Gentlemen—I already informed your Committee informally that a hoisting engine of a permanent character would be wanted at Shaft 25 by the side of the large hoister for the service of the north shaft. I have procured prices from Messrs. Otis Brothers & Co. and The Lidgerwood Manufacturing Company, who propose to furnish such engine as would be wanted, all placed, for the sum of \$1,250 and \$1,150, respectively. I also forward the proposal of Mr. Charles Peterson, contractor, to place in good working order, at Shaft 25, the hoisting engine which he has used for the construction of that shaft. This engine originally cost \$2,150, owing the fact that it was built on a special pattern, and it has successfully hoisted very heavy weights (heavier than those for which the other engines are intended) without mishap; and, considering the price he asks for the same, that is, \$1,000, I consider that his offer is the most advantageous to the Aqueduct Commissioners. The Mayor said the advertisement should be published in a German newspaper also, and the list of newspapers was amended by the insertion of the name of the "New Yorker Herold." The authorization to advertise was then passed by the concurrent vote of the Mayor, Counsel to the Corporation and the Commissioner of Public Works.

By a concurrent vote of the same officers, the action of the Supervisor in fixing the price of the CITY RECORD, containing the names, positions, residences and salaries of city officers, et als., at

ten cents per copy was approved.

PUBLIC NOTICE CALLING FOR BIDS OR Proposals for the Privileges or Licenses to Sprinkle the Public Streets in the City of New York with water drawn from the public fire-hydrants, the bids to be received and opened at the office of the Commissioner of Public Works, on Wednesday, February 26, 1890, at 12 o'clock noon.

A separate bid must be made for each of the sprinkling routes hereinafter described.

The bidder must state the amount which he proposes and agrees to pay for the license, over and above the amount which will be charged for the water consumed in sprinkling. The amount of each bid must be paid in advance at the time when the license is issued and the charges for water, as established by the Commissioner of Public Works, must be paid monthly in advance.

The seasen for sprinkling the stream shall begin not

in advance at the time when the heads is stated and the charges for water, as established by the Commissioner of Public Works, must be paid monthly in advance.

The seasen for sprinkling the streets shall begin not earlier than March 15, 1800, and terminate not later than November 15, 1800, and the Commissioner of Public Works reserves the right to diminish the length of the season and to suspend sprinkling during the season whenever he deems it in the interest of the city so to do. The Commissioner of Public Works also reserves the right to reject any or all of the bids or proposals.

In the sprinkling of the streets the following rules and regulations must be observed;

1st. The tin sprinkler attached to each cart shall conform in every respect to a pattern approved by the Department of Public Works, the holes to be in parallel rows, at least one-half inch apart, and of a size not to exceed No, 14 Wire.

2d. The name and residence of each person licensed to sprinkle the streets shall be painted on both sides of the cask in black letters of not less than two inches in length on a white ground.

3d. Permits for sprinkling carts, it driven by boys, will be immediately revoked.

4th. No license will be granted to any person not a resident of the City and County of New York.

5th. Each sprinkling cart shall be provided with a sound and proper piece of hose to conduct the water from the fire-hydrant to the cart, and such hose shall always be kept in order and free from leaks.

6th. Each person obtaining a permit for sprinkling shall keep the hydrants allotted to his use closed, except when obtaining water for use, and shall be responsible for any damage that may result from the use or abuse of them while in their charge; provided such damage shall not have been occasioned by others than those in the employ of said person.

7th. Any person who shall thus obtain a permit shall pay to the Department of Public Works such sum or price as may be fixed by the Department for the water used during the season for sprinkling;

8th. Each person obtaining a permit will be required to sprinkle the streets with sufficient water only to lay the dust; drenching the streets with an excessive quantity of water will be sufficient cause to revoke any permit or license.

oth. Every person who shall obtain a sprinkling per-mit will be required to confine himself strictly to his route; encroaching on other routes will not be per-mitted.

No bid will be considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Commissioner of Public Works, or money, to the amount of one hundred dollars (\$100), as security for compliance with the conditions of the license. REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF THOMAS F. GILROY, COM-MISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from
five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

P.SH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five do lars per
annum each.
For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows:
HORSES, PRIVATE.—For two horses there shall be charged
six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse,
two dollars.

HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each
per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar
HORSES, OMNIEUS AND CART.—For each horse, one dollar
borse TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half

per annum: and for each additional horse, one dollar horses, Omnibus and Cart.—For each horse, one dollar der annum.

Horse Troughs.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

Hotels and Boarding Houses shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Laudrines shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars ver annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Liquor and Lager Beer Saloons shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-box.

Photograph Galleries shall be charged an annual rate of trom five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Peinting Offices, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

Soda, Minwral Water and Root Beer Fountains shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

Steam Engines, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of five dollars, per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

Water-Closets and Urinals.—To each building on a

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urnal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises.

charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each. WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.

For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from

plied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

METERS.

METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 882, water-meiers, of approved pattern, shall be herefter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops

hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, terryhouses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished
for business consumption, except private dwellings.
It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all
expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water
rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton
water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water
is supplied, as now provided by law." * *
All manufacturing and other business requiring a large
supply of water will be fitted with a meter.
Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred
cubic feet.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent, per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water. Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons allway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be per

railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be per mitted.

No horse-troughs or norse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures. No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioreries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas.

saloons, confectioreries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises. The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable

this Department to detect and check the useless and un warrantable waste of an element so valuable and essentia to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this ob-ject can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this copiect can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all turther applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that wheneve their premises become wearnt, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.
