Thirteen lamps have been temporarily removed and discontinued on account of street improvements in progress; lamps were ordered to be erected on the west side of 8th avenue, between 59th and 62d streets.

The Certificate of the cost of paving 70th street, from 4th to 5th avenue has been transmitted to the Board of Assessors, amounting to \$7,396.43.

379 receiving basins and 550 feet of sewers have been cleaned.

Eleven permits for reflagging sidewalks, 15 permits to place building materials on streets, and two permits for cutting down trees have been issued.

The following appointments have been made:

Geo. R. Baldwin, Joseph Ogle and C. VanRanst, Inspectors of sewers at the rate of \$4 per day; Jas. C. Sheridan, Inspector of paving at the rate of \$3.50 per day, Wm. Johnson and Conklin Smith, Inspectors of curbing, guttering and flagging at the rate of \$3 per day; John Boardman and Jas. R. Davies, Inspectors of regulating and grading at the rate of \$3 per day.

Jas. Pringle was appointed watchman at the Croton Lake at the rate of \$2.50 per day, vice Gilbert Griffin, resigned.

James Graham, clerk in Bureau of Repairs and Supplies, was discharged on account of reduction of the force.

There is an aggregate increase of 11 men and one four horse team, and a decrease of 2 teams in the laboring force of the Department.

The total amount of requisitions drawn by the Department on the Finance Department during the week is \$232,191.42.

DEPARTMENT PUBLIC PARKS

Abstract of the proceedings of the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks for the week ending October 4th, 1873.

MONDAY, September 29th, 1873.

ADJOURNED MEETING, 8 o'clock, p. m.

The Commissioners met for the purpose of considering the various maps presented, for the laying out of the lower half of the town of Kingsbridge, and after considerable discussion of the subject, the matter was laid over for further consideration.

WEDNESDAY, October 1st, 1873.

REGULAR MEETING, 10 o'clock, a. m.

The bill of James C. Hoe & Co., amounting to \$400, for the erection of a review stand at Union Square in June, 1873, was referred to the Treasurer for investigation.

The maps presented to the Board by the Civil and Topographical Engineer, and by General John Ewen, proposing different plans for the laying out of the lower half of the town of Kingsbridge, were referred to the Civil and Topographical Engineer with instructions to prepare a new map, which shall include all practicable changes suggested by the property owners, and which are not detrimental to the public interest.

The services of the extra keepers on the parks were dispensed with.

The bill of Wm. H. Johnson, amounting to \$36, for laying bituminous walks in 1864, was referred to the President and the Treasurer for investigation.

WEDNESDAY, October 1st, 1873.

ADJOURNED MEETING, 7 o'clock, p. m.

A report from the Civil and Topographical Engineer, on the necessary repairs needed to the draw of the Harlem River bridge at Third avenue, was presented, and the repairs ordered, at a cost not to exceed \$448.

The President was requested to obtain estimates from various companies as to the cost of repairing the City Hall Park.

Messrs. Bancroft & Yetter were directed to be paid the sum of \$900, in full, for all claims they may now have against the Department, for

the use of their patents on fifteen watering carts; and also for the right to build and use on the Central Park and all the city parks as many watering carts as may be required, with said patents attached.

The President and Secretary were authorized to execute leases of property on Riverside Park.

The following were adopted as the rules to regulate the action of the Board in accepting statues and monuments, and placing the same in the Central and other parks, viz.:

First—Before any engagement is made to place a statue, or allow a statue to be placed, on the Central Park, it shall be seen in a finished condition, or in the form of a finished model, and a judgment as to its merits, as a work of art, shall have been requested of the respective Presidents of the American Academy of Design, the American Museum of Art, and the American Institute of architects.

Second—The determination of a site for any statue shall be reserved until after its acceptance.

Third—On each side of the main walk of the Mall, on a line with the statue of Scott, now placed, a series of statues may be ranged, commemorative of men and of events of far-reaching and permanent interest. At or near each of the gates of the park, portrait or commemorative statues may also be placed, appropriate to the name of the gate. Portrait or memorial statues shall hereafter be placed nowhere else in the Central Park.

Fourth—Statues or sculptured works designed to represent objects of beauty, or dramatic and poetic interest, may be placed at any points in the Park where they shall not dominate a landscape, or, when seen in front, divide the view over an expanse, lawn or glade.

Fifth—A statue commemorative of any person shall not be placed in the Central Park, nor accepted with a condition that it shall be placed in the Central Park, until after a period of at least five years from the death of the person represented.
