SIR—Pursuant to section 1544, chapter 376 of the Laws of 1897, the Police Board of the Police Department of The City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and Force for the three months ending June 30, 1899:

REPORT.

On the 30th day of June, 1899, the number of the Force of all grades, including Surgeons, was 7,357. Number of Matrons, 59.

SICK TIME.

The time lost by members of the Force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received, for the quarter, and the details thereof will be found in schedule annexed marked "A," from which it will be seen that the sick time lost was 17,614 days; sick time paid, 8,807 days; sick time unpaid, 8,807 days; total, 17,614 days. The total days' time of the Force was 669,095 days; per cent. of sick to full time, 2.63; amount paid for sick time, \$28,608.56; amount paid for preceding quarter, \$46,169.03; decrease, \$17,560.47.

ARRESTS.

The total number of persons arrested by the Police Force during the quarter was: Males, 30,787; females, 8,134; total, 38,921. Number arrested for principal felonies, 2,358; number discharged without trial, 612; number acquitted, 345; number convicted, 447; number sent to other authorities, 29; number died, 7; number pending, 918; total, 2,358.

LOST CHILDREN (see Schedule "B").

Males, 895; females, 450; total, 1,345. Restored to parents or guardians, 1,305; other dispositions, 40. Of this number there were disposed of from Central Office, 717.

Schedule "B" contains a valuable collection of miscellaneous statistics, to which attention is respectfully called.

NOTE.—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offenses in felony report and general report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the general report is made up from the daily returns from the station-houses, and the felony report is made from the quarterly returns. An offense charged in the station-house at the time the arrest is made is liable to be, and often is, changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the Magistrate.

HOUSE OF DETENTION.

The number of persons committed to and detained in the House of Detention for Witnesses during the quarter was: Remaining in House April 1, 1899, 17; committed during month of April, 1899, 10; total, 27; discharged during month of April, 1899, 14. Remaining May 1, 1899, 13; committed during month of May, 1899, 11; total, 24; discharged during month of May, 1899, 10. Remaining June 1, 1899, 14; committed during month of June, 1899, 12; total, 26; discharged during month of June, 1899, 19. Remaining in House July 1, 1899, 7. The aggregate number of days of detention was 1,291½; the number of meals was 3,874, costing 25 cents each, amounting to \$968.50.

SANITARY COMPANY.

The transactions of the Sanitary Company for the quarter, setting forth the number of steam-boilers examined and their condition, and the number of applicants for examination as engineers, will be found in schedule annexed marked "D."

PROPERTY CLERK'S OFFICE.

The value of lost and stolen property recovered and returned to owners, and other transactions of the Property Clerk's Office, will be found in schedule annexed marked "E."

No others appearing in opposition after notice, on motion, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging, laying crosswalks and placing fences in One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, from Third avenue to Webster avenue, together with a list of awards for damages caused by a change of grade, and applications for awards for damages of Sarah Piser and Jennie Ansel, filed by Charles V. Gabriel, attorney; of Anton Rinschler, filed by John C. Shaw, attorney; of William L. Loftus, Louis Falk and others, filed by Thomas S. Bassford, attorney; also objections of James B. Black, Elizabeth Lietz and others, by W. Stebbins Smith, attorney, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of March 14, 1899.

Mr. Smith was heard in opposition to the assessment with reference to the amounts included therein for fencing and for surveyors' and inspectors' fees, and also for interest on advances.

On motion, the said assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors for further consideration of the objections filed by Mr. Smith, attorney.

The assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging and laying crosswalks in Boston avenue, from Bailey avenue to Sedgwick avenue, together with a list of awards for damages caused by a change of grade and applications for awards for damages of Katie M. Messrs. Shipman, Ferris & Baldwin, attorneys, appeared.

The property-owners, by their attorneys, objected to the excessive cost of the improvement, claiming that the change of grade of Boston avenue, which has been in use for many years, is a benefit to the territory north and south of the avenue, and that the entire expense should not be assessed locally, but that a large proportion thereof should be assumed by the City.

On motion, the said assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors, with instructions to reduce the assessment upon the property affected by the improvement 50 per cent., and to reapportion the assessment in accordance with such reduction, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

No one appearing in opposition after notice, on motion, the objections filed were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

The Board of Assessors states that it has given careful consideration to the objections filed by Mr. Rush, attorney, and after several hearings in the matter it finds that the statements made are, in the main, correct, and that in view of the heavy assessments already levied and confirmed for sewerage on both sides of this wide avenue and the cost of paving, the members of the Board believe that some substantial relief should be given to the property-owners; and that they are of the unanimous opinion that a fair and equitable adjustment of this matter would be to reduce the cost of this improvement forty per cent., leaving a balance to be charged equivalent to the cost of a 60-foot roadway.
