

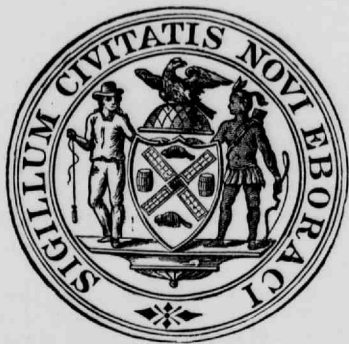

BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

STATED SESSION.

FRIDAY, December 10, 1880,
12 o'clock, M.

The Board met in their chamber, No. 16 City Hall.

On motion of Alderman Jacobus, the reading of the minutes of the last meeting was dispensed with.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

Alderman Wade moved that his Honor the Mayor be requested to return to the Board a resolution fixing the compensation of the Sheriff, as follows:

Resolved, That the compensation of the Sheriff of the City and County of New York for his services in connection with the execution of criminals heretofore executed by him, and for which he has not received compensation, and with executions hereafter, shall be as follows: For attendance on Court and official services at execution, two hundred and fifty dollars; for official services of deputies attending at such execution, five dollars for each deputy so attending, not to exceed twenty in number; for official services of two deputies watching criminal prior to execution, five dollars each for each day and five dollars each for each night; for making certificate of execution of sentence and two copies of the same, twenty-five dollars; and such disbursements for expenses actually paid out in carrying the sentence into effect as shall be audited by the Department of Finance upon the vouchers furnished by said Sheriff.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Western Electric Manufacturing Company to erect storm-door in front of their premises, Nos. 62 to 68 New Church street, the work done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Thomas W. Pittman and R. F. The President laid before the Board the following communication from the American Union Telegraph Company:

THE AMERICAN UNION TELEGRAPH CO.
GENERAL OFFICES, 135 AND 137 BROADWAY,
NEW YORK, December 6, 1880.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of New York City:

GENTLEMEN—The American Union Telegraph Company hereby respectfully applies for authority, the same as has been recently granted to the Mutual Telegraph Company, to rebuild and reconstruct, in a suitable and satisfactory manner, such parts of the Fire Alarm Telegraph in New York City as may be desirable for the use of the American Union Telegraph Company, for the joint accommodation of the wires of the Fire Department and the American Union Telegraph Company.

Such reconstruction to be entirely at the expense of the American Union Telegraph Company and without cost to the city. The poles and cross-arms to be painted and marked according to the regulations of the Fire Department, and to become the exclusive property thereof.

The American Union Telegraph Company agrees to pay to the city, during the time of its occupancy of said poles, the sum of ten dollars (\$10) per year for each mile of poles upon which American Union Telegraph Company's wires are so placed, fifty poles being considered the average number of poles per mile.

Secretary directed to address a communication to the Comptroller acknowledging receipt of his communication of the 9th inst., wherein he desired to be informed about the plan of construction of the proposed ferry-landing at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street and Second avenue, and stating that, as this Department is informed, it is not the intention of the proprietors of the proposed ferry to erect any structures on either side of the Harlem river for their purposes, and consequently the plans of this Department will not be interfered with, and that the only objection which exists to the free use of the bulkhead at Second avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, is the Croton water-pipe which crosses the river at that point, and which is only about 3 feet below low water, and that it will undoubtedly become necessary to provide some suitable protection for the water-pipe, and the ferry proprietors might be required to construct a platform to protect the same from injury, and that whenever any plan is prepared for such purpose, and submitted to this Department for approval, action will be taken thereon, and further, that this Department is informed that the proposed landing on the east side of Harlem river, is upon private property, consequently the only rental for wharf property to be paid to the city is for the use of the bulkhead at Second avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, action being taken where necessary as stated, to wit:

From Health Department—To have two spring piles driven at the bulkhead at Sixteenth street, East river, used by the Reception Hospital. Engineer-in-Chief directed to do the work in accordance with said request.

From Henry Fisher—For permission to erect two coal derricks at Sixty-second street, East river. Applicant informed that this Department has no objection to his placing and retaining a temporary derrick at the foot of Sixty-second street, East River, for the purpose of unloading coal, but this Department reserves the right to cause its removal at any time it may so elect.

From Reynolds & Sterns—In reference to dirt incumbering the Bulkhead at Fourteenth street, East river. Superintendent Butler directed to notify the Manhattan Gas Light Co., lessee of the premises to forthwith remove the obstruction complained of.

From Thomas Stevenson—In reference to brick and sand, etc., incumbering the bulkhead at Sixtieth and Sixty-first streets, East river. Superintendent Butler directed to give written notice to the owners of the above-mentioned incumbrances to remove the same, and report action thereon to the Board at its next meeting.

From Comptroller, stating that John Kinsley is not in default or arrears to the Corporation.

From Peter Cooper's Glue Factory—In reference to his application for permission to erect a shed upon the bulkhead, between Forty-first and Forty-second streets, East river, and as to the extent of jurisdiction of this Department over the bulkhead of the water-front of the city. Applicant informed that there is some uncertainty as to what constitutes the limits of a bulkhead upon the water-front of this city, and to what point from the outer edge thereof this Department has jurisdiction, but in the opinion of this Board if the shed proposed to be erected by him between Forty-first and Forty-second streets, East river, referred to in his communication, is built about 14 feet from the edge of the bulkhead, this Department does not believe that the shed will come within its jurisdiction.

From Frank Phelan—For permission to place a coal hopper and screen upon Pier 54, East river. Applicant informed that this Department has no authority to grant permits for the purposes referred to.

From Engineer-in-Chief, as follows:

1st. Report as to work performed during week ending November 13, 1880.

2d. Report of repairs made to Pier, new 1, North river, during the year 1880.

3d. In reference to repairs made to Pier, new 43, North river, in consequence of damage done thereto by Steamship "Labrador." Secretary directed to forward bill to Louis de Bebian, agent for Compagnie Generale Transatlantique, owners of said steamship, in the amount of \$76.40 for payment, being cost of making said repairs.

4th. As to repairs required to the Charity Hospital Dock, Blackwell's Island. Communication from Department of Public Charities and Correction in reference thereto, was taken from the table and placed on file, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to make the repairs in accordance with his report at a cost of about \$125.

Reports were received from the Engineer-in-Chief in reference to repairs required to Piers 61, East river, and at Forty-sixth street, North river, and, being read,

On motion, the following resolutions were adopted, to wit:

Resolved, That Isaac Fowler, lessee of Pier 61 East river, be and is hereby directed to replace five bearing-piles underneath said pier, which are gone, and to place barking log and close fenders in the end thereof, also to repair the several holes now existing in the deck of said pier, the Engineer-in-Chief having reported such repairs to be necessary, and that in case said lessee shall neglect, or refuse to make such repairs within ten days from receipt of this notice, then, this Department will proceed to make the same at his cost and expense, in accordance with the provisions of his lease.

Resolved, That John H. Benner, lessee of Pier at Forty-sixth street, North river, be and is hereby directed to repair the holes now existing in the inshore end of said pier, the Engineer-in-Chief having reported such repairs to be necessary, and that in case said lessee shall neglect or refuse to make such repairs within ten days from receipt of this notice, then this Department will proceed to make the same at his cost and expense, in accordance with the provisions of his lease.

A report was received from the Engineer-in-Chief as to the shed proposed to be erected upon the bulkhead between Forty-second and Forty-third streets, East river, and, being read,

On motion, the application of the New York City and Northern Railroad Company, for permission to erect a shed upon said premises was taken from the table and placed on file and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby granted to the New York City and Northern R. R. Co., lessee, to erect and maintain during the pleasure of this Board, upon the bulkhead between Forty-second and Forty-third streets, East River, a shed about 100 feet long, 20 feet deep and 20 feet high, for the protection of property received and discharged thereat by steam transportation, the said shed to be constructed subject to the regulations of the Superintendent of Buildings, as required by chapter 249, Laws of 1875, and in accordance with plans to be first submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and all the work to be done under the supervision of that officer.

On motion, the application of W. L. Cutting, executor, for permission to build bulkhead between Thirty-ninth and Fortieth streets, East River, was taken from the table and placed on file, and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby granted to W. L. Cutting, executor, owner of property between Thirty-ninth and Fortieth streets, East River, to erect in front thereof a suitable bulkhead extending from the central line of Thirty-ninth street to the northerly line of Fortieth street, on the established bulkhead line, and to construct proper return bulkheads and to fill in the same with solid filling; the work to be done in accordance with plans to be approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and under the supervision of that officer.

A report was received from the Engineer-in-Chief as to cost of placing fender piles on Pier, new 26, North River, and being read,

On motion, the application of the Old Dominion Steamship Co., lessee, to have fender piles placed at said pier, was taken from the table and placed on file, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to make requisition for the necessary material and labor to place forty-two fender piles on said pier (twenty-one on each side), in the same manner and equal to those already placed on said pier, at \$29.75 per pile.

A communication was received from the Engineer-in-Chief stating that in prosecuting the work of building the bulkhead wall at Twenty-third street section under the new plan two pile drivers, larger and more powerful than any that the Department now owns, will be required, and, being read,

On motion, the following resolution was unanimously adopted.

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to prepare plans and specifications for two pile-drivers, scows and ways, each capable of driving both vertical and bracing piles, to be used in constructing the bulkhead or river wall under the plan adopted for the improvement of the water front, he having informed this Board that the same are required for the work about to commence on the West Twenty-third street section, and that the said pile-drivers, scows and ways with the necessary engines, boilers, hammers and other outfit, be purchased otherwise than by contract as required by subdivision 5 of section 6 of chapter 574, Laws of 1871, and that the same be purchased by the Treasurer.

The Auditing Committee presented an audit of thirteen bills or claims amounting to the sum of \$32,388.93, and, being read, was

On motion, accepted and adopted, and the Secretary directed to forward the said bills, together with proper requisitions for the amount, to the Finance Department for payment.

On motion, the bids received and publicly opened on 10th instant, for building a rip-rap embankment and platform from Forty-ninth to Fifty-first street, East river, were taken from the table and placed on file, and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That the contract for removing all the old platform, and building a rip-rap embankment with rubble wall on top thereof, and wooden platform in front of the same, and a rubble boundary wall, from Forty-ninth to Fifty-first street, East river, be and is hereby awarded to John Kinsley, of 212 East Twenty-seventh street, his bid for doing said work being the lowest under proposals publicly opened the 10th instant, and the Comptroller having advised in writing, the 12th instant, that said party is not in default or arrears to the Corporation.

On motion, James W. Dikeman, Jr., was appointed a Chairman, and Thomas Listrange, a Dockbuilder.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

SIR.—There were 638 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, November 27, 1880, which is an increase of 92, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 81 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1879. The actual mortality for the week ending November 20, 1880, was 607, which is 150.6 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.16 per 1,000 persons living, the population, according to the last U. S. Census, being 1,206,577.

CHAPTER 123.

AN ACT in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.
The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per cent. per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
