Resolved, That the Local Boards of the Sixth and Eighth Districts, Borough of Brooklyn, after hearing had this 2d day of May, 1901, deeming it for the public interest so to do, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements of the City of New York that, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, proceedings be initiated to alter the map or plan of the City of New York by changing the grade of Twentieth street, between Tenth avenue and Vanderbilt street, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Resolved, also, That the Local Boards recommend that all persons who have previously paid assessments on Twentieth street, for grading, should be exempt from further assessment, and all persons who have built upon the lawfully established grade at the time of the building should be awarded damages because of the change.

DEAR SIR—I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 12th instant, forwarding petition signed by Mr. Manneschildt, of No. 966 Myrtle avenue, for fencing lots on the north side of Hull street, between Rockaway and Stone avenues.

In reply, after an inspection by this Department, I beg to submit the following estimate that the matter may be referred for the action of the Local Board of the District:

Fencing vacant lots on the north side of Hull street, between Rockaway and Stone avenues, known as Lots Nos. 15 and 17, Block 122, Twenty-fifth Ward Map, with a close board fence, six feet in height. Estimated cost of fencing, \$25; assessed value of lots, \$740.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, President of the Borough of Brooklyn:

DEAR SIR—I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 14th instant in connection with the improvement of Fourteenth avenue, between Forty-third street and Beverly road, and Beverly road between Fourteenth avenue and Ocean parkway, advising that a question has arisen concerning that portion of Fourteenth avenue, between Beverly road and Thirty-sixth street (Marion lane), stating that this part of the street, as laid down on the map, is parallel with Church avenue and is so close to Church avenue that the property between the two streets will be practically worthless; also, as there is an apparent need of some change in the map, requesting that this Department recommend some plan for said change.

In reply I beg to state that Fourteenth avenue, between Beverly road and Thirty-fifth street, is almost parallel with Church avenue, distant from it about 50 feet at one end and 85 feet at the other, so that the property between these two streets is of scarcely any value.

North of Church avenue, between West street and Thirty-sixth street, there is a street laid down on the map called Story street, about 70 feet distant from Church avenue at one end and 90 feet at the other. This leaves another narrow strip between these two streets of practically no value.

Church lane or Church avenue was ignored when the Town Survey Map of the Twenty-ninth Ward was made. This street, however, has been in use as a thoroughfare for a great many years. There is also a double track railroad on the same, and I doubt, therefore, if the same could be legally closed. Furthermore, there are abundant reasons why it should remain as it is.

I would suggest that this part of the map of the Twenty-ninth Ward be changed by striking therefrom that part of Fourteenth avenue, between Thirty-fifth street and Beverly road, and extending the lines of Fourteenth avenue (as laid down on the map south of Thirty-fifth street) in a northerly direction until they intersect with Church lane or Church avenue, and by extend-

ing the lines of Beverly road in a westerly direction, from East Second street until they intersect with the lines of Church lane or Church avenue as widened; also that Church avenue be widened from a 66-foot street to a street of 100 feet in width, from the Ocean parkway to Fourteenth avenue, as extended, by adding a strip 17 feet in width to each side thereof, and that the northerly line of Church avenue thus established be extended to the easterly side of Thirty-sixth street; also that Story street, between West and Thirty-sixth streets, be stricken from the map, and that Chester avenue be extended from Story street to Church lane or avenue, as widened.

Herewith, I beg to hand you plan showing the changes recommended.

Resolved, That the Local Board of the Eighth District, Borough of Brooklyn, after hearing had this 2d day of May, 1901, deeming it for the public interest so to do, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements of the City of New York that, in pursuance of the provisions of section 436 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, proceedings be initiated to alter the map of the City of New York by striking therefrom that part of Fourteenth avenue, between Thirty-fifth street and Beverly road, and extending the lines of Fourteenth avenue (as laid down on the map south of Thirty-fifth street) in a northerly direction until they intersect with Church lane or Church avenue, and extending the lines of Beverly road in a westerly direction, from East Second street until they intersect the lines of Church lane or Church avenue as widened; also widening Church avenue from a sixty-six-foot street to a one hundred-foot street, from Ocean parkway to Fourteenth avenue, as extended, by adding a strip seventeen feet in width to each side thereof and extending the northerly line of Church avenue thus established to the easterly side of Thirty-sixth street; also striking from the map of the City of New York Story street, between West street and Thirty-sixth street; also extending Chester street, from Story street to Church lane or Church avenue, as widened.
