

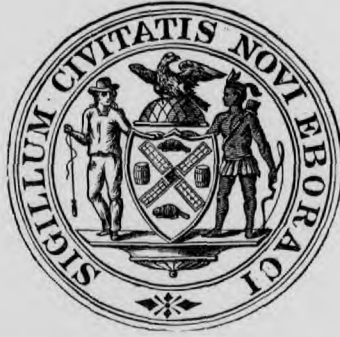

The above-mentioned paving lists are detained by reason of writs of certiorari having been issued by the Supreme Court. In the case of John Davidson and others against the Board of Assessors, the General Term of the Supreme Court has recently decided "that the structure of a street railroad in the street was benefited by the paving of the street, and could and should be assessed its proportion of the expenses."

The Counsel to the Corporation, by letter to the Board of Assessors, dated December 31, 1890, says "an appeal has been taken in the Davidson case to the Court of Appeals," and advises that "no further action be taken by the Board of Assessors until the decision of the Court of Appeals has been rendered."

Of the other lists remaining on hand, twenty-five, amounting to \$41,862.24, have been advertised during the past month, and in due time will be transmitted for confirmation, leaving in this office to be acted upon but five lists, amounting to \$43,475.55.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Special Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their Office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Thursday, January 22, 1891, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, and Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Cannon.

The meeting was called to consider the report of the Construction or Executive Committee, submitted on January 7, 1891, recommending the immediate erection of an earth and masonry dam, to be known as the "New Croton Dam," at a point recommended by the Chief Engineer in his report of October 8, 1890.

On motion of Commissioner Scott, said report and the preambles and resolutions submitted on January 14, 1891, were ordered taken from the table.

Whereupon, Commissioner Cannon offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Commission that a high dam should be built as soon as possible below the present Croton Dam.

The Comptroller presented the following preambles and resolution as a substitute for said resolution:

Whereas, The report of Chief Engineer Fteley, of the Croton Aqueduct Commission, recommends that a dam be built about one mile below the location of the present Croton Dam for the purpose of securing additional water supply to the City of New York, at a cost of about \$3,600,000; and

Whereas, George W. Birdsall, Esq., Chief Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, in a report dated October 21 to the Commissioner of Public Works, declares that a sufficient amount of storage capacity will be created upon the completion of the reservoirs now under construction in the Croton Valley to provide an ample supply for this city for the next twenty years; and

Whereas, The opinion of Chief Engineer Birdsall is concurred in by Eugene E. McLean, Esq., Engineer of the Finance Department; and

Whereas, The construction of a dam at the point indicated by Mr. Fteley would furnish no additional drainage area, and only additional storage capacity for sixteen thousand million gallons, which additional water would not be required for at least twenty years; therefore be it

Resolved, That, in the opinion of this Board, it is inexpedient and uneconomical to erect at this time a dam at the point indicated by Chief Engineer Fteley.

In moving the adoption of the same, the Comptroller spoke as follows:

Mr. PRESIDENT—I beg to herewith submit a report, which has been prepared by Engineer McLean of the Finance Department, which finds the present construction of the proposed dam unnecessary.

The two chief arguments advanced in favor of the immediate construction of the new dam would appear to be, first, that it is essentially required to provide against the possible failure of the Croton Dam; and, second, that the growth of our population entails demands for increased storage of a water supply, which it alone can furnish.

To both of these propositions I take the strongest exception. Waiving entirely the fact that the Croton Dam has for fifty years borne practical testimony to its strength and reliability, and that by engineers of undoubted repute it has been and still is pronounced adequate to resist every and all strain to which it is in any wise liable to be subjected, I thoroughly concur with the Chief Engineer of this Board that slightest possibilities where matters of such vital importance are concerned should be as carefully provided for as the strongest probabilities. In other words, that expense alone should not be allowed for an instant to stand in the way of due provision for the wants and safety of our citizens.

Admitting, therefore, that there may be grounds for believing that, under extraordinary, but not impossible, conditions, the Croton Dam might fail to stand the test imposed, I am quite of the Commission's mind that no time should be lost to protect our city from the disastrous consequences which would result. It is an imperative duty, neglect of which no plea of economy could excuse. But it nowhere is shown that such protection can alone be secured by the erection of the proposed dam. If the Croton Dam be weak, strengthen it; if parts of it are faulty in construction, rebuild them. In other words, I am opposed to an expenditure of millions to accomplish results which can be secured by an expenditure of thousands. A minimum outlay of \$3,600,000, if one of \$150,000 will provide a full measure of security to the Croton Dam, cannot be accounted a wise precautionary measure, but must be regarded rather as extravagance, deserving, as it would indubitably receive, public condemnation.

Any measure looking towards necessary alterations in the Croton Dam, called for by defects in the construction, or by its possible inadequacy to meet every requirement of safety, should receive immediate and unanimous support; for delay in providing such alterations would be almost criminal, once their necessity is held to have been demonstrated. But the assertion that, because the absolute security of the Croton dam is questioned, a necessity for the proposed new dam is imperative, is in my opinion unsubstantiated by any proof.

It appears evident that, by the reservoirs now in course of construction or authorized to be built, the additional ones which can be constructed comparatively quickly and cheaply on the sites already located, and others for which available sites are plentiful, should a need for their construction arise, a provision for storage will have been made amply sufficient for the most liberally estimated needs of at least a generation to come.

"But," it has been argued, "even if the immediate construction of the new reservoir is not absolutely imperative, it is most highly desirable, and it is certain to be required in the future."

Up to October last, the New Aqueduct had already cost the city \$23,950,000, bonds for that amount having been issued. The estimated cost of the dams and reservoirs (including land, construction and the roads and bridges entailed), already authorized and under contract, at Purdy's, Carmel and Amawalk, upon an ultra-conservative basis, is \$1,258,000 for the first named, \$844,500 for the second, and \$668,700 for the third, a total for the three of \$2,771,200, making the outlay for the New Aqueduct already incurred or authorized, \$26,721,200. Disregarding entirely the many claims against the City in course of litigation, the further certain and necessary expenditure in connection with the work remaining to be done makes it evident that nearly, if not quite, \$28,000,000 will be required.

At three per cent., the interest charges on the bonds representing this expenditure, would amount to some \$870,000 per annum; and as all but \$445,000 of these bonds must be redeemed within twenty years from their date of issue, it follows that for that period of time at least there must be raised by taxation yearly from \$1,200,000 to \$1,500,000, to provide for interest charges, and the redemption of the annual instalments of the bonds in question.

It is quite true that we owe a duty to posterity as well as to ourselves. It is quite true that any policy which regards the immediate present alone, is short-sighted and selfish to a degree deserving reprobation. But, as the city's financial representative, I feel bound to strongly protest against the imposition of the proposed additional outlay upon the tax-payers of the New York City of to-day, burdened, as they already are, to the extent I have shown, upon no better grounds than that posterity will thereby be enabled to enjoy, free of cost, the benefits it is to receive at our hands.

The same arguments which obtain against the immediate construction of the proposed new Croton Dam apply to the Quaker Bridge Dam with added force, as the outlay for the latter would be far greater. In my opinion, the erection of either dam is premature, for by the completion of the reservoirs now under contract and construction, the city is assured a daily supply of some 235,000,000 gallons, sufficient, upon the basis of present per capita consumption, for the wants of 2,798,000 people—a total of population which cannot be conservatively predicted for twenty years to come.

There also remains a large portion of the "upper Croton water-shed," where, by the building of supplementary reservoirs, an ample additional supply of storage may be easily and cheaply obtained to more than meet all demands arising from any unexpected increase in the city's growth, from that which has been liberally estimated. In view of these facts, I have no hesitation in strongly opposing any construction of elaborate new dams at an enormous expense, until the exhaustion of the resources of the Upper Water-shed conserved by these smaller reservoirs shall be prefigured. Then, and in my opinion, then only, it will be time to build a gigantic dam below the present one, to be the crowning work in the absorption of the entire Croton Water-shed supply.

The construction of the proposed dam has been stated to be only an excuse for the continuance of this Commission's existence. This assertion I stamp as emphatically untrue. Such an excuse—any excuse—is not needed. Manifold duties remain to be performed. The superintendence to completion of the works now under construction, and the defense of the City against the attacks of claimants who seek to gain, by the intricacies of the law, what justice has denied—these alone, did no others exist, are tasks amply warranting the Commission's continuance. Under this Commission New York City will enjoy, for the first time for years, an ample water supply. Under this Commission, or under the wise provisions already ordained by it, New York City will continue to enjoy, for at least a double decade of years, an ample supply, increasing commensurate with the city's growth. Let then its labors continue. Let it repair where repairs are required. Let it extend where extensions are entailed. Let it construct where construction is compelled. But let it expend only where expenditure is essential, and purchase no laurels attending triumphs of engineering skill at an unwilling public's expense.

The following is the report of Engineer Eugene E. McLean, referred to by the Comptroller:

CITY OF NEW YORK—FINANCE DEPARTMENT,
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,

Hon. THEO. W. MYERS, Comptroller:

SIR—On the 1st August, 1888, I had the honor to address you on the subject, "Shall the Quaker Bridge Dam be built at present or at some future time?" My investigations of the matter showed that although the reservoir then contemplated, involving the erection of a dam exceeding in magnitude any heretofore constructed, would be necessary in the future, in order that the City of New York should avail itself of the full capacity of the Croton water-shed, it was not wise, in a financial

point of view, that the great expenditure should be made in the then existing circumstances. The reason then given was that the necessary storage could be more cheaply and as efficaciously obtained by constructing reservoirs in the upper part of the water-shed, successively, as they might be needed.

In my report of that date and in subsequent ones made in reply to the then Chief Engineer, I think the position I assumed was clearly demonstrated. A public hearing was had on the matter, the result of which was that, though no definite conclusion was announced by the Aqueduct Commissioners, no action was taken by them. Now, on the report of the present Chief Engineer, of the 8th of October last, it is proposed by the Committee on Construction of the Aqueduct Commissioners to build a high dam a little less than a mile below the present Croton Dam, which will furnish a reservoir containing 16,000 millions of gallons, at an expense, if constructed of masonry, with appurtenances, not including the land, of \$3,600,000, and, if of earth and masonry, as recommended, \$2,960,000. The probable time of construction, if of masonry, four years, and if of earth and masonry, three or four years.

The Construction Committee, in its report proposing the high dam and reservoir, above referred to, under date of January 6, 1891, adopts certain premises and conclusions that may admit of question.

For instance, it says, "the act above referred to (chapter 493, Laws of 1883) imposed upon the Aqueduct Commission two equally important duties:

"1st. To provide a New Aqueduct to bring water from the Croton river to this city.

"2d. To provide sufficient dams and reservoirs to insure at all times a plentiful supply of water to flow through the Aqueduct."

The second of the above propositions is somewhat strained, as the law only requires "one or more dams and reservoirs to retain such water." At the same time, the law gives power to build such dams and reservoirs as may be necessary, but only for an "increased supply," and not necessarily for the entire future.

I question the conclusion in the report that "the reservoirs projected and now under construction, as above recited, with those already in use, will serve to conserve substantially all the water that can be secured from the upper half of the water-shed."

"The question now presented to the Commission is how best to conserve the water that can be obtained from the lower half of the water-shed."

By Mr. Fteley's report, the whole water-shed

Above Quaker Bridge Dam is..... 377.80 square miles.

Below Croton Dam it is..... 24.30 "

Above Croton Dam, from which storage can only be obtained on Croton

river..... 117.46 "

Leaving for the upper water-shed..... 237.04 "

It will thus be seen that "the upper half" of the water-shed referred to is actually about two-thirds of the whole of the water-shed above the Croton Dam, and not "one-half," as might be inferred from the report, and that the "lower half" mentioned is actually about one-third.

As I have stated in my report of the 11th November, 1890, the following reservoirs are now in the course of construction:

Sodom and Bog Brook, East Branch of Croton, capacity..... 8,000,000 gallons.

Titus river, Reservoir "M"..... 6,000,000 "

Carmel, Reservoir "D"..... 9,000,000 "

Muscoot river, Reservoir "A"..... 7,000,000 "

Total..... 30,000,000 gallons.

Besides these sites for reservoirs, Chief Engineer Birdsall, of the Croton Aqueduct, gives "K" and "L," "N" and "O," aggregating in capacity 14,200,000,000, and "H" with a capacity of 2,500,000,000, making in all 16,700,000,000, or 700,000,000 more than the proposed reservoir.

In addition to these there are many small valleys that could be utilized for reservoirs, as they may be needed, at comparatively small expense.

With these facts before us, I think the statement of the report that the "reservoirs projected and now under construction will serve to conserve substantially all the water that can be secured from the upper half of the water-shed," is somewhat misleading.

The questions propounded by the Committee are:

"1st. Whether a dam was needed for additional storage?

"2d. Whether such a dam was needed for security against the disastrous consequence that would result from the destruction of the present Croton Dam? And this latter inquiry in turn involves the question as to the security of the present Croton Dam."

The Committee comes to the conclusion that "nothing short of absolute and unquestioned safety should be accepted as sufficient." After reaching this conclusion, it "considers it comparatively unimportant to discuss the question whether the proposed new dam is needed for storage purposes," and dismisses what would appear a vital question with general remarks.

"Absolute and unquestioned safety" is an extreme requirement for an engineering work of this nature; but having closely examined the only plan existing of Croton Dam, showing the method of its construction; and taking into consideration the fact that it has resisted all attacks made upon it for fifty years, without the slightest sign of failure, in any respect, I believe it to be as nearly absolutely and unquestionably safe, within a certain limit, as any structure can be. The limit I give is, that the fresher shall not go higher than the top of the earth portion at the north end.

I enclose herewith diagrams of this work, and, in order not to burden this report, I attach to them the description given by Schramke of the construction of the dam.

In forming a judgment of this structure one person might prefer a rock foundation, but he would not be willing to condemn utterly "hard-pan" with the fact before him that this bottom, whatever it is, has shown no leak or weakness of any sort in the fifty years of its existence. Another might object to the crib-work, as not being the best modern practice; but he would scarcely venture to condemn it on examination of the plans, with the knowledge of how thoroughly it was constructed, and under what distinguished superintendence, with the fact which must always be taken into consideration that these cribs have carried their burden of stone without a symptom of yielding for half a century.

Another might object to the ten-foot concrete wall, thinking it ought to be something else, but he too must hesitate when he contemplates the work it has faithfully performed for so long a time.

All must acknowledge that the earth part has grown more and more solid with age, and that it is perfectly secure, so long as it is not overflowed.

In estimating the strength of this structure it must be taken into consideration that its days of greatness have passed. Formerly it was something that people went out of their way to see, but now, when they hear of dams one thousand five hundred to one thousand seven hundred feet long, with walls of stone one hundred and eighty feet above the river bed, and extending ninety feet below it, this sinks into insignificance. It is only fifty feet high, and about four hundred feet long.

I have said this dam is as near being absolutely and unquestionably safe as any structure can be, within certain limits. As is shown by the diagram the north end of the dam is entirely of earth, not even having a central core of masonry, as called for in modern practice. If the water should rise above it, and continue for any length of time, that portion would undoubtedly be washed away. Possibly a nine-inch waterfall, extending over the whole water-shed, might do it, possibly not.

The highest point the water has reached above the crest, as far as known, is eighty-one inches (six feet nine inches), coming within one foot six inches of the top of the bank. There is no record of the extent of the rain-fall which caused this rise.

I have gathered from the records of the Department of Public Works the following statistics as to the height of water over the crest at different times:

January 8, 1874, height over crest, eighty inches.

January 9, 1874, height over crest, sixty-seven inches, six inches rain-fall in twenty-four hours.

March, 1876, height over crest, sixty-three inches.

April, 1876, height over crest, sixty inches.

August, 1874, height over crest, sixty inches, five inches rain-fall in twenty-four hours.

December 11, 1878, height over crest, seventy-four inches, six inches rain-fall in twenty-four hours.

February 13, 1881, height over crest, sixty-seven inches.

September 24, 1882, height over crest, sixty inches, eleven inches rain-fall in two days.

February 21, 1888, height over crest, sixty-six inches, three inches rain-fall in twenty-four hours.

January 12, 1891, height over crest, sixty inches.

Six inches of rain-fall over the whole area of the water-shed above Croton Dam amounts to more than 36,900 millions of gallons, forty per cent. of which is 14,700 million gallons. The nine-inch rain-fall spoken of by Mr. Francis would amount to over 55,350 millions of gallons, forty per cent. of which is 22,140 million gallons.

If we assume that forty per cent. of these rain-falls will reach the river and flow to the dam, with the regularity of their fall, there would arrive, each hour, from the six-inch rain-fall 615 million of gallons, and from the nine-inch rain-fall, 921 million gallons.

The velocity of water over a weir, when its depth reaches eight feet, is not known, but if we assume it to be fifteen feet per second, the discharge at the Croton Dam with eight feet of depth would amount to 875 million gallons per hour, and with sixteen feet per second it would be 933 million gallons per hour. According to this the six-inch rain-fall would not be alarming, and it has heretofore been resisted; the nine-inch rain-fall would place it in doubt.

This nine-inch rain-fall over the whole shed is amongst the possibilities. To guard against this possibility I cannot consider it wise, in a financial point of view, to expend \$3,600,000 when the weak part extending over only 125 feet, could be strengthened so as to meet all possibilities, at a cost not exceeding \$150,000.

Even supposing this dam to give way, I would not apprehend the water famine predicted. To deal a little in probabilities—it is probable, nay almost certain, that in the event of a fresher over-topping the earth portion, that part alone would be washed away. I would ask how long it would require the City of New York, with unlimited resources, and with the water famine in view, to erect a temporary dam to fill up this little gap of 125 feet? certainly not more than two days, or three at the farthest. During that time the reservoirs at Central Park could amply supply us.

Suppose further, that in addition, the whole of the 180 feet up to the part founded on rock should go, making in all 305 feet, I would ask how long would it require to erect a temporary dam? not longer than five days at the farthest.

With regard to the first proposition of the Committee, "Whether a dam was needed for additional storage?" I report as follows:

The storage provided for in the four reservoirs above mentioned, which is in addition to the 9,541 million at present in use, is 30,000,000,000. The Chief Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, Mr. Birdsall, in his report of the 21st October, 1890, states that "the present yearly increase in the consumption of water is 3,000,000 gallons per day, which would require, in very dry years, 750,000,000 gallons additional storage capacity each year. The storage reservoirs now in course of construction or under contract will provide for the storage required for the next twenty-two years, and if the supply of water for the last eight years is taken as a basis, they would furnish the necessary storage for the next forty years."

This opinion, coming as it does, from one who has been intimately associated with the water supply of the city for the last twenty years, and has been in immediate charge, as Chief Engineer, for over seven years, is entitled to great weight.

Mr. Church, former Chief Engineer of the New Aqueduct, gives as the amount of storage necessary to supply the city with 240 million gallons daily, under the same conditions as existed in 1880, the year of minimum supply, as 37,125,439,100 gallons.

Chief Engineer Isaac Newton gives the additional amount of storage necessary to supply 250 millions daily, under the same conditions as existed in 1880, as 34,577 million gallons (see Table I accompanying his report of February 21, 1883).

In Appendix "B," accompanying the same report, he gives 33,239,471,000 as the necessary amount of storage for supplying 244,540,000 gallons daily.

Below I give an extract from Table 3, accompanying the report of the Commissioners of the New Aqueduct of 1887, giving the average daily flow of Croton river for the years 1880 and 1881, and showing the quantities necessary to be drawn from reservoirs in order to furnish a supply to the city of 250,000,000 per day:

The above tables agree very nearly with the computation of Chief Engineer Newton, and show that,

In order to provide for a supply of 250,000,000 gallons a day we have to furnish 3,740,342,100 storage in addition to present arrangements.

By a similar calculation, I find that, in order to supply daily 235 million gallons, storage would be required for 30,065 million gallons.

We are drawing now from the Croton River Aqueduct about 135 million gallons per day, and from the Bronx river system 10 million gallons, making a total of 145 millions. When the full supply is given, the amount will be 151 million gallons per day. Taking the population of the city at 1,655,598, as given by the Health Department in its report published in the CITY RECORD of January 7, 1891, this supply is at the rate of 91 gallons per capita.

With this per capita, an increase of 100,000,000 gallons per day would represent 1,111,111 persons.

Assuming an increase of 30 per cent. per decade in the population of the city, and starting with 1,655,598 as above, the city will have, in twenty years, 2,797,960 inhabitants, being an increase of 1,142,362.

These figures appear to me to lead to the following definite conclusions:

1st. That the reservoirs now in course of erection will provide, within a small amount, sufficient storage for an increase of 100 million gallons per day.

2d. That at the present rate per capita this increased amount will supply 1,111,111 persons.

3d. That at the assumed rate, 30 per cent. per decade, this increase of population will be reached in about nineteen years.

4th. That the reservoirs now in course of erection will be sufficient for at least that time.

When all the reservoirs that can be suitably built in the upper water-shed shall have been erected, then the great dam should be constructed at Quaker Bridge, or at the locality a short distance above, selected by Mr. Fteley, which will furnish 30,000 million gallons of storage.

Schramke's Description of the Construction of Croton Dam.

The Croton Dam: At the above-mentioned point the dam, plate II, figure 4, was erected in order to raise the water and to form the Croton Lake. Figure 3 shows the profile of the river. At first a length of only ninety feet was given for the dam B, and this part was erected after the profile of figure 1, with a construction similar to that of figure 5, extending then only from a to b,

figure 3, occasion for which was given by the rock lying here, affording a good foundation. The remainder of the river profile to d was to be filled with an earth embankment. A considerable fresher, however, carried away this embankment when partly completed, and it was resolved to extend the stone dam one hundred and eighty feet further to C. For the erection of this part, A, figures 3 and 5, the bottom of the river was cleared from mud and boulders, and the piers C and D, of twelve-inch hemlock timber successively built up, the walls were connected together by ties and filled with stone closely packed in, the top was covered with six-inch plank of white pine and treenailed; upon this planking the timber piers F and G were erected, but only "F" covered with plank. While erecting these piers, the space E was filled with concrete and the piers near the top connected with ties. Both these piers, together with their filling of concrete being the armature of the dam, served at the same time for coffer-dam against the water above. Against G, another timber pier, H, was in like manner constructed, with but one timber wall in place of the other, anchors of round timber were laid in and with the ties joggled together. The timber of these piers is of hemlock, twelve inches by twelve, the ties of white oak seven inches thick at the smaller end, framed with single dove-tails four inches thick, figure 8, and fastened with one-inch treenails, which are placed ten feet from centre to centre; the pier timber, figures 6 and 9, are treenailed thirty inches deep, with two-inch treenails of white oak; these nails are sometimes put nearer together, and the ties likewise; the planking was of white pine. When the timber piers had reached a certain height, the piers K K, of four compartments, were put down, two of which, the nearest to low water, were packed with stone, the two others were filled with concrete, and formed the coffer-dam against the water below the dam; the courses were of twelve by twelve inch hemlock, the ties of oak eight inches at the smaller end and six feet apart from centre to centre, the treenails of the squared timber the same. The uppermost of them were made of elm and white oak, treenailed every three feet thirty inches deep, two and one-half inches in diameter. The upper trees, figures 7 and 9, are of elm twelve inches square. To this course of ties, a bed-timber of white elm is joggled and secured by iron screw bolts, figure 9. Across these bed-timbers or caps an apron planking of six inches elm is fastened by one and one-half inch locust treenails of thirteen inches in length. Against the rear of this timber-pier the one marked L was erected; only against the backwater it has a regular timber-wall, figure 6. The ties of it were secured by anchors. A part of the apron planking of this pier is laid horizontally in connection with the apron of the pier K; the remainder is put three feet lower, figure 5. After the pit had been laid dry by pumps the ground and the space at f were filled in with concrete and leveled off. On this bed the body of the dam was by degrees erected of hydraulic stone masonry according to the bond, figure 10, and the courses of the face stone for the weir laid down. This face work is of granite, cut with such closeness as to allow the stone to be laid with a joint not exceeding three-sixteenths of an inch. The masonry is laid in horizontal courses to three feet from the extrados of the face work, where it is in courses corresponding with the radii. In front of the lip of dam below the head water, a fore embankment, figures 1, 2 and 5, was formed of earth, and its upper part secured with a dry stone pavement two feet thick.

In the part of dam first erected, B, figure 3 at b and figure 2 at b, a waste weir is constructed, in order to draw off the water of the lake from a greater depth. It consists of a well with culverts, having two sets of gates, all of which is protected with a small stone house, figures 2 and 3 at b, which can be reached by the bridge B, figures 1 and 3.

At a distance of three hundred feet from the lip, a secondary dam, figures 1 and 2, is constructed. It is erected of round timber, filled with dry stone. The object of this secondary dam is to divide the head of water by means of the water-basin formed by it, to break the body of water running over the weir and to keep the woodwork of the timber piers K and L under water. Near the left shore a waste-weir is constructed in this dam, in order to let off the water from the basin, when required.

Mr. Ambrose Snow then requested permission to present certain resolutions adopted by the New York Board of Trade and Transportation.

On motion of Commissioner Cannon, it was ordered that said resolutions be received and read, as follows:

ROOMS OF THE NEW YORK BOARD OF TRADE AND TRANSPORTATION, } NEW YORK, January 21, 1891.

At a special meeting of the New York Board of Trade and Transportation, held this day, called to consider "The completion of the work in the hands of the Aqueduct Commission for furnishing a water supply for this city," the following resolutions were unanimously adopted, and a committee of twenty appointed to present the same to the Aqueduct Commission:

Resolved, That, in the opinion of the Board of Trade and Transportation, the new Croton Dam recommended by Chief Engineer Fteley in his report of October 8 last, and also by the Construction Committee of the Aqueduct Commission, J. C. Duane, Chairman, ought to be proceeded with and built by said Commission with the least delay practicable;

Resolved, That the admitted insecurity of the old Croton Dam to withstand unusual and unexpected freshets, such as have visited other portions of the country, renders the building of this new dam imperative, in order to provide the greatest practicable security for the uninterrupted and continuous water supply of this city in times of unexpected, though possible, fresher or rain-fall; and further, that this new dam should be so constructed as to be beyond danger of being carried away by the failure of any of the dams in the water-shed above it;

Resolved, That the estimated cost of this dam, about two millions of dollars, ought not to be considered as against the security it will afford to the city of the certainty of a continuous supply of water, in times of unexpected fresher sufficient to destroy the present old Croton Dam.

Resolved, That the city, having now incurred within the past eight years an expenditure of more than twenty millions of dollars, to secure a full supply of pure and wholesome water, in the building of its great aqueduct and reservoirs in the upper Croton water-shed, should, by the completion of this dam, be secured for the present generation in the enjoyment of the most ample supply, which the plans of the Aqueduct Commission, when completed by the building of this dam, will afford, and thus enter upon and enjoy an immediate and full return for this great expenditure.

Resolved, That a Committee of twenty members of this Board be appointed to present the foregoing resolutions to the Aqueduct Commission at their meeting, to-morrow, Thursday, January 22, 1891.

Resolved, That the Committee on Water Supply be instructed to present this resolution to the Aqueduct Commission, and urge the hastening of the completion of the dam.

On the adoption of the substitute submitted by the Comptroller the vote was as follows:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller and the Commissioner of Public Works—3.

Negative—Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Cannon—4.

The original resolution presented by Commissioner Cannon was then adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Cannon—4.

Negative—The Mayor, the Comptroller and the Commissioner of Public Works—3.

The Commissioner of Public Works then presented the following preambles and resolution, and moved the adoption of the same:

Whereas, It has been decided by this Board that a dam be built at some point below the present Croton Dam; and

Whereas, The dam indicated as No. 2, in Engineer Fteley's report, furnishes no additional drainage area, and an additional storage capacity of but 16,000 million gallons, and will cost \$3,600,000; and

Whereas, The dam proposed to be erected at the point known as "Cornell's" will furnish twenty-one miles additional drainage area, and a storage capacity of 30,000 million gallons of water, and will cost, in comparison to its area and capacity, less than the dam erected at the point indicated as No. 2; and

Whereas, If a dam be built, it should be built at such point as to afford ample facilities for storage and water to the City of New York for the next fifty years; and

Whereas, Mr. George W. Birdsall, Chief Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, has reported that the erection of the dam at the point known as "Cornell's" would furnish an ample supply of water for the City of New York for the next fifty years, and such report is concurred in practically by Messrs. McLean and Fteley; therefore

Resolved, That the dam to be built under the direction of the Croton Aqueduct Commissioners be built at the point designated as "Cornell's."

The same were adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Commissioner of Public Works and Commissioners Tucker, Scott and Cannon—5.

Negative—The Comptroller and Commissioner Duane—2.

Commissioner Cannon then moved that the report of the Construction or Executive Committee, submitted on January 7, be adopted after striking out all of said report after the words "Chief Engineer" on the thirty-fourth line of page 11 of the minutes of said date, and adding thereto the words "or on a site in its near neighborhood."

The Commissioner of Public Works moved as an amendment that all reports and documents referring to the subject be spread in full on the minutes.

Which was adopted.

On motion of Commissioner Scott, the Chief Engineer was directed to prepare as soon as possible detailed plans, maps and specifications providing for the construction of the dam this day determined upon by the Aqueduct Commissioners.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.
