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COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting held at the Mayor's Office at 1 o'clock P. M. on Friday, October 12, 1894.

Present—Thomas F. Gilroy, Mayor; Ashbel P. Fitch, Comptroller; Joseph J. O'Donohue, Chamberlain, and Nicholas T. Brown, Chairman Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen. The minutes of the meeting held October 3, 1894, were read and approved.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Public Works for lease of Beard's Clinton Street Basin, South Brooklyn, for storage of free floating baths:

Hon. THOMAS F. GILROY, Chairman, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

DEAR SIR—For the last four years, the fifteen free floating baths, when out of commission, have been stored in Gowanus Bay, under leases authorized by your Board to be made with Mr. John Gilbertson, at the rental of \$1.50 a day for each bath. For these years the offers of Mr. Gilbertson were considered the most advantageous both in respect to price and the suitability and safety of the storage place. For the ensuing winter season, or in fact for the storage of the baths to begin at once, as they are now all out of commission, an offer has been received from Mr. Theodore M. Roche, No. 280 Broadway, to store the fifteen baths in what is known as Beard's Clinton Street Basin, between the foot of Clinton street and the foot of Columbia street, South Brooklyn, for the sum of \$1.25 per day for each bath. Mr. Gilbertson's offer for the old storage place is at the old price of \$1.50 per day for each bath.

The Superintendent of Repairs and Supplies, and the foreman in charge of the baths, have examined the proposed new storage place, and have reported that it is safe and convenient. Considering this, and the reduction of twenty-five cents in the price, I respectfully recommend and request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorize the making of a lease with Mr. Theodore M. Roche for the immediate storage of the free floating baths at the place above-described until the commencement of the bathing season of 1895, on or about June 1, for the sum of \$1.25 per day for each bath, to be paid only for the days that each bath shall actually be and remain in storage.

SIR—I desire that the resolution adopted by the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on the 30th day of March, 1894, consenting to and approving of the leasing by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning of the first floor and basement of the premises No. 202 East Sixty-fifth street, as a section station, be modified, by striking out the clause "with the privilege of three yearly renewals at the same rental."

It was understood at the time the lease was entered into that the lessor would not give any renewals, and the lease contains no renewal clause.

GENTLEMEN—By a resolution of the Board of Aldermen adopted August 28, 1894, and approved by the Acting Mayor August 31, 1894, permission was given Valentine Loewer to lay a six (6) inch iron pipe to contain two pipes of smaller diameter, one for conducting hot water and the other for steam from No. 527 West Forty-first street to No. 530 West Forty-first street, as shown on diagram herewith submitted, upon the payment to the City as compensation for the privilege such amount as may be determined upon as an equivalent therefor by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; provided the said Valentine Loewer shall stipulate with the Commissioner of Public Works to save the City harmless from any loss or damage that may be occasioned by the exercise of the privilege thereby given during the progress or subsequent to the completion of laying said pipes.

From an examination made by the Assistant Engineer of the Finance Department, whose report is herewith submitted, it appears that the distance between curbs in the line of this proposed laying of pipes is thirty feet, and that sixty dollars per annum would be a fair charge for the privilege, with a fee of ten dollars for opening the street.

I accordingly submit the following resolution for such action as the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may deem advisable.

Resolved, That the compensation to be paid to the City by Valentine Loewer for the privilege of laying a six (6) inch iron pipe to contain two pipes of smaller diameter, one for conducting hot water and the other for steam from No. 527 West Forty-first street to No. 530 West Forty-first street, shall be sixty dollars per annum, and a fee of ten dollars for opening the street, to be paid to the Department of Public Works, the opening of the street and relaying of the pavement to be done at the expense of said Valentine Loewer, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works, and subject to such conditions as he shall prescribe; provided also, that the said Valentine Loewer shall give a satisfactory bond for the faithful performance of all conditions prescribed by the said Commissioner of Public Works, and by a resolution of the Board of Aldermen passed August 28, 1894, and approved by the Mayor August 31, 1894, said bond to be approved by the Comptroller and filed in his office; and provided further, that the right be reserved to revoke such permission at any future time, if necessary, in the interest of the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following resolution was received from the Clerk of the Common Council:

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Metropolitan Traction Company to lay a thirty-inch iron pipe for conducting salt water from the Harlem river through West One Hundred and Forty-sixth street to the premises of said Company, situated on the northwest corner of Lenox avenue and West One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, as shown on the accompanying diagram, upon payment to the City as compensation for the privilege such amount as may be determined an equivalent by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; provided the said Metropolitan Traction Company shall stipulate with the Commissioner of Public Works to save the City harmless from any loss or damage that may be occasioned by the exercise of the privilege hereby given during the progress or subsequent to the completion of the work of laying said pipe, the work to be done at the expense of the Company, under the direction and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Whereas, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a meeting held March 1, 1894, concurred in a resolution of the Board of Armory Commissioners adopted February 26, 1894, adopting the plans of Messrs. Cable & Sergeant for an armory for the Ninth Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y., provided that the cost of constructing said armory under said plans, including architect's fees, should not exceed the sum of two hundred and eighty-five thousand dollars (\$285,000), and authorized the Comptroller to issue bonds to the amount of two hundred and eighty-five thousand dollars (\$285,000) to provide for the payment of the same; and

Whereas, the Board of Armory Commissioners, at a meeting held October 11, 1894, adopted a resolution awarding the contract for erecting said armory to James D. Murphy, the lowest bidder therefor, his bid amounting to two hundred and ninety-seven thousand eight hundred dollars (\$297,800); and

Whereas, the Board of Armory Commissioners, at a meeting held October 11, 1894, adopted a preamble and resolution, from which it appears that the increased cost of erecting the said armory was due to the provisions of chapter 277 of the Laws of 1894, requiring all stone to be dressed within the State or municipality, and in which the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were requested to authorize the additional issue of bonds to the amount of twenty-seven thousand dollars (\$27,000) to be added to the amount already authorized, making the total sum required to be issued for the purposes aforesaid three hundred and twelve thousand dollars (\$312,000); therefore, be it

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 3, chapter 91 of the Laws of 1884, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund concur in the said resolutions and do hereby approve of said award of contract to James D. Murphy, for the erection of an armory for the Ninth Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y., on the north side of Fourteenth street, west of Sixth avenue, amounting to two hundred and ninety-seven thousand eight hundred dollars (\$297,800); and,

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 299 of the Laws of 1883, and the laws amendatory thereof and supplementary thereto, the Comptroller be and he hereby is authorized and directed to issue from time to time, as may be required, redeemable in not less than ten nor more than twenty years from the date of issue thereof, and at such rate of interest as he may determine, not exceeding three per cent., "Consolidated Stock of the City of New York," which shall also be designated "Armory Bonds," to the amount of twenty-seven thousand dollars (\$27,000), the proceeds of which stock or bonds shall be applied in payment of the contract for erecting an armory for the Ninth Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y., on the north side of Fourteenth street, west of Sixth avenue, and for the architect's fees connected therewith, in addition to the amount heretofore authorized to be issued for said purpose by a resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted March 1, 1894; and,

Resolved, That the said stock be and hereby is exempted from taxation by the City and County of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 137 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, and the ordinance of the Common Council approved by the Mayor October 2, 1880.

Which were unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller offered the following preamble and resolutions for the sale of the ferry franchise, from Ninety-second street, East river, to Astoria, Long Island.

Whereas, The Commissioner of the Sinking Fund, at a meeting held January 19, 1894, authorized the Comptroller to advertise a sale at public auction to the highest bidders, as provided by law and the ordinances of the Common Council, of the leases of the franchises of certain ferries, for a term of ten years, from May 1, 1894, together with the wharf property belonging to the Corporation of the City of New York (if any), which is used and required for ferry purposes at each of said ferries, upon terms and conditions of sale to be approved and upon appraisements to be fixed by said Board; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the appraisement of the annual rental of the franchise of the ferry from Ninety-second street, East river, to Astoria, Long Island, and of the annual rental of the wharf property used by said ferry and belonging to the Corporation of the City of New York, be and the same is hereby fixed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund as follows:

Annual rental of wharf property.....	\$700 00
Annual rental of franchise, \$2,500 per annum for the first five years; and for the second five years five per cent. of the gross receipts, such five per cent., however, not to be less in any one year than \$1,500; and,	

Resolved, That the following terms and conditions of sale be and are hereby approved and adopted:

Bids for the franchise only will be received and the wharf property belonging to the City will be subject to the yearly rental fixed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in addition to the rental to be paid for the franchise or license to operate the ferry.

No bids will be received for this ferry franchise which shall be less than its value as appraised and fixed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The highest bidder will be required to pay the auctioneer's fee, and to deposit with the Comptroller, at the time of sale, twenty-five per cent. of the yearly rental of the wharf property, and twenty-five per cent. also, of the minimum amount to be paid yearly for the franchise of the ferry, to be credited on the first quarter's rent, or to be forfeited to the City if the lease is not executed by the purchaser when notified that it is ready for execution.

Lessees will be required to give bonds in double the amount of the minimum yearly rentals with two sufficient sureties, to be approved by the Comptroller, conditioned for the faithful performance of the covenants and conditions of the lease, and the payment of the rent quarterly and in advance for the fixed rent payable on the wharf property.

The lease will contain the usual covenants and conditions, in conformity with the provisions of law and the ordinances of the Common Council relative to ferries, that the lessees will maintain and operate the ferry during the whole term, and will provide ample accommodation in the way of safe and capacious boats and frequency of trips, as to the sufficiency of which accommodation the decision of the Mayor and Comptroller shall be final; also conditions that the lessees will dredge the ferry slips, as required by the Department of Docks, and that, during the term of the lease, they will erect and build, at their own expense, and will at all times well and sufficiently repair, maintain and keep in good order all and singular the floats, racks, fenders, bridges and other fixtures at the landing places, and in the event of any damage to the bulkheads or piers from collision by their ferry-boats or otherwise, from any accident or negligence on their part, they will immediately repair and restore said wharf property to its previous condition, free of cost and expense to the City of New York; and also, that if at any time during the term of the lease the Department of Docks shall require any of the wharf property used for ferry purposes, in order to proceed with the waterfront improvement in the vicinity of the ferry landings, the said lessees shall surrender and vacate the premises without any claim upon the City for any damage whatever, upon written notice being given to the lessees three months in advance of the intention of said Department; and also that the rates of ferriage and charges for vehicles and freight shall not exceed the rates now charged. Sworn returns of the amounts of ferry receipts shall be made to the Comptroller when required by him, and the books of accounts of the ferry shall be subject to his inspection.

The lease shall also contain a covenant providing for the purchase at a fair valuation of the boats, buildings and other property of the lessees used in and actually necessary for the operation of said ferry upon the termination of the lease and the surrender and yielding up of the premises by the lessees, if the lessees shall not become the purchaser of the franchise for another term; but the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York shall not be deemed thereby to covenant to purchase said property in any event.

The right to reject any bid is reserved, if it is deemed for the interest of the City.

Which were unanimously adopted.

Second avenue (East Houston street to Twenty-third street), Third avenue (Bowery to Harlem river, Harlem river to One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street), Fourth avenue (Sixth street to Forty-second street, Fifth avenue (Sixth place to Fifty-ninth street), Sixth avenue (all), Seventh avenue (Forty-second street to Fifty-ninth street), Eighth avenue (Hudson street to Fifty-ninth street), Lexington avenue (all), Madison avenue (all), Fourteenth street (First avenue to Eighth avenue), Twenty-third street (all), Thirty-fourth street (East river to Tenth avenue), Forty-second street (Second avenue to Ninth avenue), Fifty-ninth street (First avenue to Tenth avenue), One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street (Third avenue to Ninth avenue).

Or for any streets under the control of the Department of Parks, Docks and Public Works, except upon the consent of the heads of those Departments.

All existing permits for the occupancy by unlicensed vehicles of any of the streets or portions of streets or places enumerated above are hereby revoked.

All unlicensed wagons, trucks or other vehicles standing in the streets or public places, other than those for which permits have been issued and which are in compliance with the conditions of the same will be seized and removed to the Corporation Yards of the Department of Street Cleaning, in pursuance of the provisions of the law.

Applications for permits as above must be made at the office of the Department of Street Cleaning, in the basement of the New Criminal Court-house, corner of Centre and Franklin streets. Entrance on Centre street.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
