

PAVILIONS A, B AND C.

Made 3 fire-boards, 3 feet 6 inches by 5 feet, and 1 batten-door, 3 feet by 6 feet 6 inches. Repaired bath-room doors and closet-seats, 1 clothes-box, 1 ice-box, 10 chairs, using 14 rungs; 2 locks and keys, and 20 feet flooring, using 160 square feet clear pine, ⁷/₈-inch, 1 pair butts, 4-inch; 6 perforated chair-seats, 16 by 20 inches. Renewed 18 sash-cords. Used 2 gross screws and 5 pounds nails.

Plumbing.

Repaired gas-pipes. Renewed 15 feet 3%-inch pipe. Used 4 ells, 3%-inch; 1 tee, 3%-inch. Cleaned out waste-pipes and made repairs to several faucets. Disconnected and removed bathtub in Pavilion D.

Painting.

Ceilings and sidewalls in visitors' room cleaned and painted in 2 coats, using 35 pounds white lead, I gallon turpentine, ½ gallon oil, I pint dryers, I pint asphaltum.

Built an extension for water-closet, 12 feet high, 12 feet wide and 18 feet long, using 22 floor beams, 2 inches by 9 inches, 13 feet long, spruce; 45 studs, 3 inches by 4 inches, 13 feet long, 260 square feet yellow pine flooring, 1,000 square feet ceiling boards, 250 square feet spruce ½-inch, 100 feet shelving boards, 100 square feet 1¼-inch pine and 100 feet 1½-inch pine, 75 square feet 1¼-inch yellow pine; 1 pair butts, 4 inches; 1 rim lock and key, 400 square feet flap boards; 4 window frames, 2 feet 6 inches by 4 feet; 4 sashes, 2 feet 6 inches by 4 inches; 1 door, 2 feet 6 inches by 7 feet. In basement bath-room, put up a partition, using 150 square feet spruce planks. Built storm shed, 7 feet long, 6 feet wide and 8 feet high, and put up stoop, using 100 feet yellow pine, 1¼ inch; 75 feet clear pine, ½-inch; 60 feet clear pine, 2-inch; 40 square feet weather boards; 25 feet clear pine, 14-inch; 2 spruce beams, 2-inch by 9-inch, 13 feet long; 1 rim lock and 2 pairs butts, 3 inches. Furring up clothes-room and put in new sill, using 6 spruce beams, 2 by 9; 19 spruce boards, ½-inch by 9-inch; 50 feet clear pine, ½-inch, and 2 rim locks. Inclosed picket fence with 150 feet spruce boards, ½-inch by 9-inch, 4 feet 4 inches high. Put in 6 pulleys in window frames. Put in new ceiling and wafnscoting in basement bathing-room, using 1,100 square feet yellow pine, 1¼-inch, closed up, opening at end of same leading to boiler-room with 10 spruce boards, ½-inch by 9-inch; and put on 9 new tops to dining tables, 2 feet 4 inches by 10 feet ; renewed 80 square feet flor; renewed 32 feet base-board, 7 inches high, and renewed 30 sash cords ; used 2 kegs nails and 2 gross screws.

Plumbing.

Plumoing. Put in I new 7-foot school range with automatic flushing tank, and made all necessary con-nections to same, using 30 feet cast-iron pipe, 4-inch; 20 feet cast-iron pipe, 2-inch; I 4 x 2 Y; 2 ¼-inch bends; 200 feet ¾-inch pipe tor water supply; 4 ells, ¾-inch; 4 tees, ¾-inch; 2 unions, ¾-inch; 2 G valves, ¾-inch; 4 feet lead pipe, 1½-inch; 12 feet ½-inch lead pipe; 6 pounds solder, and I 4-inch trap. Put in closet in small room on first floor, making waste and supply connections, using 40 feet cast-iron pipe, 4-inch; 6 bends, ¼-inch; 4 bends, ¼-inch; 1 ferrule, 4-inch; 20 feet water supply, ¾-inch; 15 feet ½-inch pipe; 4 ells, ¾-inch; 2 tees, ¾-inch, and 2 ells, ½-inch. Removed old closet in basement.

Masonry.

Built up chimney breast in basement with 1,200 brick, 1½ barrels cement, 1½ loads sand. Laid 750 square feet brick floor for concreting, using 6,000 old brick, 2 barrels cement and 2 loads sand. Laid a new cement floor, 750 square feet, using 12 barrels cement and 6 loads sand. Window openings enlarged and sloped. Rebuilt side walls and ash pit in boiler room, 3 feet by 4 feet, using 200 fire-bricks and 1 barrel fireclay.

Renewed 12 sash cords, 3 panes of glass. Made and set up boxes for shoes, 20 feet long, 2 feet high and 2 feet deep. Used 12 spruce boards ½ inch by 9 inches, 7 pairs T-hinges, 8 inches, 1½ gross screws at 15 pounds nails. 2 feet deep. Used 12 spruce screws and 15 pounds nails. Plumbing.

Cleaned out and repaired waste-pipes.

Painting.

Cleaned down ceilings and side walls of sewing-room and painted in 2 coats. All woodwork and wainscoting grained and varnished, using 100 pounds white lead, 1 gallon turpentine, 2 gallons oil, 4 pounds ochre, 1 pound umber and 1 gallon varnish.

MAIN BOILER-ROOM.

Carpentry.

Built I coal enclosure, lattice top, 7 feet high, 13 feet wide, and 21 feet long, using 125 feet clear pine $\frac{7}{6}$ inch, 15 spruce joists 3 by 4, 26 spruce boards $\frac{7}{6}$ inch by 9 inch, 27 spruce planks 2 x 9, 4 bundles lath, and 30 pounds nails. Built an enclosure for ashes at north end of main kitchen courtyard 7 feet high, 10 feet wide, and 13 feet long, using 115 feet clear pine $\frac{7}{6}$ inch, 15 studs 3 inch by 4 inch, 18 spruce planks 2 inch by 9 inch, 18 spruce boards $\frac{7}{6}$ inch by 9 inch, 20 pounds nails, and 2 bundles laths.

Masonry.

Laid new brick floors to ash pits, of 2 boilers 5 feet 4 inches by 5 feet, used 360 old brick and grouted in side walls, cut out and repaired same with 540 fire-brick, repaired main flue on top of boilers, and rebuilt with 130 red brick, 200 old brick, 1 barrel cement, 2 barrels sand, and repaired arch with 80 fire-brick.

Painting.

Enclosures for coal and ashes; painted in 2 coats each of venetian red with olive green trimmings, using 50 pounds venetian red, 5 pounds drop black, 9 pounds chrome yellow, 10 pounds umber, and 2 gallons oil.

MAIN KITCHEN BUILDING.

Masonry.

Placed coping-stones under small extension used for kitchen utensils, 48 running feet. Raised brick foundation 6 inches and flagged same throughout with bluestone flags, 280 square feet. Used 4 barrels cement, 3 loads sand, and 400 red brick. Put in set of stone steps leading from butcher shop to kitchen, 2 steps and platform, and built 2 piers 4 inches high, 12 inches square ; also placed a set of steps leading from kitchen to courtyard and from platform at extension to courtyard. Built brick piers 4 feet high. Used 200 brick, 1 barrel cement and 2 barrels sand.

Glazing.

Renewed 7 panes of glass.

Plastering. Repaired 2 patches on sidewalk, in hard finish, 8 square feet.

PAVILIONS F AND G.

Carpentry.

Repaired 5 benches, 3 tables and gate at landing. Renewed perforated seats in 2 chairs and wooden seats in 3 chairs. Used 16 feet clear pine, 14 inch, and 10 pounds nails.

Plumbing.

Cleaned out waste and gas-pipes. Repaired flushing-tanks and several hot and cold water faucets.

Painting and Glazing.

Renewed 20 panes of glass.

DORMITORY 2.

Carpentry.

Repaired handrails on stairway and balcony, I door and 3 locks and keys. Renewed 8 sash-ls. Used 25 feet clear pine, 36-inch, and 4 feet clear pine, 2-inch. cords.

Plumbing.

Cleaned out waste and gas-pipes.

Painting.

One iron grating at cellar opening painted in I coat asphaltum.

Renewed 14 panes of glass.

Plastering.

Renewed 3 large patches in dormitory and finished same in hard finish, 45 square feet. Repaired floor with I pail cement and I pail plaster paris.

GRAMMAR SCHOOL BUILDING.

Plastering. Repaired 2 patches in class-room 20 square feet and in hallway 25 square feet.

Masonry. Repaired brick walk and areaway, using 1/2 barrel cement and I barrel sand.

Painting.

All hallways, stairway, ceiling and sidewalls on first floor washed down and painted in 2 coats; woodwork painted in 2 coats and all wainscoting and doors grained and varnished in oak, using 500 pounds white lead, 7 gallons turpentine, 4 gallons oil, 5 gallons varnish, ½ gallon dryer and ½ gallon asphaltum.

Glazing.

Renewed 3 panes of glass.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Cartentry.

Made and set in 4 mosquito frames of wire netting 2 feet 10 inches by 2 feet 8 inches in office. Made 1 table 3 feet 6 inches in Orderlies' dining-room. Placed 2 rim locks on door in linen room. Put new top on table in kitchen, 5 feet long and 3 feet wide, using 15 feet clear pine

1½. Made 1 ladder 16 feet for painters. General repairs to 5 summer houses, using 150 laths, 17 feet clear pine %-inch, repaired 13 benches, 35 stools and 13 chairs.

Plumbing.

Removed old closet and bath-tub and placed in new closet and bath-tub in Chaplain's room, making all necessary connections, using 20 feet lead waste-pipe 1½-inch, 30 feet ¾-inch Croton pipe, 6 ells and 4 tees ¾-inch, 1 trap 4-inch and 2 brass ferrules. Repaired hot-water boiler in Nurses' dormitory. Placed a new closet in Quarantine 31 and made necessary connections, using 15 feet pipe ½-inch, 4 ells ½-inch and repaired pipe to hot-water boiler. Placed 2 gas-lights in kitchen, using 40 feet pipe ⅔-inch, 6 ells ¾-inch, 4 tees ¾-inch and 4 gas-burners and tips. Plastering.

Used 5 barrels of lime for general whitewashing.

Painting.

Chaplain's room painted in I coat, using I pound umber, ½ pound sienna, I pint shellac, 5 pounds white lead and I pound chrome yellow. Painted I meat-cart, 2 meat-boxes, 5 covers for garbage tubs, 2 step-ladders and 14 screens.

IMPROVEMENTS.

IMPROVEMENTS. Screened 34 cart-loads ashes for tar walks, pumped 20 barrels tar from tank, mixed same and haid a walk 360 feet at boat-house, quarried stone for curbing of same. Loaded and carted 25 dead trees, removing the same. Cut down and removed 9 dead trees around school building. Excavated 100 yards of earth and made path leading from main path to Pavilion A, B and C, 5 feet wide, using 25 loads of ashes. Cut down and removed 12 loads stone for filling in at boat-landing. Cut down and removed 21 dead trees at north side of Ward 15, and 4 at east end of Ward 14. Pumped to barrels tar and screened 20 loads ashes for repairing patches on walks. Whitewashed portions of cellars at Infants' Hospital and Wards 1 and 22. Assisted in carting and packing ice at Ice-house.

BLACKSMITHING.

BLACKSMITHING. Made and placed 7 wrought-iron pipe gratings for areaways, 35 holdfasts for pipes, 13 oak standards for carts, 2 inches by 2½ inches by 2 feet long, 120 iron staples for fence-wire, 3 iron pipe-fenders, 2 rins for long wagon box. Placed 2 new tires on wagon, using 30-foot flat iron 3% inches by 2½ inches. Made body for push-cart 4 feet 5 inches by 1 foot deep. Made gratings for 3 cesspools. Put new felloes on 3 wheels of delivery wagon. Made general repairs to lawn-mowers. Made 6 stove-shakers, 30 wrought-iron spikes, 1 pair shafts for wagon and 1 shaft for cart, and put in new side of 1½ inch spruce, 36 feet. Made 4 iron braces for 1ailboards and set in 2 kingbolts, ¥-inch. Put 2 iron hooks on cart tail-boards and 3 pairs clips for wagon traces. Spliced iron shafting for machiners and made 4 hangers, 13 bolts ½-inch and ¾-inch, made 53 spokes for wagons and carts, 2 whiffletrees, and rebottomed wagon. Made repairs to 13 carts and 3 wagons. Made 17 slice bars, 8 hoes and 9 claws for boiler-rooms and gas-house, 7 picks, 2 crowbars and 4 rakes. Dressed 13 chisels and points and 5 pairs ice-tongs. Material used in the above : 45 feet oak, 2-inch; 30 feet oak, 2½-inch; 40 feet clear pine, ¾-inch; 15 feet round iron, ¾-inch, and 60 feet flat iron 2½ inches by ½ inch. Re-shod Io horses, using 65 pairs shoes.

During the quarter the extension to the Hospital Laundry has been completed and refitted with modern laundry machinery. The several business offices have been centralized, and new methods of keeping the financial and statistical facts of the various institutions have been adopted, and the entire work put under one competent Chief Accountant.

The general increase in the per capita cost over last quarter is partly due to the increased number of inmates (at this season of the year), and partly to the fact that every item of expense has been charged against the several institutions. 




