The Committee on Repairs and Supplies, to whom was referred the annexed protest of merchants and others against the removal of the Station-house of the Twenty-eighth Police Precinct, respectfully

REPORT:

That, upon an investigation of the subject so referred, your Committee find that a resolution was introduced into the Board of Commissioners of the Police Department of the City of New York to abolish the Twenty-eighth Police Precinct, but that no final action has yet been taken on the proposition by the Commissioners. With a view of preventing the removal of the Station-house, and the abolition of the Precinct, a remonstrance, numerous signed by citizens, tax-payers, warehouse-keepers, and merchants, was presented to the Common Council, and referred to your Committee. Entertaining doubts as to the power of the Common Council to interfere authoritatively in the premises, the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation was sought and obtained, and is herewith attached as part of this report, from which it will be seen that the supposition of your Committee was correct, and that the jurisdiction over the question is vested exclusively in the Board of Police.

This fact being established by the authoritative official opinion of the legal adviser of the Corporation, the petitioners will perceive that the city authorities are powerless to effect the object they have in view, and that aid can be given them only to the extent that the Commissioners of Police may defer to a request made by the Common Council.

Did the power exist in the corporate authorities to grant the request of the petitioners, your Committee would not hesitate in their recommendation to your Honorable Body to do so. The numerous influential and prominent business men, whose names are signed to the remonstrance, would be a sufficient guarantee to your Committee, as it would doubtless be to your Honorable Body, that the proposed abolition of the precinct, if carried into effect, would be detrimental to the public interests, injurious to the business of the remonstrants, and not called for by any public emergency.

As the question now stands, however, it only remains to the Common Council to use the weight of its influence with the Board of Commissioners of Police, to prevent the abolition of the precinct, by joining its remonstrance to that of the protestants, and by requesting that final action on the resolution be indefinitely postponed by the Commissioners of Police.

The following resolution is, therefore, respectfully offered for your adoption:

Resolved, That the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York be and is hereby respectfully requested to defer action indefinitely on the proposition heretofore submitted to that Board to abolish the Twenty-eighth Police Precinct.

SIR—In reply to your communication regard-

ing the power of the Board of Police to alter, establish, or abolish a police precinct in the city, I beg leave to state that I have given the matter due consideration, and my opinion is as follows:

Previous to the act of April 15, 1857 (Laws of 1857, chapter 569), creating a Metropolitan Police District, the police of the City of New York had no special powers as a body or department, otherwise than the common law powers of constables, so far as they had not been altered by special statute. The Metropolitan Police Act created a Police Department, and conferred powers thereto unknown to the head of the police in the cities. Section 10 of that act provides for a division, by the Board of Police, of the district into precincts, not exceeding forty in number. That Board was also empowered to regulate and control the force by rules and regulations, as they should from time to time be enacted. They were also given all the powers theretofore held by the Board of Commissioners of Police. Acts subsequent to this made no alteration in material features, till the act of 1864, April 25 (Laws of 1864, chapter 403), provided that precincts might from time to time be established by said Board, not to exceed in the aggregate one precinct to each fifty of the patrolmen. The Charter of 1870, and acts supplemental thereto (Laws of 1870, chapters 137-383), excepts the City of New York from the provisions of the Metropolitan Police Act, creates a Department of Police, and gives extended powers to the Board of Police. Nothing whatever is said of precincts, but section 76 of that charter gives to the Department all powers held by the Metropolitan Police not inconsistent with the act. The Charter of 1873 and supplementary acts (Laws of 1873, chapters 335 and 755), repeal the Charter of 1870, but continue the powers of the Department of Police, thereby created as fully as the same were held by the Board of Metropolitan Police, as far as the same were not inconsistent with the terms of the Charter. But this new clause is inserted (section 49). The Board of Police may, by and with the authority and approval of the Mayor, and the Common Council \* \* \* established \* \* \* stations and sub-stations, and station and sub-station-houses. Rule 5 of the Police Department (Ed. of 1873) is partly as follows: "For the purposes of police government, the territory of the City of New York is divided into Inspection Districts, Surgeons' Districts, and Precincts, subject to alteration from time to time by the Board of Police."

It will be seen from the above laws that, originally, the creation of precincts devolved upon the Board of Metropolitan Police, subject to certain restrictions. But it was a power separate from the general power of regulating the force, as each act gives that specifically and separately. The act of 1864, however, modifies that provision as to establishing precincts; and a very broad and discretionary power is given to establish precincts, subject to the one restriction that there shall be no more precincts than one to each fifty of the patrolmen. The Charters of 1870 and 1873, and acts amendatory thereof, give the Police Department of the City of New York all the powers held by the Metropolitan Police, except as otherwise provided, and no provision is contained as to precincts. The provision of section 49 of the Charter of 1873 gives an indirect influence in the creating or abolishing of precincts to the Mayor and Common Council, for no money can be used to build station-houses without their consent. The division of the city into precincts is a disciplinary act, as the regulations in regard to the force depend upon precinct divisions, and the power to regulate and discipline the force is expressly lodged in the Board of Police. The rule of the Police Department in that regard, also, shows the interpretation and construction hitherto placed upon the laws by the Police Department, and such interpretation seems to have been admitted.

In my opinion, the power to establish, change, or abolish precincts is vested in the Police Department of the City of New York.

The Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York.

GENTLEMEN—Referring to the resolutions adopted by the Board of Police Justices, on the 30th of March last, and presented to your Board by Alderman Morris, at a meeting held April 1, concerning the location of a Court-house and Prison for the use of the Police Court of the Sixth District of the City of New York, the Board of Police state that they concur with the views expressed in said resolutions, so far as they relate to the location of such Court-house and Prison, and join with the Board of Police Justices in earnestly and respectfully protesting against the location of said Court-house at Fordham.

The Police Department being charged by law with the duty of taking to and arranging before the Police Court of the largest share of persons arrested for offenses, are deeply interested in the question of location of Court-houses, with reference to the proximity to the Police Stations, where the prisoners are first taken.

In the case in question, the Court of the Sixth District has the disposition of all the prisoners taken into custody in the Thirty-third, Thirty-fourth, and Thirty-fifth Precincts.

The Station-house of the Thirty-third Precinct is located in Morrisania, the Thirty-fourth in Tremont, and the Thirty-fifth at or near Kingsbridge. There is a horse railroad running from the Thirty-third to the Thirty-fourth Precinct, affording a convenient and cheap mode of transferring prisoners.

If the Court-house is located in Tremont, prisoners arrested in that (the Thirty-fourth) Precinct can walk to Court; those arrested in the Thirty-third can be taken to Court on the horse cars; while those of the Thirty-fifth only would require to be taken to Court by wagon and team.

This arrangement would be more convenient, and much more economical than any other location.

The proposed location at Fordham would largely increase both the travel and the cost involved in transferring prisoners to Court, and would subserve no interest immediately connected with the business of the Court or the Police Department.

For these and kindred reasons the Board of Police respectfully suggest that good policy, convenience, and economy require that the Court-house and Prison for the Sixth District should be located in Tremont, within walking distance of the Police Station-house of the Thirty-fourth Precinct.

ORDINANCES.

AN ORDINANCE to amend Chapter 42 of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, entitled "Of Pawnbrokers, Dealers in Second-hand Articles, and Keepers of Junk Shops—Relating particularly to Pawnbrokers."

ARTICLE I.

Of Pawnbrokers and Loanbrokers, or Keepers of Loan Offices.

Section 1. The Mayor may from time to time grant licenses, under his hand and seal, to such persons as shall produce to him satisfactory evidence of their good character to exercise or carry on the business of a pawnbroker, or of a loanbroker or keeper of a loan office, and no person shall exercise or carry on the business of a pawnbroker, loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office without being duly licensed by the Mayor, under the penalty of fifty dollars for each day he or she shall so exercise or carry on said business without such license.

Section 2. Every person receiving such licenses shall pay therefor the sum of fifty dollars for the use of the City.

Section 3. Every person so licensed shall, at the time of receiving such license, enter, with two sufficient sureties, into a joint and several recognizance to the Mayor and Aldermen of the City of New York in the penalty of five hundred dollars, conditioned for the due observance of all such ordinances of the Common Council as may be passed or in force respecting pawnbrokers and loanbrokers, or keepers of loan offices, at any time during the continuance of such license.

Section 4. Every pawnbroker and loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office, shall keep a book in which shall be fairly written, at the time of each loan, an accurate account and description of the goods, article, or thing pawned or pledged, the amount of money loaned thereon, the time of pledging the same, the rate of interest to be paid on such loan, and the name and residence of the person pawning or pledging the said goods, article, or thing.

Section 5. Every pawnbroker and loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office, shall, at the time of each loan, deliver to the person pawning or pledging any goods, article, or thing, a memorandum or note, signed by him or her, containing the substance of the entry required to be made in his or her book by the last preceding section; and no charge shall be made or received by any pawnbroker or loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office, for any such entry, memorandum, or note.

Section 6. The said book shall, at all reasonable times, be open to the inspection of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Special Justices for preserving the peace of the City of New York, or any or either of them, or of any person who shall be duly authorized in writing for that purpose, by any or either of them, and who shall exhibit such written authority to such pawnbroker, loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office.

Section 7. Every pawnbroker, loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office, who shall violate or neglect, or refuse to comply with any or either of the provisions of the fourth, fifth, or sixth sections of this chapter, shall, for every such offense, forfeit and pay the sum of twenty-five dollars.

Section 8. No pawnbroker, loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office, shall ask, demand, or receive any greater rate of interest than twenty-five per cent. per annum upon any loan not exceeding the sum of twenty-five dollars, or than ten per cent. per annum upon any loan exceeding the sum of twenty-five dollars, under the penalty of one hundred dollars for every such offense.

Section 9. No pawnbroker, loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office, shall sell any pawn or pledge until the same shall have remained one year in his or her possession; and all such sales shall be at public auction, and not otherwise, and shall be made or conducted by such auctioneer as shall be designated and approved of for that purpose by the Mayor of the City of New York.

Section 10. Notice of every such sale shall be published for at least six days previous thereto, in one

or more of the daily newspapers printed in the City of New York; and such notice shall specify the time and place at which such sale is to take place, the name of the auctioneer by whom the same is to be conducted, and a description of the goods or articles to be sold.

Section 11. The surplus money, if any, arising from any such sale, after deducting the amount of the loan, the interest then due on the same, and the expenses of the advertisement and sale, shall be paid over by the pawnbroker, loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office, to the person who would be entitled to redeem the pledge in case no such sale had taken place.

Section 12. No pawnbroker, loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office, shall make any loan on the separate or divided part or parts of any one article or thing, and which article or thing shall have been offered entire or collectively to him or her by way of pawn or pledge.

Section 13. No pawnbroker, loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office, shall, under any pretense whatever, purchase or buy any second-hand furniture, metals, or clothes, or any other article or thing whatever, offered to him or her as a pawn or pledge.

Section 14. Every pawnbroker, loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office, who shall violate or neglect, or refuse to comply with any or either of the provisions of the eighth, ninth, tenth, eleventh, twelfth, and thirteenth sections of this chapter, shall, for every such offense, forfeit and pay the sum of one hundred dollars.

Section 15. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 16. This ordinance shall take effect mediately.
