BUREAU OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND OFFICES.

During the week ending July 26, 1902, 50 orders—34 for supplies and 16 for repairs—were issued by the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices.

To date from August 1, 1902, on July 21, 1902, arranged with the approval of the President of the Borough, and the consent of the Superintendent of Buildings, William M. Calder, to transfer Francis J. Pelletreau, an Inspector of Plumbing in the Bureau of Buildings, to the same position in the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, at a salary of \$1,200 per annum. The Civil Service Commission was notified and asked to approve of the action.

On July 24, 1902, signed a number of bills and forwarded same for payment, and on the same day signed the first and final estimate of Neptune B. Smythe, for repairs to public baths, on contract amounting to \$3,373.

On July 25, 1902, transferred, to take effect on July 28, John Collins, Engineer in the Municipal Building, to the Kings County Jail, and Andrew Brosnan, Engineer in the Kings County Jail, to the Municipal Building.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF
THE CITY OF NEW YORK.*Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock a. m., on Thursday, July 17, 1902.*

Present—Señ Low, Mayor; Edward M. Grout, Comptroller; Elgin R. L. Gould, Chamberlain; and Charles V. Furnes, President, Board of Aldermen.

A joint meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and the Committee on Public Buildings, Markets and Supplies of the Board of Aldermen was called for the purpose of taking action on the removal from the City Hall Park of the old Hall of Records, the engine house and the brown-stone building occupied by the City Court.

The Mayor explained why it was deemed advisable to remove the buildings.

Mr. Leary, representing the Fire Department, was heard in protest against the removal of the engine house.

Discussion followed.

The Mayor offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That, in the judgment of the Sinking Fund Commissioners and the Committee on Public Buildings, Markets and Supplies of the Board of Aldermen, the interests of the City require the removal from the City Hall Park of the Hall of Records, the engine house and book and ladder company, and the brown-stone building, occupied by the City Court, as soon as suitable arrangements can be made for the accommodation of the occupants of these buildings elsewhere, and that the space occupied by these buildings be added to the City Hall Park.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, Chamberlain, President of the Board of Aldermen, and Aldermen Whitaker, Jones, Stewart, Alt and Nehrbauser of the Committee on Public Buildings, Markets and Supplies of the Board of Aldermen.

On motion, the Mayor was requested to ask the Fire Commissioner, in view of the foregoing resolution, to look into the question of a new location for the engine house and report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as soon as practicable.

The following communications were received from the Department of Docks and Ferries relative to the granting of a permit to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company to construct an additional bulkhead shed at the foot of West Thirty-seventh street, Borough of Manhattan:

NEW YORK, July 9, 1902.

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Esq., Secretary to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—Under date of June 10, 1902, an application was received from the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, requesting permission to construct an additional bulkhead shed at the foot of Thirty-seventh street, North river.

On June 20, 1902, this Department granted permission to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company to erect a shed in front of pier at the foot of West Thirty-seventh street, North river, being an addition to the bulkhead shed now located north of said pier, the shed to revert to and become the property of The City of New York upon the expiration or sooner termination of the lease of the pier at the foot of West Thirty-seventh street, compensation for the privilege of maintaining the shed to be paid by said Company at the rate of \$1,000 per annum, payable quarterly in advance at the office of this Department, commencing July 1, 1902, the shed to be erected under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department and in accordance with detailed plans of construction to be first approved by him, said Company to file an agreement to remove, when ordered so to do, the portion of the shed which lies inshore of a line fifty feet from the bulkhead line, which order should become operative upon the completion and opening of the marginal wharf, street or place between Thirty-sixth and Thirty-seventh streets and between Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets, North river, and provided also that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall approve of the terms and conditions of this permit.

I would respectfully request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of this permit as soon as possible.

Under date of July 3, 1902, a communication was received from Charles E. Pugh, Second Vice-President of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, accepting the terms and conditions of the permit as above stated.

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Esq., Deputy Comptroller and Secretary to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—Referring to the communication sent you July 9, 1902, relative to the granting of a permit to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company to construct an additional bulkhead shed at the foot of Thirty-seventh street, North river, I beg to advise that the permit granted the Pennsylvania Railroad Company on June 20, 1902, is practically a lease to that company for the use of the marginal street at the foot of West Thirty-seventh street, North river, immediately in front of the pier at the foot of said street, said premises being 38 feet along the bulkhead line and extending 100 feet easterly from the bulkhead line, together with the privilege of erecting a shed covering said space, this shed being an addition to the bulkhead shed now located north of said pier, inasmuch as the shed to be constructed under the permit may remain thereat for a period coterminous with the lease of the pier at the foot of West Thirty-seventh street.

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance:

July 16, 1902.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

Sir—In the attached communication, bearing date July 9, 1902, from the Department of Docks and Ferries, the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund is requested to the granting of a permit to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company to construct an additional bulkhead shed at the foot of Thirty-seventh street.

In a subsequent communication, bearing date July 14, 1902, it is further stated "that the permit granted the Pennsylvania Railroad Company on June 20, 1902, is practically a lease to that company for the use of the marginal street at the foot of West Thirty-seventh street, North river, immediately in front of the pier at the foot of said street, said premises being fifty-eight feet along the bulkhead line and extending one hundred feet easterly from the bulkhead line, together with the privilege of erecting a shed covering said space, this shed being an addition to the bulkhead shed now located north of said pier, inasmuch as the shed to be constructed under the permit may remain thereat for a period coterminous with the lease of the pier at the foot of West Thirty-seventh street."

I see no objections to the approval of the proposed lease by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund under the conditions as named.

The following communication was received from the Department of Docks and Ferries relative to a lease of the bulkhead on the North river, between One Hundred and Fiftieth and One Hundred and Fifty-first streets, to Peter J. Moran:

NEW YORK, July 10, 1902.

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Esq., Secretary to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—Subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, I have agreed to lease, assign and to farm let unto Peter J. Moran, of No. 184 Convent avenue, New York City, the right to maintain a bathing house and to carry on a bathing business between the northerly line of West One Hundred and Fiftieth street and the southerly line of West One Hundred and Fifty-first street, North river, and between the right of way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company and the bulkhead line as established under the Act of 1857 at said locality, the lease to be for a term of five years from August 1, 1902, at a rental of \$300 per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Cashier of this Department, it being understood that he shall have the privilege of maintaining, during the term of the lease of the above described premises, the necessary bathing houses, floats and other structures for the purpose of carrying on a bathing business, all structures to be erected thereat under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department and in accordance with plans and specifications to be first submitted to and approved by him; it being understood that this agreement to lease shall be of no force or effect unless the terms thereof are accepted by said Peter J. Moran, and unless the same shall be approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

There are no other applicants for the privilege of carrying on the bathing business at this point, and I respectfully request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of and consent to the execution of a lease by me in accordance with the terms above stated.

Moran of the right to maintain a bathing house and to carry on a bathing business between the northerly line of West One Hundred and Fiftieth street and the southerly line of West One Hundred and Fifty-first street, North river, and between the right of way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company and the bulkhead line, as established under the act of 1857 at the said locality, for a term of five years from August 1, 1902, at an annual rental of three hundred dollars (\$300), payable quarterly in advance, and as recommended by the Commissioner of Docks in a communication dated July 10, 1902.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Department of Docks and Ferries relative to a lease of the bulkhead at the foot of Thirtieth street, East river, to William J. McGirr:

NEW YORK, July 11, 1902.

N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Esq., Secretary, Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—On Tuesday, July 1, 1902, sealed bids were received by this Department for a lease of the bulkhead at the foot of Thirtieth street, East river, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, said lease to be for a term of five years from a date ten days after the approval of such lease by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, due notice of the intention of the Department to grant such a lease having been published in the "City Record."

Under the terms of the advertisement, the lessee shall have the privilege of mooring a floating dump at the bulkhead, during the term of the lease, for the purpose of receiving ashes, cellar dirt or similar material, and shall have the privilege of maintaining on property owned by the City and under the jurisdiction of this Department and within the lines of said street, the necessary ramp or approach to said dump, and also the privilege of maintaining a tally office thereat, said tally office not to exceed in dimensions ten by ten feet; it being understood that the lessee shall keep posted, printed in large type, in at least two conspicuous places on the pier, so that same can be readily seen by passers-by from the street, the prices to be charged by the lessee to the public for the privilege of dumping ashes, cellar dirt or other similar material, which prices are also made a condition of the lease and are to be not more than twenty-five cents per cubic yard or as follows: For regular and ordinary dumping carts which contain two cubic yards, not exceeding fifty cents; for ordinary cellar diggers' carts which contain one and one-half cubic yards, not exceeding thirty-five cents; for brick trucks containing between two and one-quarter and two and one-half cubic yards, not exceeding sixty cents.

The proposed lease shall contain the usual terms, conditions and covenants at present embodied in leases of wharf property now used by this Department, except, that the lessee shall covenant and agree that he will at all times do such dredging from time to time during the term of said lease, as may be considered necessary or proper by the Commissioner of Docks, in the basins or slips or water adjacent to the said premises. The lease shall also contain a provision requiring the lessee to keep books of account showing the prices charged those using his dump, the said books of account to be open at all times to inspection by the Commissioner of Docks or his representatives, in order that he may be able to determine at any time as to whether the terms of the lease are being complied with. The lessee to furnish a bond or obligation in the sum of double the annual rent for the faithful performance of all the covenants and conditions of the lease, the sureties on the bond to be approved by the Commissioner of Docks.

William J. McGirr being the highest bidder for the privilege, I have decided to grant the lease to him, in accordance with the terms and conditions above stated, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and I would respectfully request that the consent of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to this lease be granted.

For your information in connection with the above, I beg to state that the bulkhead at the foot of East Thirtieth street, which is 60 feet wide, has been occupied since 1895 by William Hastorf at a rental of \$250 per annum, said Hastorf having had the privilege of maintaining a floating dump at said bulkhead, an additional compensation of \$500 per annum having been charged therefor, or a total of \$750 per annum for the entire privilege.

The proposed lease to William J. McGirr will give to the City a revenue of \$6,700 per annum for this privilege, or an increase of \$5,950 over the rental paid by Hastorf.

McGirr, of the bulkhead at the foot of Thirtieth street, East river, Borough of Manhattan, for a term of five years from August 1, 1902, at his bid of six thousand seven hundred dollars (\$6,700) per annum, and as recommended by the Commissioner of Docks in communication dated July 11, 1902.

The following report and resolution were received from the Board of Education relative to a renewal of the lease of premises on Fulton avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-ninth and One Hundred and Seventieth streets, Borough of The Bronx:

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Buildings respectfully reports that the lease of the basement and parish house of St. John's German Lutheran Church, Fulton avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-ninth and One Hundred and Seventieth streets, Borough of The Bronx, used as an annex to Public School 61, will expire November 28, 1902.

The City Superintendent has reported to your Committee that the neighborhood of this school is crowded, and until the completion of new Public School 145, and the Morris High School, the premises in question will be required.

In view of the necessity of the case it is respectfully recommended that the lease be renewed for one year, with the privilege of renewal, on the same terms of existing lease.

The following resolution is submitted for adoption:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they are hereby requested to authorize a renewal of the lease of the basement and parish house of St. John's Lutheran Church, Fulton avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-ninth and One Hundred and Seventieth streets, Borough of The Bronx, used as an annex to Public School 61, for one year from November 28, 1902, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year, at an annual rental of \$1,800, the other terms and conditions to be the same as those of existing lease.

The advance in rental asked is \$300 per annum, which I am of the opinion is reasonable, the assessed valuation having been increased \$2,500 since the original lease was made. I recommend that the lease be renewed on the terms proposed.

The Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance, and offered the following resolution relative to an amendment to resolution authorizing a lease of premises corner of Third and Tremont avenues, Borough of The Bronx, for the use of the Coroners:

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

Sir—In accordance with the attached letter from Messrs. Berry and O'Gorman, Coroners, Borough of The Bronx, inclosing communication from John P. Friedhoff, J. Friedhoff & Meyer, owners of the building northeast corner of Third avenue and Tremont avenue, to the effect that the said owners decline to sign the lease of the second floor of the said premises, as authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on May 2, 1902, on the grounds that the owners did not agree to furnish janitor service, but will, in place thereof, furnish light, I would report as follows:

The original application contained no statement of what the owners would furnish, and my information on the subject was obtained from Coroner O'Gorman.

The changes called for in the arrangement of rooms have been made, and I am of the opinion that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may modify the terms of the lease, as requested, by omitting the janitor's service, and inserting in lieu thereof light to be furnished by owners.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

Sir—With report of May 15, 1902, I submitted a schedule for determining the compensation to be paid for the privilege of laying pipes (16-inch diameter or less) in streets and avenues, and the fee for opening the street or avenue.

At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund May 21, 1902, the matter was laid over, and subsequently referred to me for a further report. Agreeably to your instructions, I have reconsidered the matter, and submit the accompanying schedule, which is a slight variation of my former suggestion.

The first method reduces the price per foot, as the distances increase; the schedule now presented decreases the rate by sections as the distances increase, being a fixed rate per foot for each section of fifty or seventy-five feet up to six hundred feet, after which the rate is \$1 per foot. After studying the matter carefully, I consider the second method a fairer means of calculating the annual rental and fee to be paid for pipe line privileges.

SIR—The Board of Aldermen, by resolution adopted June 17, 1902, received from the Mayor July 1, 1902, without his approval or disapproval thereof; therefore, as provided in section 40 of the Greater New York Charter, the same took effect as if he had approved it, grants permission

—“to William Baumgarten & Company to lay a pipe for the purpose of conducting steam under and across the carriageway of East Forty-fourth street, from their factory at Nos. 228 to 238, to their warehouse about to be erected at Nos. 227 and 229 East Forty-fourth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, provided that the said William Baumgarten & Company shall pay to The City of New York, as compensation for the privilege, such amount as may be determined as an equivalent by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund;

I would report that it is proposed to lay two pipes, one six-inch pipe for conducting steam and one four-inch pipe for a return. The distance between curb lines at this point is 30 feet, and I think \$60 per annum a correct charge for the privilege, and \$15 fee for opening the street.

The Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance relative to compensation to be paid by the Sisters of the Poor in charge of St. Francis Hospital for the privilege of constructing and maintaining a vault under the sidewalk on each side of their premises, corner One Hundred and Forty-third street and Brook avenue, Borough of The Bronx:

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—The Board of Aldermen, by resolution adopted June 10, 1902, received from his Honor the Mayor June 24, 1902, grants permission to the “Sisters of the Poor in charge of St. Francis Hospital to construct and maintain a vault under the sidewalk on each side of their premises, on the southeast corner of One Hundred and Forty-third street and Brook avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, upon payment to The City of New York as compensation for the privilege such amount as may be deemed an equivalent by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen.”

I would report that the vault space proposed and requested is really two vaults, as shown on the accompanying diagram, one 50 feet by 15 feet, on the south side of One Hundred and Forty-third street, beginning 8 feet easterly of the southeasterly corner of One Hundred and Forty-third street and Brook avenue, and the other 20 feet by 19 feet, on the easterly side of Brook avenue, and 37 feet southerly from the southeasterly corner of One Hundred and Forty-third street and Brook avenue.

Both of the vaults are under the sidewalks or between the house lines and the curb lines, and since they are so located, the authority or permit to construct same could be given by the President of the Borough of The Bronx, pursuant to article 16, sections 318 to 328, inclusive, of the Revised Ordinances of The City of New York, in force December 31, 1897, the compensation being calculated at not less than 30 cents nor more than \$2 per square foot, as specified in section 321.

Hence I think this resolution unnecessary, but since it has been adopted and the compensation for the privileges is to be fixed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, I would suggest that the rate and method of calculating the same be determined, as outlined in my report of June 30, 1902, “in relation to compensations charged for vault privileges.” The charge should be an annual rental instead of a fixed amount, as presented in section 321 of the Revised Ordinances, viz.:—pay an amount as an annual rental for each square foot of ground required for the vault equal to five per cent. of the assessed valuation per square foot for the abutting property.

Applying this principle to the vaults in question we get the following, which I would recommend as a correct charge:



Therefore I think the correct charge should be \$93.22 per annum for the privilege and a fee of \$24 for opening the street and avenue.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance and offered the following resolution relative to the application of the Armory Board for an issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$22, proceeds to be used for alterations and repairs to the ship “New Hampshire”:

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—At a meeting of the Armory Board, held June 26, 1902, the following resolution was adopted:

“Resolved, That the report of the Secretary in relation to alterations to the Armory of the First Battalion, Naval Militia, N. G. N. Y., be received and adopted, and that he be directed to have specifications made, and when the same have been approved by the Corporation Counsel, to advertise for bids and proposals for the work, and that twenty-two hundred dollars (\$2,200) be appropriated therefor, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur therein, and that the Comptroller be requested to issue bonds to provide for the payment.”

The work consists of certain alterations and repairs to the ship “New Hampshire,” viz., making suitable accommodations for the signal division and for the necessary alterations appurtenant thereto, altering bulkheads in the paymaster’s store room, bulkheading off for petty officers, ensigns, musicians, hospital corps and fifth division room, in order to provide the necessary quarters for the various subdivisions and for the necessary painting and repairing of the clap-boarding to put the ship in proper order.

Sir—At a meeting of the Armory Board, held June 26, 1902, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That the Secretary be directed to have plans and specifications made for the work necessary in removing the violations placed on the following armories in the Borough of Manhattan, viz.: Seventh Regiment, Ninth Regiment, Twelfth Regiment, Twenty-second Regiment, Sixty-ninth Regiment and Seventy-first Regiment; and also to remove the violations reported by the Secretary to exist on the following armories in the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, viz.: Fourteenth Regiment, Twenty-third Regiment and Seventeenth Separate Company, the work to be done under the direction of the Consulting Architects, and when the same have been approved by the Corporation Counsel, to advertise for bids and proposals for the work; that the sum of fourteen thousand three hundred dollars (\$14,300) be appropriated therefor, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to concur therein, and the Comptroller requested to issue bonds to provide for the payment."

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor, and Chairman of the Sinking Fund:

DEAR SIR—Referring to a resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on June 4, 1902, requesting the Department of Correction to vacate the stable in the rear of the Children's Court, at the corner of Third avenue and Eleventh street, I beg to submit herewith copies of two letters in regard to building No. 516 East Twentieth street.

I have made diligent search for a building large enough for the needs of the Department, and conveniently located, and this I believe to be the best and most suitable, it being between the Central Office and the Department dock at East Twentieth street, not too far from the prisons in the downtown section of the City and other institutions of the Department.

As I find property of this description very scarce and difficult to procure in a location at all convenient, may I ask that your Honorable Commission will take action in the matter and will inform me as to your decision as soon as practicable? I remain,

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

Sir—Hon. Thomas W. Hynes, Commissioner, Department of Correction, in a communication bearing date July 1, 1902, requests the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of a lease of premises No. 516 East Twentieth street, for use as a Department stable, in the place of the one in the rear of the Children's Court, at the corner of Third avenue and Eleventh street, which by resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, June 4, 1902, he was requested to vacate.

I have caused an examination to be made of the premises and find that they consist of a three-story brick building, 23 feet 9 inches by 85 feet, on a lot 23 feet 9 inches by 92 feet (Lot 45, Block 977, Section 3). Owner, John U. Brookman, agrees to make certain alterations and repairs, as specified in a communication from Charles A. Lutz, agent, copy thereof being attached hereto, at an estimated cost of \$550. Annual rental \$1,366, City to pay water; term from date of occupation to April 1, 1906.

As in my judgment the terms proposed, viz.: \$1,366 per annum, were excessive, I had an interview with the owner, Mr. John U. Brookman, who stated that he valued the lot at \$7,000; the building at \$5,000, and the cost of alterations and repairs at \$550, making a total of \$12,550.

Upon his own estimate, which I regard as full, it appears that the rental asked exceeds 10 per cent thereof, and I am unable to recommend its approval. The owner refuses to accept less than \$1,260.

In my opinion, \$1,000 per annum, the City to pay water rates, would be a full rental value. If the owner refuses to accept these terms, the Commissioner of the Department of Correction should be requested to seek other quarters.

The following report and resolution were received from the Board of Education relative to a lease of premises corner of Hamburg avenue and Cornelia street, Borough of Brooklyn:

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Buildings respectfully reports that it has received a report and resolution of the Committee on Elementary Schools, adopted by the Executive Committee, recommending that steps be taken to hire a building opposite Public School 106, Brooklyn, when completed, about September 1, 1902, for additional primary and kindergarten accommodations for that school.

The matter has been investigated, and a proposition obtained from the owner of the plot of ground, 100 by 100 feet, directly opposite Public School 106, to erect a one-story four-room structure, with the necessary sanitary accommodations, according to plans furnished by the Board of Education, and have it ready for occupancy in September next, and to lease the premises for five years, with the privilege of a renewal for a similar term, at an annual rental of \$900, provided the building does not cost over \$3,000, and \$60 per year additional for each \$1,000 that the said building may cost over \$3,000 up to \$5,000.

In view of the necessity for additional accommodations in this vicinity, your Committee respectfully recommends that this proposition be accepted, and submits the following resolution for adoption:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they are hereby requested to authorize a lease to be entered into with Augusta Gomer for a one-story four-room wooden structure, with suitable sanitary arrangements, to be erected on a plot of ground, 100 by 100 feet, situated on the corner of Hamburg avenue and Cornelia street, Borough of Brooklyn, according to plans and specifications to be prepared by the Board of Education, for a term of five years from date of occupancy, with the privilege of renewal for an additional five years, at an annual rental of \$900 and water tax, providing the building does not cost more than \$3,000, and \$60 additional per year for each \$1,000 the said building may cost over \$3,000 up to \$5,000. The Board of Education to have the option, at any time during the continuance of the lease, to purchase the site for the sum of \$10,000, in addition to the amount which may have been expended in constructing the building.

SIR—At a meeting of the Board of Education, held July 7, 1902, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and they are hereby requested to authorize a lease to be entered into with Augusta Gomer for a one-story four-room wooden structure, with suitable sanitary arrangements, to be erected on a plot of ground 100 by 100 feet situated on the corner of Hamburg avenue and Cornelia street, Borough of Brooklyn, according to plans and specifications to be prepared by the Board of Education, for a term of five years from date of occupancy, with the privilege of renewal for an additional five years, at an annual rental of \$900 and water tax, providing the building does not cost more than \$3,000, and \$60 additional per year for each \$1,000 the said building may cost over \$3,000 up to \$5,000. The Board of Education to have the option, at any time during the continuance of the lease, to purchase the site for the sum of \$10,000, in addition to the amount which may have been expended in constructing the building.

I would report that additional accommodations are required for Public School No. 106, Borough of Brooklyn. The register of part-time classes at this school, as given in the last monthly report I have (November, 1901), is 508.

The one-story building, although no plans have been made by the Superintendent of School Buildings, will be about 56 feet by 61 feet and will cost at least \$3,000.

The terms of the proposed lease I consider just and reasonable and the value, \$10,000 for the plot 100 feet by 100 feet, is fair and reasonable.

Therefore I think that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund can properly authorize the lease as proposed in the above resolution of the Board of Education, adopted at meeting of July 7, 1902.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and consent to the execution, by the Board of Education, of a lease to the City from Augusta Gomer of a one-story four-room wooden structure, with suitable sanitary arrangements, to be erected on a plot of ground, 100 by 100 feet, situated on the corner of Hamburg avenue and Cornelia street, Borough of Brooklyn, according to plans and specifications to be prepared by the Board of Education, for a term of five years from the date of occupation, with the privilege of a renewal for an additional five years, at an annual rental of nine hundred dollars (\$900) and water tax, providing the building does not cost more than three thousand dollars (\$3,000), and sixty dol-

lars (\$60) additional per year for each one thousand dollars (\$1,000) the said building may cost over three thousand dollars (\$3,000) up to five thousand dollars (\$5,000); the Board of Education to have the option at any time during the continuance of the lease to purchase the site for the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), in addition to the amount which may have been expended in constructing the building—the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following statement and resolution relative to a refund of \$2.55 to G. A. Seixas:

July 16, 1902.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—The records in this Department show that on October 27, 1888, G. A. Seixas and Mutual Life Insurance Company paid an assessment on Lots 13 to 16 and 49 to 52 in Block No. 703 for One Hundred and Tenth street outlet sewer from Harlem river to Fifth avenue, as confirmed July 13, 1875, in amount \$1,370, with interest \$668.22. By order of the Supreme Court entered December 7, 1895, the assessment was vacated to the extent of .00186 per cent. on the principal and all the interest which had accrued on said assessment.

By order of the Supreme Court entered June 18, 1902, Mr. Seixas is entitled to receive from the City \$2.55 on the principal of assessment, together with all the interest, \$668.22 paid as above stated.

The amount of assessment paid was deposited in the City Treasury to credit of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

Sir—At a meeting of the Armory Board, held July 14, 1902, the following resolution was adopted:

"That \$4,000 be appropriated for alterations and repairs to the steam heating plant in the Seventh Regiment Armory, in accordance with the plans and specifications already drawn by Messrs. Clinton & Russell, architects, and when the Corporation Counsel has approved said specifications, the Secretary be directed to advertise for bids and estimates for the same, and that the Sinking Fund Commissioners be requested to concur in said action, and authorize the Comptroller to issue bonds for the payment thereof."

I would report that the alterations and repairs to the steam-heating plant in the Seventh Regiment Armory is for alterations and repairs to the heating plant in the administration portion of the armory, and consists in removing the old piping (main and return), and the old radiators, and replacing same by new piping and radiators. The present boilers will not be disturbed, nor will any work be done in the drill floor.

The plans and specifications submitted have been drawn with care and the estimate of \$11,500 I consider fair.

There being an available balance of \$7,500 from the appropriation to the Armory Board for "Repairs and Supplies," I think the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund can properly approve of an appropriation of \$4,000, the balance necessary to provide the sum of \$11,500, the amount necessary to do the above-described work.

Clinton & Russell, architects, and when the Corporation Counsel has approved said specifications, the Secretary be directed to advertise for bids and estimates for the same, and that the Sinking Fund Commissioners be requested to concur in said action, and authorize the Comptroller to issue bonds for the payment thereof; and

Resolved, That for the purpose of providing means for the payment thereof the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 212 of the Laws of 1898, to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the amended Greater New York Charter, to the amount of four thousand dollars (\$4,000), the proceeds whereof shall be applied to the payment of the expenses aforesaid.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Department of Bridges relative to the renewal of two leases of land required for the temporary bridge over the Bronx river at Westchester avenue:

June 11, 1902.

To the Honorable Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, New York City:

GENTLEMEN—It is probable that the permanent bridge over the Bronx river, at Westchester avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, will not be ready for traffic within a year; and until it is opened the temporary bridge authorized by chapter 24 of the Laws of 1897 must remain in use. This temporary bridge and its approaches are upon land held by the City under the following leases:

1. Lease from the Real Estate Corporation of New York City of Parcels A and B, on the west side of the Bronx river, dated September 6, 1900, for the term of two years from July 28, 1900, with the privilege of renewal for one or two years on the same terms, at a rent of \$400 per annum, payable quarterly.

2. Lease from Robert C. Watson and others, executors and trustees of the estate of William Watson, of Parcel C, on the east bank of the Bronx river, dated September 12, 1900, for the term of two years from July 28, 1900, with the privilege of renewal for one or two years upon the same terms, at a rent of \$250 per annum, payable quarterly.

While under the existing leases the City has the privilege of renewal for one or two years at the same terms, I believe in view of the recent action of the President of the Borough in the matter of requiring the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company to build a bridge across its tracks at this point, that it would be unwise to take the land for more than one year longer. If at the expiration of that period the City is not ready to vacate the premises, it can probably obtain a short term renewal.

I therefore respectfully request your Honorable Board to obtain renewals of the foregoing mentioned leases for the term of one year.

2. Lease from Robert C. Watson and others, executors and trustees of the estate of William Watson, of Parcel C, on the east side of the Bronx river, for a term of two years from July 28, 1902, with the privilege of a renewal for one or two years upon the same terms, at an annual rental of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250), payable quarterly, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease.

—the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rents fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such leases be made.

Which was unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented the following reports and offered the following resolution relative to a lease of rooms in the new Masonic Hall, at Stapleton, Borough of Richmond, for the use of the Department of Finance and Department of Taxes and Assessments:

June 24, 1902.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

Sir—Referring to the matters contained in communications from Col. David E. Austen, Receiver of Taxes, bearing date June 6, and from Mr. John De Morgan, Deputy Receiver of Taxes, Borough of Richmond, of June 5 and 6, 1902, in regard to securing increased accommodations for the Receiver of Taxes in the Borough of Richmond, I would state that I have caused an examination to be made of the premises at Stapleton, S. I., in the new Masonic Hall, corner of Bay and Sands streets, which the Deputy Receiver of Taxes suggests would make an excellent tax office.

I find that they consist of a part of the ground floor of a new three-story brick fire-proof building, known as Masonic Hall, with a frontage of 50 feet on Bay street and 90 feet on Sands street. The room is approximately 40 by 60 feet, affording 2,240 square feet of floor space. The terms are \$1,620 per annum, including heat.

In the rear a suite of five small rooms, arranged as a living apartment, but which could be used for office purposes, is offered at \$300 per annum.

I append a diagram of the entire first or ground floor of the building, and a letter from the agent, Edward C. Meurer, setting forth the terms on which other portions of the building may be rented.

I am informed that the lot (50 feet by 100 feet) cost \$6,000 and the building \$30,000. The edifice is very artistic in appearance and first-class in construction, is heated by steam and lighted by electricity, and modern in all its details. Light, ventilation and toilet accommodations being ample.

The great objection to the removal of the office of the Receiver of Taxes from its present location in the Richmond Building at New Brighton to the proposed site at Stapleton is the great distance it will be from the offices of the Department of Taxes and Assessments and the Bureau of Arrears, now in the Richmond Building, rendering it very inconvenient for tax-payers who may need to consult the records in the latter offices. It is quite important that these three offices should be in close proximity, and, if possible, premises nearer by should be selected.

There is ample room in the Masonic Hall at Stapleton for the accommodation of all three of these offices, and the rental asked, \$3,250 per annum, to include light, heat and janitor service, appears to me to be fair and reasonable.

The lease of the Richmond Building at West New Brighton has been renewed for a year from May 1, 1902, with a privilege of a further renewal, and if the quarters of the Receiver of Taxes are changed these rooms now occupied by him will be vacant.

The Borough President has received an appropriation of \$200,000 for a Borough Building and it would appear to me that until this new building is ready for all the departments no radical change like that proposed should be made.

It would appear to me that for the one or two months when there is especial necessity for extra room for the Receiver of Taxes it might be possible to secure temporary quarters.

As the hours when the office is open to the public are only from 10 a. m. to 2 p. m., it would appear that the books could be removed back and forth daily.

Sir—In my report, bearing date June 24, 1902, in regard to a lease of part of the first floor of Masonic Hall, at Stapleton, Staten Island, for the Receiver of Taxes, in the Borough of Richmond, I stated that the great objection to the removal of the office of the Receiver of Taxes from its present location in the Richmond Building, to the proposed site at Stapleton, was the great distance it would be from the offices of the Department of Taxes and Assessments and the Bureau of Arrears, it being quite important that these three offices should be in close proximity.

The leases of premises now occupied by the Department of Taxes and Assessments and by the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and Arrears, were each renewed for a term of one year from May 1, 1902, and it did not seem expedient to make any present change of location which would involve increased expense to the City, unless material advantages were to be secured.

However, if it were decided to transfer the Collector of Taxes to the Masonic Hall Building at Stapleton, it seems almost imperative that the Department of Taxes and Assessments and the Bureau of Arrears should also be accommodated in the same building.

Informal conferences have been held with William E. McFadden, Esq., Collector of Assessments and Arrears, and with Hon. William S. Cogswell, Commissioner, Department of Taxes and Assessments, and an examination of the second floor of the Masonic Hall has been made by their representatives, which have resulted in a mutual satisfactory agreement as to the division of the floor space to be occupied by each, in case the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund should approve of a lease of both the first and second floors of the building.

The Trustees of Tompkins Lodge No. 471, F. and A. M., by their agent, Mr. Edward C. Meurer, Nos. 164 and 166 Bay street, Stapleton, S. I., have made an offer to give the City the use of the premises for the sum of \$1,000 from August 1, 1902, to May 1, 1903, provided a lease for a further term of two years from May 1, 1903, at the rate of \$3,250 per annum be taken; light, heat and janitor service to be furnished by the lessor.

The total available floor space on the two floors, exclusive of hallways, toilets, etc., and including the living apartments in rear of first floor, is about 5,885 square feet, which would be a rate per annum per square foot of about 55 cents.

The following table will show the accommodations that each of the three Bureaus will have, as compared with the present quarters.

The cost to the City in making the change will be exactly the \$1,000 for increased rental from August 1, 1902, to May 1, 1903.

Reference to the accompanying diagrams of the second floor plan will show the division thereof that has been agreed upon by and between the Department of Taxes and Assessments and the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and Arrears.

On the first floor the area to be occupied by the Collector of Taxes, consisting of the three stores, front, is about 2,246 square feet.

The suite of five small rooms in the rear on the first floor, containing an area of 749 square feet, if not required in connection with the other offices, could be sublet.

There are certain changes and alterations, such as the removal of the partitions between the three front offices, taking down partitions between reception and preparing room, the connecting of the doric room with the library and some minor alterations, which the agent says that the owners will be willing to make.

It is my opinion that the terms are reasonable and just, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may properly approve of a lease of the first and second floors of the building known as Masonic Hall, situate corner of Bay and Sands streets, Stapleton, Staten Island, from the trustees of Tompkins Lodge No. 471, F. and A. M., as owners, from August 1, 1902, to May 1, 1903, for the sum of \$1,000, and for a further term of two years from May 1, 1903, at and after the rate of \$3,250 per annum, payable quarterly; the lessor to furnish light, heat and janitor service, and make alterations in partitions as required.

In the event of the approval of this lease, as aforesaid, by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and the vacating of the premises now occupied by the Receiver of Taxes and the Department of Taxes and Assessments in Richmond Building, at West New Brighton, I would recommend that the same be formally assigned to the President of the Borough of Richmond, as he has expressed a desire to have increased accommodation for a Topographical Bureau.

As to the premises now occupied by the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and Arrears, as I know of no present use that the same may be required for, I would recommend that the same be placed in charge of the Bureau for the Collection of City Revenue.

DEAR SIR—On May 14 last, at the request of Mr. Nichols, and confirming a verbal agreement had with him, we submitted to you in writing a proposition to exchange Rooms Nos. 2401 to 2404, inclusive, on the twenty-fourth floor, and Room No. 1822, on the eighteenth floor, for Rooms Nos. 1815, 1816 and 1817, on the eighteenth floor, and Rooms Nos. 1225, 1226, 1227, on the twelfth floor, the amount of rental to remain the same for the new offices as was paid by the City for the old ones. This proposition was accepted in a letter from you dated May 16.

Circular No. 5.

New York, May 1, 1902.

The attention of the Commissioner has been called to a circular dated Brooklyn, April 14, and which solicits contributions toward providing a suitable testimonial for one of the higher officers of the uniformed force who has recently been retired. This circular has been sent broadly through the apparatus houses of the department in the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens. It is signed by a civilian, not a member of the uniformed force, but in its effect it is contrary to the spirit of the regulations by which the uniformed force is governed in this regard, that it violates the provisions which forbid the soliciting of subscriptions or donations without the written consent, in advance, of the head of the department. The Commissioner has also received a number of written communications from members of the uniformed force, requesting him to prevent the circulation of a paper of this character, on the ground that many of the members of the force who cannot afford such subscription find themselves forced, by the influence of opinion around them, to furnish subscriptions which their circumstances do not justify. There is also manifest an apprehension on the part of some of the members of the force, drawn from past experience, that their failure to make such subscription would operate to their injury in their advancement in the department.

The Commissioner does not desire to forbid or prevent the use of their funds by members of the department in any way not injurious to the interests of the department, and when the act is purely voluntary with the giver; nor does the Commissioner wish to criticize, in the slightest degree, the object for which the subscription above referred to is sought, namely: the presentation of a souvenir to an old and worthy officer, but he considers himself, in an essential degree, the protector of the members of the force from injustice, extortion, oppression or intimidation, whether in a greater or less degree, and takes the present occasion to inform the entire uniformed force that the refusal or failure on the part of any member to subscribe to donations of the above character will not be construed to his discredit or allowed to operate to his disadvantage in the future.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
