## BOARD OF CITY RECORD.

JANUARY 7, 1876.

The officers designated by section 111 of chapter 335, Laws of 1873, met in the Mayor's office at 1:30 P. M., Friday, January 7, 1876.

All were present, viz.: William H. Wickham, Mayor; William C. Whitney, Counsel to the Corporation; and Fitz John Porter, Commissioner of Public Works.

The minutes of the meetings held January 4 and January 5, 1876, were read and approved.

The Counsel to the Corporation offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That in pursuance of the authority contained in section 3 of chapter 758, Laws of 1873, the Comptroller is hereby authorized to publish, in the papers heretofore designated as Corporation newspapers by the Mayor, Counsel to the Corporation, and the Commissioner of Public Works, under section 111, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, proposals for the issue of Stocks and Bonds of the City of New York, notices of the Receiver of Taxes, the Clerk of Arrears, and the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and such other official advertisements of the Finance Department as are required by law to be published.

The Chairman put the question upon agreeing with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following concurrent vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Counsel to the Corporation, and the Commissioner of Public Works.

The Secretary was, on motion, directed to transmit a certified copy of said resolution to the Comptroller.

The Supervisor was directed, on motion, to fill requisitions on file in his office for printing stocks and bonds for the Department of Finance.

The Commissioner of Public Works offered the following resolution for adoption:

Resolved, That the following bill be approved and referred to the Chairman of the Board for certification and requisition on the Comptroller for payment, to be paid for out of the appropriation specially provided:

THE PUBLICATION OF THE CITY RECORD FOR THE YEAR 1875.

Martin B. Brown, for printing, etc. the CITY RECORD for the month of December, 1875, \$2,753.59. The Chairman put the question upon agreeing with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Counsel to the Corporation, and the Commissioner of Public Works.

The Mayor submitted the following rules to be observed in procuring advertising and supplies of stationery, printing, and blank books.

1. All expenditures for advertising, printing, stationery, and blank books, shall be made under the direction of the Supervisor of the City Record.

2. All requisitions for advertising, printing, stationery, and blank books, shall be drawn upon the Supervisor of the City Record, and by him submitted to the Board.

3. All bills payable out of the appropriation for advertising, printing, stationery, and blank books, shall be certified by the Supervisor of the City Record to the Board for approval.

4. A monthly report shall be made to the Board of the bills incurred and the bills approved during each month.

5. A book shall be kept in the office of the CITY RECORD showing the amount of stationery provided for each Department and office separately.

6. The work required shall be done as far as practicable by contract, especially the printing of the proceedings and documents of the Board of Aldermen, of the Annual Reports of the Board of Health, and the Board of Police Justices, the Minutes of the Board of Park Commissioners, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

7. Files of the various blanks required in the Departments and offices shall be kept in the office of the CITY RECORD, and estimates received for printing them either by the 1,000 and token, or by price for specific jobs.

8. The Supervisor shall prepare a statement of the quantities used annually by the Departments and offices of the principal items of stationery, and submit the same to this Board for consideration.

9. No authority shall be given to any Department or office to supply its own stationery, or to order its own printing or advertising.

The foregoing rules were, on motion, approved.

That the driving of sheep across the city shall be confined to Forty-second street for those starting from below Fiftieth street, and to Sixty-fifth street for those starting from above Fiftieth street; the flocks not to exceed 250 in number, and not to follow each other in the cross streets, at intervals of not less than one-fourth mile.

That upon the report of the Sanitary Superintendent to the effect that the process, apparatus, and implements of the New York Cleaning and Disinfecting Company and of John Schriemer for the removal of night-soil from privies, sinks, etc., are satisfactory for the purpose, and in accordance with the rules and regulations for scavengers, and the provisions of the Sanitary Code, this Board respectfully recommends to his Honor the Mayor, that a license as scavenger be granted to the New York Cleaning and Disinfecting Company and to John Schriemer for one year, from February 1, 1876.

That the Attorney be and is hereby authorized and directed to commence actions against Dr. Thomas B. Stirling and Mrs. Blackhall, midwife, for violation of the Sanitary Code.

That the Attorney and Counsel be directed to commence actions, in the name of the Board, against the following-named persons for violation of the Sanitary Code:

## Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau during the week ending January 29, 1876: The total number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,315, as follows: 10 public buildings, 653 tenement houses, 99 private dwellings, 41 other dwellings, 9 manufactories and workshops, 4 stores and warehouses, 51 stables, 55 slaughter-houses, 1 cemetery, 1 coal yard, 5 fat-rendering establishments, 1 stock yard, 4 manure dumps, 1 market, 1 gut-cleaning establishment, 10 sunken and vacant lots, 20 yards, courts, and areas, 57 cellars and basements, 90 waste-pipes and drains, 78 privies and water-closets, 6 street-gutters and sidewalks, 10 dangerous stairways, 1 cistern and cesspool, 1 piggery, 5 dangerous chimneys, 4 violations of Code, 3 other nuisances, and 94 visits to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 470. During the past week 45 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

29 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes.

45 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 51 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 43 houses, 43 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

28 persons sick with small-pox were removed to the Hospital and 2 dead bodies to the Morgue by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported during the week ending January 29, 1876: Typhoid fever, 9; cerebro-spinal meningitis, 8; measles, 55; diphtheria, 106; scarlet fever, 52; and small-pox, 39.

272 cans and 69 tanks of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city during the week ending January 29, 1876.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending January 29, 1876: Cattle, 2 carcasses; calves (bob), 4 carcasses; calves (case), 1 carcass; sheep, 9 carcasses; antelopes, 4 carcasses; beef, 229 pounds; and veal, 60 pounds.

During the week ending January 29, 1876, there were issued from this bureau 531 burial permits for city deaths, 17 for bodies in transitu, and 52 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 531 deaths, 126 marriages, 474 births, 52 still-births, 17 applications for transit permits, and 52 returns from Coroners. There were 35 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 7 transcripts of birth record, 5 of marriage, and 24 of death were issued from this bureau.

SIR—There were 531 deaths reported during the week ending Saturday, the 29th instant, being a decrease of 69 compared with the number reported the previous week, and 45 less than the number reported the corresponding week of the previous year. The actual number of deaths which occurred during the week ending January 22 was 583, or 41 less than occurred during the corresponding period of 1875, showing an annual death-rate of 28.74 per 1,000, estimating the population at 1,054,710. The mean temperature of the week was 35.9 degrees Fahr. (as reported by Daniel Draper, Director of Meteorological Observatory at Central Park), or 9.1 degrees higher than the corresponding period of last year.

There was a decrease of 7 deaths during the present compared with the past week reported from small pox, 2 from scarlatina, 15 from diphtheria, 6 from membranous croup, 3 from cancer, 20 from phthisis pulmonalis, 11 from pneumonia, 7 from hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 35 in Institutions, 8 of persons over 70 years of age, and 27 of children under 5 years of age, and an increase of 2 from measles, 3 of whooping cough, 2 from diarrhoeal diseases, and 10 of bronchitis.

Of the 57 deaths reported of diphtheria, 28 occurred in houses containing over 3 families, 20 on first floor, 24 on second floor, 8 on third floor, 1 on fourth, and 3 on top. The highest mortality from diphtheria was in the Twenty-third Ward (7), while no deaths were reported from the Second, Third and Eighth Wards. Eight of the 13 deaths reported from scarlatina, 11 of the 15 from membranous croup, and 4 of the 8 from cerebro-spinal fever, occurred in houses containing over 3 families, and 1 each of membranous croup and cerebro-spinal fever in institutions. The average age of those who died during the past week from diphtheria was 3 years 3 months and 10 days; of scarlatina, 4 years 6 months and 10 days; of membranous croup, 2 years 2 months and 27 days; and of cerebro-spinal fever, 3 years 2 months and 11 days. Of the 95 deaths from diphtheria, scarlatina, membranous croup, cerebro-spinal and malarial fevers, the most fatal hour was 3 P. M., 8 deaths having occurred at this hour, and the least fatal was 8 A. M., none having been reported to have occurred.
