Hudson River Crossing—A report was received from Commissioner Chadwick dated July 25, 1910 (15313), recommending approval of agreement with the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Co. to locate, construct and maintain upon a strip of land formerly occupied by the Cranford Company near Storm King Station, 40 feet wide by 100 feet long, a boiler and compressor house, together with bin for storage of coal, and to install, operate and maintain such boilers, compressors and other machinery necessary for the prosecution of the work of this Board, and to construct and maintain a powder magazine for the storage of dynamite and powder; also to lay, maintain and operate a pipe line for the transportation of compressed air from the compressor house to the site of the shaft, the Board to pay \$100 per annum rental from May 21, 1909, and any taxes upon said buildings or improvements made by the City on said land. On motion, this recommendation and agreement were approved, and voucher was ordered to be prepared for the amount of rent due from May 21, 1909.

Leases—Pursuant to recommendation of the Chief Engineer in his communication 4762 (14886), the resolution of this Board adopted June 29, 1910, authorizing lease of premises in the Town of Cortlandt, N. Y., from Jules Breuchaud and Bernard F. Coleman, was amended to read as follows:

Resolved, That the Secretary be and is hereby directed to submit to the Corporation Counsel for approval as to form, and, when so approved, to execute a lease to the Board of Water Supply of The City of New York, from Jules Breuchaud and Bernard F. Coleman, sole surviving partners of the firm of Coleman, Breuchaud & Coleman, of the two-story and attic frame building about 22 feet by 26 feet, exclusive of porch, situated in the Town of Cortlandt, Westchester County, N. Y., about 200 feet south of Crompond road, at a point 3½ miles from Peekskill Village, about 1,200 feet south of the junction of Lexington ave. and Crompond road, and about 1,200 feet west of the junction of Catharine st. and Crompond road; the first story to consist of a hall and stairway and three rooms about 12 feet by 15 feet, 11 feet by 12 feet and 10 feet by 12 feet, and containing approximately 182, 125 and 122 square feet of floor space respectively; the second floor to consist of a hall and stairway, two closets and three rooms, about 12 feet by 15 feet, 12 feet by 12 feet and 8 feet by 9 feet, and containing approximately 182, 130 and 75 square feet respectively; the total floor space in both stories to contain about 970 square feet, with use of a cellar under the whole house 8 feet in depth; also the use of a carriage house located about 50 feet northwest of house, and the use of so much land surrounding house and carriage house and included between the road on the north and west, the township line on the east and a fence on the south, as may be desired for purpose of ingress and egress—garden and lawn. This lease to be for a term of one year from September 1, 1910, with rental at the rate of \$300 per annum, payable quarterly at the end of each quarter, with the privilege of renewal for one year from September 1, 1911, on the same terms and conditions.

SK-2635, showing the location of the proposed route of said railroad with reference to the flow-line of the Kensico Reservoir, and the taking-line of the City, and also transmitted blueprint Acc. SK-2634, showing a profile of the proposed line across the lowest portion of the property acquired by the City. The Chief Engineer recommended that if the Board considered it advisable to permit said Company to construct the line as now proposed, permission be granted under the conditions mentioned in his communication. On motion, this matter was referred to the Commissioners of the Board as a Committee of the Whole.

Real Estate, Northern Aqueduct, Section 1—Opinion 1017, July 20, 1910 (15210), advised that on June 25, 1910, there was transmitted to the Comptroller certified copy of order of the Supreme Court amending the order confirming the awards in the fifth report of the Commissioners of Appraisal in this proceeding, and directing the Comptroller to pay certain attorneys, who represented claimants of Parcels 6, 9, 12, 18, 18½, 25, 26, 30, 33, 34, 35, 36, 44 and 45, an additional allowance of 5 per cent. on the amount of said awards, and also transmitted copies of claims of Robert McCord for \$838.75 and Edward G. 

#### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for the City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or her name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application thereto at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
