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

The American Union Telegraph Company agrees to pay to the city, during the time of its occu-pancy of said poles, the sum of ten dollars (\$10) per year for each mile of poles upon which American Union Telegraph Company's wires are so placed, fifty poles being considered the average number of poles per mile.



SIR—There were 638 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, November 27, 1880, which is an increase of 92, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 81 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1879. The actual mortality for the week ending November 20, 1880, was 607, which is 150.6 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.16 per 1,000 persons living, the population, according to the last U. S. Census, being 1,206,577.

COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, JUNE 4, 1880.) CHAPTER 123. An ACT IN relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes. Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present. The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows: Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the-City of New York the amount of any tax upon real prop-erty belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpuid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by rason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over seven per centum per ammu upon any unpaid tax. Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipar-tion of the taxes in the first day of such tax.

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per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax. Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipa-tion of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collect-ed, may be reissued by the comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one upor Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
