J. A. BENSEL, Esq., Commissioner of Docks:

Sir—I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge and supervision for the quarter ending March 31, 1906:

#### Battery Wall, North River.

The existing platforms at this locality and the steamboat landing have been maintained during the quarter, and some repairs have been made to the steamboat landing.

#### Boat Landing, Pier "A," North River.

The boat landing has been maintained during the quarter, and the float inside the landing has been repaired from time to time when needed.

#### Rector Street Section, North River.

The work at this section is being done under authorization of the Commissioner of Docks of the 16th of December, 1903, and is at the cost and expense of the owners of the property to be improved. The wall has been practically completed for a portion of the section on either side of Pier (new) 7.

#### Cedar Street Section, North River.

By action of the Commissioner of Docks of December 10, 1902, a section of the bulkhead wall was authorized in the vicinity of Cedar street, extending from the middle of the block between Carlisle and Albany streets northerly to a point 40 feet southerly of the northerly line of Cedar street. This work included the removal of the old structures and Piers (old) 13 and 14, together with the sheds thereon. The building of the wall proper was practically completed during a prior quarter and filling has been placed in rear of the wall built. A pier to be known as Pier 11 has been finished as far as it is intended for the present, and a ferry rack has been constructed at the outer end of the pier preparatory to the work to be done by the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey on their new ferry.

#### Chambers Street Section, North River (Piers (New) 20 and 21).

Preparations are being made for extending these piers out to the pierhead line for the Erie Railroad Company, and rip-rap has been deposited over the area of the proposed piers.

#### Chelsea Section, North River.

On the 28th of December, 1900, the Board of Docks authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead wall between Bloomfield and West Twenty-third streets. Large property interests in this vicinity have in the past been acquired and extensive work done towards the construction of the wall, until at present the section is very nearly completed. During the past quarter the work on the section has been in progress, and 288 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made thereby. Earth filling is being placed in rear of that portion of the wall already built. The old buildings between Fourteenth and Seventeenth streets have been removed during the quarter and the section office has been removed from Twenty-second street to the vicinity of West Fourteenth street.

#### Pier (New) 54, North River.

The construction of a new pier to be known as Pier 54 at the foot of Thirteenth street has been in progress during the quarter under Contract No. 949.

#### Pier (New) 56, North River.

The construction of a new pier to be known as Pier 56 near the foot of Fourteenth street has been in progress during the quarter under Contract No. 941.

#### Pier (New) 59, North River.

The work of constructing a new pier to be known as Pier 59 at the foot of Eighteenth street has been in progress during the quarter under Contract No. 915, and is rapidly approaching completion.

Rebuilding the Terminal of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company and the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey.

On the 20th of December, 1905, a disastrous fire occurred in these premises, starting at the upper end of the ferry house of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company, and in a short time destroying both the terminals of that company and of the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, adjoining the same on the south. The companies affected by this fire immediately started to rebuild the destroyed structures, and during the quarter the work has been in progress. A temporary frame waiting-room for the accommodation of the passengers at the foot of West Twenty-third street has been built during the quarter by the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company, and a temporary approach for teams has been constructed at the north ferry slip at Twenty-third street by the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey. A frame building near the outer end of Pier 62 has been erected by the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, to be used in conjunction with the reconstruction of its ferry house at this locality.

#### Between Thirty-third and Thirty-fourth Streets, North River.

In this locality coping, where it had been originally moved from the wall, was cut and set and backing log fastened.

#### West Forty-second Street Section, North River.

By an order from the Engineer-in-Chief, dated 14th of November, 1905, the sections originally known as West Forty-second Street Section, West Forty-third Street Section Extended and West Forty-third Street Section were consolidated. The wall was practically completed, with the exception of the coping for all the portion except that extending across the foot of West Forty-second street, during a prior quarter.

#### Pier 83, North River.

The work of constructing a new pier to be known as Pier 83 near the foot of West Forty-third street under Contract No. 919 has been in progress during the quarter.

#### Claremont Section, North River.

The work at this section is being done under resolution of the Board of Docks passed November 16, 1900. During the past quarter work on the wall proper has been in progress and some coping set on the wall. Filling is being placed in rear of that portion of the wall built.

#### Pier at One Hundred and Thirty-third Street, North River.

The work of constructing an extension to this pier is in progress by the force of the Department.

#### Between Spuyten Duyvil and Mount St. Vincent.

The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company are widening the present railroad embankment between these two points, and rip-rap is being de-

posited along the line of the widening under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

#### Marginal Street, North River.

A contract awarded during a prior quarter with the Sicilian Asphalt Paving Company has been in progress. Under this contract the work of laying concrete foundation and asphalt pavement on the marginal street along the North river has been done. Repairs have also been made where necessary to the asphalt pavement already laid by the Uvalde Asphalt Paving Company under their various bonds to maintain the pavement in good condition. The granite pavement along certain portions of the waterfront, where necessary, has been taken up from time to time and relaid to grade.

#### Whitehall Terminal.

The work of constructing a new ferry terminal at this point for the Municipal Ferry to Staten Island is in progress. The work of removing the old ferry house is being done, and one of the slips has been completed. A contract has been prepared, but has not been let, for the construction of a new ferry house at this point, and a contract has been prepared and will shortly be let for the construction of a temporary waiting room to be used prior to the tearing down of the old ferry house.

#### North Side of Pier 3, East River.

Test piles have been driven and examination made of the river bottom preparatory to preparing plans and specifications for proposed ferry terminal for ferry to Thirty-ninth street, Brooklyn.

#### Pier 7, East River.

A temporary approach has been constructed to this pier preparatory to widening the pier.

#### Old Slip Section, East River.

The Commissioner of Docks, on December 7, 1904, issued the necessary authorization for the construction of the bulkhead wall from the northerly side of Pier (new) 7, where it joins the Broad street section to the westerly side of Burling slip, East river. This stretch of wall is divided into two sections, the Old slip section and the Maiden lane section. The Old slip section extends from the northerly or upper end of the Broad street section, and runs along the established bulkhead line to a point opposite the southerly line of Wall street. This section contemplates the erection of four new piers to be known as Piers 8, 9, 10 and 11. During the quarter the work of constructing the bulkhead wall proper has been in progress, and about 147 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made by the work done. Temporary approaches to Piers 10 and 11 have been constructed, and Piers (old) 13 and 14 are being removed.

#### Pier 8, East River.

The work of constructing this pier, under Contract No. 923, is in progress, and is rapidly approaching completion.

#### Pier 9, East River.

The work of constructing this pier, under Contract No. 968, was begun on February 28, 1906, and is in progress.

#### Pier 10, East River.

The work of constructing this pier, under Contract No. 924, has been completed, and 1,171 linear feet of wharfage room has been made by the work done.

#### Pier 11, East River.

The work of constructing this pier, under Contract No. 916, has been completed, and 1,156 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made by the work done. Storage of Concrete Material on Pier 8, East River, and Making Concrete Blocks. It having been thought advisable to provide a place in the lower part of the city where concrete material could be stored, the outer end of this pier was fitted up during a prior quarter with a derrick for handling material, and broken stone, sand and cement have been stored at this locality and concrete blocks made. Seven hundred and sixty-four batches of concrete were mixed and placed in molds, and 21 concrete blocks were fabricated.

#### Maiden Lane Section, East River.

By authorization of the Commissioner of Docks, dated December 7, 1904, the construction of the bulkhead wall along this stretch of waterfront has been ordered. The work extends from the southerly line of Wall street where it joins the Old slip section, to about the southerly line of Burling slip. Work on the bulkhead wall proper has been in progress during the quarter, and about 92 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made by the work done. Earth filling is being placed in rear of that portion of the wall built. Temporary approaches have been constructed to Piers 13 and 14. This section embraces Piers 12, 13, 14 and 15. Pier (new) 12 was built in 1901. Piers (new) 14 and 15 were built in 1905.

#### Pier (New) 13, East River.

The work of constructing this pier, under Contract No. 927, was completed on March 13, 1906, and 1,242.30 linear feet of new wharfage room made by the work done.

#### Fulton Section, East River.

This section of the bulkhead wall was authorized by the Board of Docks on April 26, 1901. This resolution was amended by action of the Commissioner of Docks on December 7, 1904. During the past quarter the work of constructing the bulkhead wall proper has been in progress, and 98.30 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made by the work done. The wall at this section is composed of concrete wall in place. One thousand two hundred and forty-two batches of concrete were deposited in molds on foundation area, and earth filling is being deposited in rear of that portion of the wall built. This section embraces Piers (new) 16, 17 and 18. Pier (new) 16 was built in 1901. Pier (new) 17 was built in 1905.

#### Pier (New) 18, East River.

The work of constructing a new pier, to be known as Pier 18 has been completed, under Contract No. 911, and 1,221 linear feet of new wharfage room made by the work done.

#### Market Section, East River.

The authorization for this section is the resolution of the Board of Docks, passed February 23, 1900. During the quarter work has been in progress on the bulkhead wall proper, but no new wharfage room has been made along this section. A temporary approach was constructed to Pier 28.

#### Pier (New) 28, East River.

The work of constructing a new pier to be known as Pier 28, under Contract No. 921, has been completed, and 999 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made by the work done.

#### Eighteenth Street, East River.

The pier at the foot of this street is being reconstructed by the force of the Department, under Bureau Order No. 3563, and the work is in progress.

#### Between Sixty-fourth and Sixty-fifth Streets, East River.

A temporary platform along the established bulkhead line is in course of construction by the force of the Department, under Bureau Order No. 3951.

#### Between Sixty-fifth and Sixty-sixth Streets, East River.

A test pile examination has been made at this locality to determine the nature of the river bottom.

#### Blackwell Section, East River.

By action of the Commissioner of October 10, 1904, Bureau Order No. 2756, the work of improving the waterfront, which was being done under resolution, for the East Seventy-fourth, East Seventy-fifth and East Seventy-seventh street sections, was consolidated, and a new section established as Blackwell Section, beginning at the southerly line of East Seventy-fourth street and extending to the northerly line of East Eighty-first street, a distance of 1,958.03 feet. A portion of the section in the neighborhood of East Seventy-fourth street was practically completed for quite a strip of wall during a previous quarter, and the work at this particular point has been suspended until the wall in the other sections makes a joint with it. During the present quarter work on other portions of the section has been in progress, and about 57 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made by the portion of the work done.



## East One Hundred and Second Street Section.

The work at this section has been done under resolution of the Board of Docks, passed July 17, 1890. This section was completed a number of years ago, but during the past quarter holes were drilled in the coping preparatory to placing mooring posts, and the pavement along the marginal street has been paved.

## One Hundred and Twentieth Street, Harlem River.

A new pier has been constructed at the foot of this street under Contract No. 940, and 295 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made by the work done.

## One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street, Port Morris.

A new pier has been constructed at the foot of this street under Contract No. 929. The work was finished February 8, 1906, and 495 linear feet of new wharfage room has been made by the work done.

## One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street, Harlem River.

Coal pockets and tower for hoisting purposes are being constructed at this locality by Trimmer & Sons under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced August 15, 1905, and is in progress.

## One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street, Harlem River.

The Pioneer Real Estate Company are building ferry slip, crib bulkhead, transfer bridge, freight house and freight terminal south of One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced February 27, 1906, and is in progress.

## One Hundred and Forty-ninth Street, Port Morris.

The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company are building a power station, pier slip and concrete bulkhead at this locality under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun June 1, 1904, and is in progress.

## One Hundred and Fiftieth Street, East River, Oak Point.

The Rock Plaster Company of New York and New Jersey are building a crib bulkhead at this locality and filling in behind same under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

## East Chester Creek.

The New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company are constructing an embankment along its trestle each side of the draw bridge by the depositing of earth filling under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. This work was commenced May 23, 1904, and is in progress.

## Bancroft Street, Bronx River.

A pile platform has been erected south of this street by the American Real Estate Company under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced January 4, 1906, and completed March 1, 1906.

## Eastern Boulevard and Westchester Creek.

A boat house has been erected at this locality by George E. Poulsen under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced December 15, 1905, and completed March 16, 1906.

## One Hundred and Fifty-ninth Street, Harlem River, South of Speedway.

A bulkhead platform is being constructed and other improvements are being made at this locality by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced September 1, 1905, and is in progress.

## Fourth Avenue Railroad Bridge, Harlem River.

A submarine cable is being placed, piles driven and filling placed around same at this locality by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced February 15, 1906, and is in progress.

## Marble Hill, Spuyten Duyvil, Harlem River.

The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company are constructing a new road bed in connection with the Marble Hill cut-off at this locality under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced July 20, 1904, and is in progress.

## One Hundred and Eighty-ninth to One Hundred and Ninety-second Streets, Harlem River.

A crib bulkhead is being constructed at this locality by the Kingsbridge Real Estate Company under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced January 29, 1905, and is in progress.

## Morris Heights, Harlem River.

A rip-rap wall is being built and filling placed behind same at this locality by the Gas Engine and Power Company (Seabury's) in accordance with permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced December 15, 1901, and is in progress.

## Putnam Railroad Bridge to High Bridge.

A pile and timber trestle is being built, same to be filled with rip-rap, by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced July 25, 1904, and is in progress.

## BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

## Grand Street and Gardiner Avenues, Brooklyn.

A bulkhead platform and basin have been constructed at this locality by the Cross, Austin & Ireland Company under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced June 10, 1905, and completed February 17, 1906.

## Greenpoint Avenue, Kingsland Avenue, Brooklyn.

Storage sheds and tanks are being erected at this locality by the Rockland-Rockport Lime Company under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced September 6, 1905, and is in progress.

## Stagg and Scholes Streets, Brooklyn.

An asphalt paving plant is being constructed at this locality by the Barber Asphalt Paving Company under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced August 15, 1905, and is in progress.

## India Street, Brooklyn.

A pier is being constructed at this location by the estate of Henry Steers under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced February 8, 1906, and is in progress.

## Division Avenue, Wallabout Canal.

A bulkhead foundation for coal towers, ash pockets, and a system of condensing water tunnels have been constructed south of Division avenue by the Transit Development Company under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced August 10, 1904, and completed January 3, 1906.

## Gold Street, Brooklyn.

The Kings County Electric Light and Power Company are rebuilding the bulkhead wall and building foundations, screening wells, etc., at this locality under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced April 6, 1905, and is in progress.

## Bridge Street, Brooklyn.

The Jay Street Terminal Company are removing Pier (old) 3 and constructing Pier (new) 2, with bulkhead, at this location under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced March 12, 1906, and is in progress.

## Montague Street, Brooklyn.

The New York Dock Company are constructing Piers 10, 11, 12 and 13, at this locality, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced May 8, 1905, and is in progress. The same company are building pier sheds on the above piers under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. This work was commenced October 9, 1905, and is in progress.

## Sullivan and Wolfert Streets, Brooklyn (Buttermilk Channel).

A pile platform was constructed at this locality by the New York Dock Company, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced September 20, 1905, and finished January 15, 1906.

## Otsego Street, Erie Basin, Brooklyn.

A crib bulkhead and pile platform were constructed at this locality by the John W. Robbins Company, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced January 8, 1906, and finished February 1, 1906.

## Sixth Street Basin, Gowanus Canal, Brooklyn.

A concrete building was erected at this locality by the Concrete Building Stone Company, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced October 17, 1905, and finished January 10, 1906.

## Between Forty-third and Fifty-first Streets, Brooklyn.

Five new piers are being erected at this location by the Bush Company, Inc., under Secretary's Order No. 21424. Work was commenced April 1, 1902, and is in progress.

## Sheepshead Bay, Manhattan Beach, Brooklyn.

The Manhattan Beach Hotel and Land Company are dredging, filling and bulkheading at this locality, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was commenced January 30, 1905, and is in progress.

## Flatbush Avenue, Jamaica Bay, Brooklyn.

A pile bulkhead is being constructed at this locality, and filling in behind same and dredging done by Terrence F. Curley, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Work was begun August 15, 1905, and is in progress.

## Twenty-second Street, Sheepshead Bay, Brooklyn.

The work of filling in on property north of Emmons avenue, near Twenty-second street, Sheepshead Bay, by William Esmark, under permit from the Commissioner of Docks, has been completed. Work was commenced December 20, 1900, and completed January 11, 1906.

## Borough of Queens.

At Lawrence Point the Astoria Light, Heat and Power Company are constructing two crib piers and building bulkheads and slips. At Fourteenth avenue, Whitestone Landing, a crib bulkhead has been built by the Astoria Marble Company. Between Worth and Noble streets, Long Island City, the work of dredging and constructing a crib bulkhead is in progress by William Bradley & Son. At Pierce and Graham avenues, Queens, a crib bulkhead is being constructed by Edward Schuttelworth. Between Hunter's Point avenue and Nott avenue, Dutch Kills, Long Island City, a crib bulkhead is being constructed by the Degnon Realty Terminal Improvement Company. Between Hunter's Point avenue and Anabel avenue, Dutch Kills, a crib bulkhead on piles is being constructed by the Degnon Construction Company. East of Dutch Kills, Newtown creek, crib bulkhead and piers are being constructed by the Long Island Railroad Company. All the above work is being done under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

## Borough of Richmond.

A number of pieces of work have been done by private parties and supervised by the Department of Docks and Ferries in this Borough. At Mariners' Harbor a crib and close pile bulkhead and a small pier and wooden shed are being constructed by the New Jersey Dock and Bridge Building Company, and a pier and extension to the pier-head line are being constructed by Henry DuBois Sons Company, between Central and Van Pelt avenues. At St. George a crib bulkhead and sheet pile bulkhead are being built by the Staten Island Rapid Transit Company, and a pier for a "McMyler" car dumper is being erected by the same company. A crib lighterage pier and crib bulkhead have been built, and Piers 2 and 5 have been extended by the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company. At Port Richmond a dry stone retaining wall structure is being constructed outshore of the railroad trestle by the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company. At Tottenville a crib or pile bulkhead, with filling behind same, is being constructed, and a pier is being constructed and dredging done at the foot of Henry street by Henry Cossey; a pier is being constructed easterly of Henry street by Henry Cossey, and the ferry bridge at Tottenville is being replaced with a new bridge by the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company. At New Brighton a crib bulkhead is being erected by J. B. King & Co. At Tompkinsville The American Dock and Trust Company are extending their pier, known as Pier 3, near the foot of Arrietta street, and also extending shed on said pier. At Stapleton a crib bulkhead is being built at the James D. Leary Long Dock by Bernard Brady. At Arthur Kills a marine railway about 240 feet north of the foot of Amboy road is being constructed by William H. Brown.

## Pavement on Marginal Street, North and East Rivers.

The asphalt pavement has been repaired at various places along the North and East rivers, where necessary, to repair pavement already laid, and the work under contract No. 879 for the repairing of the wearing surface and binder and concrete foundations for the asphalt pavement along the North and East rivers has been in progress.

## Pavement on East River.

Pavement has been repaired along the East river waterfront, as required.

## Timber Basin, Seventy-fifth Street, North River.

At the Timber Basin timber has been received under Department orders and contracts, cared for and issued as required. The Timber Basin has been maintained and cared for.

## Pile Basin, Sherman's Creek.

The Pile Basin, at Sherman's creek, on the Harlem river, has been maintained and cared for.

## Basin for Storage of Old Material, Brooklyn.

At this basin old material has been rafted and cared for.

## Department Yards at West Fifty-seventh and East Twenty-fourth Streets.

At the Department yards the force of the Department has been engaged in the construction of concrete blocks, the handling and cutting of granite, the care of materials and the issue of supplies for various pieces of work. The yards have been maintained in good order and condition.

## Floating Property.

All of the floating property of the Department has been cared for during the quarter and repaired where necessary. Work has been in progress under Class 1 of Contract No. 907 for building pile drivers. The work under Class 4 of the above contract for building derrick has not yet been commenced.

## Dredging.

All the dredging has been supervised whether done by the Department or private parties.

## Surveying Party.

All the necessary lines, grades, soundings, surveys and examinations have been made and given. Work done by private parties has been supervised, automatic tide gauges have been attended to and the daily and weekly reports have been made. The records of the anemometer and weather vane, etc., have been compiled. An extensive survey of the waterfronts of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond is in progress.

## Repairs.

Repairs other than dredging have been made at various times under orders or permit from the Commissioner of Docks. Repairs, alterations and other pieces of work by private parties under order or permit from the Commissioner of Docks have been supervised during the quarter.

## Recreation Structures.

The recreation structures have been maintained and cared for during the quarter.

## New Staten Island Ferry.

The operation of this ferry was begun on the 25th of October, 1905, and since that time the ferry has been maintained and operated.

Contracts have been awarded for the construction of the necessary ferry terminals at the foot of Whitehall street, East river, and at St. George, S. I., and the work has been in progress during the quarter.

A contract has been prepared and will shortly be let for the construction of a temporary waiting-room and boiler house in front of the Whitehall terminal preparatory to construction of the new ferry house.



**Draughtsmen.**

In the office of the Engineer-in-Chief the Draughtsmen have been engaged on plans and studies for contract work, plans for the improvement of the waterfront, plans and specifications for new piers and repairs, change of lines, examination of plans submitted by private parties, solar printing and general routine work.

The total new wharfage room made by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the quarter amounted to 7,513 linear feet. Wharfage room destroyed by the City in making way for new improvements, 140 linear feet. The area of the City's piers has been increased by 169,860 square feet.

The total increase in wharfage room made by private parties under permit from the Department of Docks and Ferries is 5,481 linear feet.

Sir—Pursuant to the requirements of section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments submit the following report of the operations and action of this Department for the quarter ending March 31, 1906:

The books of annual record of the assessed valuation of real and personal estate of the several boroughs of The City of New York were completed and opened for inspection and correction on the second Monday of January, as required by law.

Previous to that date and since then up to March 31, the fact that such books were open for inspection and correction was advertised in the CITY RECORD and in such other newspapers published in the several boroughs as were authorized by the Board of City Record.

Every opportunity was afforded to persons and corporations assessed upon either real or personal estate to present their claims for reduction of such assessments. A very large number of such applications were thus received, and it is believed that in no preceding year has there been as little delay and inconvenience caused to those who desired to present their applications. The action of the Commissioners upon these applications will be duly stated in the Department's report for the quarter ending June 30, 1906, when all corrections of assessments will have been duly recorded and the assessment rolls for the year 1906 will be completed in readiness for delivery to the Board of Aldermen on the first Monday of July, as provided by section 907 of the Greater New York Charter.

The following summary shows the work done in the office of the Surveyor of the Department during the quarter ending March 31, 1906:

**Lot Alterations.**

Borough of Manhattan—Alterations were made affecting 246 lots in the 37 volumes of block tax assessment maps.

Borough of The Bronx—Alterations were made affecting 596 lots in the 31 volumes of block tax assessment maps and in the 6 volumes of tentative maps.

Borough of Brooklyn—Alterations were made affecting 1463 lots in the 77 volumes of block tax assessment maps and in the 18 volumes of tentative maps.

Borough of Queens—Alterations were made affecting 1,499 lots in the 31 volumes of tentative maps.

Borough of Richmond—Alterations were made affecting 224 lots in the 13 volumes of tentative maps.

The duplicate copies of the tax maps used by the Deputy Commissioners in all the boroughs, and the copies of the block tax assessment maps in the offices of the Bureau of Arrears and Water Registrar in the boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn, were corrected to correspond with the alterations made on the original maps.

All corporations liable to a real estate tax not heretofore entered, were numbered and entered on the tax maps.

**Street Openings.**

Lands acquired in thirty-eight proceedings were properly shown on the tax maps; four of the proceedings were in the Borough of Manhattan, fourteen were in the Borough of The Bronx, thirteen in the Borough of Brooklyn and seven in the Borough of Queens.

**Street Closings.**

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment discontinued three streets in the Borough of The Bronx, three in the Borough of Brooklyn and one in the Borough of Queens, which were taken from the tax maps.

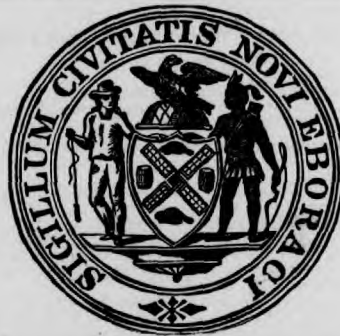

## GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
