Present—Commissioners Tappen (President), Straus, Dana, Clausen. Mr. E. G. Marsh, representing the Comptroller, being present, and the meeting open to the public, the President, in the presence of the representative of the Comptroller and such of the parties making proposals as were present, opened the estimate box and publicly opened and read all the estimates or proposals which had been received in accordance with advertisements duly published in the CITY RECORD for the following-named works:

From the Advisory Art Committee, reporting favorably as to the pedestal for the statue of Columbus by Sunol, and recommending its acceptance. Referred to the Superintendent of Parks.

From John La Farge, in behalf of the Art Committee of the Century Club, asking to be heard with reference to the proposed location on the parks of the bust of William Cullen Bryant.

On motion, the 25th instant was fixed as a time for a hearing.

From the Secretary of the National Horse Show Association, asking that the Mounted Squad of the Park Police be allowed to take part in the coming Horse Show.

On motion, the request was granted, with the proviso that any test of riding that may be required be subject to the approval and supervision of the Captain of Police and the Roundsman of the Mounted Squad.

From Carrere and Hastings, Architects, offering to furnish without cost to the Department such drawings or general superintendence of the work as may be necessary for constructing the proposed tool-house in Central Park. Filed.

From the Secretary of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, relative to the condition of the plank walk leading from Eighty-second street and Fifth Avenue to the east basement door of the Museum building. Referred to the Superintendent of Parks, with power to remove or repair the walk.

From Thomas Dwyer, requesting a payment for work under his contract for erecting a boiler-house, etc., at the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Referred to Commissioner Clausen for report.

From Clarence A. Seward, in relation to the base of the pedestal for the statue of Roscoe Conkling.

On motion, the 25th instant was fixed as a time for a hearing on the subject.

From William Holmes, asking permission to test a preparation for preserving bronze on a portion of the Ericsson Monument in Battery Park. Filed.

From the Architects in charge of the Aquarium, submitting a time statement on the work of making alterations and repairs to Castle Garden building under Joseph Moore's contract, and recommending that no penalty be charged for overtime, the delays having been unavoidable. Approved.

From the Superintendent of Parks, and the General Inspector, reporting the death of a horse at the Park stables. Filed.

From W. G. Horgan, asking that monthly payments be made him for work done under his contract for cleaning the pond at Central Park. Filed.

On motion, Commissioners Straus and Clausen were appointed a Committee on the cleaning of the pond in Central Park.

From the Director of the Menagerie, recommending that the Menagerie be closed at 4.30 o'clock, after November 15, during the winter season. Approved.

From the Superintendent of Parks, reporting that he had requested the Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals to shoot a horse suffering from an incurable disease at the Park stables. Approved.

The President, to whom was referred the matter of the occupation of Goose Island in Pelham Bay Park, made a verbal report, and recommended that the assignment of the license now in the name of George Leviness to W. J. Elliot, be permitted. Which was approved.

The President presented a report of the transactions of the Department for the quarter ending June 30, 1893, which was ordered transmitted to his Honor the Mayor, and also printed as a document of the Board. (See Document No. 128).

Commissioner Tappen offered the following:

Hon. John Bigelow appeared and was heard in relation thereto, and the matter was laid over.

From the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen, transmitting a copy of a resolution authorizing this Department to contract, without public letting, for the various works necessary for the equipment of the new wing of the Metropolitan Museum of Art and for repairing the other parts of the building. Filed.

From the City Improvement Society, in relation to sidewalks on the proposed Harlem River Driveway. Filed.

From the Engineer of Construction, submitting plans and specifications for constructing that portion of the Harlem River Driveway lying between One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street and High Bridge.

The President submitted the following report as to the action taken by the Department under chapter 102 of the Laws of 1893:

HARLEM RIVER DRIVEWAY.

“ Report to the Commissioners of Public Parks :

“ Immediately after the enactment of the Law of 1893, chapter 102, authorizing this work, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment made an appropriation of \$10,000 for the expenses of surveys, plans and engineering. The act required the map to be prepared and filed within thirty days after the passage of the act, and was so prepared and filed, showing the location of the road for the entire distance about two miles.

“ An Engineering Corps has been at work since May 1, 1893, under Mr. Kellogg, Chief Engineer of Public Parks, with Mr. Charles H. Graham as his Chief Assistant. The west bank of the Harlem river presents many physical difficulties and obstructions to be overcome in planning and constructing the Driveway.

“ The Commissioners held a meeting on the ground in September to determine various questions presented by the surveys. They clambered the cliffs and thoroughly examined the proposed location both on the land and by taking a boat on the river. It became necessary then to determine the location of the sidewalk, and three of the Commissioners, one other Commissioner dissenting, determined to locate the sidewalk on the west side of the Drive and not on the water side. It was a question of safety and avoidance of all accidents or collision on the Driveway between drivers and their teams and foot passengers that led to this decision; its reasonableness is further apparent because we know that the landscape and other views of the valley of the Upper Harlem can be quite as well and indeed more safely enjoyed, and the purposes for which the law established this Driveway more intelligently carried out.

“ In the course of time a far better promenade for pedestrians will be laid out, not on the extreme margin on the river side of the road, but higher up on the cliffs, a place indicated by natural surroundings for a romantic promenade. Small footpaths have been worn by visitors on the elevations thus indicated.

“ In the prosecution of the difficult engineering work there has been expended up to October 15, 1893, out of the appropriation, for salaries and wages, the sum of

“ The best interests of the public will be promoted by construction of road and walk on the plans adopted, and the chief purpose for which the law was passed can only be attained by adhering to that plan, which at present involves the construction of the first section of the Drive for a distance of about one mile south of Highbridge.”

Debate was had upon the question of the location of a sidewalk on the Driveway, Commissioners Tappen, Straus and Clausen advocating the walk on the west side, and Commissioner Dana favoring the river side.

Mr. Lawson N. Fuller appeared and was heard in favor of a sidewalk on the river side.

Commissioner Dana called up the preamble and resolution offered by him and laid over on the 25th instant, and moved the adoption of the same as follows:

Whereas, The City has obtained possession of two miles of the Harlem water front for purposes of public recreation, which property includes the two parks known as High Bridge Park and Washington Bridge Park,

Resolved, That the public right of access to the water front of the two parks aforesaid should not be abridged, but should be maintained in respect to them, and to the entire length of the property to be known as the Harlem River Driveway.

Which was lost by the following vote:

Ayes—Commissioner Dana—1.

Noes—Commissioners Tappen, Straus, Clausen—3.

Commissioner Tappen offered the following:

Resolved, That the plans, specifications and form of contract for constructing the first section of the Public Driveway, being that portion lying between One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street and High Bridge, be and the same hereby are approved, and that the specifications and form of contract be ordered printed; that the sum of one million dollars is hereby certified as necessary for carrying out the work, and that the Comptroller be requested to issue, for such purpose, bonds to said amount in such sums as may from time to time be required, as provided by chapter 102 of the Laws of 1893.

Commissioner Dana then retired.

The question was then put on the resolution offered by Commissioner Tappen, which was adopted by the following vote:

From James Grant Wilson, in relation to the erection of the statue of Columbus in Central Park; and

From the Superintendent of Parks, reporting that the pedestal of the statue, as approved by the Art Committee, was adapted to the site chosen, and suggesting that the statue be made to face the Shakespeare statue. Approved.

From James M. Motley, in relation to the necessity for lighting the bridge roads in Central Park. Referred to the Superintendent of Parks for report.

Mr. J. V. D. Card appeared and was heard in regard to the improvement of the Plaza at One Hundred and Tenth street and Central Park, West.

From the Executive committee of the United Order of American Carpenters and Joiners, advising the Department of the appointment of a committee to present grievances to this Board. Filed.

The committee named in said communication appeared and were heard in relation to the employment of workmen by the Department or its contractors who are not citizens and residents of this city.

From Joseph Wolf, Architect:

1st. Submitting specifications and forms of contracts for work in the new wing of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, as follows:

Wall and table cases for Gold room.

Wall cases for five northeast galleries.

Wall cases for five north centre galleries.

Wall cases for five northwest galleries.

Approved.

2d. Submitting estimates for furnishing and erecting wall and table cases in the new wing of the Art Museum, and recommending that contracts be awarded to the lowest bidders, as follows:



SEALED ESTIMATES FOR SUPPLYING THE City Government with Blank, Printed or Lithographed Books, Dockets, Libers, etc., will be received at this office until 12 o'clock M. of Thursday, the 14th day of December, 1893, at or about which time said estimates will be publicly opened and read at a meeting of the Board of City Record, to be held in the Mayor's Office.

Each person making an estimate shall inclose it in a sealed envelope, indorsed "Estimate for furnishing Blank Books, etc.," and with his name and the date of its presentation.

Each estimate shall state the name and place of residence of the person making it; if there is more than one such person, their names and residences must be given; and if only one person is interested in the estimate it must distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud; and that no member of the Common Council, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making it that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. Where more than one person is interested it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled upon its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested.
