Monday, September 29th, 1873. Adjourned Meeting, 8 o'clock, p. m.

The Commissioners met for the purpose of considering the various maps presented, for the laying out of the lower half of the town of Kingsbridge, and after considerable discussion of the subject, the matter was laid over for further consideration.

The following were adopted as the rules to regulate the action of the Board in accepting statues and monuments, and placing the same in the Central and other parks, viz.:

First—Before any engagement is made to place a statue, or allow a statue to be placed, on the Central Park, it shall be seen in a finished condition, or in the form of a finished model, and a judgment as to its merits, as a work of art, shall have been requested of the respective Presidents of the American Academy of Design, the American Museum of Art, and the American Institute of architects.

Second—The determination of a site for any statue shall be reserved until after its acceptance.

Third—On each side of the main walk of the Mall, on a line with the statue of Scott, now placed, a series of statues may be ranged, commemorative of men and of events of far-reaching and permanent interest. At or near each of the gates of the park, portrait or commemorative statues may also be placed, appropriate to the name of the gate. Portrait or memorial statues shall hereafter be placed nowhere else in the Central Park.

Fourth—Statues or sculptured works designed to represent objects of beauty, or dramatic and poetic interest, may be placed at any points in the Park where they shall not dominate a land-scape, or, when seen in front, divide the view over an expanse, lawn or glade.

Fifth—A statue commemorative of any person shall not be placed in the Central Park, nor accepted with a condition that it shall be placed in the Central Park, until after a period of at least five years from the death of the person represented.

LAW DEPARTMENT.

The following opinion constitutes a portion of the proceedings of the Law Department for the week ending September 27, 1873:

The "New York Bridge Company" derives its existence and powers from an act of the Legislature of the State of New York, passed April 16, 1867, with the object of "constructing and maintaining a bridge over the East river, between the cities of New York and Brooklyn;" and the recent action of the Board of Apportionment providing for the payment to the company of \$150,000 in addition to former allowances, is sustained by the laws of the State and the ordinances of the city.

LAW DEPARTMENT, Office of the Counsel to the Corporation, New York, Sept. 27, 1873.

The Honorable the Board of Assistant Al. dermen :

GENTLEMEN: A copy of the resolution of your Board requesting a reference to the laws and the opinion of this department in relation to the recent appropriation of the sum of \$150,000, by the Board of Apportionment to the New York Bridge Company, was received.

The "New York Bridge Company" derives its existence and powers from an act of the Legislature of the State of New York, entitled "An act to incorporate the New York Bridge Company, for the purpose of constructing and maintaining a Bridge over the East River, between the cities of New York and Brooklyn." This act was passed April 16th, 1867. See Chap. 399, page 593 of the laws of 1867.

The 12th section of said act is as follows:

"The cities of New York and Brooklyn, or either of them, are authorized to subscribe to the capital stock of said company such an amount as two-thirds of their Common Councils, respectively, shall determine, and to issue bonds in payment of such subscriptions, payable in not less than thirty years, or may guarantee the payment of the principal and interest of the Bonds of the Company in such amounts as the Common Council shall respectively determine."

It is clear, therefore, that the city of New York had the right to subscribe for the capital stock of the company in question.

On the 31st day of December, 1868, the Common Council of the city of New York, by a twothirds vote, passed an ordinance in relation to this subject, of which the following is an extract, viz. :

"SECTION 1. The sum of one million five hundred thousand dollars is hereby subscribed on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the city of New York, to the capital stock of the New York Bridge Company; provided nevertheless that the said charter of said company shall be so amended that the Mayor, Comptroller and President of the Board of Aldermen be ex officio directors of said company, and that such city officers shall represent the interests of the corporation in said company."

The second section of said ordinance author izes the Comptroller to issue bonds to the amount of \$1,500,000 to pay said subscription. See proceedings of the Board of Aldermen

and Councilmen, vol. 36, page 344.

The law relating to the New York Bridge

Company was amended to conform to the proviso of the ordinance first above cited, by an act of the Legislature of the State of New York entitled "An act to amend an act to incorporate the New York Bridge Company," &c.

By section 1 of the Act it is provided that the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York shall be represented in the Board of Directors of the New York Bridge Company by the Mayor, Comptroller and President of the Board of Aldermen by virtue of their respective offices. This law was passed on the 20th day of February, 1869. See vol. 1, chapter 26, page 45 of the laws of 1869.

The proviso in the ordinance above referred to was thus complied with.

Section 112 as amended by section 20, chapter 757, laws of 1873, of the present charter of the city of New York, provides, among other

things, as follows: " The said Board of Apportionment may from tsme to time, by the affirmative vote of three members, authorize the issue of the whole or any portion of any stock or bonds which are now by law authorized to be issued upon compliance

with the provisions of law authorizing them." It appears that the total amount authorized to be issued by the ordinance of the Common Council was \$1,500,000. Of this sum, I am informed by the Comptroller, nine instalments of \$150,000 each have been called for by the company, amounting to \$1,350,000. There have

been issued to them \$1,148,000; \$202,000 having been held in reserve to secure payment for land taken for piers in New York and Brooklyn. It appears from the above statement o the Comptroller that the Bridge Company is entitled to call for another installment of \$150,000, and I am of the opinion that the act of the Board of Apportionment in appropriating the said sum of \$150,000 was a lawful exercise of the power vested in that Board.
