DEPARTMENT OF PLANT AND STRUCTURES.

REPORT FOR QUARTER ENDED JUNE 30, 1916.

During this quarter the Department of Bridges went out of existence, being superseded by the new Department of Plant and Structures. A bill amending the Charter so as to provide for this change was introduced in the Legislature by this administration and was passed by both houses. Following its approval by the City it was signed by the Governor May 12, and became chapter 528 of the Laws of 1916.

The Plant and Structures bill was forwarded to the Legislature and was endorsed by the administration as an economy measure, the changes contemplated being the placing of central control and direction in a single department over the functions of building and structure construction and maintenance and repair work previously regulated and directed by the individual heads of the following departments: Police, Fire, Street Cleaning, Public Charities, Correction, Health, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals and Parks for all of the boroughs.

The new chapter of the law is permissive as to the actual transfer of functions upon which the central administration of this work might be predicated. The power to make this transfer resides with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Central Garage Operation.

This quarter marks the second three months operation of the new Municipal Garage or central control and dispatching agency for motor vehicles used for departmental transportation. On Sept. 22, 1916, I submitted to you in full a special report on the first six months operation of this new system. In view of the fact of the submission of this special report, it does not seem necessary to set forth at length here the full results of the operation. In brief, a large saving has been effected, operating cost having been reduced about one-half. The garage supplied 54,368 hours of service with 72 motor vehicles, where in 1915, under individual departmental control without a central dispatching system, only 51,565 hours of service were provided with 94 cars. The operation of cars for the new garage for the first six months cost \$51,200, as compared with a cost of \$100,655 in 1915 with the 94 cars heretofore referred to. During the quarter for which I am reporting, the garage received 4,322 orders for service. Of this, 3,771 were filled, 176 were cancelled for one reason or other, and 375 were unfilled owing to the previous assignment of all cars and chauffeurs for the day in question. The total number of service hours supplied was approximately 31,000. The maximum number of calls filled in any one day was 58. The garage system provides for a record of each trip as to mileage and destination, waiting time, stops and number of passengers. Records are also kept of the consumption of gasoline, oil, tires and other supplies, as well as the cost of maintenance and repairs of individual cars.

Brooklyn Bridge.

During the quarter the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company completed the erection of hand railings on the entire lines of the large stairways leading from the elevated platforms to the mezzanine floor of the New York station, and completed the work of putting in guard railings on the inner side of the running rails at the six slip joints.

On May 20 all through trolley service across the bridge was discontinued from 12.01 to 4.45 a. m., while new trolley wire was being installed over each track.

On May 23, service over west bound incline trolley track, Brooklyn Approach, was discontinued during morning on account of derailment of Flatbush Avenue car over High Street.

From 9 p. m., May 31, to 5.15 a. m., June 1, shuttle trains were run on west bound elevated tracks while repairs were made to east bound tracks in New York Station, and new rails laid on up grade track on structure.

Other track repairs during the period consisted of repairs to deck, Concord and High Streets; new trackwork and ties in New York Station and repaving along east bound trolley track, New York Approach.

A count was made of all cars and trains crossing the Brooklyn and Manhattan Bridges for the twenty-four hours, beginning at 12.01 a. m., May 18th.

The contract for installation of hand stoker under Boiler No. 1, Prospect Street plant, was completed April 3rd. The contract for installation of fireproof, self-closing windows on rear of building at No. 352 Pearl Street, was completed April 24th. Work on the contract for tar and gravel roofing, flashing and gutters on roofs of warehouses in Manhattan, which was started on April 27th, was completed on May 10th. Work on the contract for repairs to asphalt paving in New York Station and on promenade, New York Approach, which was started on May 3rd, was completed on May 11th. The contractor then started on repairs required by the railroad company to the asphalt paving around the ticket booths, on the elevated railway platforms and adjacent to the trolley tracks in the New York Station. Work on the installation of elevators and the alterations to floors, doors, drains, partitions, etc., in Arches Nos. 2 and 12 was completed and the arches turned over for occupancy by the new tenants.

A new all steel hanging roof was completed under the elevated deck in the old coal yard, Concord to Nassau Street, a fireproof wall constructed along the store-room and along the Washington Street side, adjacent to the trolley incline, the old partitions moved over and the new part opened as an extension to the garage.

In addition, the regular forces were assigned to routine maintenance work. The carpenters to repair work in Arches Nos. 2, 12 and 16, at 352 Pearl st., at 297 Water st., at 281 Front st., at 167 South st. and 170 South st. From May 2 to 22, six carpenters were detailed to the Queensboro Bridge for emergency work on roadway repairs.

The emergency repairs on the structure were as follows: New lower part and sleeve nut put in on counter bar U74-L72, South Intermediate Truss, New York River Span, on April 19. New suspender rod 104E, Cable A, Brooklyn River Span, put in on May 10. Suspender rod 85B, Brooklyn Land Span, tightened up on May 8. Repairs completed to truss anchors at Brooklyn Tower. Progress repairs on the structure were as follows: Cable posts and cable wrapping repairs on New York Land Span completed from 117A to 113A, from 119B to 116B, from 119C to 117C and from 118D to 115D. Repairs to stringers and floor beams under north elevated railroad tracks completed on Brooklyn Land Span on May 24th. Riveting on new cover plates on bottom chords of the outer trusses, new suspender plates on floor beams, and riveting up curb posts, knee braces and bridging, has progressed on the New York River Span from Point 89 to Point 59, Truss A, and from Point 89 to Point 20, Truss D. New pins and plates have been put in on top chords, New York River Span, at 64 and 69, North Intermediate Truss, and at 79D and 80D. Repairs have been made to promenade railings, from Point 52 to Point 84, Trusses B and C. New York Land Span. Inspection platform under the structure on the east face of

Brooklyn Tower completed. Ladders from the cables to the tops of the Main Towers and railings on the top of the towers, erected.

Special work was done in the Machine Shop (Brooklyn Bridge) for the Manhattan Bridge, the Williamsburg Bridge, the Queensboro Bridge, the Vernon Avenue Bridge, the Grand Street Bridge, the Washington Avenue Bridge, the Macombs Dam Bridge and the Willis Avenue Bridge.

Manhattan Bridge.

During the quarter very rapid progress has been made on the contract for improvement of Manhattan Plaza. The arch and colonnades, including the statuary work in front of both arch legs, have been completed; also the exterior wall on Forsyth and Canal Streets. The work on the granite wall along the Bowery is progressing and is about 50 per cent. completed. The electric lighting system is about 50 per cent. completed. The parking on west plaza is about 10 per cent. completed. The percentage of completion for the entire contract is 95.

There has been no change in the status of the work on the contract for the improvement of Brooklyn Plaza, since last report. The statuary work in front of pylons is not yet finished. All other work is completed. This contract is 99 per cent. completed.

In addition, routine maintenance work has been performed by the regular force. At the Brooklyn Anchorage, wires were shifted from temporary to permanent poles. Lights and poles were erected at the Three Cent Line loop, Manhattan. Roadway and fences built from Bowery to loop of Three Cent Line. Temporary tracks of Three Cent Line at Canal Street and Bridge Roadway removed and concrete base and paving placed at this location.

Williamsburg Bridge.

During the quarter the painting of the bottom deck of the New York Land Span was completed, 50 per cent. of the total work having been done during the three months. 35 per cent. of the New York Approach was completed. The repainting of this structure would have been completed in June had the full complement of men been allowed for the work, but it was found necessary to detail one-half of the force to other structures during the quarter. Preparations were made to renovate the interior of the New York Subway Station. During the quarter the equipment on the Brooklyn Plaza, including the new Bedford Avenue station, was repainted.

During the quarter, the construction plant, consisting of all tools and two portable houses, field office and men's quarters, was transferred from Delancey and Ridge sts. to the North Footwalk of the Main Span.

Hangers on the End and Main Spans were drilled for the erection of the elevated guard beams. A contract for furnishing 128 tons of steel for this work was awarded to the Vulcan Rail & Construction Co., on May 23rd, 1916. A cross-over 40 feet wide was constructed at the centre of the Main Span, connecting the North and South Footwalks. Benches were installed, and this was used during the summer and early fall by the public as a recreation centre.

Pay-station telephone booths were established on the centre platform of the Bedford ave. Station and lights installed and operated in telephone booths at Loops 2, 4 and 6, Manhattan Subway Station, and at Bedford ave. Station, on June 1, 1916.

Laborers from the High Pressure and Low Pressure Divisions of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, excavated in the Manhattan Plaza, exposing service pipes and repaired leaks in mains at Clinton st. and searched for leaks in Norfolk st. without success.

A new esplanade has been constructed on the North Footwalk, between Panel Point 65, Manhattan Main Span, to Point 65, Brooklyn Main Span, an area 20x200 with a 40-foot cross-walk connecting it and the South Footwalk at centre of span. Permanent wood benches have been built in place for the entire length.

Laborers from the Sewer Department, Brooklyn, tried, without success, to clear stopped up S. 5th st. sewer, which is exclusively used by this Department to drain the Brooklyn Approach of the bridge from New Street to Driggs ave.

The new stairways at the east end of the outside platforms of the Bedford Avenue Station were opened to the public on June 27.

The sewage disposal plant located in the Kent Avenue Yard has not started permanent operation as yet, alterations and experiments not being completed.

The trackmen of the New York Railways Company are laying new 100-pound rails along the Manhattan approach and have regraded the Bridge Street crossing where depressed. They have now progressed with the work to about Panel Point 581-2, Manhattan approach, on westbound, and Panel Point 91, Manhattan approach, on eastbound track, making a total of 2,216 linear feet of single track laid to date.

Through elevated service from Chambers Street to Rockaway Beach was started on June 25.

A careful detailed inspection of the structure has been maintained, the results of which form the basis of the maintenance work of the mechanical force.

Queensboro Bridge.

During this quarter the preliminary work was done in connection with the reconstruction of the roadway pavement of the Queensboro Bridge, for which the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriated \$144,000. Detailed plans were worked out under the direction of the Chief of Engineering Staff, E. A. Byrne. On April 30 compressors were installed at Panel Point 17, Tower No. 1, South Footwalk, and on April 11 work was begun in connection with the drilling of buckle plates for the reinforcing angles for the new permanent roadway pavement. The work completed during the quarter consisted of drilling along the south half of the main bridge from Panel Point 1 to Panel Point 123, a distance of 3,724 feet; along the Queens Approach from Panel Point 1 to Panel Point 12, a distance of 267 feet; the full width of the roadway from Panel Point 12 to Panel Point 46, a distance of 900 feet, along the north side; and from Panel Point 46 to Panel Point 90, along the south side, a distance of 1,039 feet. The drilling was completed on June 14. On June 30 work was resumed drilling the two southerly buckle plates under and adjacent to track beginning at Panel Point 12. The number of holes drilled between April 11 and June 14 was 40,515. During this quarter somewhat extensive roadway repairs of a temporary nature were necessary in order to maintain traffic under anything like satisfactory conditions on the bridge. From May 2 to May 20, a force of Mechanics and Laborers were employed in removing sections of bulged or depressed wood block and in laying, as a substitute pavement, yellow pine planks bolted crosswise upon the stringers of the bridge floor. Small sections of bulged pavement were also repaired with old block. Approximately 58 men were employed on this work and its direction.

On June 19 the New York and Queens County Railway Co. began work in connection with the installation of the new additional trolley wires preparatory to changing the trolley system from the inner to outer track, as made necessary by the

roadway repaving. The company erected hangers and overhead wooden trolley troughs along the north and south spurs at the Manhattan end of the bridge and at all expansion points along the main bridge and Queens Approach. They installed emergency feeders at Point 90, Queens Approach, and this was put into operation June 26.

Motor cycle racks were installed in the store room under the Manhattan Approach for the use of the police assigned to motorcycle traffic work.

The following is a summary for the quarter for the number of round trips of cars of the various lines of street railway companies operating across the bridge:

Harlem River, Manhattan and Bronx Bridges.

During the quarter practically all of the work incident to the laying of the street car tracks of the Willis Avenue Bridge was completed. The pavement on the Manhattan Approach was relaid to the new grade, as per the agreement with the Union Railway Company, and the curbs, drain boxes, pull boxes and sidewalks were raised to correspond. The pavement was completed on May 24. In addition, the Department removed the asphalt and concrete over the buckle plates on the easterly side of the fixed span and laid a new concrete subsurface consisting of one part cement, two parts sand and four parts ¾-inch broken stone. Between April 11th and May 1st the asphalt pavement on this bridge has been renewed to the extent of 3,718.11 square yards. This was done on contract and included a large part of the area of the bridge maintained by the City. On May 27 the railroad company completed the pavement on the Southern Boulevard approach, the only work remaining to be done by that company at the end of the quarter was some painting on the under side of the structure. On April 5 the company began the operation of cars over the main structure, but up to the end of the quarter no cars had been run over the Southern Boulevard approach. By agreement, the Union Railway Company installed new conduit for the new lighting system, the Department installing the wire, which was furnished by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. Each lamppost now carries a 100-watt lamp in place of the 200-watt lamps formerly placed on alternate poles.

At the Third Avenue Bridge asphalt repairs were made the latter part of April, amounting to 317.79 square yards.

At the Macombs Dam Bridge asphalt repairs amounting to 569.17 square yards were found necessary.

At the Washington Bridge asphalt repairs amounting to 270.61 square yards were made.

Prior to this quarter, the contractors, Rodgers & Hagerty, Inc., did no work at the site of the new Unionport Bridge except to remove the top of one of the steel cylinders forming the centre support for the old draw span. On April 11, however, work was resumed. During the quarter the entire cluster of seven cylinders was removed, and also the timber which constituted the easterly abutment of the old bridge. Some dredgings were done at the site of the east abutment of the new bridge, and practically all of the piles for the abutment were driven. A cofferdam was built at the site of the west abutment, and the excavation here was carried to an average depth of 20 feet below mean high water. The bottom of this excavation consisted of boulders and very large pieces of native stone or outcropping bed-rock, together with hard pan and a small amount of disintegrated rock. This bottom was accepted on June 27th, and the concreting was begun. At the end of the quarter about 6 feet of concrete had been deposited over the bottom. The caisson for the East Rest Pier was under construction at the foot of Randall Avenue and the Bronx River at the end of the quarter, and was about 90 per cent. completed.

Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond Bridges.

In addition to minor repairs and routine maintenance, other repairs and replacements were made on the respective bridges in this division, as follows:

The roadway floor of the Washington Avenue Bridge, or that portion outside of the surface car tracks, has been reconstructed by adding four additional lines of steel stringers, a new plank deck 5 inches thick, and a wearing surface three inches thick composed of 3-inch by 8-inch creosoted yellow pine paving blocks, joints filled with pitch and sand.

At the Vernon Avenue Bridge repairs were completed on the track plates and the shoe plates of the southeasterly rolling segment or rocker and the southerly lift span put in service on April 9th, 1916. The following day a shoe plate broke loose from the northeasterly rolling segment or rocker. This break prevented further operation of the northerly lift span until a temporary shoe plate was fitted and bolted to the webs of the rocker. Repairs were completed April 15. Four new rolled steel plates with heavy chord angles have been ordered for further repairs required.

Repairs were made to the roadway planking on the Vernon Avenue Bridge, Union Street Bridge, Greenpoint Avenue Bridge and Ocean Avenue Bridge, and to the asphalt pavement on the east approach to Carroll Street Bridge, and the Medina block pavement on the approaches to the Flushing Bridge.

Repairs were made to the machinery on the Grand Street Bridge and the Washington Avenue Bridge.

New bumpers were constructed and erected over each rocker to replace the old bumpers at the Vernon Avenue Bridge.

At the Hamilton Avenue Bridge repairs were made to the concrete at the base of the east abutment, and the rack supports.

Painting Division.

In addition to the painting of the Williamsburg Bridge, the men cleaned and touched up certain parts of the steel work of the Manhattan Bridge in order to preserve the steel from corrosion. They also painted all new steel, lattice flooring and railings, shelter houses and fire apparatus.

At the Brooklyn Bridge the force painted the new garage extension interior in flat white, and painted automobiles, signs, etc.

This division did important work at the Queensboro Bridge, taking charge of the rigging under deck and above deck for roadway repair work.

The Strong's Causeway Bridge, Harway Avenue Bridge, Ocean Avenue Bridge and Little Neck Bridge were painted during the quarter.

The steel floor beams of the Washington Avenue Bridge were redlead.

The Vernon Avenue Bridge houses and the Borden Avenue Bridge houses were painted.

Division of Design.

The Division of Design prepared for the use of the Public Service Commission drawing giving the weights of the present and proposed terminals over the new subway at the Brooklyn Bridge. This also shows column loads on the Brooklyn Bridge in connection with the Municipal Building subway connection.

Drawings and specifications for the improvement of the Manhattan Plaza of the Manhattan Bridge were practically completed. Slight revisions were necessary because of last minute changes.

Completed drawings and prepared requisitions, etc., for material for the Queensboro Bridge roadway pavement. Prepared a design for a new stairway approach to Queens Plaza.

Shop drawings submitted by the contractor for the new Unionport Bridge were checked, and steel work drawings were practically completed.

Prepared revised drawings for Eastchester Bridge, giving additional data as requested by the War Department.

Completed plans for repaving the approaches of the City Island Bridge.

Assisted in the preparation of charts in connection with the reorganization proposed under the Plant and Structures Act.

Municipal Building.

The following is a summary of the work in progress at the Municipal Building during the quarter:

Shur-Loc Co.—Removing operating arms and old latching devices and installing door lock and car interlocking device on elevator cars Nos. 2, 3, 4, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 20, 21, 22, 23, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31.

Nelson Co.—Painting passageway in the basement of the Municipal Building, connecting the Interborough Rapid Transit Co. and the Municipal Railway Co. subway stations.

Lord Electric Co.—Replacing defective wiring in the elevator signal system; installing wiring for electric door opener in the eighth story.

Richey, Brown & Donald—Removing defective roller bearings from elevator door hangers and adjusting doors in elevator shafts 2, 3, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 19, 21, 22, 27, 29.

Johnson Service Co.—Overhauling and repairing heat control system throughout the building.

Lamson Company—Installing pneumatic carrier system in Stock and Bond Division of the Finance Department in the seventh and eighth stories, under open market order of this Department.

Art Metal Construction Co.—Contractor for furnishing and installing metal railings, screens, counters, etc.; erecting steel and glass partitions in the tenth, fourteenth and twenty-first stories; installing metal railing and gate in the third, tenth and seventeenth stories; installing bronze cage grille in the sixth, eighth, eleventh and seventeenth stories; cutting and fitting special counter in the sixth story; reinforcing partitions in the seventh story.

The Edw. Schroeder Lamp Works—Contractor for furnishing and installing lighting fixtures in the Municipal Building; installing fixtures in front of water gauges in boiler room; removing and installing fixtures in the eighth story; installing fixtures in the passageway connecting subway stations in the mezzanine story.

Pullman Automatic Ventilator Mfg. Co.—Contractor for furnishing and setting window ventilators; installing additional ventilators in various rooms in the Municipal Building and adjusting and repairing defective ventilator work throughout the building.

Louis J. Sieling—Contractor for furnishing and installing counter screen reflectors in the Municipal Building; prepared and secured the approval of all plans required for this work; also samples of material to be used, and work is now being manufactured.

Interior Metal Mfg. Co.—Contractor for furnishing and installing metal partitions and railings. This contractor has made all the plans for the partitions ordered under this contract and has secured the approval of all material to be used. The work is now going through the shops and the first shipment (41 cases) was shipped on June 28th, 1916.

Plans and estimates were also prepared for changes necessary in the 5th story to accommodate the new City Magistrates' Court for the new location for the Municipal Reference Library, the new space assigned to the Committee on Education of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Central Payroll Division; also certain changes for the Finance Department in the seventh story and the offices of the Borough President in the twenty-first story and other changes in the general construction of the building.

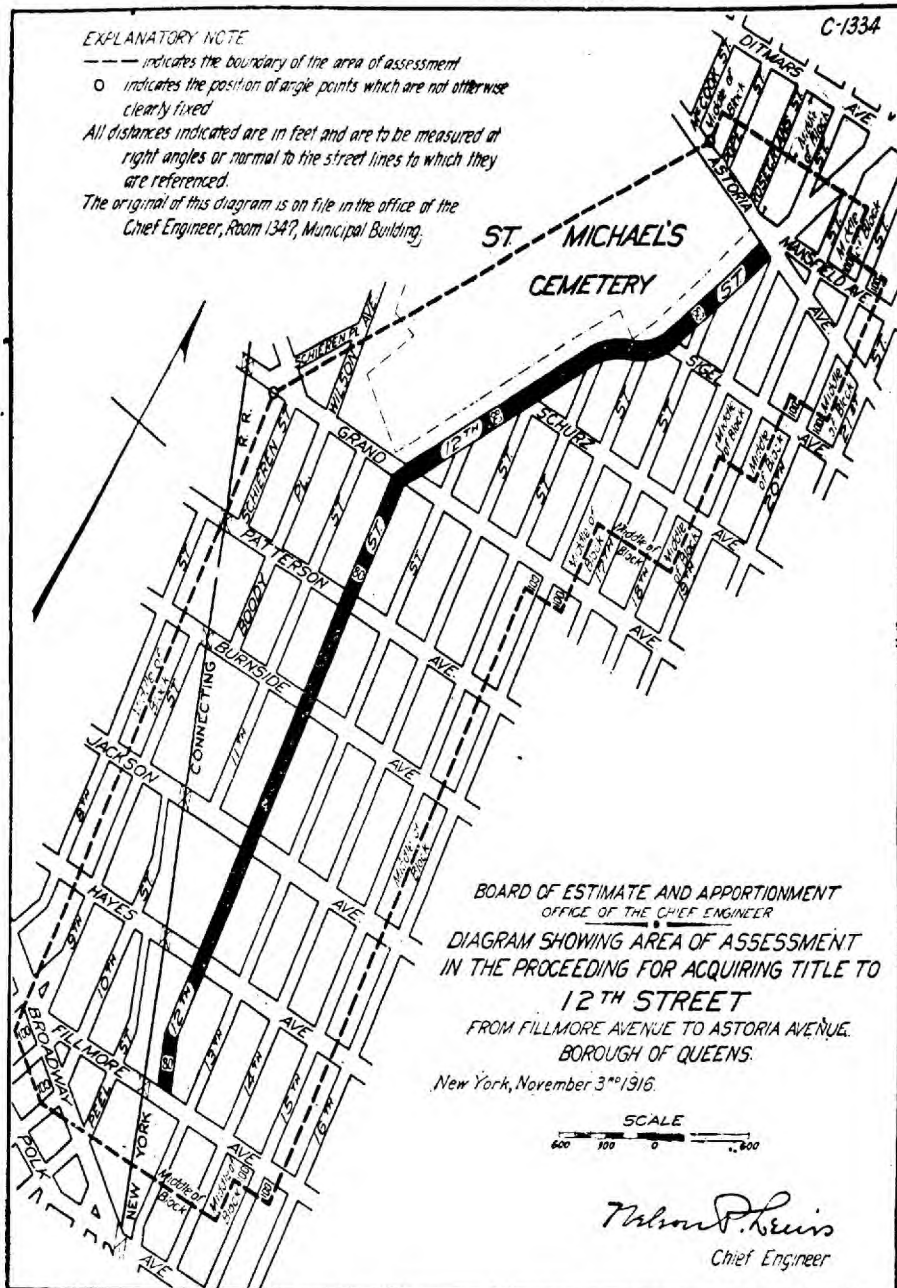

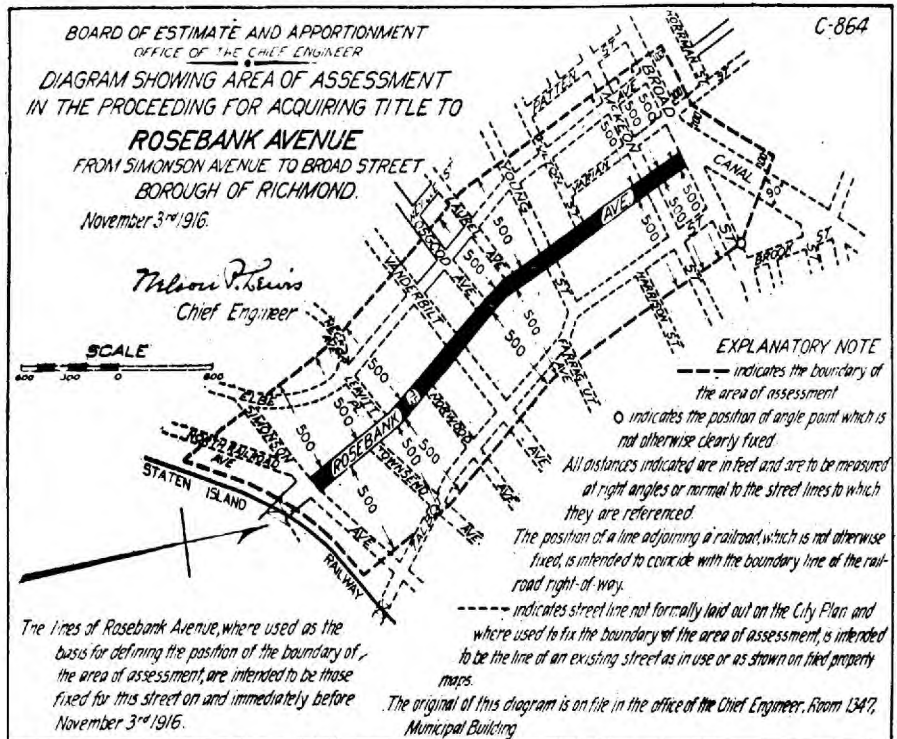

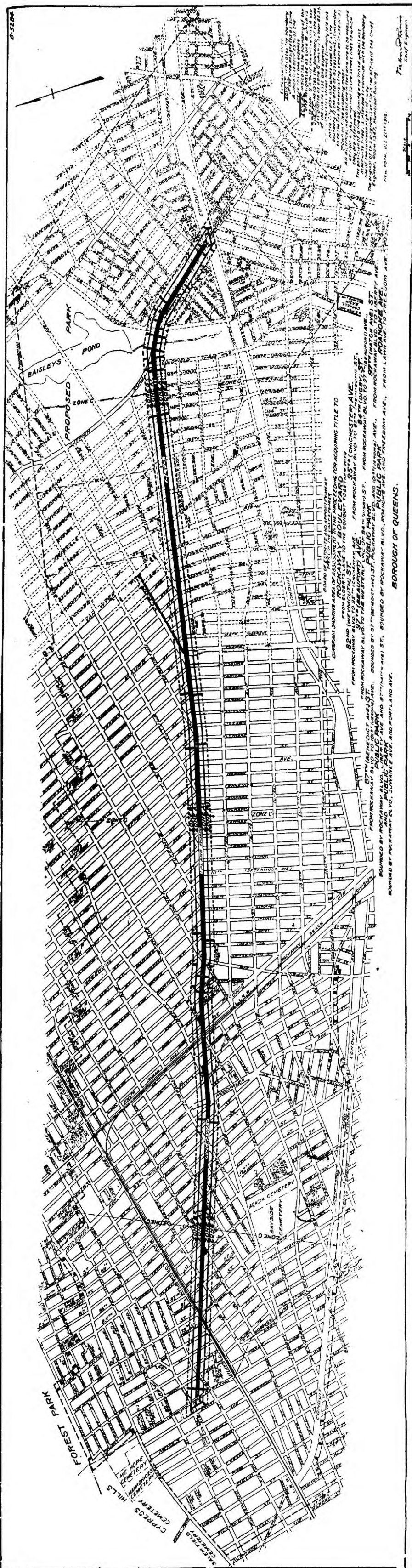

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall painted and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

"No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions, shall in any case be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made."

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and be it further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may be seen there.
