SIR—I have made another examination of the pavement in Seventy-sixth street, between West End avenue and Riverside Drive, recently recommended by the Commissioner of Public Works for repavement with asphalt.

In reporting upon the list of streets, which included Seventy-sixth street, I recommended omitting several streets on the list and the repaving of some other streets where the pavements were in poorer condition, Seventy-sixth street being one of those omitted. Since my former examination, the pavement on this block has been torn up in the laying of gas or water pipes, and



as this street has already been paved with asphalt between Central Park, West, and West End avenue, I would recommend the continuing of this class of pavement to Riverside Drive by the repaving of this remaining block. The approximate area is 1,801 yards, and the estimated cost, \$5,943.30.

Hon. WILLIAM L. STRONG, Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIR—On August 17, I requested your Board to authorize me to repave with asphalt pavement, Eighty-first street, from First to Madison avenue.

The Comptroller's Engineer reported on September 23, to your Board, that from First to Third avenue, and from Park to Madison avenue, no objection.

Appropriations for these sections were authorized by your Board. He also reported that from Park to Third avenue, has a 3 3-10 per cent. grade, and, therefore, would not recommend this section for paving with sheet asphalt.

Remaining to be paved, 2,900 square yards.

On the same day I submitted a request to pave Eighty-first street, from Central Park, West, to Riverside Drive.

Comptroller's Engineer reported that from Ninth to Tenth avenue (Columbus to Amsterdam) was over 3 1/2 per cent. grade, and that he did not deem it advisable to pave it with asphalt.

The other sections (from Central Park, West, to Amsterdam avenue, and from Amsterdam avenue to Riverside Drive) were authorized for repavement by your Board, and appropriation made.

Remaining to be paved, 2,767 square yards.

On the same date I also submitted Eighty-fourth street, from Columbus avenue to Riverside Drive.

The Comptroller's Engineer reported that the grade between West End avenue and Boulevard is over 3 1/2 per cent. and would not advise repavement with asphalt. No objections to repavement between Columbus avenue and Boulevard, and West End avenue and Riverside Drive.

Your Board authorized an appropriation for the last-named sections.

Remaining to be paved, 1,030 square yards.

I therefore recommend to your Board that the following-named sections be repaved with asphalt block on concrete foundation, the same having been reported unfavorably, by the Comptroller's Engineer, for repavement with sheet asphalt:

SIR—The Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards in communication, November 26, 1897, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requests the consent and approval of the Board of the plan submitted for the construction and improvement of Boscobel place, near the easterly end of Washington Bridge, which is shown and designated as a public place on the map or plan of section 15 of the final maps and profiles of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of the City of New York, under the provisions of chapter 640 of the Laws of 1897.

He also asks the Board to direct the Comptroller to provide funds for the construction of the same. An approximate estimate is submitted amounting to \$39,062, and he asks for an appropriation of \$40,000 to cover any deficiency that may arise.

Section 1 of chapter 640, Laws of 1897, sets apart and appropriates "for a public place to be known as Boscobel place," all those pieces or parcels of land situate in the Twenty-fourth Ward, extending from Undercliff avenue to Boscobel avenue, south of the Washington Bridge, and shown and designated as a public place on the map or plan of section 16 of the final maps and profiles of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and directs as follows, "and the commissioner of street improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards shall proceed immediately to construct and improve the same."

Section 2 says: "The cost and expense of the acquisition of said public place shall be borne by the mayor, etc., of the city of New York," and shall be paid out of the funds for Street and Park Openings in the manner provided for by existing laws, and whenever the cost and expense of the acquisition shall exceed the balance remaining in said fund, after deducting all outstanding claims, "the comptroller shall and he is hereby authorized to raise by the issue of bonds for and on account of said fund, such amounts as shall be necessary to pay such cost and expense; and the cost and expense of the construction and improvement of said public place shall be paid by the issue of revenue bonds, which the comptroller of the city of New York is hereby authorized and directed to issue therefor, and the redemption thereof shall be provided for by the board of estimate and apportionment in the final estimate for the year succeeding the year in which any contract therefor shall become due and payable."

The title to the property was vested in the City, September 10, 1897.

The law is mandatory throughout, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is required to provide for the redemption of the bonds issued by the Comptroller in the manner expressed in the law.

The improvement, as laid down on the plans submitted by the Commissioner, will be a very fine and desirable addition to the easterly approach to the bridge; but I do not see what action can be taken by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at this time, since the law does not require it to approve or consent to the plan.

NEW PUBLIC SCHOOL 173.

DECEMBER 18, 1897.

This new building is to be erected on the south side of East One Hundred and Eighty-third street, between Beaumont and Cambreling avenues, Belmont, occupying a site in the midst of a thickly populated district which has long been without school accommodations, most of the children being obliged to walk nearly one mile to the Fordham or West Farms schools.

The plot of ground is 200 feet front by 125 feet in depth, and the building will be 176 feet front, thus leaving a side entrance to the yards at the rear.

The building will be five stories in height and of fireproof construction of the steel skeleton type. The materials of the exterior will be Belleville brown stone, terra cotta and Croton Point front brick, the roof to be covered with Spanish tile.

The first story is divided into boys' and girls' play-room, wainscoted with glazed brick, floored with asphalt and fitted up with drinking sinks and lavatories. Provision is also made for a janitor's office and a medical inspector's room, the latter room being finished with a tiled floor and wainscoting, and provided with lavatories, closets, etc.

Entrance to the building for the pupils is by means of two broad flights of steps at either end of the building, and these are supplemented by a large central front opening communicating with the main stairway and both boys' and girls' play-rooms directly in the rear.

The second, third and fourth stories have been divided so as to provide for twenty-nine class rooms and one kindergarten room.

Particular attention has been given to the construction of the wardrobes, which are placed outside the class rooms to insure proper ventilation.

The fifth story is designed to provide for manual and physical training, lecture and reading rooms. Ample provision is also made for sanitary arrangements for children of both sexes who may use the proper floors.

The building will be heated and ventilated by means of the Plenum system, which provides for each child 30 cubic feet of fresh, warm air per minute, removing the foul and vitiated air as well. Each wardrobe has a coil of steam pipe introduced, which is used not only to accelerate ventilation, but also to dry the clothing when damp.

Sanitary appliances and furniture will be of the most modern and approved types.

The contract price for the building, which was passed by the Board of Education on December 15, 1897, is \$186,490, but this amount does not include pupils' closets or plumbing, as the question of a public sewer in the immediate neighborhood has not been finally settled.

ALTERATIONS OF THE CITY HALL, PURSUANT TO CHAPTER 632, LAWS OF 1897.

Gen. CHARLES H. T. COLLIS, Commissioner Public Works, New York City:

DEAR SIR—The contract for alterations of the City Hall was based on the assumption that the present Aldermanic Chamber was in condition to receive the Council of the Greater City (both bodies being practically the same number), with the exception that by authorization of an ordinance passed by the Board of Aldermen, the gas chandeliers and some of the fixtures were changed from gas to electric lighting.

I have had an application for the following additional work from the Hon. Randolph Guggenheimer, President-elect of the Council, and other members-elect of this body, as they feel that the present arrangements of the old chamber in these respects are not sufficiently good in character, or are damaged, so that the room does not compare favorably as it should with that of the new Aldermanic Chamber.

1. The new Charter provides that former Mayors are entitled to a seat at all meetings of the Council. For their convenience there should be twelve chairs, each with a metal plate engraved with the name of the Mayor entitled to same.

2. The entire woodwork and all plaster-work of side walls will receive three coats of Atlantic Mills lead and raw linseed oil of tones to be selected. New decorative frieze in keeping with the ceiling throughout the room. Columns repainted. Caps and cornices repainted and retouched with gold where required. The present ceiling to be thoroughly cleaned, but the existing fresco-work remains, being repaired if injured. Radiators and pipes to be finished in gold bronze. Finish the head of canopy with gold.

3. The benches, rails, desks and chairs throughout will be thoroughly refinished and left in perfect order. The tops of desks, where necessary, to have new gimps; also re-covered where injured.

4. The canopy will be entirely remade in silk velour, of two pieces backed together wherever exposed, with cords, tassels, bullion trimming and fringe, and left in perfect order. The windows will be redraped with the same material of such form as will be directed.

5. The carpet throughout will be of best American manufacture, best quality, solid color, Axminster, and extends throughout room and covering President's dais; also the public space in rear of room, including the making, lining and laying, complete. The present carpet is entirely worn out and will be removed by the contractor.

6. The benches at the rear are objected to and desired to be replaced with chairs. The only thing that will answer this purpose are opera chairs of a similar nature to those used in the gallery of the new Aldermanic Chamber. They will be made with folding seats, leather-covered. The back of birch, stained to match mahogany. Iron frames painted, and to be equal to chairs specified.

SIR—Replying to your letter of December 20, transmitting a copy of a communication from the Department of Public Parks, requesting the issue of bonds to the amount of \$30,000 to provide for the expense of the improvement of a portion of Crotona Park, on which is located the public building, pursuant to chapter 678 of the Laws of 1897, together with report of Engineer McLean thereon, referred to me by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for my opinion thereon, I have to say :

It was evidently the intention of the Legislature to provide the means for improving and beautifying a portion of Crotona Park in the immediate vicinity of the public building heretofore erected there for the use of the Department of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

To interpret the word "site" in the act strictly and technically would be to entirely nullify the act, for, inasmuch as the building heretofore erected occupies the entire plot of land consisting of the six city lots alluded to, there would be no possibility of expending any money in improving that portion of the park occupied by the building.

The act is entitled "An act to provide for the improvement of that portion of Crotona park on which is located the public building in the city of New York," and I am clearly of the opinion that the proper interpretation of the act is to hold that it intended to and does authorize the expenditure of not more than \$30,000 for the improvement of that portion of the park in the immediate vicinity of the building.

I therefore have to advise you that I see no legal objection which would prevent the Board from granting the request of the Park Department for the issuance of the bonds for the purpose indicated.

SIR—The Commissioner of Street Improvements, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, in communication of December 22, 1897, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requests the consent and approval of the Board "of the plans and specifications herewith submitted for the construction of a bridge and approaches over the Bronx river, between Williamsbridge and Woodlawn stations of the New York and Harlem Railroad, under the provisions of chapter 357 of the Laws of 1897."

He also asks that the Comptroller be directed to provide funds for the construction of the same to the amount of \$150,000 as authorized by said act.

The Commissioner incloses an estimate of cost amounting to \$149,364.25.

The general plans submitted are in sufficient detail to give a clear conception of the work to be done.

The specifications fully describe the manner of execution and the details of the various parts of the construction.

The work as shown on the plans and described in the specifications consists in building a stone bridge over the Bronx river with a span of 70 feet, with a 20-foot rise.

Another stone bridge over First street with a span of 50 feet; the soffit of the arch to be 21 feet above the roadway.

And a steel girder bridge over the tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad, with a span of 54 feet, and clear height above the tracks of 16 feet.

The work extends from Bronx terrace on the east to Webster avenue on the west.

From the bridge over the railroad to Bronx terrace the approach will be a roadway between retaining walls of stone masonry, with stone parapet walls throughout its length. The roadway will be 30 feet in width, with sidewalks each side 7 feet 6 inches, the parapet wall being 2 feet 6 inches thick. The width of the approach from out to out will be 50 feet.

From the westerly side of the railroad bridge the approach extends to the right and left, reaching Webster avenue.

The whole extent of the approaches above described are to be paved with Telford macadam pavement, except the bridge over the tracks which will be of asphalt.

The improvement will be a useful one. I think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may properly approve the plans and specifications, and authorize the issue of bonds to the amount of \$150,000 as requested by the Commissioner.

SIR—The Commissioner of Street Cleaning in communication of December 4, 1897, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmits two forms of contract, each in triplicate, designated respectively No. 1 and No. 2, for the construction of a conveyor for the dump at the foot of West One Hundred and Thirty-first street, "for which your Board, by a resolution of the 14th of October, 1897, authorized me to undertake the work at an expense not to exceed seven thousand five hundred (7,500) dollars."

He says the forms are submitted "in accordance with section 63 of the New York City Consolidation Act in order that you may, as therein provided, devise some means to secure a fair and reasonable opportunity for competition."

The plan he suggests is "to advertise in the CITY RECORD two contracts simultaneously receiving the bids for the two contracts at the same time, and then under the operation of the law and ordinances governing the awarding of the city contracts, to reject all the bids on that one of the two contracts which it would be disadvantageous to enter into, and to accept the lowest bid (which probably would be the only bid) on that one of the two which would be the more advantageous to enter into."

The work to be done under each of these contracts is as follows:

First—A conveyor with all appurtenances as hereinafter described.

Second—Necessary supports for the conveyor and driving mechanism.

Third—A boiler and engine of suitable size, with all machinery necessary to connect the engine to driving shaft of the conveyor.

Fourth—A suitable shed, covered with galvanized corrugated iron for inclosing the boiler and engine.

Fifth—A receiving platform for conveyor.

As will be noted this list contains considerable work outside of the conveyor.

The main difference in the contracts consists in the kind of conveyor called for.

Contract No. 1 specifies that "the conveyor is to be of the continuous bucket type, so designed that it will receive the material on the lower run and discharge it on the upper run without intermediate transfer."

Contract No. 2 specifies that "the conveyor is to be of the overlapping gravity bucket type, so arranged that it will receive material on the lower run and discharge it into bins on the upper run without intermediate transfer."

I learn from the Street Cleaning Department that the type of Contract No. 1 is covered by three patents, owned by the Link Belt and Engineering Company, and the type of Contract No. 2 is covered by three patents, owned by W. F. Morse, No. 58 Pine street. As I understand the matter the Commissioner will be satisfied with either type.

Section 63 of the Consolidation Act says "Except for repairs no patented pavement shall be laid, and no patented article shall be advertised for, contracted for, or purchased except under such circumstances that there can be a fair and reasonable opportunity for competition, the conditions to secure which shall be prescribed by the board of estimate and apportionment."

Nearly every important mechanical device is covered by patents.

It appears to me that the plan devised by the Commissioner would open the matter to as much competition as is possible, but as one type is as acceptable as the other, I do not see why the lowest bid received on both proposals should not be accepted and the award made on that.

This double bidding is unusual, but if the advertisements explain the arrangement, I cannot see anything illegal in the matter, if the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve the same.

SIRS—I am in receipt of a communication from Charles V. Adey, Esquire, Clerk of your Board, transmitting the papers in the matter of the application of Police Sergeant James P. Tucker for an appropriation of \$650, to reimburse him for expenses for defending his position before the Supreme Court, which was presented to your Board at a meeting held January 23, 1897, and referred to me.

I have examined the papers sent with Mr. Adey's letter, and find that there is no feature to distinguish the proceeding brought by Tucker to procure his reinstatement from the ordinary proceeding of certiorari instituted by a member of the Police Force who has been dismissed.

It is not, however, necessary to go into the facts of the case, or to discuss the amount of the claim of the applicant, for the reason, that in my opinion, the Board has no power to grant the request or Mr. Tucker, and I therefore recommend that it should be denied.

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment, New York City:

GENTLEMEN—A few days since the plans and specifications of steel cells, also heating, lighting and ventilating plans and specifications for the New City Prison were returned to your Honorable Board from the Comptroller's office, with estimates attached, calling for the sums of \$220,000 and \$80,000, respectively. The matter was temporarily laid aside under the impression that no immediate action was necessary.

I find, after careful investigation, that it is absolutely essential that certain portions of the work covered by plans and specifications referred to, be arranged for at once. This is particularly true regarding the heating and ventilating ducts, which are laid out with reference to the cells, as planned, and should be carried up and incorporated into the building during its construction. The manufacture of the cells will require an extended time, and the work should be progressing, that they may be placed in position the moment the building is ready.

I am disposed to urge the matter at this particular time, as I have taken more than ordinary interest in the arrangement of cells, etc., for the City Prison, and have devoted much time and attention to the subject.

The main part of the work having been arranged for under my jurisdiction, I feel justified in asking your Honorable Board that the sums asked for, based upon plans and specifications of steel cells, heating, lighting and ventilating, approved by Mr. George B. Post, Architect, representing the city, be appropriated during my term of office.

IN BOARD OF EXAMINERS, JANUARY 11, 1898.

The Board of Examiners met this day, 4 P. M.

The roll was called with the following result: Present—Thomas J. Brady, Commissioner of Buildings, in the chair, and Messrs. Dobbs, Post, Fryer, McMillan, Conover, Moore, O'Reilly and Bonner.

The minutes of January 4, 1898, were read, and, after amendment as to meeting hour of Board, were approved.

Petitions were then submitted for approval, as follows:

Plan 1136, Alterations to Buildings, 1897—H. G. Knapp, petitioner—To allow a one-story frame extension to be erected on south side of present building, to be used as a summer garden in connection with existing building; south front of said garden to be left open; sides to be covered with sheet metal and roof with plastic slate or tin; also to utilize the space over present verandas by inclosing and roofing same in the manner shown and described for other portions of building; this roof also to be covered with plastic slate or tin; all as stated in petition; northeast corner of St. Nicholas avenue and One Hundred and Eleventh street. Denied.

Plan 1148, Alterations to Buildings, 1897—John B. Snook & Sons, petitioners—To allow the construction of pent-house or mezzanine story in front bay on West street, without increasing the thickness of non-bearing walls for same; as shown on plan and as stated in petition; southeast corner Bank and West streets. Approved, on condition that the openings in wall between the main building and extension be provided with fire-proof doors on each side of said openings, and subject to the approval of the construction by the Commissioner of Buildings.

Plan 950, New Buildings, 1897—John Hauser, petitioner—To allow present thickness of upper story side walls to remain with openings into, as shown on plans, and as stated in petition; south side of One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, 90 feet west of Second avenue. Approved, on condition that the walls be laid up with cement and sand mortar, and subject to the approval of the construction by the Commissioner of Buildings.

Plan 952—New Buildings, 1897—John Hauser, petitioner—To allow thickness of walls inclosing staircase on first and upper stories to remain with the openings into, as stated in petition; north side of One Hundred and Twenty-third street, 90 feet west of Second avenue. Approved, subject to the approval of the construction by the Commissioner of Buildings.

Plan No. 916, New Buildings, 1897—Charles Rentz, petitioner—To allow main partitions and ceilings overhead in first story to be constructed, as shown, of 4-inch T and L irons, set 2 feet apart, well braced and secured with cross bars, and filed in between with hollow clay fire blocks set in cement mortar and plastered both sides; main stairs to be constructed of iron with iron risers, strings, etc., and treads of yellow pine, underside of stairs to be covered with expansion metal lath and plastered three coats of rock wall plaster, as stated in petition; No. 37 Catharine street. Approved, on condition that 2-inch oak treads be used instead of yellow pine, and subject to the approval of the construction by the Commissioner of Buildings.

Plan 905, New Buildings, 1897—Heary Anderson, petitioner—To allow the number and size of openings, as shown on plans of inside house and as stated in petition; southeast corner of Amsterdam avenue and Seventy-ninth street. Approved, on condition that the walls are laid up with sand and cement mortar, and subject to the approval of the construction by the Commissioner of Buildings.

Approved, on condition that the filling between the studs be of burnt clay blocks and subject to the approval of the construction by the Commissioner of Buildings.

Plan 951, New Buildings, 1897—Babb, Cook and Willard, petitioners—To allow bay-windows of extension to be built of wood covered with galvanized iron, as shown; also south wall of extension to be laid in cement mortar and built of thicknesses as shown, viz.: Basement 1 foot, 4 inches; first story, 1 foot 4 inches; second and third stories, 1 foot, as stated in petition; east side of Fifth avenue, 25 feet 8½ inches north of Eighty-sixth street. Approved, subject to the approval of the construction by the Commissioner of Buildings.
