

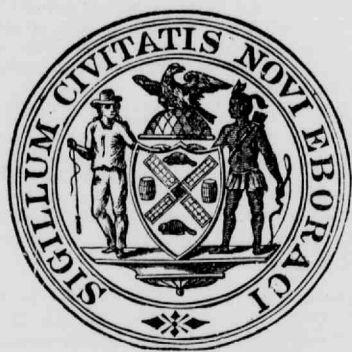

Abstract of proceedings for the week ending Saturday, May 5, 1877.

MEETING, WEDNESDAY, MAY 2, 1877.

It was ordered that the horse railroad tracks on a portion of Boston road be readjusted to conform to the new grade.

A communication was received from Mr. Joseph Forbes, Commander of Abraham Lincoln Post of the Grand Army of the Republic, requesting permission for said Post to decorate the statue of Lincoln on Decoration Day, and that the Department would fill four vases, which they will place round the statue, with palms and flowers. Permission granted as requested.

A bill amounting to \$85.36, in favor of Mr. E. C. Morrison, the late Engineer in charge of the improvements in the territory formerly constituting the town of Morrisania, in pursuance of proceedings authorized by the Board of Trustees of said town prior to the first day of January, 1874, was approved, and certified to the Finance Department.

The opening of the proposals for the construction of a bridge over Harlem river, at the intersection of Madison avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, was further adjourned until Wednesday, the 16th day of May, 1877, at 9:30 o'clock A. M.

New agreements were authorized with Mr. Isidor Isaac to operate the Carousel, and run goat carriages in Central Park.

An agreement was authorized with Mr. J. M. Toucey, granting him the privilege to lay a five-inch wrought iron pipe, for the purpose of conveying oil through Transverse Road No. 1, as directed by the Board on the 25th April, 1877.

The following resolutions were adopted, viz.:

I.

Resolved, That the President be requested to make application, on behalf of the Department, to the Common Council, for an ordinance directing that Seventy-seventh street, from Eighth avenue to Ninth avenue, be regulated, graded, paved, and guttered, and that the south sidewalk on said portion of said street be flagged.

II.

Whereas, The certificate of the late Engineer in charge of the improvements in the territory formerly constituting the town of Morrisania, in pursuance of proceedings authorized by the Board of Trustees of said town prior to the 1st day of January, 1874, set forth in the report of the Auditing Committee this day presented to the Board, have been examined and audited by the Commissioners of this Department;

Resolved, That the said Commissioners approve, and they do hereby approve, the work and amount certified the said late Engineer in said certificate; and that the Secretary be and hereby is directed to prepare the certificate to be delivered to the contractor mentioned in said report in pursuance of the provisions of section 7, chapter 329, Laws of 1874, and in accordance with the said certificate of the said Engineer, and submit the same to the Commissioners of this Department for their signatures.

III.

Resolved, That William R. Martin, the President, and one of the members of the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks be and hereby is designated and directed to certify and file, as provided by law, the three similar maps or plans, each comprising a title page, explanatory remarks, and sight sheets, entitled "Map, with filed notes and explanatory remarks, showing the location, width, course, windings, and classification of streets, roads, and avenues, and public parks or places within that part of the Twenty-fourth Ward of the City of New York lying west of the easterly line of Broadway, as laid out and classified by the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 604 of the Laws of 1874, passed 5th of June, 1874, and chapter 436 of the Laws of 1876, passed 2d of June, 1876," dated "New York, April 25, 1877," and signed "Fred'k Law Olmsted, Landscape Architect," and "J. James R. Croes, Civil and Topographical Engineer." The streets, roads, and avenues, and the classification thereof, and the public parks or places, as shown on the said map, being such as to the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, or a majority of them, seem most conducive to the public good.

Rittenhouse to erect a platform scales for weighing ice foot of Third street, East river, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Brewster & Co. to erect an ornamental awning in front of the front door entrance to their premises, No. 1571 Broadway, they owning the whole square block of ground adjoining the premises, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, April 26, 1877.

Resolved, That the lamps on the north side of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, opposite the New York and Harlem Railroad Depot, be removed 14 feet west, opposite the gate of the Harlem Railroad Depot, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to John Spellman to construct an iron stairway on the outside of his premises, corner of Chatham and New Chambers streets, said stairway to be on the Chambers street side of his building, to be done under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works, and to remain only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Whereas, By a decision of the Court of Appeals the Commissioners of Excise in this city are prevented from granting licenses to sell wines and liquors to others than keepers of hotels, inns, or taverns; and

Whereas, The entire receipts from Excise licenses have heretofore been distributed among the various deserving charitable institutions of this city, many of which institutions will be compelled to suspend their operations, and all of which will be greatly curtailed in their usefulness if deprived of the aid and assistance furnished from the Excise moneys, this being the only public support these institutions now receive, and the only support that can be extended to them without imposing additional burdens on our already over-burdened taxpayers; and

Whereas, It is unwise and unjust, owing to a mistake made in the passage of the present Excise law, to at this time deprive our charitable institutions of the assistance they now receive, or to add to the present business embarrassments by crippling and destroying the various industrial interests connected with the liquor traffic; be it therefore

Resolved, That this Common Council, as the representatives of the people of this city, earnestly request the Legislature now in session to at once pass a just and proper excise law to meet the emergency created by the recent decision of the Court of Appeals, and thus relieve the persons engaged in the liquor business from the anomalous position in which they are now placed, and enable the city to receive the revenue from this source, to which it is properly entitled.

Resolved, That a copy of the foregoing preamble and resolution be transmitted to each member of the present Legislature by the Clerk of this Board.

Resolved, That section 55 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows: On and after the fifth day of May, 1877, no cattle, swine, pigs, calves, or sheep shall be driven on or between Eleventh and Second avenues south of Sixtieth street, nor on any other streets or avenues, except as hereinafter mentioned.

1st. On First avenue, and the cross streets east of First avenue, between Forty-second and Forty-eighth streets, inclusive.

2d. On the cross streets west of Eleventh avenue, between Thirty-ninth and Forty-third streets, inclusive.

3d. On the cross streets west of Eleventh avenue, between Forty-fifth and Forty-ninth streets, inclusive.

4th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street to Tenth avenue; thence through Tenth avenue to Sixty-fourth street, Sixty-fourth street to Eighth avenue, Eighth avenue to Ninety-seventh street, Ninety-seventh street to Fifth avenue, Fifth avenue to One Hundred and Eighth street, One Hundred and Eighth street to Second avenue, Second avenue to One Hundred and Sixth street, One Hundred and Sixth street to the East river, between midnight and 6 o'clock A. M.

5th. From the cattle yards by the fourth route to second avenue, on Second avenue to One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, on One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street to Third avenue, across Harlem Bridge, up Third avenue to the slaughter-houses in Morrisania, between midnight and 6 o'clock A. M.

6th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street to Tenth avenue, on Tenth avenue to Sixty-fourth street, on Sixty-fourth street to Eighth avenue, on Eighth avenue to One Hundred and Twenty-first street, on St. Nicholas avenue and the Kingsbridge road to the slaughter-houses north of Spuyten Duyvil creek, between midnight and 6 o'clock A. M.

7th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street down Eleventh avenue to Thirty-ninth street, between midnight and 6 o'clock A. M.

8th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street to Tenth avenue, on Tenth avenue to Sixty-fourth street, on Sixty-fourth street to Eighth avenue, on Eighth avenue to Sixty-fifth street, through Central Park by transverse road to Fifth avenue, on Fifth avenue to Sixty-seventh street, through Sixty-seventh street to Fourth avenue, on Fourth avenue to Sixty-eighth street, through Sixty-eighth street to First avenue and down First avenue to slaughter-houses, upon the express condition, however, that the cattle shall not leave the yards before midnight or after 5 o'clock A. M., that the drivers shall be orderly and quiet, and that the crosswalks shall be cleaned each morning before 8 o'clock. Permits under this subdivision shall be revoked by the Sanitary Superintendent on violation of any of the foregoing conditions.

9th. The Sanitary Superintendent may, in special cases, with the approval of the Board, give temporary permits to drive animals on other routes than those herein designated.
