LABOR.

CITY PRISON.

Plastering walls of male and female prisons; erecting chimneys 13 and 30 feet high; painting walls of female prison 288 feet by 21 feet; repairing and painting chimneys of cook-house and female prison; tinning roof of female and new prison; painting halls 342 by 8 feet; new floor on ten-day house, and brick floor, and 715 feet flooring in cook-house; placing iron bars to skylights, etc.

PENITENTIARY.

At Blacksmiths' and Tinsmiths' Shops—There has been made claw-hammers, screw-drivers, soldering irons, cast steel plugs, half-rounds, hand drills, pitching tools, stonecutters' points, chisels, spikes, rivets, bolts, bucket-ears, handles, cover-plates, corner plates, 62 tires, new and reset, for wheelbarrows, 89 coal hods, 14 tires for wagons, etc., 21 tires reset, 100 iron bedsteads, 452 feet stove pipe, shoeing 50 horses, repairs to roof of prison, all tools and implements for quarry and stonecutters, tin ware, and all requisite materials and repairs of various articles in and around the prison have been made by prisoners.

At Carpenters' Shop—132 cell-buckets made, and 163 repaired; 135 stools repaired; 12 large soup tubs made, 31 repaired; 18 benches made, and 20 repaired and painted; glazed 153 lights; 20 wheelbarrows made, and 74 repaired; 638 stone, sledge, and striking hammers made; 62 beef barrels repaired; 83 window-frames, Mansard story, erected, and enclosing and covering roof; 83 window-frames set, and sashes fitted, etc., for new shop; 156 coffins made. Painting, varnishing, and making a large number of other articles throughout the prison and adjacent buildings, and to furniture, pictures, utensils, etc., therein have been done.

At Tailor's and Cotmaker's Shop there have been made 275 woolen jackets, 602 pants, 102 vests, 362 caps, 300 pairs mittens, 51 cot bottoms; repaired 452 woolen jackets, 618 pants, 121 vests, 74 caps, and 365 cot-bottoms.

The Broom-makers have made 21 dozen brooms, 48½ dozen scrub-brushes.

At shoemakers' shop there has been made 1,740 pairs men's shoes, 478 pairs women's shoes, 488 pairs of men's, 20 pairs women's slippers, and 2 ambulances upholstered and trimmed, and 1,789 pairs men's and 45 pairs women's shoes repaired.

At the Sewing Room—Made 352 shirts, 50 women's dresses, 96 pants, 12 suits infant's clothes, 36 sheets, 200 pillow-ticks, 100 chemises, 100 pillow-cases, 170 men's caps, 312 pairs men's socks knitted, 440 pairs shoes bound, 270 pairs woolen mittens finished; repaired 5,147 shirts, 434 women's dresses, 1,243 pants, 225 petticoats, 700 chemises, 496 pairs stockings, 18 bed-ticks, 14 pillow-ticks, 20 sheets, 24 pillow-cases, 12 roller towels.

By the male prisoners employed at out-door labor, 46 barge loads of ashes have been discharged, grounds filled in and graded; 1 barge load of sand, and 11 barge loads of coal have been discharged; 1,350 feet (cubic) stone wall built at new shop; 20,000 brick laid; 5,600 cubic feet of stone wall built; quarried and cut 980 cubic feet sea-wall stone, 1,403 cubic feet rock-faced building stone; 805 cubic feet of fine-dressed stone have been cut and dressed by stone-cutters. A large quantity of stone for making and repairing roads has been broken.

All the stone for the above has been quarried by the prisoners. An average of 22 men have been employed as gardeners.

The average number of male prisoners during the quarter has been 849. They have been employed as follows:

- 25 as blacksmiths and tinsmiths.
- 29 as carpenters and painters.
- 105 as shoemakers, tailors, and broom-makers.
- 22 as gardeners.
- 17 on guard boats.
- 10 as whitewashers and plasterers.
- 67 as stone-cutters.
- 45 at new carpenter shop.
- 101 at stone breaking, discharging coal, etc.,
- 124 at stone quarries.
- 25 at building sea wall, and making roads.
- 122 at unloading barges, filling in ground and grading.
- 52 at quarrying, building sea wall, Randall's Island.
- 27 at hospital.
- 78 have been employed in and around the Prison as hall men, cooks, barbers, etc., or have been confined in cells. The average number of female prisoners has been 123.
- 60 at sewing room.
- 20 at wash-house.
- 16 at hospitals, disabled.
- 27 as scrubbers, cleaners, and other domestic labor, or locked up.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK,
MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,
Saturday, March 3, 1877—12 o'clock M.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—All the members, viz.:

Smith Ely, Jr., the Mayor of the City of New York; John Kelly, the Comptroller of the City of New York; Henry D. Purroy, the President of the Board of Aldermen; John Wheeler, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The minutes of the meeting held March 1, 1877, were read and approved.

By unanimous consent the Rule adopted at meeting of June 23, 1874, relating to the calls of meetings, was suspended in order to act upon the issue of Revenue Bonds, "Additional New Croton Aqueduct Stock," "Museums of Art and Natural History Stock," and Assessment Bonds of the City of New York.

Whereupon the Comptroller offered for adoption the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, In a proceeding had in the Supreme Court on April 10, 1876, in which the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York were plaintiffs, and the two unsafe buildings on Grove avenue, east side, 275 feet north of Cliff street, John J. Quinn, owner, under a precept of the Hon. Charles Donohue, one of the Justices of said Court, pursuant to section 38, chapter 625, Laws of 1871, a report was made, January 4, 1877, by Walter W. Adams, Superintendent of Buildings, that the costs and expenses incurred for the work of taking down said buildings, of labor and materials furnished by E. W. Gilbert, who was employed by him to perform said work, was \$157.50, as per bill rendered—approved January 15, 1877, by said Justice Donohue of the Supreme Court; therefore

Resolved, That in pursuance of the provision of section 38, chapter 625, Laws of 1871, the Comptroller of the City of New York be and he is hereby authorized to issue a revenue bond, upon the requisition of said Superintendent of Buildings, for the sum of \$157.50, to be reimbursed by the payment of the amount and interest at seven per cent. per annum, out of the judgment or judgments obtained as provided by said provision of law, if the same shall be collected, from the proceeds of which bond the Comptroller shall pay the amount of expense incurred under said precept.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said preamble and resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller presented a communication from the Department of Public Works, asking for the transfer of an appropriation.

Which was referred back to, and original paper sent to the Comptroller.

The Comptroller then offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the sum of two hundred and two dollars and fifty cents (\$202.50) be and the same is hereby transferred from the appropriation "Removing Obstructions—Streets and Avenues," for 1876, the same being in excess of the requirements thereof, to the appropriation "Wells and Pumps—Repairing and Cleaning," for 1876, for which it is required.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:
