as to the withholding of interest from the payments provided for, and especially as regards the final payment which is now demanded.

The facts are briefly as follows:

The Trustees have made, from time to time, requisitions upon the City of New York for the whole amount of the appropriation, \$2,666,666.66, the last requisition dated October 6, 1879, being for \$166,666.66.

The question is, what amount, under the provision of law referred to, shall be paid to the Bridge Trustees as a final payment on the appropriation?

1. Shall prospective interest, or interest to accrue on the bonds issued, or to be issued, be charged to the Bridge Trustees and be withheld by the Comptroller?  
2. To what date shall interest be calculated on the bonds issued, to arrive at the amount to be paid as a final payment on the appropriation?

Hon. JOHN KELLY, Comptroller:

SIR—In your letter to me of the 15th instant, you state the following facts:

The Trustees of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge have applied for the payment of the balance due by the City of New York from the appropriation made by chapter 300 of the Laws of 1875, for the construction of the bridge. Such trustees have heretofore made, from time to time, requisitions, the last requisition dated October 6, 1879, being for \$166,666.66.

The amount appropriated by said act was..... \$2,666,666 66  
Payments have been made to the trustees of..... 2,200,000 00

The interest paid on bonds heretofore issued amounts to..... \$466,666 66  
244,750 31

Apparent balance due the trustees..... \$221,916 35

For the purpose of determining what shall be the amount or the final payment to the trustees, you request my opinion upon the following questions.

First—Shall prospective interest, or interest to accrue on the bonds issued, or to be issued, be charged to the trustees, and be withheld by the Comptroller?

Second—To what date shall interest be calculated on the bonds issued, to arrive at the amount of such final payment.

First—I think it is very clear that interest to accrue hereafter on bonds issued, or to be issued, cannot be charged to the trustees, or withheld by the Comptroller. Looking merely to the text of the statute, such a course could not be justified, for the reason, among others, that it is provided that after the completion of the bridge, the income shall be applied to the payment of the principal of the bonds to be issued by the Cities of New York and Brooklyn, and also to the payment of the interest on such bonds. This provision is wholly inconsistent with the idea that all prospective interest on the bonds shall be deducted from the payments to the trustees. Moreover, such a construction of the statute might defeat the plain intent of the legislature, which was, as has been decided by the Court of Appeals, to require the Cities of Brooklyn and New York to raise and pay over to the trustees the sum of eight millions of dollars, of which one-third was to be provided by the City of New York. There is nothing in the statute which determines how long the bonds shall have to run; and if bonds having fifteen or more years to run should be issued, and prospective interest for the whole period should be deducted, there would be nothing, or but a small sum, left to be paid over to the trustees. Such a construction of the act would, of course, be inadmissible.

Second—As far as the City of New York is concerned, the law places no restriction upon the trustees as to the times when they may call for the money appropriated by the act, except that the city shall not be required to pay more than one million of dollars in any one year. The trustees are expressly authorized, from time to time, as they shall deem necessary, to call for such sums as they shall deem proper, up to said amount.

If, therefore, the amount covered by the last requisition, of October 6, 1879, together with the amounts paid by the city during the twelve months prior to that time, do not exceed one million of dollars, the trustees were entitled to receive the amount of such requisition upon the presentation thereof to the Comptroller, and it follows that interest should be charged up to that date only.
