Edward F. The Secretary was instructed to be governed accordingly.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the exempt class, under the heading "Board of Elections of the City of New York," by changing the line "9 Clerks to Board" to read "37 Clerks to Board."

President John R. Voorhies and Jacob A. Livingston, of the Board of Elections, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session and, on motion, it was

Resolved, That the classification of positions in the exempt class, under the heading "Board of Elections of the City of New York" be and the same is hereby amended by changing the line, 9 Clerks to Board, to read, 37 Clerks to Board.

On the recommendation of the Acting Chief Examiner, in a report dated May 20, it was

Resolved, That the following eligible lists be and they are hereby promulgated, subject to future investigation: Physician, Grade 3; Laboratory Assistant, Bacteriological.


